For example, few Americans may realize just how sorry a state our interstate highway system is in. In fact, almost three-fourths of it is already obsolete by modern road standards and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) estimates that the system is wearing out at an annual rate of 50 percent faster than it is being replaced. The FHWA goes on to report fully 60 percent of the nation's major roads are rated only fair and ten percent fall into the poor category.

You may not realize how much it can cost to repair those roads. In 1977, the FHWA reported that, excluding routine maintenance expenditures, states needed over \$18 billion to offset deterioration of the interstate system and will need some \$67 billion over the next 20 years to meet similar needs on non-inter-
