## Rebelettes Place First In District

The Rebelette girls placed first in the District 20AA track and field meet held at Rivercrest on Monday, April 12. In addition to the first place in the overall team competition, the Rebelettes were able to win all three relay trophies.

Rivercrest trailed New Diana 32 to 39 at the end of the field events. A first place in the 440 relay gave the Rebelettes a lead that they continued to increase

throughout the remainder of the day. Good team balance was indicated by the fact that the Rebelettes received points in all but one event during the meet. Mary Jane Savage was the leading point scorer for the Rebelettes with 28. Kim Reeder, Mary Jane Savage, and Amber Hood placed fourth, fifth and sixth, respectively, in the triple jump.

Larry McGee placed first in the high jump with a

height of 4'6". Mary Jane Savage was first in the long jump with a leap of 15'2 1/2". Delores Simpson placed fourth. Karen Caddell placed sixth in the discus.

The 440 and 880 relays were won by team members Delores Simpson, Nelda Anderson, Pam Ward and Mary Jane Savage. Staci Thompson placed third in the two mile run and Kim Wilkins placed fifth in that event.

Tricia Duffer, Jerry Ann Smith and Larry McGee placed second, third and fifth in the 100 meter hurdles. Sabre Burson, Renee Williams and Becky Brooks placed second, third and fourth in the 880 run.

Nelda Anderson, Pam Ward and Kim Reeder placed second, fourth and sixth in the 100 meter dash. Tricia Duffer placed fifth in the 440 dash. Mary Jane Savage was third in the 220

dash. Renee Williams was first in the mile run with a time of 6:21.92. Sabre Burson and Becky Brooks placed second and fourth in the mile.

The mile relay was won by the team of Delores Simpson, Jackie Via, Kim Reeder and Amber Hood in a time of 4:39.73.

## Cub Scouts Hold Derby

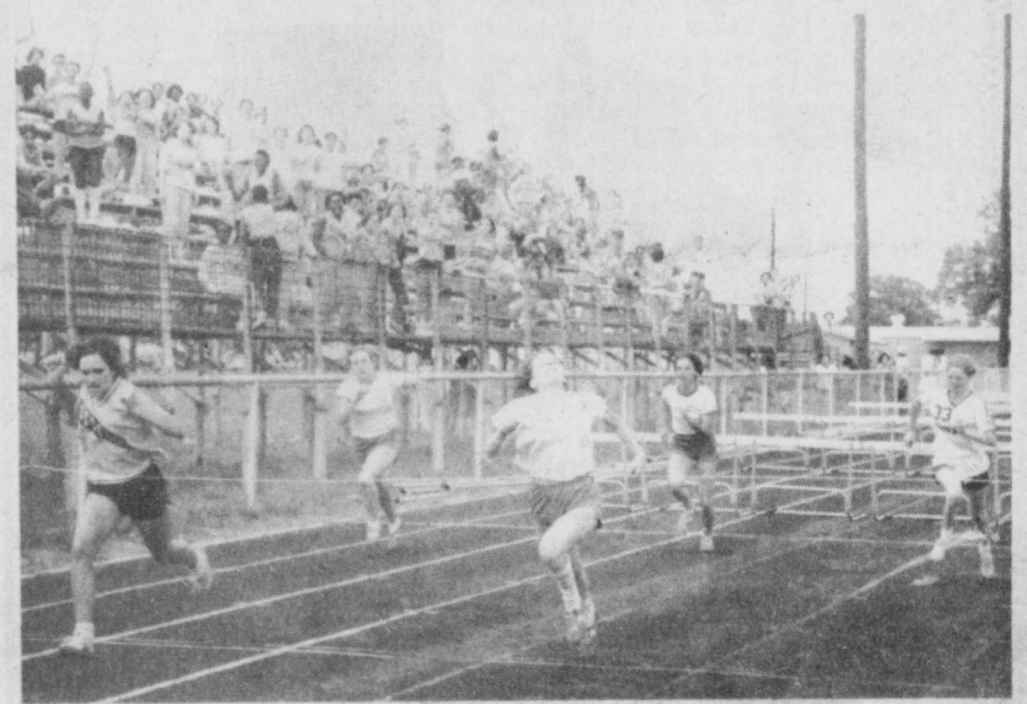
Cub Scout Pack 200 held its annual Pinewood Derby during its regular meeting Tuesday, April 6 at the Calvary Baptist Church.

