Let's We Forget

The terrible holocaust at the hands of Hitler's Nazi gang during World War II was brought back to memory by a June 2, 1948 copy of The Paris News that was brought to our Bogata News office by a reader whose name escapes us.

A page one news article reported on the execution of the first Germans convicted by the U.S. War Crimes Court in Nuernberg. Their execution, by hanging, came nearly three years after the war had been concluded.

It is of interest to note that four of the first seven German executed for war crimes were doctors. The other three were SS (Elite Guard) officers who participated with the doctors in the Nazi "research program."

The first of the executed Germans was 43 years of age and the top medical officer of Nazi Germany.

The massacre of human lives by the Nazis was for real, but still we wonder what kind of demonstrations to prevent the executions of the war criminals would be staged by the so-called rights groups of today—if the rights groups and the tv media existed back then.

Here is the complete reprint of that 1948 news article:

"Seven German doctors and SS (Elite Guard) officers died on American gallows today for war crimes.

"They were convicted of killing and maiming thousands in brutal medical experiments in Nazi concentration camps. Their victims were inmates of the camps.

"They were the first to be hanged of 25 Germans sentenced to death by U.S. war crimes courts in Nuernberg. "Several died protesting their innocence and complaining against the American system of justice which convicted them.

"All walked firmly to death on two black gallows in the courtyard of the prison where Adolf Hitler wrote 'Mein Kampf' while confined there after his Munich Putsch 25 years ago.

"The executions went off without a hitch. The last man dropped to his doom just 62 minutes after the first stepped on the trap.

"Four of those hanged were doctors. The court, headed by Judge Walter Beals of the Washington State Supreme Court, which convicted them said they had perverted their science into a murderous practice on helpless living persons. The other three executed men were SS officers convicted of directing the Nazi 'research program'.

"The experiments described in court included high altitude experiments in which human guinea pigs were crushed and strangled. There also were malaria, mustard gas and sterilization tests which killed many, most of them dying in agony.

"Gen. Karl Brandt, 43, the top medical officer of the Nazi state, was the first to die. Others were:

"Karl Gebhardt, 50, once president of the German Red Cross, head surgeon of the Elite Guard and personal physician to Heinrich Himmler.

"Joachim Murgowsky, 42, chief Elite Guard hygienist.

"Wolfram Sievers, SS colonel and director of the Military Research Institute.

"Victor Brack, SS colonel and chief administrative officer under Martin Bormann.

"Waldemar Hoven, chief medical officer at Buchenwald.

"Rudolf Brandt, adjutant to Himmler and chief of SS Hygienic Institute."

Nazi Germany must forever remain an unforgettable blot on civilization.

