The Rebelette tracksters were finally able to participate at Mt. Vernon Saturday after having missed their first meet at North Lamar the previous Saturday. Mother Nature hadn't been very kind for the early morning workouts or for the weekend meets. It was a different story Saturday however, and the Rebelettes took advantage of the sunshine and beautiful weather to improve on their times and distances.

The Rebelettes, a very young team composed of freshmen and sophomores, placed second in both the 400 meter and 800 meter relays and first in the 1600 meter relay. The good performances in the relays, along with outstanding individual efforts in the other events, allowed the team to place second in the meet with 158½ points. Cooper won the meet with 175 points. Forty-eight votes were cast in the City election Saturday for two councilmen and mayor.

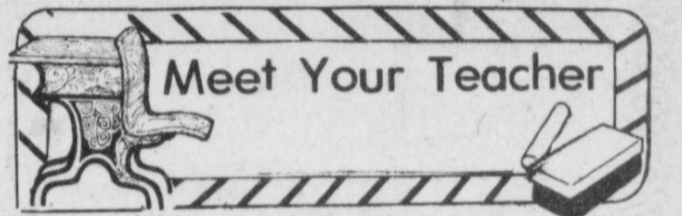

Red River County Seeks Tornado Assistance

Red River County Judge Connie Sullivan announced Tuesday, April 6, that the county is sending in a request for Federal aid for the county, due to the tornado that tore through the area Friday, April 2, 1982.

Total estimated damage in the county is \$811,500. \$292,000 of the damage is estimated to be agricultural sources.

One of the major sources of damage was to the poultry business of Leon Cox, whose business was totally

destroyed. Five chicken houses were devastated, and 30,000 chickens were killed. Fifteen head of cattle lost their lives, plus some 3,000 acres of land was affected.

Timber was lost, fences, barns and out-buildings were destroyed.

Four homes in Red River County were totally destroyed, 13 damaged, three mobile homes were destroyed and one heavily damaged. One church, the Mennonite Church, only

recently completed, was leveled. It was valued at \$100,000.

An estimated \$7,500 damage to county roads was set. This includes repairs and clean up. The heaviest damage was in Commissioner Ben Storey's precinct, near the Cox poultry farm. That road is still not completely clear.

Judge Sullivan stated that "we consider ourselves extremely fortunate, in that there were no casualties in our county."

The year 1836 was a very important one for Bogata. That was the year that Wm. and Mary Humphrey moved to Texas and settled on the location where the Community Center is now located.

The spot was chosen for its sweet springs and the shelter. The first house that was built on the hill is where the old Cooper place stands.

In 1910 the railroad came through. It was built on high ground on a line from Paris to Mt. Pleasant, so the town moved from its first beginnings at the springs to the railroad.

In the year 1881 a post office was established and the postmaster was R.E. Horner, who sent in the name of Maple Springs for the community. The Government wrote back and

said that there was already a town by that name, so the town was named Bogata.

In the past, the present park was deeded to the Boy Scouts to be used by them for the benefit of the community. For many years the park was used for a place for

all people and there was a cabin built there. But vandals were all too eager to destroy things as they were built, and the cabin was soon unusable to those who enjoyed the place.

Again, now, the place has been restored. In 1980 the

Lions Club of Bogata was formed and members have restored the community center as a meeting place for the Lions and for the use of Boy Scouts or any group that wants to use the building for a gathering.

Pirtle, Brown, Jeffery Elected To School Board

In the April 3 school trustee election for the Talco-Bogata CISD, two new members and one incumbent were elected to the board. H. Drue Pirtle of Johntown received a total of 222 votes, winning a three-year term for the Bogata area; Eddy Brown of the Maple Springs community received a total

of 176 votes winning a three-year term for the Talco area; Kenneth Jeffery of Bogata received a total of 195 votes winning the one-year at large position. Other candidates and the votes they received are as follows: Mildred Eudy of Bogata received a total of 150 votes; Gerald Martin of Talco

received a total of 136 votes and Scott Rackliff, Jr. of Talco received a total of 99 votes.

Write-in votes were received by the following: Roger Dale Simmons, 3 votes; Lyndon Ray Reed, 2 votes; Charlie Lewis, 1 vote, and A.D. Stephenson, 1 vote. The Board will be reorganized with new members being sworn in and new officers elected at the next regular meeting on Tuesday, April 13.

From Bogata H.E. Hawkins, Jim Pirtle and Hobart Dinwiddie from Talco, Vivian Westbrook, Ophelia Hood, Geanitta Brown held the elections.

