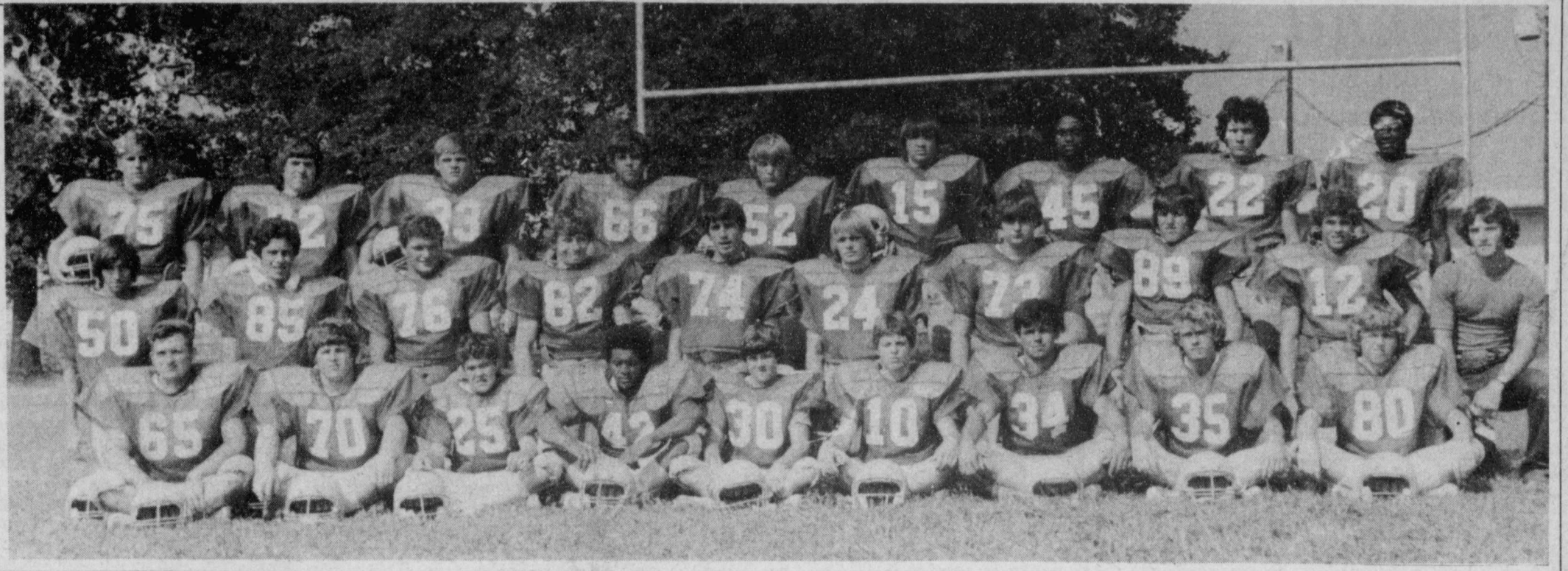

## Rebels, Patriots Kick Open Season Friday Night At Rivercrest

The testflights and experiments are over and the rebuilt Rivercrest Rebels lift the curtain on their new-look football machine Friday night when they host Prairiland in the seasonal opener for both teams.

Kickoff time in Rebel Stadium is 8 p.m., with Coach Milford Groves and his Rebs squaring off against an enemy that has shown the desire and ability in pre-season tests to shake loose from its dreaded losing ways and break out of the chute with a victory.

The invading Patriots went winless last year, have won but twice in three years and have never enjoyed a winning season since starting varsity play in 1975—but they have never thrown in the towel against the Rebels. Rivercrest had to come from behind last year to defeat the Class Triple-A Pats, 13-6.

The Rebels have undergone wholesale rebuilding and shuffling since last year's district championship 6-3-2 season. As a result, 18 of the 22 starting positions on the defensive and offensive units will be manned by people who either weren't on the team or were reserves last year.

There is only one returning offensive starter, junior tackle Stanley Jesse. The three returning defensive starters are senior backs-corners John Hines and Larry Davis and free safety Bradley Moore.

"With our small size, we're not going to be running over anyone this year, and we're not blessed with speed either," Coach Groves says.

Groves, however, isn't exactly on a gloom trip. He's high on the spirit and enthusiasm of the Rebels. "They're a good group, one of the hardest working teams I've ever had and they're willing to try anything we coaches ask."

