

# Community Education Classes Set

Registration for four community education classes to be offered by the Community Education Department of the Talco-Bogata schools is now underway, with the first of the four courses to begin on June 10.

Classes will be offered in copper tree art, lead stain mirror, shrinky puzzle art and cupcake magic, says community education coordinator Kay Kennedy. The latter two classes are for boys and girls.

The copper tree art class, a one session class, will be held June 10, from 6-9 p.m. in Room 108 at Rivercrest High School. Blanton Gage will serve as instructor. There is a \$15 registration fee, with the class limited to 20 participants.

The lead stain mirror class will be conducted in two sessions, June 21-22, from 7-9 p.m. each night, also in Room 108 at Rivercrest. Bonnie Gage is the instructor with a \$10 fee and a class size limited to 20 persons.

The shrinky puzzle art class is for boys and girls in the 4-9 age bracket. It will be a one session course, on June 24, from 1-3 p.m. in Room 108 at Rivercrest. The registration fee is \$10 and the class is limited to 15 participants. Bonnie Gage will be the instructor.

The cupcake magic class is for boys and girls in the 7-10 age bracket. It will be a one session class, on June 28, from 1-3 p.m. in Room 108 at Rivercrest, and is limited in size to 15 participants. The registration fee is \$5 and Bonnie Gage will be the instructor.

## Talco Woman Wins Hidden Name Prize

As we have been saying, if the call is a long distance toll, we will accept a collect call—as long as it is from the person whose name is hidden.

The Hidden Name is that of a paid-up subscriber to one of the News-Times newspapers, selected at random from our subscription files. The name is placed in the same size type as the word you are now reading, except that the name and address may be printed upside down, sideways, on a slant, or perhaps on a straight line.

The \$5 check, if claimed by the hidden name person, is made out jointly to that person and any business they select, that advertises in one of the papers. The check is then mailed to that person, after which all they have to do is take it to the business (See TALCO, Page 6)

## 3 Local 'Duels' On Ballot...

# Big Turnout Due In Runoff

With several county level office nominations at stake along with a hotly-contested state representative position fuel, Talco voters are expected to join fellow Titus countians in a near-record turnout for a runoff primary this Saturday.

Along with voting on three local precinct offices, Talco voters will help select the Democratic nominee for county Judge, state representative of District 8 and four statewide offices.

Election observers say the voter turnout may easily set a record for a runoff primary in Titus County. The county Clerk's office said absentee voting, which ended Tuesday, may surpass the absentee vote in the May primary when some 200 ballots were cast.

On the more immediate Talco area, Ronnie Logan and Roy Price are the candidates for Pct. 3 county commissioner; Johnny Mac Brown and Hubert Martin are dueling for Pct. 3 justice of the peace; and Jack Daniel is facing Steve Stephens in a runoff for constable.

For county judge, the runoff is between Jimmy Shields and Bill Harper. For the District 8 state representative nomination on the Democratic ticket, Sam Russell of Mt. Pleasant faces Gary Wilford of Hughes Springs.

## Rodeo Queen Entries Due By June 11

Area girls interested in competing for the honors as queen of the annual Bogata Rodeo are reminded that the entry deadline is Friday, June 11, one week from tomorrow.

This year's rodeo is scheduled for June 24-26, with the queen contestants to appear in the grand entry on each of the three nights and in the June 24 rodeo parade, along with other rodeo-related activities.

All single girls between the ages of 14 and 19, who attend school within a 20-mile radius of Bogata, are eligible for the queen's contest.

Judging for the rodeo queen will be on the basis of horsemanship, appearance and personality.

for the area's county commissioner. The Pct. 3 post includes the voting boxes at Bridges Chapel community center, Wilkinson community center, Argo school, Nevile's Chapel and the county clerk's office in Mt. Pleasant as well as the Talco city hall.

