## Rebel, Rebelettes Sweep Contest

The Rivercrest Rebels and Rebelettes each took a pair of district 20-AA wins last week. The first of the pair came last Tuesday night when the Rebels caged played host to the Harmony Eagles. The Rebelettes got off to a slow start in the opening game against Harmony. The Rebelettes got the initial tip-off, took the ball down court, and scored the only two points of the first quarter. The Eagles then took over possession of the ball and played pass for the remainder of the period leaving the Rebelettes on top after the first eight minutes of play, 2-0.

Girls head coach Frank Stubblefield then put his Rebelettes into a person-to-person defense which kept the Eagles from stalling and allowed the Rivercrest feds to rack up 21 points by half time and hold the Eagles scoreless. Excellent defense and a 23 point fourth quarter surge by the Rebelettes enabled them to post a 52-7 victory over Harmony.

Senior post Veronica Howerton led scoring for Rivercrest with 13 points. Jeann Ann Norman had 11 points and sophomore center Jackie Via added ten more. The Rebels also got off to a slow start as the Eagles jumped out to a 20-15 lead at

the end of the first quarter. The Rebels came back in the second period and held a two point lead at half time. After the break, the Rebels came out with blood in their eyes. They outscored the Eagles 20-8 in the third quarter and went on to post a 66-49 victory.

Stan Wood led scoring for the Rebels with 13 points. John Hines netted 12 points and Wyatt Bush and David Rozell each had ten.

Friday night's games carried the Rivercrest teams to Ore City to take on their namesake Rebels. The Rebelettes "brought the roof down" as they had to dodge fragments of ceiling insulation en route to a 67-49 victory. The Rebelettes

jumped out to an early lead that they never relinquished.

Veronica Howerton, averaging 29 points a game, led scoring with 25 points. Nelda Anderson had 16 and Jean Ann Norman added 13 more.

The win boosted the Rebelettes season record to 18-2 and kept their district record unblemished at six wins and no losses. It also made the Rebelettes the winners of the first half of district play.

In the nightcap, the

Rivercrest Rebels again came from a first quarter deficit to command a 40-32 half time lead over Ore City's Rebels. The Rebels stretched the lead over the final two quarters to end the game with a 89-64 victory.

Stan Wood led scoring with 20 points. David Wisinger and Bradley Moore each had 17, while David Rozell added 11 more.

The victory stretched the Rebels season record to 16-6 and district record to 4-1.

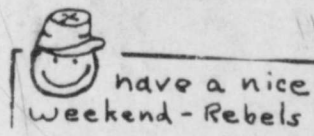

## Talco Man Critically Injured In Butane Truck Explosion

Travis Morgan of Rt. 1, Talco, was critically burned at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 26, when the butane tank truck he was driving on Hwy. 71 east of Hagansport went off the road on the north side, skidded and turned over twice. The truck came to rest on its wheels, but one of the two tanks on the truck ruptured, causing one major explosion and numerous minor explosions.

Morgan was reported in very critical condition in Parkland Hospital in Dallas with burns over 80% of his body. His wife, Pat, is attending him there.

Residents in the area, about a mile east of

Hagansport, said that there was an explosion like a tire blowing out followed by skidding in gravel. There were several very loud noises followed by an explosion and a fire ball that went several hundred feet into the air. Bobby Martin, who lives a few hundred feet from where the explosion occurred, and the first on the scene, found Morgan out of the truck and walking on the highway.

Morgan was taken to Red River General Hospital, then transferred to Paris to be taken to Dallas.

DPS Trooper Johnny Burns, who investigated the accident, said that the Talco Butane Truck's tanks were

both full at the time of the accident. The heat from the fire caused the pop off valve on the tank that was intact to release and send a stream of

fire approximately 100'. When the fire was the most intense, the pop off valve was releasing fire about every 45 seconds.

Volunteer Fire Departments from Mt. Vernon, Talco, South Franklin, and Hagansport sprayed water on the butane truck for

several hours following the accident in an effort to relieve the pressure inside the tank that did not rupture. Gene Smith, owner of Talco

Butane Co., checked the temperature of the tank approximately two hours after the accident, and the gauge indicated 210° F.

Thomas Ridge, pastor of the local Church of Christ led the congregation in singing favorite hymns. The large group of residents, friends and church members then gathered in the dining room to enjoy homemade pies baked by the ladies of the church.

He is a member of the Detroit Lions Club and attends Martin Memorial Methodist Church in Detroit.

Mr. Hood stated that he was very pleased to assist in Judge Sullivan's campaign. He feels that she has done an outstanding job during her first term of office, especially successfully in putting the county back on a sound financial footing.