Groves and his assistant coaches, Perry Cowan, Wake Wood, Andy Jones, John Gable and Jerry Craig, are uncertain about some of the starting positions against the Patriots. Here's the way the probable starters looked earlier this week:

On offense, the leading candidates for ends are a pair of juniors, Scotty Goates, 160, and Clay Tidwell, 150. Tackles are Jesse, 195-pound junior and David Mauldin, a 182-pound sophomore; while the likely guards are junior Harold Holt, 180, and sophomore Mikeal Alford, 180; and Wade Walker, 150-pound senior, may man the center slot.

## Rebs Win 5 Of 7

The Rivercrest Rebels have won five of the last seven gridiron meetings with the Prairiland Patriots, including the last three straight games.

Prairiland's last victory over their neighboring Rebels came in 1978 when the Pats came from a 10-point half-time deficit to nip the Rebs in the highest scoring game of the series, 34-30.

quarterback and fullback. Kelly Jeffery, 135-pound junior, appears to have the inside track for the quarterback role after last week's scrimmage with Honey Grove, but Joel Morgan, another 135-pound junior; and the very versatile Moore, a 160-pound senior, can also be counted upon for either quarterback or at one of the end posts.

In the Honey Grove scrimmage, the Rebs got their lone score (and only one of the scrimmage season) when Moore snagged a little pass from Jeffery and went scooting for some 66 yards.

The fullback slot is being contested by Greg Russell, 191-pound sophomore; and a pair of 140-pounders, junior Jeff Bivins and senior Jim Earley.

Probable starting halfbacks are Davis, 145-pound senior and Hines, 140-pound senior; although Randy Galloway, 145-pound junior, will be putting in some time at one of the halfback jobs.

Going over to the probable starters on defense, where the Rebs are especially expected to have some bright moments, Jesse will be at one defensive end post with either Tidwell or Goates at the other. Tony White, 205-pound senior, appears to have one tackle post nailed down, while the other will likely go to either Holt or Billys Mays, 196-pound junior.

Galloway is expected at middle linebacker and will be flanked on the weakside by Lonny Sheffield, 135-pound junior; and either James Noey, 130-pound senior or Bobby Wisinger, 130-pound junior, at the strong side.

## Tentative 74-Cent School Tax Rate....

# \$1.95-Million Budget OK'd

Adoption of a \$1,953,428 expenditure budget, some \$230,000 more than last year, has been approved for the 1982-

83 school year by the Talco-Bogata school board.

Approval of the new budget, along

with a tentative decision to set the tax rate at 74 cents per \$100 valuation, was made by the school trustees following the Aug. 24 public hearing on the proposed budget.

School officials emphasize the proposed 74-cent tax levy is tentative, pending certification of the school district's actual valuation by the Red River County Appraisal District. The tax rate could be revised, up or down, when the awaited final figures are made available by the appraisal district.

The new budget compares to \$1,723,428 for the 1981-82 school year, representing a percentage increase of about 13 percent.

Although all budget categories are increased over last year, the major hikes are in instruction and plant maintenance-operation, an increase of \$172,643 in those two categories.

Instruction is up by some \$117,000, due mostly to the state-mandated salary increases for teachers and the start of a computer program in the school system. The \$55,643 increase in maintenance-operation takes in the construction of basketball dressing rooms at Rivercrest High School and anticipated improvements to facilities at the Bogata and Talco schools.

Pending the official certification by the appraisal district, the budget is tabulated on an estimated taxable value of \$146-million. The tentative 74-cent tax rate would bring in some \$1,080,000 based on that valuation.

Approximately 63 percent, or about \$1,230,659 of the total school budget goes for personnel salaries.

Total funds available to support the new budget are estimated at \$2,066,520, including \$965,642 from state funds, with the remainder from

# Football Guessing Game Offers Cash

Armchair quarterbacks can begin proving their expertise at forecasting winners today—and try for \$24 weekly cash prizes, in the annual football guessing contest sponsored by the News-Times newspapers of Bogata, Deport, Blossom and Talco.

is a different football game. Contestants must guess the winner in each of the 27 games, by making an "X" or some identifying mark in the parenthesis alongside the team they believe will win. If you believe the game will end in a tie, mark a "T" or write "tie" across the ad in which the game is published.

Do not guess the score on the games in each of the 27 games, just mark your choice of what team will win.

In addition to the 27 games, there is the "Tie Breaker" game, printed in the middle of the page—and contestants should guess both the winner and score of the tie-breaker game. For this week's opener, the tie-breaker game is the Rivercrest-Prairiland game.

