Warning Period Expires For Liability Insurance

period for the new mandatory liability insurance law expires this week. After midnight Wednesday, March 31, state troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested.

The law, which became effective January 1, 1982, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person and property damage of \$5,000.