## Tax Preparer Is Important

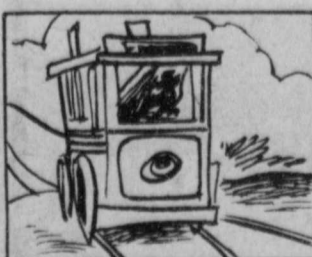
The choosing of a paid preparer by taxpayers to do their federal income tax returns should be done carefully, the Internal Revenue Service says.  
Most tax return preparers are honest and do not deliberately attempt to defraud either their clients or the IRS. However, a few abuse the responsibility of preparing a tax return for someone else, and the IRS has suggestions on how to identify these preparers.  
Taxpayers should not sign a blank return, or one which is partially completed, or one prepared in pencil. These could be altered by the preparer. Preparers should

be asked to sign the return in the taxpayer's presence, and give his or her identification number, as required by law. The taxpayer must be given a copy of the completed return.  
Preparers who promise a refund, claim a special relationship with the IRS or boast of ways to beat the tax system should be avoided.  
The choosing of a preparer is particularly important because the taxpayer, not the preparer, is responsible for the accuracy of the tax return. As much care should go into the choosing of a tax preparer as the selection of an attorney, doctor, or any other professional person.

## Defensive Driving Saves Money

New Texas law requires motorists to be covered by liability insurance.  
Motorists who've never been covered may be surprised at the high cost of liability insurance. This cost can be lowered by taking the Defensive Driving Course.  
Administered by the Texas Safety Association the Defensive Driving Course was written and produced by the National Safety Council.  
TSA statistics show those who complete the 8-hour DDC are better drivers. The Texas State Board of Insurance allows insurance companies to grant those who complete the course a ten percent reduction in insurance rates.  
This ten percent discount applies for three years and can be renewed by taking the course again and is allowed for the principal driver of each family car. The discount applies to policies written by rate-regulated

carriers. Discounts are given at the discretion of assigned risk pool and country mutual carriers.  
Fee for the course is usually \$18.00. DDC is taught by more than 650 agencies across the state to more than 225,000 persons yearly.