## The Tale Of The O-R-T

Continuing the tale of the O-R-T railroad, it was discovered that some of the laborers who sweated in the hot Texas sun to complete the line never did receive the pay due to them for their work.

They threatened to bring suit to the courts and hold the rolling stock and rails through court action until they got their pay.

Upon investigation they learned that the whole outfit, lock, stock and shady barrel, had been borrowed or leased from people, and there was no sign of the main promoters of the scheme left, only honest people who had been taken advantage of.

Folks around Deport and Blossom who were major loser in the venture didn't like to talk about it. The businessmen who invested in the haphazard transaction have long since departed, but it's a fair bet that the folks who proposed the whole deal were showered with some pretty strong epitaphs during that period in time.

The Paris and Mt. Pleasant Railroad that reached Deport from Paris in 1910 was financed by a stock company of reliable and substantial citizens of Paris, Mt. Pleasant, Deport, Bogata and all the other towns along the line.

Of course, people were still smarting around Deport from the financial sting of the little O-R-T attempt, and after very careful investigation of the stock company, they



rallied and subscribed liberally to this new road.

They had been hoodwinked once, and made sure that they weren't going to be again.

In the beginning the Paris and Mt. Pleasant wasn't a class A railroad, but it was much superior to the O-R-T.

The first carload of merchandise that was carried on the rails was consigned to Sam Bell, a Deport merchant. The car that brought it from Paris was at the end of the construction train which was laying track toward Mt. Pleasant.

A regular passenger train was added in addition to the freight cars at a later date. These were true passenger cars, not box cars with benches bolted down on the floor like the poor old O.R.T.

The train would usually consist of engine, baggage car and two coaches. The freight trains were larger.

The train was well patronized by folks for a number of years and road conditions made the railroad a benefit to all. Gradually, however, the passenger list dropped as roads improved and autos did too.

Highway 271, which was built parallel to the railroad, nearly did the passenger service in.

Trucks and buses took a lot of the freight business, and sometime about the middle of the 1950's the railroad ceased to run entirely.

The last chapter in this story will come up next week, and then we'll turn to something else.

