"Every pick-up has a gun rack and you know why. When you see the vulture soar, pray that it soars not for you. From Austin to the Astrodome,



Levee Break Sends Sulphur On Rampage **Flood Damages Severe To Farmers**

The "Flood of 1982" carved out extensive damage and losses for farmers within reach of the overflowing Sulphur River and its tributaries, according to agriculture officials in **Red River and Titus counties.**

"It's difficult to put a dollar mark on the damges at this point, but it is considerable," says county extension agent Bob Moody of Red River County.

In Red River County, damages were not confined to the Sulphur area as the norther borders of the county were well-soaked by floodwater from the Red River, also causing damages to croplands in that area.

The damages, especially to crops, were considerable along the Sulphur in the Bogata-Talco area. The Highway 271 bridges were closed to traffic from Thursday through late Saturday, as the bridges and approaches were covered by more than two feet of rushing waters.

Closing of the Highway 271 also



R.W. "Red" Sanford of Talco called the flood waters on the 271 "the second highest I've ever seen.

Agriculture officials in Titus and Red River counties say several hundred acres of crops went down the drain, especially wheat, with grain sorghum and corn, along with some cotton, also being washed out.

Other than soybeans, it is now too late for replanting.

There's still plenty of time to plant soybeans, probably up to about June 20, if we can get some dry weather," Moody says.

Trustees Discuss Travel Pay, **Ballfields**, Tax Collections

Items ranging from tax collections to paying travel mileage and operational policies for baseball fields on school property were discussion topics for trustees of the Talco-Togata schools at their regular meeting.

There was also an excutive session, listed as discussion of a personnell matter, with no action taken.

No action was taken on a proposal from Gary Lesniewski, chief appraiser for the Red River County Appraisal District, that the appraisal district handle tax collections for the Talco-Bogata CISD. Board members pointed out that the school district is a multi-county district with property in Red River, Titus and Franklin counties and that permitting the Red River County Appraisal District to collect all the taxes could cause a number of problems and confilcts for the school district.

In the discussion of travel for administrative and other school personnel, approval was given for the continuation of the policy of paying

"so much" per mile for approved school travel. The report on the board meeting did not specify the "so much' figure

Supt. Talmadge Morgan is to make a recommendation at the June meeting in regards to paying school personnel, other than administrators. for travel to required school activities.

There was a brief discussion on the procedures and operation of the three baseball fields located on schoolowned property in Bogata, Johntown and Talco. The fields have been operated with preferential treatment given teams composed of school age students, with one person in each community in charge of scheduling the field in the community for games and practices.

Board members expressed the desire to continue the operational procedures for th baseball fields. although the administration was requested to make recommendations at the June meeting on other matters involving the baseball fields, such as concessions

Written information on the administrative guidelines used in selecting students for the Meat Processing Lab when there are more requests for participation than can be accomondated was presented to board members. The guidelines were previously approved use during the 1982-83 school year.

The attorney for a taxpayer who was not permitted to sigh-up for a homestead exemption, based on the application being submitted after the sign-up deadline, discussed the matter with the school board.

In other action at the May meeting, approval was given for the purchase of carpeting for principal's house in Talco; the various financial reports were approved. Permission was granted for an under age out-of-state transfer student who is presently enrolled in kindergarten to be enrolled in the first grade next school year.

year and continuing to show a gain in sales tax receipts for the overall year to date.

Bogata has received a reimbursement of \$4,653.17 for the period ending May 9, which is an increase of nearly \$500 over the same period a year ago. Through the first five months of the 1982 year, Bogata now has received \$9,860.88, which is an increase of 4.5 percent over the initial five months of 1981.

Talco's reimbursement check from the state comptroller's office totaled \$9,170.08. That represents an increase of nearly \$1,000 over the same period of a year ago. Talco has \$19,943.23 in sales tax money through the first five months of 1982, an increase of 29 percent over a year ago.

Talco and Mt. Pleasant are the only Titus County cities showing an increase in sales tax receipts for the year to date. Mt. Pleasant is up by 22.6 percent, while Monticello is 18 percent behind its pace of a year ago and Winfield is down by 4.7 percent.