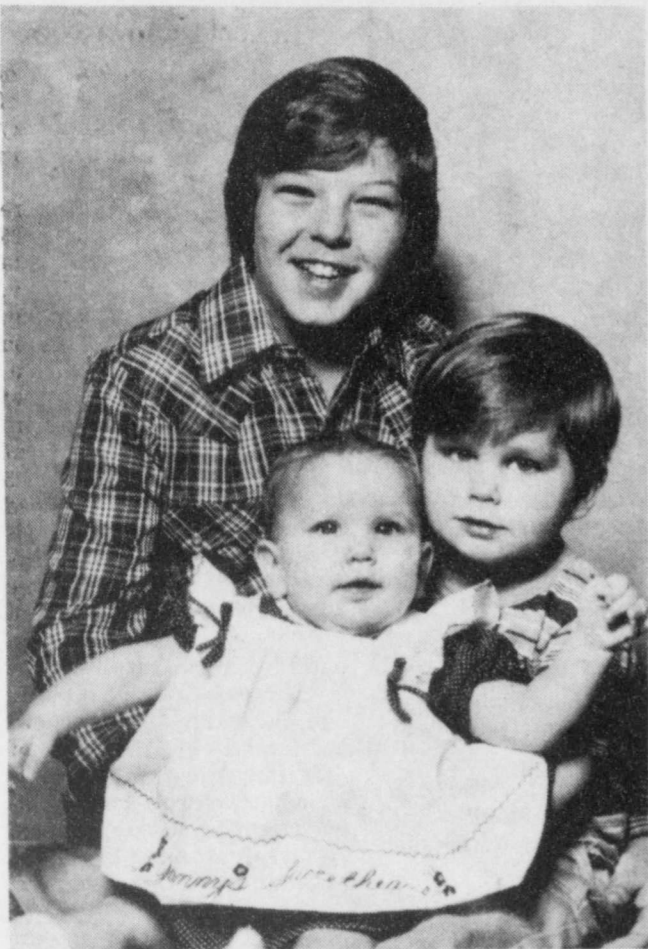

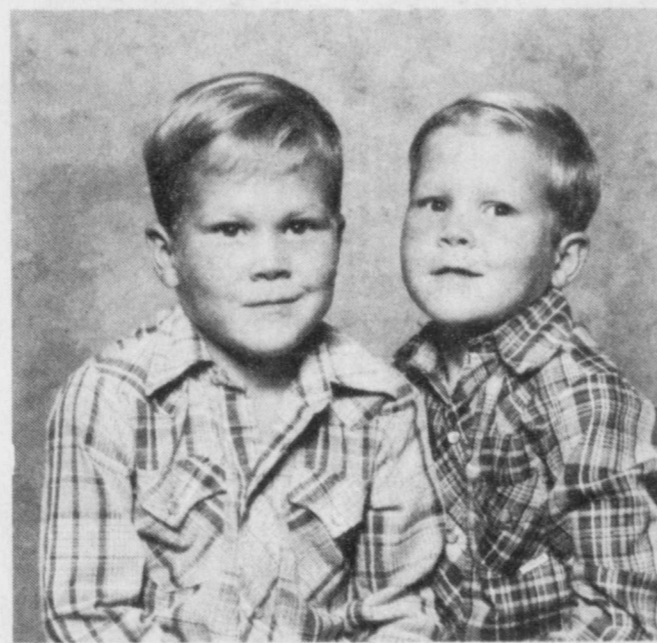

Sub-juniors, ages 9-11, shoot from the prone position only, whereas juniors, 12-13, and seniors, 14-18, shoot from three positions, prone,

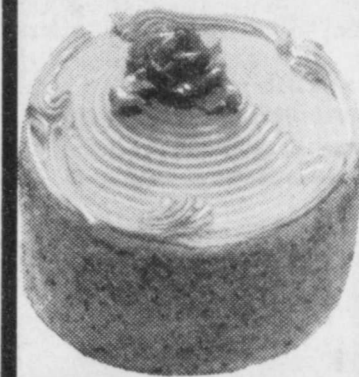

## HIGHWAY facts & fancies

Although few—if any—people still believe that cars going more than 15 miles an hour could cause cows to dry up in the fields they passed, the amount of facts and fancies in many people's heads about our highway and the vehicles that use them, could be surprising.

For example, few Americans may realize just how sorry a state our interstate highway system is in. In fact, almost three-fourths of it is already obsolete by modern road standards and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) estimates that the system is wearing out at an annual rate of 50 percent faster than it is being replaced. The FHWA goes on to report fully 60 percent of the nation's major roads are rated only fair and ten percent fall into the poor category.

You may not realize how much it can cost to repair those roads. In 1977, the FHWA reported that, excluding routine maintenance expenditures, states needed over \$18 billion to offset deterioration of the interstate system and will need some \$67 billion over the next 20 years to meet similar needs on non-interstate roads.

The cause of this rapid and expensive deterioration would come as a surprise even to some of the highway planners who helped build our roads originally. Most highways were built in the 1950s and 1960s to accommodate automobiles and trucks that seldom exceeded 50,000 pounds. Now, trucks weighing as much as 80,000 pounds use our roads. That causes an astounding 500 percent more damage per mile—and heavier trucks travel more miles per year.

How the repairs will be financed may afford other surprises. Most states charge fuel taxes on each gallon of gas sold and registration and other fixed fees. Surprisingly, while a heavy truck does use more fuel than a car, that doesn't mean the fuel tax paid by these heavy trucks is enough to offset the damage they cause. A study by the Department of Energy found that fuel consumption—and hence fuel taxes—increases only nominally as weight increases above 50,000 pounds. Heavy trucks cause more damage, but pay little extra fuel taxes. Increased fuel taxes fall most heavily on the vehicles least responsible for highway damage—cars and light trucks. Regis-

"At that time, PJC had three terms which worked out fine during the depression years, as some of us could drop out a semester and get a job, then return later," Clemo writes. He

played three years of football and was named all-state end in 1930 when PJC won the TJCAA state championship. Clemo lettered in football and basketball in 1930, '31 and '32 and was elected president of his freshman and sophomore classes for one term.

After graduating from PJC, he entered Austin College in Sherman, where he obtained his bachelor of arts degree in 1935. In the fall of that year, he was named head football and basketball coach at PJC, a position he held until he entered the Army in 1940.

An enlisted man, Clements advanced to the rank of major before the end of his tour of duty and received the Legion of Merit decoration while in New Guinea. After returning to the states, he began a new career in newspaper work at Gilmer,

where he worked for four years before purchasing the Panola Watchman at Carthage. He owned and operated the Watchman for 10 years and then bought the Lewisville Leader when he published for 10 years. While he published the newspaper, it won more regional, state and national awards than any other newspaper in Texas, large or small.

Clemo and his wife, the former Doris Bhael of Paris, are semi-retired and live at Hide-A-Way Lake near Tyler. Mrs. Clements graduated from PJC in 1933, and the couple's nephew, whom they reared, is a 1960 PJC graduate.