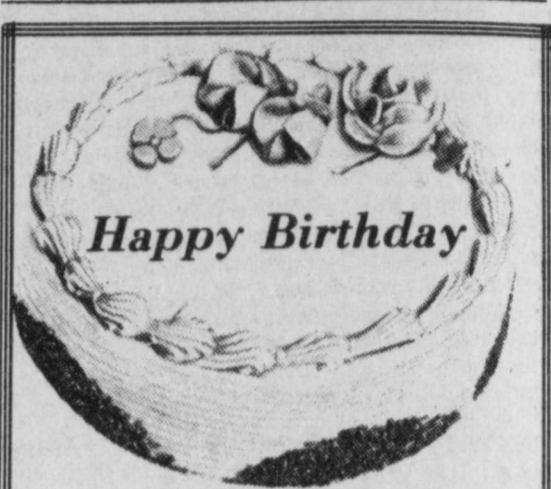

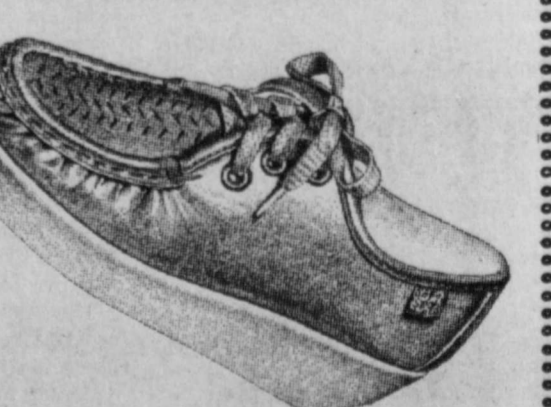

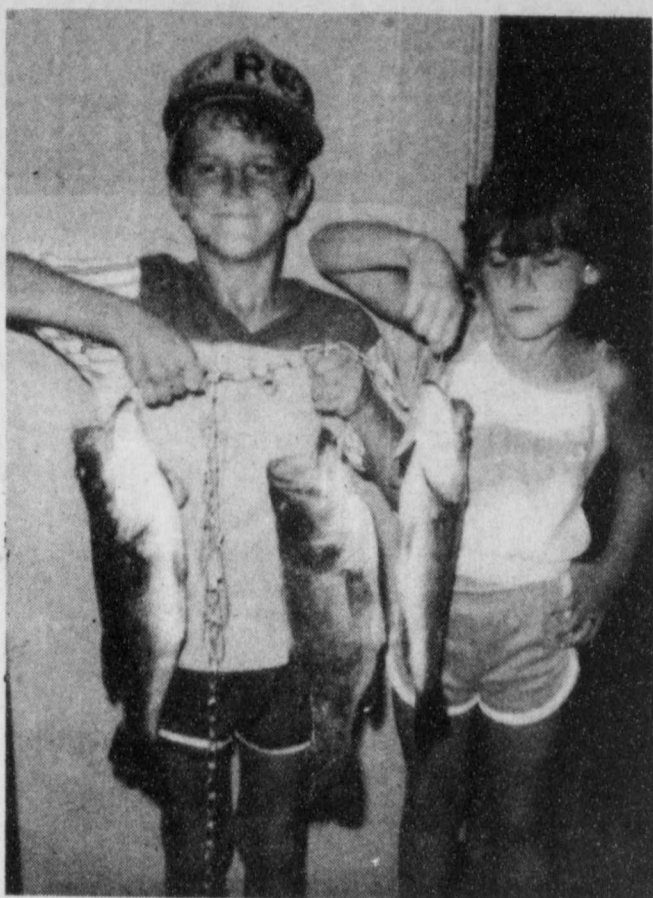

## Another Lawn Threat....

# Armyworms To Chinch Bugs

The southern chinch bug can damage home lawns severely, particularly during hot, dry weather, says Chris Bull, Red River County Extension agent. Many homeowners do not discover this problem until they find their lawn suddenly spotted with large areas of dead grass. Infested yards first turn yellow, then turn brown and die. Early diagnosis and treatment of the infestation is the key to chinch bug control. "The chinch bugs can be as bad as armyworms," Bull says, referring to the recent outbreak of armyworms.

Use insecticides containing carbophenothion (Trithion) Aspon, diazanon, Ethion, or chlorpyrifos (Dursban). Follow the directions given on the label. Allow treated areas to dry thoroughly before permitting children of pets to play on the grass. Always read and follow carefully instructions on the container label, Bull cautions.

The adult chinch bugs are about 1/4 inch long and have black bodies with white wings. Each wing bears a distinctive triangular black mark. Along with the adults, there may be a number of small chinch bugs called nymphs scurrying around under the grass on the soil surface. At first, these nymphs are wingless and yellow, but soon turn red and develop a light colored band across their backs. The small chinch bugs can cause the same damage as the adults, Bull points out. In Texas, the adult chinch bugs are inactive during the winter and cause little damage in the spring. Usually the dead spots that are found in lawns in the spring are from some cause other than chinch bugs. This could either be winter kill or a disease. Chinch bug damage usually occurs in the summertime, according to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The granular insecticides are easier to use and generally provide more thorough coverage. This type of insecticide can be applied with fertilizer spreader. Following application, the lawn should be watered for about an hour to wash the granules into the matted turf.

## FHA Changes Area Office Responsibilities

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) in Texas has announced a reorganization of its district and county offices.

In the reorganization there will be a realignment of the counties served by the district office in Mt. Pleasant. Robert C. Toon, district director in Mt. Pleasant, said that the following FmHA County Offices will be under his administration: Gilmer serving Upshur, Wood &

Camp Counties; Marshall serving Harrison and Marion Counties; Henderson serving Rusk, Gregg, and Panola Counties; Daingerfield serving Morris County; Mt. Pleasant serving Titus and Franklin Counties; Linden serving Cass County; New Boston serving Bowie County; and Clarksville serving Red River County.

In announcing the reorganization, J. Lynn Futch, State Director, says the aim of FmHA is to

provide a sound credit program to rural people who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere, and to provide the servicing activities needed to insure that the loans are repaid.

Futch also said that because of recent budget reductions and lower staff ceilings, the reorganization is necessary to reduce the number of FmHA offices in the State.

The reorganization will be effective Sept. 5.

## Postal Service Sets Carrier Examinations

The U.S. Postal Service announces an examination for the positions of Clerk and City Carrier in the Post Office at Paris.

Postmaster Dennis R. Lee states that interested persons should secure an application form at the post office between Sept. 1 and Sept. 10.

All completed applications must be returned to the post office not later than Sept. 10. Applicants will be notified at a later date as to the time and place of the examination. They will be sent a set of sample questions at that time.

The general minimum age requirement is 18 at the time of appointment. There is no maximum age limit. All qualified applicants will receive consideration for

employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, political affiliations, or any other non-merit factor.

