Ramblin Round

Our search to correct the age of The Talco Times hit the jackpot over the weekend when an extensive search of old files and boxes in the hot upstairs storage area of the Deport Times produced a lot of newspapering "treasure", including the first issue of The Talco Times.

So, to make it official, Publisher Sam Holloway and Editor Frank Dannelly came out with Vol. 1, No. 1 of The Talco Times on Valentine's Day, Friday, Feb. 14, 1936.

The Times debut was about one month before Talco's first oil well, the Charles Carr, No. 1, drilled by R.L. Peveto, C.N. Housh and E.G. Thompson, with H.B. Hinton as the contractor, was officially declared a "gusher" on, of all dates, Friday the 13th, March, 1936.

The oil boom fever was already mushrooming Talco's population and business activity when The Times made its debut. In the first edition Holloway, who had already been operating The Deport Times for a quarter century and was to exercise an option to buy the Bogata News the following year, wrote the following:

"We have established The Talco Times because we believe there is a genuine need for a progressive, aggressive newspaper to tell the world about Talco and to bring in new capital to develop the field.

"We desire to work with and for all the interests in this town and community and you will find us doing our part at all times.

"For the present, The Talco Times will be published every Friday. Should conditions later demand them, we have both the capital and experience to issue daily."

The discoveries made in the search of old files and Holloway's collection produced a "gusher" of information, historic and otherwise, not only about Talco but also Deport and Bogata. We hope to bring much of it back into print in the future.

The only other "revelation" for today is the article about how Talco got its name. Many oldtimers may know the story, but then not all of us are in that category, by age or residency, so here's what an early issue of The Times reported:

"Years ago when the small community of Goldsboro was abandoned, and the new township of Talco was founded, the question of what name would be suitable arose in the minds of the citizens in the newly born town. Somehow the name of Goldsboro just didn't seem to fit the new town.

"W.E. Lewalling, who happened to have a conversation with a group of friends gathered in a new store, had the thought uppermost in his mind on naming the new town, when he happened to see the trademarked name "TALCO" standing out in bold print on the end of a box used for shipping candy.

"There's the name of our town," Lewalling is said to have exclaimed, after a moment of musing over the pronunciation of the coined word.

"The name 'TALCO' was spoken aloud several times by the group of men, and the wooden box end was nailed on a stick, and the town was christened, Talco. The coined word stands for the 'Texas, Arkansas & Louisiana Company', each letter of the word supposed to represent each first initial of the company which manufactured candy, and shipped it to Talco, where, by accident, a city was named for a candy.

"Anyway, Talco and its oil field is a 'sweet' one."

The article went on to say that Lewalling later moved to California and at the time the name story was published was still a subscriber to The Talco Times.

Publisher's Father Dies In Indiana

The Rev. Lawrence R. West, 78, father of News-Times publisher Bert West, died at his home in Rochester, Ind., Tuesday night.

Rev. West, who retired about five years ago after 43 years as a Methodist minister, had been in failing health for sometime but only recently had spoken of a desire for another trip to Texas, where he last visited in 1977.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Veva West of Rochester, whom he married in 1928; three sons, Bert West of Bogata, Keith West of Rochester, Ind., and George West of Tacoma, Wash.; nine grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by four brothers and two sisters.

Funeral services are scheduled for Saturday, with Zimmerman Funeral Home of Rochester in charge of arrangements.

Reagan's Tax Plan Appeal Not Too Popular Here

President Reagan's decision to go over the head of Congress and take his case for a tax increase to the people, with the nationwide tv and radio appeal Monday night, may have fallen on deaf ears, based on results of a three-county opinion survey by the News-Times newspapers.

Forty-five percent of all

people contacted Tuesday, either in person or via the telephone, in the Deport, Bogata, Talco and Blossom areas, say they are against the President's 98-billion tax package.

Only 38 percent of those surveyed by staff members of The Bogata News, Deport Times, Talco Times and Blossom Times would say

they support Reagan's plan. Another 17 percent offered comments other than a straight "yes" or "no" commitment.

Comments ranged from "I've lost complete confidence in the man (Reagan)," as expressed by businessman in Bogata; to a Deport nurse who said she supports the tax proposal

"and everything Reagan does."

A retired Deport area school teacher said she's against both the tax proposal and President Reagan and didn't watch his Monday night broadcast because, "If I see him on TV, I have to go and take Pepto Bismol!"