In Red River County, all cities with the exception of Avery are running ahead of last year. Avery is 39 percent behind a year ago after five months. Bogata's total of \$4,653.17 for the

Salmon in 73/4 ounce cans. There are no specific brands because the salmon was canned under many labels. The following TWO LINE CODE identifies the contaminated product. Top Line of Code: Something, K13, something (This means that K13 holds the middle spaces of a 5 space code.)

There are four numbers or letters in the bottom line of the code but they do not identify the contaminated batch. A can of salmon with this code should be returned to place of purchase.

Mosey's Corned Beef, Inc. is voluntarily recalling its cooked corned beef after U.S.D.A. tests confirmed the presence of salmonella in their product. The suspect meat was produced between January 8 and February 1. It distributed to was delicatessens and similar outlets in many states. 





AUSTIN REPORT

by Senator Ed Howard

AUSTIN -- On Monday, May 24th, the Texas Legislature will convene in Special Session in Austin to act on a constitutional Amendment to repeal the state advalorem property tax which is presently designated by the Constitution at the rate of 10 cents per one hundred dollar valuation.

Under Texas law, the Governor has the authority to call special legislative sessions and to determine subjects to be considered during such sessions. Governor Clements, in exercising that authority, has set two issues for consideration, the repeal of the state advalorem tax and a one-time appropriation of state funds to finance building and improvements to seventeen state colleges and universities including East Texas State, Stephen F. Austin, North Texas State, Texas Tech, and the University of Houston.

In 1979, the legislature sought to lower the tax rate from 10 cents per \$100 valuation to 1/10,000 percent of valuation in order to provide property tax relief to the citizens of the State of Texas. This legislative action has been challenged in court by Midwestern University in Wichita Falls on the legal theory that any change in a constitutional amendment must be approved by voters rather than the legislature. This suit is scheduled for trial on June 1st. In approving a constitutional amendment repealing the property tax to be submitted to the voters, the legislature might prevent the re-imposition of the 10 cent tax should the lawsuit be decided in favor of the plaintiffs. It has been estimated that taxpayers would face an additional \$450 million in taxes if legislative action is not taken.

One year ago, 117 gas and 37 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the fourth month of the year included 40 in deep South Texas, 35 in the Refugio area, 15 in Southeast Texas, 13 in West Central Texas, nine in East Central Texas, five in East Texas, three in the San Angelo area, two each in North Texas and the Panhandle, and one each in the San Antonio and Midland areas.

Oil discoveries included 12 in deep South Texas, 10 in Southeast Texas, nine in North Texas, five each in the Refugio and San Angelo areas and East Texas, four in the Midland area, three in the Panhandle, and two each in the San Antonio and Lubbock areas.

Through the first four months of this year, there have been 511 gas and 186 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same period last year, there were 404 gas

and 221 oil discoveries. In April, operators reported 367 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,402 in April compared with 3,359 in the same period of 1981. Applications to drill,

deepen, plug back and for service wells in April amounted to 2,767 against 3,585 a year earlier. **Operators** filed 898

amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 811 amended requests.

For Democrats In June 5 Runoffs ... **Absentee Voting To Start**

Absentee voting for the June 5 Democratic primary runoff election begins next Wednesday, May 26 and will continue through June in the county clerk offices in Red River, Lamar and Titus counties during regular office hours.

Absentee balloting may be by mail or in person.

Persons who voted in the Republican primary may not vote in the Democratic runoff, although voters who did not vote in either one of the May primaries may vote in the runoff, if they are registered.

Qualified voters who are over 65 years of age may vote absentee in person or they may vote by mail by making a written application to the county clerk's office. Those who are under age 65, but are sick or disabled, may vote absentee by mail, but must

attach a certificate certifying his or her sickness or disability to their written application.

Those who because of religious belief may not wish to vote on Saturday may also vote by mail or in person.

Those who are absent from the county of their residence during the time for absentee voting and are expecting to be absent on June 5 may also vote by mail by making application and giving an out of the county address where he will receive his ballot.

A notary public is not required for absentee voting. The county clerk's office can supply

applications whichcan be picked up at any time. After the application is completed, it must be mailed back to the county clerk's office accompanied by the voter registration certificate. or an affidavit of its loss.

It is unlawful for one person to assist more than five voters with an absentee ballot. Voted ballots must be received in the county clerk's office no later than June 5, election day.