A physical examination will be required before appointment. A valid Texas driver's license is also required before appointment. Starting salary is \$9.80 per hour, with increases to \$11.13 per hour.

No vacancies for these positions exist at the present time, Lee says. Applicants who make at least a grade of 70 on the examination will be placed on a register of eligibles, in order of grade, for filling future vacancies.

Presently, applicants will be eligible for employment at the Paris post office only. However, it is anticipated that in the near future all

eligibles will be given the opportunity for employment in two additional offices. These additional offices will probably be: Bogata, Bonham, Cooper, Honey Grove and Whitewright.

Application forms may be secured at these additional post offices, Lee says.

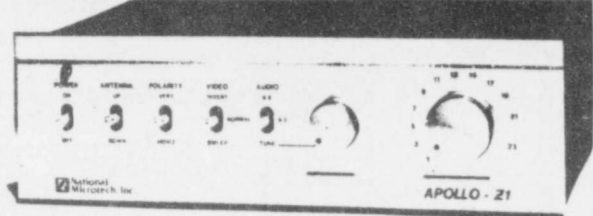
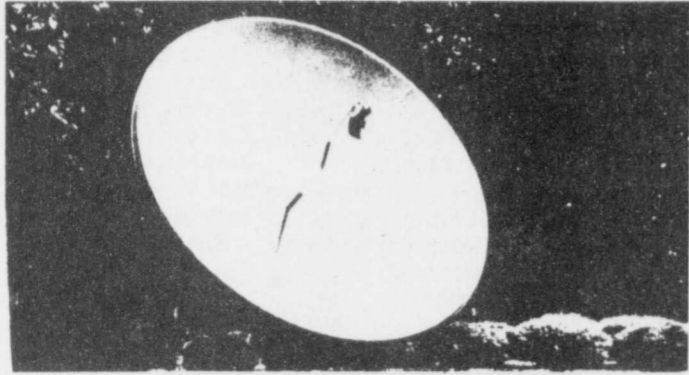

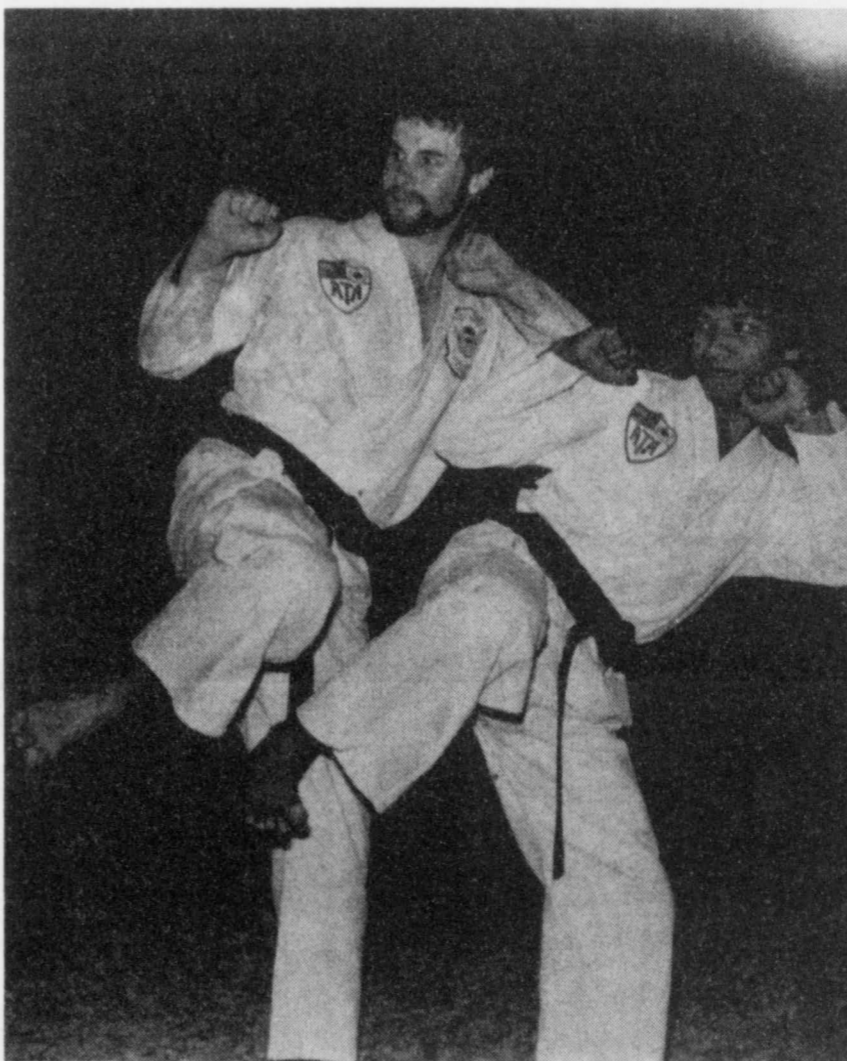

## Talco Sales Tax Tops 1981 Pace

Talco continues ahead of last year in its revenue from the city's one-cent sales tax, while Bogata is running about 3.5 percent behind last year's receipts through the first eight months of the year.