All polls open at 7 a.m. Saturday and will remain open through 7 p.m. Logan, a resident of the Wilkinson area and former Talco banker, was the vote collection leader in the May primary with 535 ballots to 342 for Price.

Logan carried all of the voting boxes in the first primary with exception of Argo and the voting box at the sheriff's office. In Talco, Logan polled 196 votes to only 52 for Price who finished third in the local count.

In the county judge race last month, Shields won the county vote with 1,555 votes to 1,318 for Harper and out-pointed Harper in the Talco vote, 197-40.

For the JP job, Brown led the precinct-wide count in the first primary with 41.4 percent of the vote, while Martin, a former county commissioner, received 24.6 percent. In the Talco voting, Brown finished second in the four-candidate scramble and Martin was last.

For the constable's badge, Daniel was the first primary winner with 47.4 percent to 30 percent for Stephens. The two were close among Talco votes with 126 for Daniel to 118 for Stephens in the three-candidate battle.

The winner between Russell and Wilford for the Democratic nomination in the state representative's race will face Republican Mike Ellis of Daingerfield in the November showdown. Russell captured all of the counties in the district in the May primary with the exception of Wilford's home Cass County.

The four state level races are for Attorney General, Land Commissioner and two places on the state Court of Criminal Appeals.

In the AG's race are John Hannah of Tyler, a former federal prosecutor, and Cong. Jim Mattox of Dallas.

Land Commissioner candidates are two former state representatives, Pete Snelson of Midland and Garry Mauro of Houston.

Dueling for Place 1 on the criminal appeals court are John E. Humphreys, the county winner last month, and Charles F. Campbell, Jr. For Place 2 are Chuck Miller, the county winner in May, and Bill Black.

# Cowboys, Cowgirls Share

## \$722,000 Prize Money In '81

The Central States Rodeo Association, of which the June 24-26 Bogata Rodeo is a member, is a comparative newcomer to the sport of rodeo. Central States didn't get its start until more than 100 years after rodeo began.

In the late 1860's, cowboys gathered in various western towns and celebrated Independence Day by roping wild steers and bouncing off bucking broncos.

Admittedly, the cowboys weren't very adept at staying on the broncs. They usually got only one chance a year - on the Fourth of July. But they found they had so much fun breaking their arms and hurting their knees they quit waiting for special occasions for these cowboy reunions.

The sport gained popularity quickly and by the 1920s it was finally organized by the Rodeo Association of America. The cowboys themselves took over the organization a few years later and by 1945 the Rodeo Cowboys of America was formed.

That organization is now known as

the Professional Rodeo Cowboys of America and it made rodeo so popular that a competing national organization, the International Rodeo Association, was formed.

Through the 50s and 60s it was to the cowboys' advantage to belong to one of these two associations. Until the energy crisis of the early 1970s most full-time cowboys could afford to "go down the road," that is, travel to all parts of the country to compete in rodeos.

But the increasing cost of traveling hurt cqwboys in the national associations. Many couldn't afford to travel thousands of miles a week to compete.

That is when the regional rodeo associations stepped in to meet the cowboys' needs.

The Central States Rodeo Association is just one of many regional rodeo associations in the country. It was formed in 1976 to serve the needs of contestants in the states of Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Arkansas and Louisiana. It is one of only a few regional associations that serves more than one state.

With a membership in Central States, the rodeo contestant can hold a full-time job during the week and still be able to compete for high honors in the association. If the cowboy is a full-time contestant, he can attend several rodeos during the week.