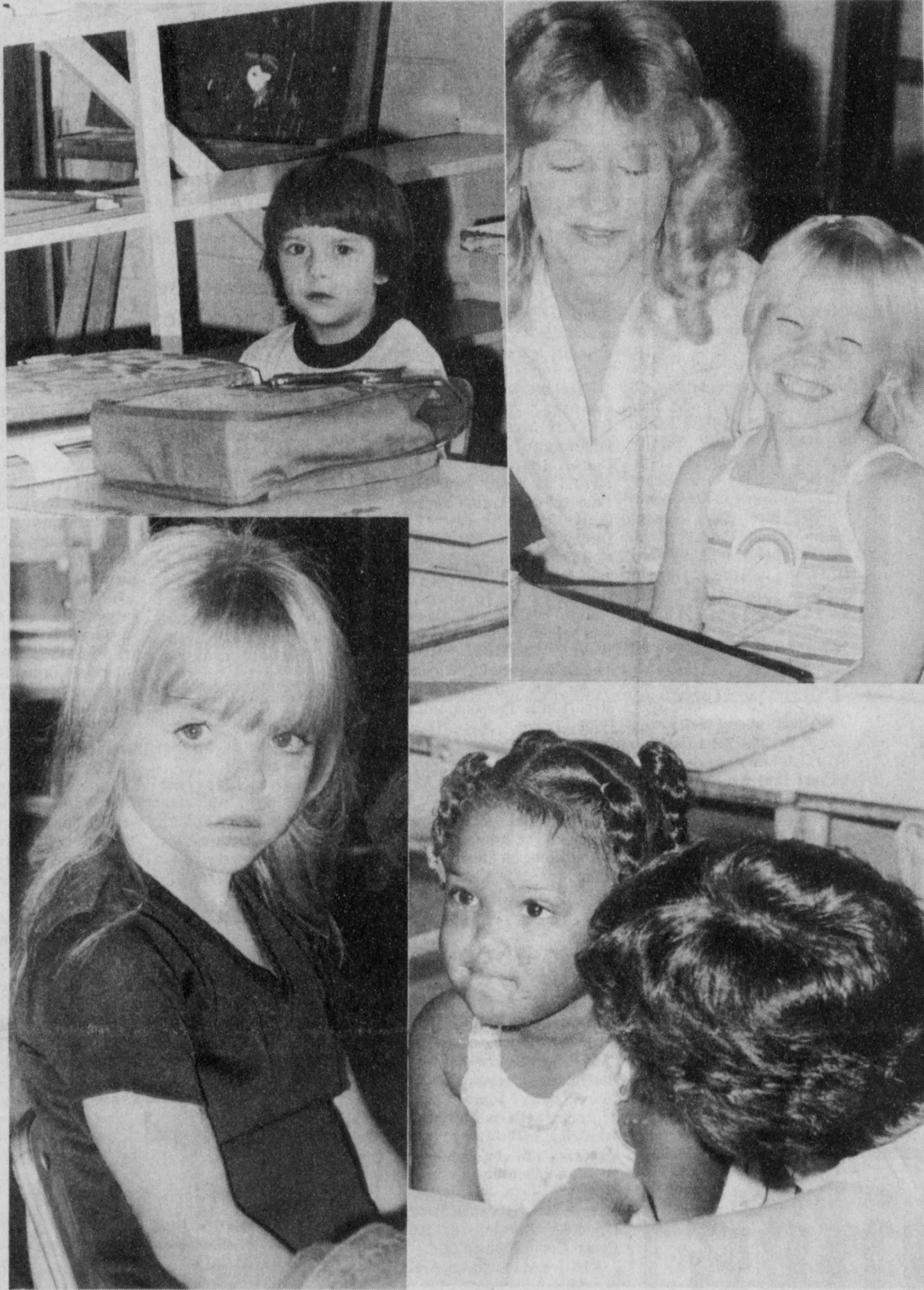

Mrs. Hearron was given the oath of office of W.R. Capshaw, a U.S. Postal Service official from Texarkana, with several other postal officials and a number of Talco residents and family members attending the brief ceremony in the Talco post office.

Mrs. Hearron graduated from high school at Mt. Vernon and has lived in

Talco with her husband, James, for the past 32 years. Her husband is employed by Getty Oil at Winstboro.

The Hearrons have one daughter who lives in Denton and a son who lives in Talco. Mrs. Hearron is a member of the Talco Assembly of God Church.

Postmaster selections are made on the basis of merit from a list of qualified candidates submitted to the Sectional Center Manager by a review committee.

The review committee, composed of

sectional center director from the same sectional center, a postmaster from the same sectional center, and a sectional center director from a different sectional center, review the applicants for the position and recommend to the sectional center manager those candidates who best meet the position requirements.

The sectional center manager then selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for appointment to the vacancy.

Rebs In Final Test Friday

The Rivercrest Rebels will be out to further polish up on their football skills Friday night when they scrimmage Honey Grove in the final pre-season test under simulated game conditions.

The Friday scrimmage, originally set for Rebel Stadium, has been moved to Honey Grove and will get underway at 7:30 p.m., with only the varsity units in action.

The rebels kick open their 1982 campaign one week from tomorrow night when rejuvenated Prairiland invades the Rivercrest pigskin pasture.