Fifty-five percent of the opinion poll respondents

were men and 45 percent were women.

The women packed the largest "no" vote in the survey, with 54 percent of them saying they were against the tax increase plan, while 38 percent did voice support of the President and 8 percent had "other" comments.

While the women were

decisive, the men were at a stand-off as 37 1/2 percent said they were against the Reagan plan, another 37 1/2 percent supported the plan, while 25 percent were in the "other" category.

The question directed to those contacted in the poll was: "Did you see or listen to President Reagan last (See SURVEY, Page 6)

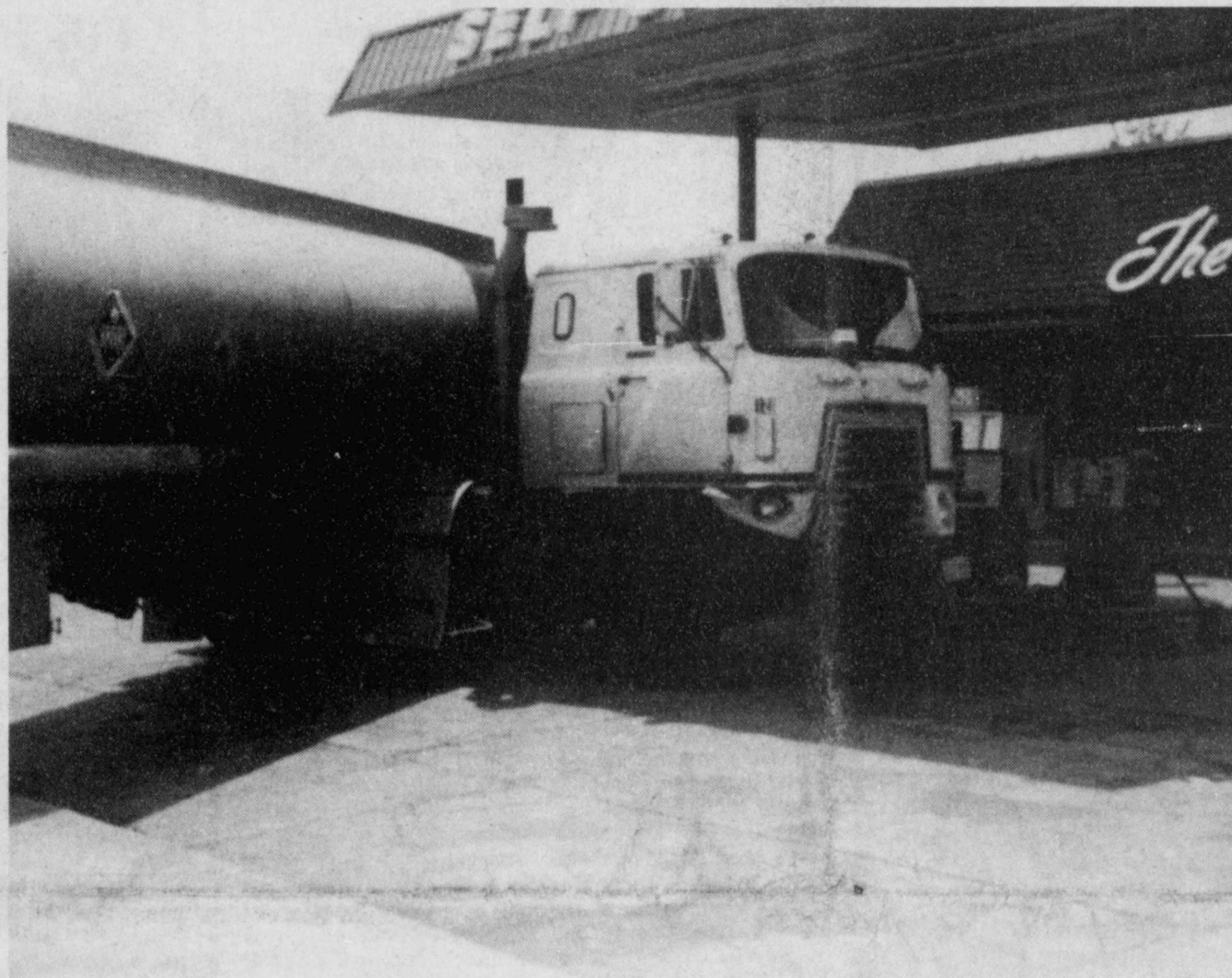

classes today. The first day pupil count may be a few numbers below last year, with the enrollment expected to increase over the next few days.