The Central States Rodeo Association ends each season with a championship Finals rodeo. The top 15 (See RODEO, Page 6)

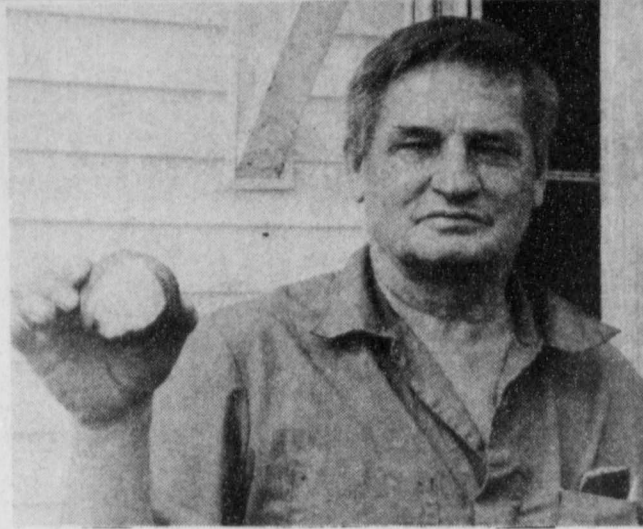

A choice had to be made, due to the other pictures and news items. Since the queen contest winner is eligible to move on up the ladder in state competition, the choice was obvious and warranted Page One.

And, this was not inconsistent with the policies of any newspaper we know about.

performers in each event are invited to compete for thousands of dollars in prizes and dozens of buckles, saddles and trophies.

The 1981 Finals paid a record \$39,000 to winning contestants. A total of \$14,000 was added, \$2,000 in each event. In addition, 16 saddles and buckles were given to the champions in each event of the year and of the Finals, awarded at the Finals banquet after the last performance.

The Cowboys and cowgirls of the Central States Rodeo Association have found time and time again that

Central States rodeos pay off. Central States rodeos paid their cowboys and cowgirls more than \$700,000 in 1981, an increase of \$60,000 over 1980.

This increase isn't merely attributable to the addition of a few large rodeos. Instead, all the rodeos in the association worked hard to try to increase the amount of money to be paid to the winning contestants.

A total of \$722,841.72 was paid to winning cowboys and cowgirls in 1981. The largest rodeo, held in June at Seminole, Oklahoma, paid \$20,947.50. A total of 17 rodeos had payoffs of more than \$10,000 each. Another 51 rodeos paid more than \$5,000 to winning contestants.

Other large rodeos in Central States include Mount Pleasant, Texas (\$16,797.80); West Monroe, Louisiana (\$16,242.26); Okemah, Oklahoma (\$15,310.00); and Jenks, Oklahoma (\$15,024.25).

The biggest payoff to contestants of a single event was, as expected, bull riding, which paid \$168,964.57. The bull riding event has the most members in the association, which means it commands the most entrants.

Surprisingly, the team ropers earned nearly as much money. A total of \$162,180.52 was paid to team ropers. Central States calf ropers earned \$104,547.55, while steer wrestlers nearly broke over the \$100,000 mark

with a total of \$99,820.59 in total payoff.

Barrel racers in the association earned \$75,407.46 and bareback riders made \$72,518.84. Due to the low number of saddle bronc riders and the limited number of rodeos that included the saddle bronc event, it paid only \$39,402.13.

The seven-states area which Central States covers is a hotbed of rodeo. Most of the best cowboys and cowgirls in the country, no matter what association they belong to, come from these seven states.

association, set a record for most money won in the bull riding event -- \$10,746.99.

In bronc riding, the experts are Jim Martin of Canadian, Texas, and Rome Wager of Butte, Montana. Martin is a three-time champion of bareback riding in Central States, including the 1981 title.

Wager was Rookie of the Year and the No. 2 saddle bronc rider in 1980. In 1981 he came back to win the saddle bronc championship, setting a Central States record by winning \$6,699.55. He

also placed fourth in the All-Around. Kelly Allred Ray was a repeat winner in the barrel racing event in 1981. She broke her own record for most money won in a season in that event -- \$8,370.85. In all, she has won nearly \$20,000 in her three seasons as a Central States member.

Ropers Steve Crow and Dick Foreman are among the most consistent performers on the rodeo circuit. Crow won the All-Around title in 1980, while Foreman took the crown in 1978.