The Honey Grove Warriors are a District 17-AA outfit and are pre-season picked by Texas Football Magazine to battle Leonard for last place. The Warriors, however, do have good size and are expected to key their seasonal fortunes to the defensive unit that revolves around 225-pound defensive tackle James Wishard and speedy defensive back Marcus Denson.

The Rebels came out on the short end of things in their initial scrimmage last week, against a good New Boston squad. The Lions, from District 14-3A, kept the Rebels out of the endzone while punching over three goals on their own.

Only one of New Boston's scores came against the Rivercrest first string, while one was scored on the reserve unit and one on the jayvees.

Although issuing a reminder about the Rebels being a young team, with only one offensive and three defensive starters back from last year's district championship outfit, Coach Milford Groves says he as "pleased" with the Rebels' effort against New Boston.

"We have a young and small team, but once they settled down, they played good ball," Groves says in referring to Rivercrest's first test under combat conditions.

"However, some of our blocking needs to be worked on and we expect that part of the game to show improvement this week," the Reb head man adds.

Manager Plan Test By Bogata

The City of Bogata is testing the waters of having a city manager, at least on a part-time, trial basis.

Mayor John W. Hood says the city council, at its August meeting, approved the employment of Bill Hayter of Paris as city manager on a two-month trial basis.

"If it works out, we will expand it to a permanent situation," Hood says.

Hayter, whom Hood says is a certified city manager, will assist the city only on a part-time basis at present. He will provide assistance in preparing the city's 1982-83 fiscal year budget, that is now being compiled and also serve as a consultant on various administrative details and procedures.

Bogata is also considering the possibility of establishing a municipal court, with a city judge and city attorney, Hood says.

Hayter is currently assisting his father with the Hayter Engineering, Inc., firm of Paris.

District Judge Deals Out Punishment

On Aug. 16, District Judge Leon Pesek of Texarkana heard guilty pleas in the Red River County District Courtroom and set punishments as follows:

The probation of David Lee Huddleston, of Paris was revoked, and he was sentenced to 5 years in prison. An additional 5 year sentence was stacked on Huddleston's sentence after he plead guilty to the April 25, 1982 burglary of Earnest Boulware's grocery store at Kiamatia.

Pesek sentenced Donald Wayne Young, of Clarksville to 3 years in prison for the August 13, 1982 theft of a pickup truck from Harvey Brothers Implement Company. Young had a prior felony conviction.

Wayne Hines, of Clarksville received a 5 year probated sentence and a \$278.50 restitution for 2

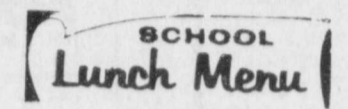

GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U... Guidelines In Overseas Research

By Michael Cunningham

Although many of us are blessed by being sons, or daughters of immigrants, most of us are not the descendants of recent immigrants. Some time during our research we will find what country our immigrant ancestors came from.

Our 11th genealogical principle is Overseas Research. It will help give you ideas on how to obtain information.

Researching foreign records can be done quite successfully if we follow these guidelines. First, find out the name and birthplace of your ancestor who came over here.

Fourthly, if you cannot find out where overseas to write, contact the embassy in Washington, D.C. of the country where your relatives came from.

You can also order census records, church records and other records, from many foreign countries.

When writing these foreign libraries, be very specific on information you request. Just ask for information on one person or family at a time.

Over the next several weeks, we will in great detail discuss overseas research. Next week we will discuss the most important of all principles of genealogy: Persistence.