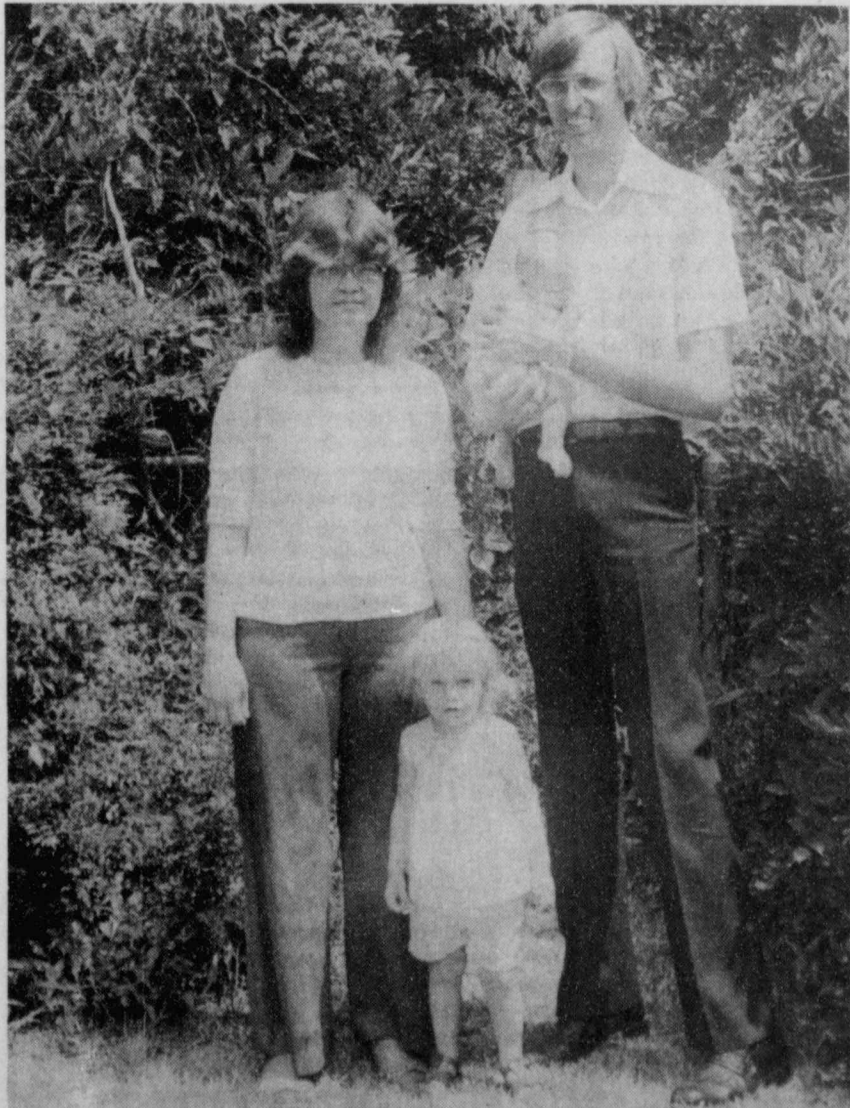
Thursday will be a full school day, with both breakfast and lunch available.

Scrimmage At New Boston....

Rebel Footballers In Debut Tonight

The 1982 football Rebels of Rivercrest make their first appearance of the new school year, in an unofficial way, tonight (Thursday) when they travel to New Boston for the first of two pre-season scrimmages.

Junior varsity units from the two schools will lock horns first in the partial game condition outing, starting about 6:30 p.m., Rebel Coach Milford Groves says. The varsity units will begin their tests, under make-believe game conditions, about an hour later.

The host Lions are in District 14-3A, a league in which they came through as co-champions last year with a strong 9-1 record.

The Lions, like Rivercrest, face a somewhat rebuilding task with only two defensive and two offensive regulars back from last year's squad. One of them, however, is senior running back Billy Brewer (6-0, 175), who has romped and stomped for 2,209 yards over the past two seasons.