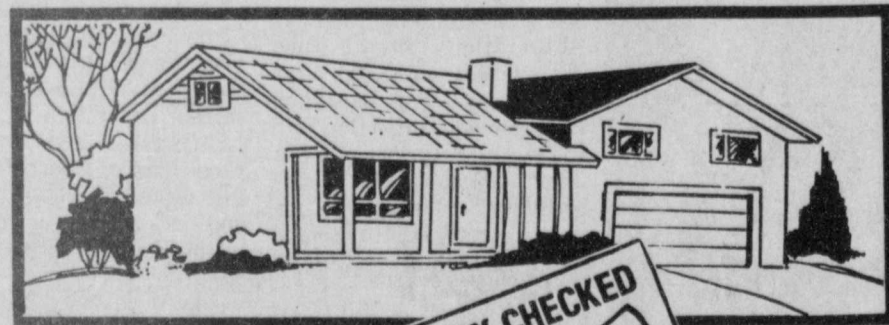
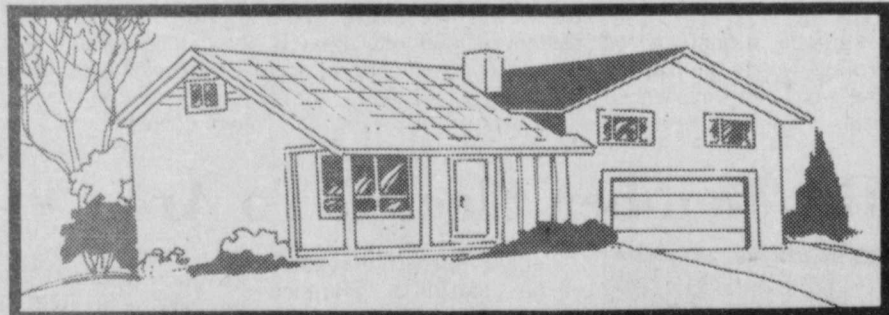

Deadline Approaches For All-Risk Insurance

The deadline is rapidly approaching for Lamar County farmers who want to carry insurance against the possible loss of their soybean crops. All-Risk Insurance District Director Bruce Hottel points out applications to insure spring planted crops must be received by April 15.

Congress has made a number of changes to make the insurance more attractive and affordable. One such change is a Federal

government subsidy of up to 30 percent of the insurance premium.

Still another change, Hottel says, is the opportunity to substitute private hail and fire insurance for the hail and fire coverage included in the All-Risk policy. When this option is chosen, the All-Risk insurance premium is reduced.

All-Risk insurance can be purchased from any authorized local agent.

Warning Period Expires For Liability Insurance

The 90-day DPS warning period for the new mandatory liability insurance law expires this week. After midnight Wednesday, March 31, state troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested.

The law, which became effective January 1, 1982, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person and property damage of \$5,000.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the law is encouraging more drivers to obtain the required coverage.

"DPS figures show that during 1981 approximately 73 percent of drivers involved in reportable accidents had the insurance," Adams

pointed out. "That number increased to 81 percent for the first two months of this year."

Drivers who fail to carry the required coverage risk being fined from \$75 to \$200 for the first offense and from \$200 to \$1,000 for subsequent violations. In addition, a conviction under the new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.

