





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Hightower Says Officials Doing Little To Boost Farm Income

Hightower, crops ever to come out of Jim Democratic candidate for Texas Agriculture Commissioner, said recently that "Our government officials are fiddling, while a major farm depression is swepping Texas like a prairie fire."

Hightower, who was guest speaker at the Texas Farmers Union annual convention, said that "The family farmers of this state are in the worst financial since 1933, and the situation said. is out of control. That's bad and rural people, but for all entrepreneurial system and that stands between concontrol of our food supply. "This latest economic

what farmers already know-the farm economy is going bankrupt," plummeted for three years in a row, falling by 36 percent from 1979 to 1981, and another 15 percent to 30 percent during 1982.

In addition, the price of every crop was down in 1981, Great Depression. Farm concluded. production costs, however, continue to rise, jumping by more than 21 percent since 1979.

"Farmers have just creased 136 percent between produced some of the largest 1940 and 1980.