## Disaster Teams To Visit Clarksville

A disaster loan team from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) will open offices for two days this week in Bonham and Clarksville to accept loan requests from people who had tornado damage in Red River and Fannin Counties.

The team also will include a flood insurance specialist to help determine whether damaged properties lie in a flood hazard area.

The team will be in the Fannin County Courthouse in Bonham from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday. They will move to the Red River County Courthouse in Clarksville on Thursday and Friday and take applications from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m.

The two counties were determined to be eligible for disaster loans from SBA to repair or replace homes, personal property and business losses.

Farmers Home Administration, an agency within the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, also has agreed to accept farm and ranch assistance loans in the two counties.

An agriculture department spokesman said that a representative of that agency will be present with

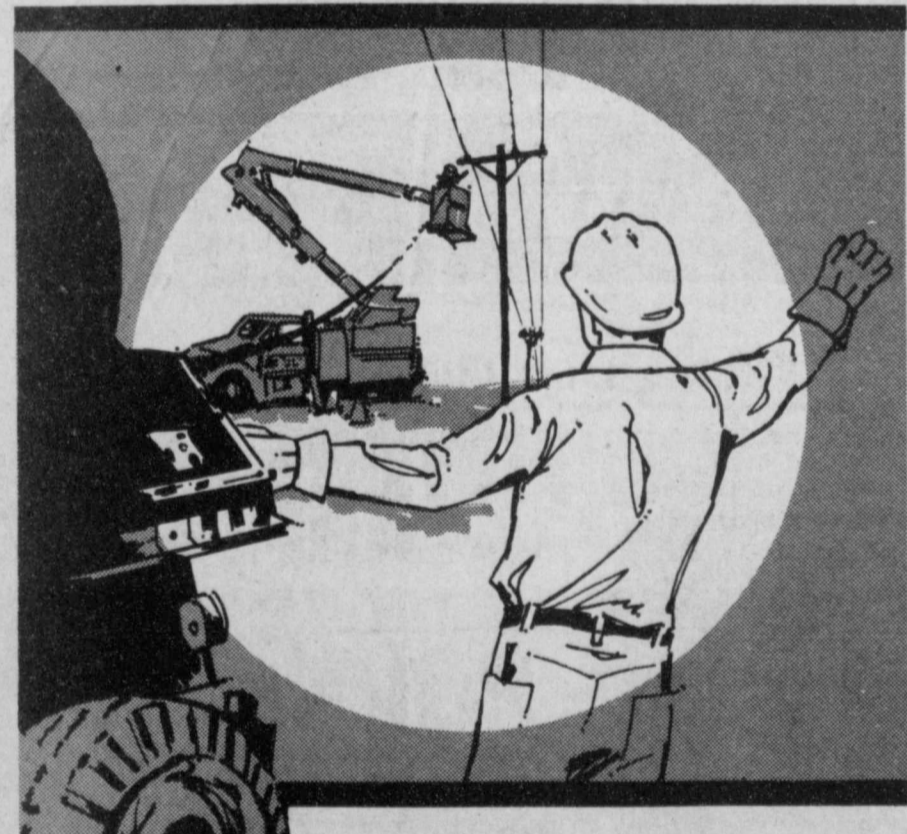

**Weekly Ag Update**

This is a prime time for stocking farm ponds with fish, says Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Before stocking the pond, Higginbotham suggests that a water sample be taken and the pH checked. Much of the pond water in East Texas is acidic and fish need a pH of between 6.5 and 8.5 for optimum production.

If catfish are being stocked in a pond that already has bass in it, the catfish fingerlings should be at least eight inches long. If no bass or other predator fish are present, Higginbotham suggests fingerlings of approximately six inches in length.

Fingerlings are readily available from producers throughout East Texas. The stocking rate should correspond to the type treatment the fish will be given. If regular feeding is planned, the stocking rate can be increased.

Insects such as wasps, scorpions, bees, spiders, etc. are coming out of hibernation, says Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Some only inflict painful bites or stings while others are poisonous. Care should be taken to avoid contact with these insects, particularly if

allergic conditions are known to exist.

Tent caterpillars are infesting fruit trees and ornamentals. Robinson says these insects create a real nuisance when they leave the web and get on the ground, house or other structures.