The state comptroller's office reports that Talco has received a check for \$8,067.44 for the period ending Aug. 6. That makes for a total of \$31,394.75 Talco has received in reimbursement of the sales tax through the initial eight months of 1982, a total that is some \$3,400 or 12.3 percent more than Talco had received through the same period one year ago.

Bogata's sales tax reimbursement from the state was some \$526 behind last year, receiving a check for \$3,715.72 this month. This hiked

Bogata's sales tax money for the first eight months to \$14,197.24, compared to \$14,724.11 through the January-August period of a year ago.

Clarksville is showing a very healthy increase, with its sales tax refund running more than 56.6 percent ahead of last year. The Red River County city received a check for \$29,892.79 this month, to shove Clarksville over the \$100,000 mark for the earliest time ever.

Clarksville has now received \$125,678.70 from its one-cent sales tax for the year to date, more than \$45,000 ahead of what it had received in the first eight months of last year.

Deport, with \$4,900.75 in sales tax money for the initial eight months, is 2.1 percent ahead of last year.

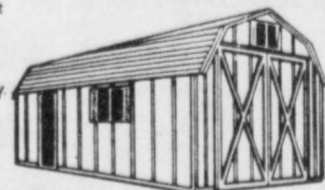

## 12 Year Catfish Recaught

When Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fishery biologists caught a 31-pound flathead catfish in a recent electroshocking survey at Lake Kirby near Abilene, they noticed a metal tag in the fish's lower jaw.

The fish had worn the tag since Aug. 11, 1969, when it was tagged as part of a flathead catfish study.

Biologists Roy Bamberg said the 12-year period was the longest in his memory for recapturing tagged fish. "We have known that flatheads can live a long time, and since this 31-pounder was over 12 years old you can guess that a 70-

or 80 pounder is really long-lived," Bamberg said. The captured fish weighed 1.76 pounds when tagged and released.

Bamberg said the study dealt with spawning habits,

movement and growth rates of flatheads in the 700-acre reservoir on the outskirts of Abilene. He said the fish was captured near the dam, in the general vicinity of the release site.

**you and the LAW**

Q: Recently, I was stopped by a highway patrolman for speeding. My driver's license says I should have glasses on to drive a car. I was wearing contact lenses when the officer stopped me; he made me remove the contacts to prove I had them. Did he have the right to require that?

A: Under the law, the Department of Public Safety is authorized to issue driver's licenses which are restricted in various ways including requiring the use of corrective lenses while operating a motor vehicle. Peace officers are authorized to enforce the laws of the state of Texas. It is a reasonable request that a peace officer require the user of contact lenses to show the officer that such corrective lenses were in fact in use.

Q: I sold my car to a person who is paying me \$25 a week until it is paid in full. At that time, I will sign title over to her. If she has a wreck or is involved in some wrongdoing, can I be held liable since the title to the car is still in my name?

A: Although your sale agreement may specify otherwise, the certificate of title still names you owner, and you are presumed to own the vehicle. Depending on the facts, you could be sued and found liable for negligent entrustment of your vehicle, say, if the buyer did not have a driver's license and you knew it. However, from your question it appears that you have surrendered custody and control and are merely a lien holder. Telephone the Motor Vehicle Division of the State

Highway Department to discuss whether title should be changed while you are selling the car.

Q: My husband and I are divorced. We have a 10-year old son who lives with me. My ex wants the boy to go and live with him, but my son wants to stay here with me. At what age may a child refuse to go with his father?

A: To change custody, the father must file a Motion

to Modify, showing a material and substantial change in circumstances; that to retain Mother as Managing Conservator would be injurious to the child's welfare; and that Father as Managing Conservator would be a positive improvement.

A child may be allowed to testify to his preference, and this factor may be taken into consideration. However, the Judge alone will make the decision based on the standard of "the child's best interests."