A community-wide Rebel Spirit Rally, aimed at pumping renewed enthusiasm into Rivercrest Rebel fans and supporters for the coming football season, is set for next Thursday (Aug. 26) at Rivercrest High School.

Festivities begin with a hamburger supper in the school cafeteria, from 6:30-7:30 p.m., followed by a pep rally in the auditorium. Members of the Rebel football team, band and Rebel Corps, along with the cheerleaders, will help spark the rally.

Tickets, mostly limited to advance sales, are \$2.50 each and are available from FHA officers or may be obtained at either the Kwik Korner in Bogata or the Short Stop in Talco. Tickets at the door will be limited to the first 25 persons.





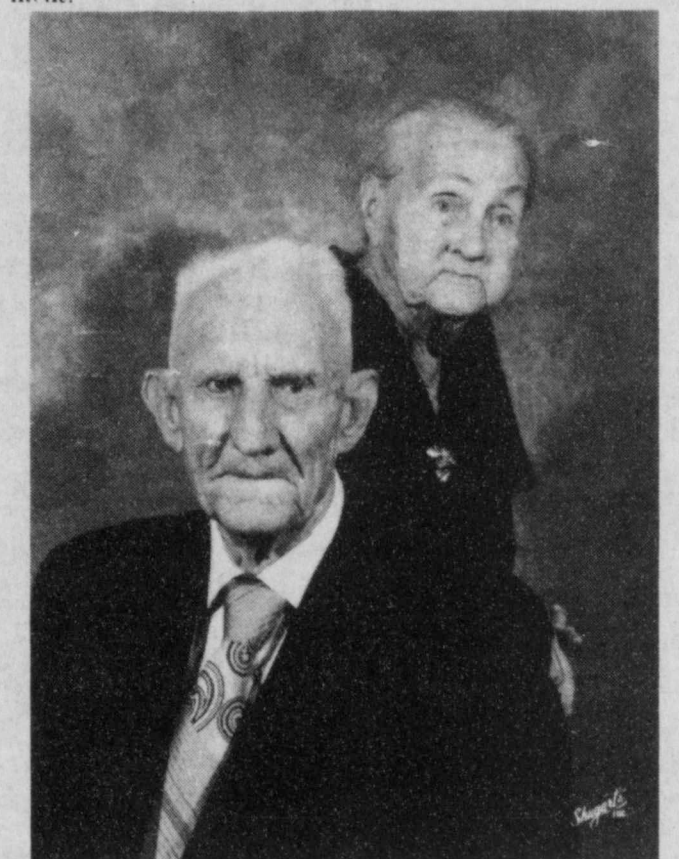

answers, with the respondents given assurance that their names would not be published: "I think he's crazy. Of course, I don't approve of the tax plan," said a

Blossom businesswoman. "It may be inconsistent with what he first said, but the deficit is frightening and we need a tax increase," from a retired Deport insurance salesman.

"I've lost all confidence in the man. A Year ago, he wimpered his way to getting a tax cut; now he wants to raise taxes. What he gives with the left hand, he takes away with the right," says a Bogata businessman.

"No way can I support a tax increase when the things he wants to increase the tax on are the things that will hit the average person the most. No way," says a Talco merchant.

"I think it's all right. Something needs to be done at least," says a Blossom merchant.

"I hate what he's doing," comments a farm lady. "We need to give him a chance. Big companies do need to pay more taxes," said a farmer in the Deport area.

"He wants to hike the taxes on cigarettes, telephones and airplane tickets. Those are exactly the items that will hit the little guy more than the big businesses. The big businesses will either write off all that expense on their own taxes, or they'll hike prices more, to hit the little

guy or average American," is the way a Bogata service station worker states it.

"I like Reagan and what he does," says a Deport receptionist.

"It's awful, raising taxes when we have all this unemployment and inflation," says a Talco housewife.

"I still say if he'd quit flying back and forth to those California vacations, costing the government millions of dollars in extra expense with each trip, the man would help set a good example and maybe more of us would support the guy," says a Rivercrest school teacher.

"I just don't know. I need to know more about these things and am still trying to learn," commented a college student from Blossom.

"No way do I support the tax program," says a Deport beautician.

"Just once do I wish a President would get out here in the common man's land and spend a couple of days;

then, maybe he'd reconsider all the hurt he causes people with tax increases and red tape," was the word of a housewife in the Fulbright area.