When applying insecticides to control the tent caterpillar, remember that the insecticide must come in contact with the caterpillar. Penetration of the web by the insecticide is very important for good control. Robinson suggests spraying in the late afternoon for the most effective control. Most common household pesticides are labeled for tent caterpillar control. As with all pesticides, label directions should be followed.

Robinson says this is the time of year when numerous insects begin to appear. Lawn, garden and household insects will thrive for the next few months and continuous control must be carried out. Guidelines for controlling most insect pests are available at local county Extension offices.

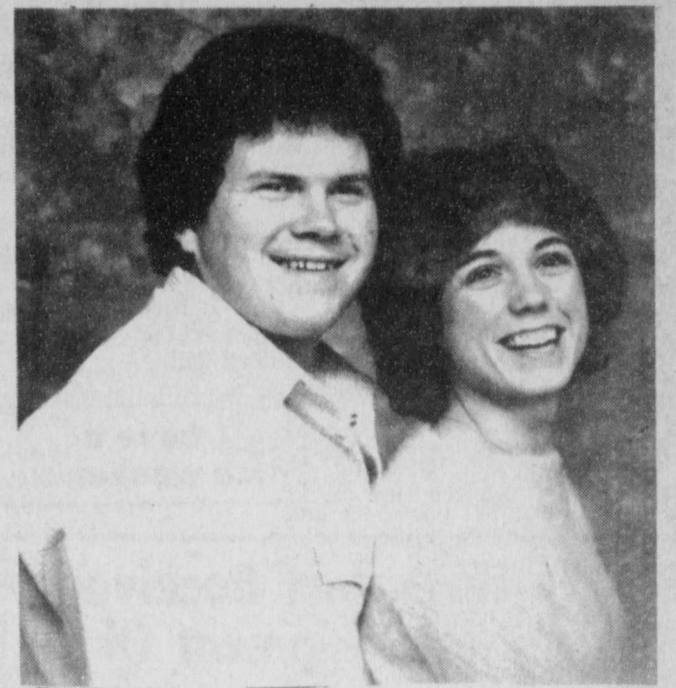

Performing with the group will be several of their friends including Ty Raney, Hilda Cromer, Missy

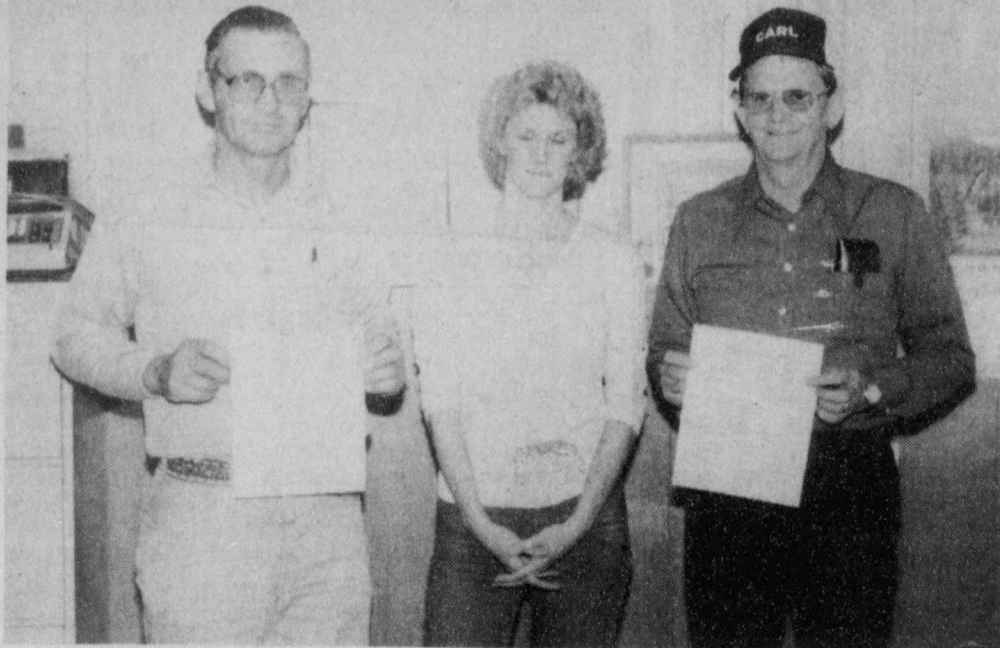
Hawkins, Patty Hood and Mike Betts. They are all regulars at the Mt. Pleasant Opry.