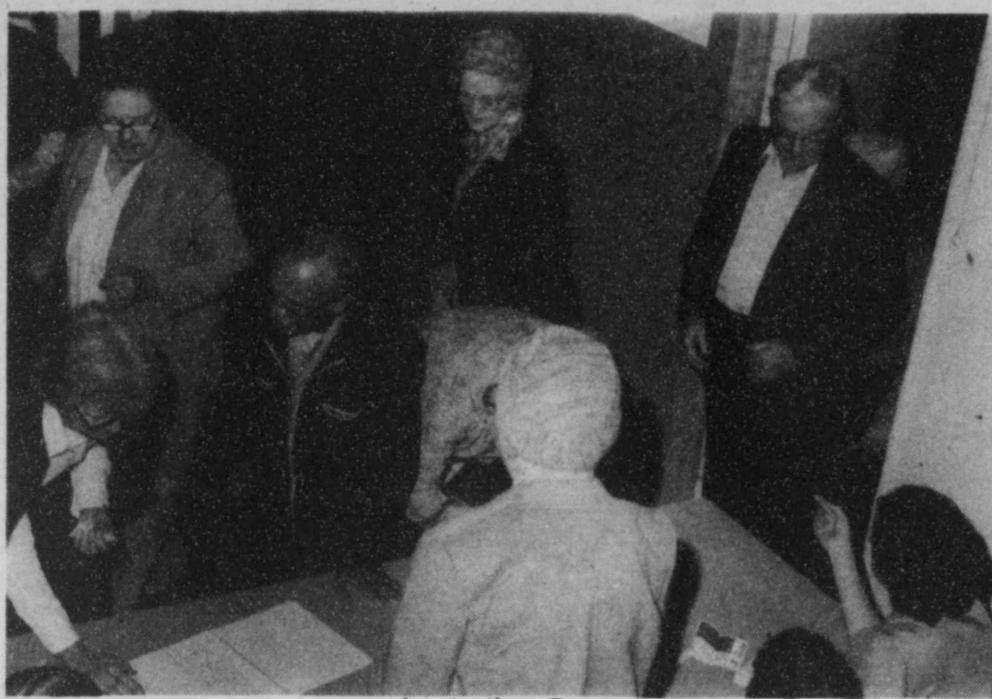

Bartering Carries Tax Responsibilities

Bartering, or the exchange of goods or services for goods or services of equal value, is an American tradition that carries federal income tax responsibilities, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Income from any source must be reported, according to the IRS, and, in the case of bartering, the tax is computed on the fair market value of the goods or services exchanged.

Individuals must report the services received as income at fair market value. However, both may claim the fair market value of the repair work received as a business expense on their income tax returns.

Taxpayers who have not reported income gained from bartering can correct their income tax returns by filing a 1040X, an amended return, for the year or years involved, the IRS said. Forms are available by calling the IRS Forms Tax Information number listed in the telephone directory under U.S. Government.

Footprints From The Past

Reading Edd Bryson's column in the Paris News about the old school at Monkey Run brought back memories of small country schools that I went to.

The first school I can remember was in a small town called Halesboro. The school was a one room variety and taught kids from the first to the ninth grades. The grade part of the school was separated from the high school by a gingham curtain. When classes were in session, the curtain was drawn across a wire fastened to each wall. The majority of the pupils were from two or three early settlers of the community. I can remember the Hobbs and Wards.

How many of you can remember going to some school of this type? There were a lot of them in the early twenties through the late forties. I sure did hate to go to school when I was a boy. It took too much from playing and all the other things that were important.

From the old school at Halesboro, we moved to Lone Oak, south of Deport. I thought that I was in some important place, because that school was divided by wood folding doors. When we were in class, the doors were shut and when we were having something for all the school, the doors were opened. Assembly consisted of teacher or a man of the community talking to use for awhile. Then we would have prayer. After that, they

would close the doors and start school. I can remember many of these one room schoolhouses. Coming to mind are Halesboro, Lone Oak, Independence, Minter, Milton, Hovertown, White Hall, Rugby, and Shadowland. All are gone now and we bus our children to schools that have been consolidated to be able to get a better education than we did. We had a lot of fun at the small schools and believe it or not, some of the people who attended the country schools got a pretty good education, for the educators of today came from a school just like the schools of my time.

We had fun at recess. We would play, spin tops or marbles. How long has it been since you have seen anyone playing mumble peg?

We got a lot of fun out of playing Pop the Whip. For those who do not know how to play, you line up in a straight line, then you hold hands and start to run as hard as you could. The one at the head of the line would stop, turn and try to throw the one on the end as far as he could. It was a lot of fun, but dangerous.

There are very few small communities left and I think that the kids who never lived in or visited one are missing a lot of fun. There were a lot of hardships, but also a lot of love for your fellow man.

Late Tax Payments Can Cost

The idea that "credit" with the federal government currently is cheaper than with credit agencies is erroneous, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Late payments of federal income taxes are subject to a 20 percent per year interest

rate and a late payment penalty of one-half of one percent per month, or six percent per year. The late payment penalty cannot exceed 25 percent of the unpaid tax.

Consequently, deferring payment of taxes owed in favor of bills owed to other

creditors can prove to be far more costly in the long run. Borrowing money to satisfy a tax obligation can be less costly than allowing interest and penalties to accrue.

The law clearly states that taxes must be paid on time, and it calls for penalties and interest in case of late payment, the IRS adds.

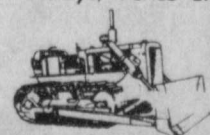