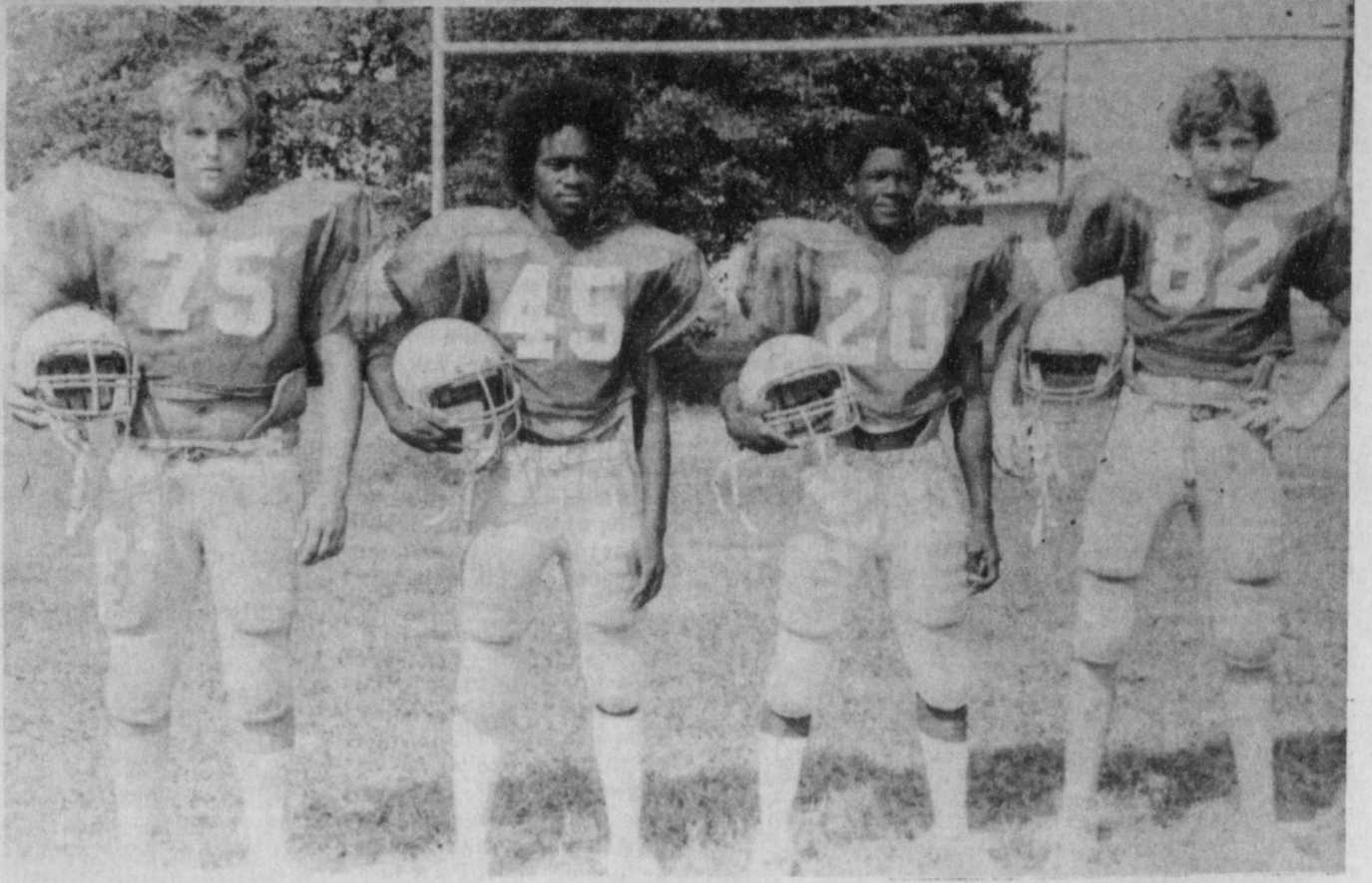

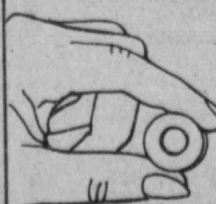

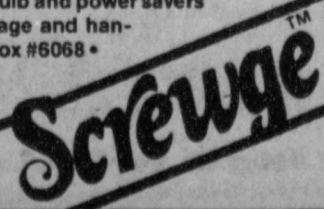
