marking the predictions The rules are easy and everyone is eligible to compete except employees of the sponsoring newspapers and their immediate families.

On the contest page, there are 27 advertisements by businesses that are joining the Times-News in sponsoring the contest. In each of the 27 ads there

is a different football game. Contestants must guess the winner in each of the 27 games, by making an "X" or some identifying mark in the parenthesis alongside the team they believe will win. If you believe the game will end in a tie, mark a "T" or write "tie" across the ad in which the game is published.

Do not guess the score on the games in each of the 27 games, just mark your choice of what team will win. In addition to the 27 games, there is

with a tentative decision to set the tax rate at 74 cents per \$100 valuation. was made by the school trustees following the Aug. 24 public hearing

on the proposed budget. School officials emphasize the proposed 74-cent tax levy is tentative, pending certification of the school district's actual valuation by the Red River County Appraisal District. The tax rate could be revised, up or down, when the awaited final figures are made available by the appraisal district.

The new budget compares to \$1,723,428 for the 1981-82 school year. representing a percentage increase of about 13 percent.

Although all budget categories are increased over last year, the major hikes are in instruction and plant maintenance-operation, an increase of \$172,643 in those two categories.

Instruction is up by some \$117,000, due mostly to the state-mandated salary increases for teachers and the start of a computer program in the school system. The \$55,643 increase in maintenance-operation takes in the construction of basketball dressing rooms at Rivercrest High School and anticipated improvements to facilities at the Bogata and Talco schools.

Pending the official certification by the appraisal district, the budget is tabulated on an estimated taxable value of \$146-million. The tentative 74cent tax rate would bring in some \$1,080,000 based on that valuation.

Approximately 63 percent, or about \$1,230,659 of the total school budget goes for personnel salaries.

Total funds available to support the new budget are estimated at \$2,066,520, including \$965,642 from state funds, with the remainder from

Pen Season Friday Night At Rivercrest

The testflights and experiments are over and the rebuilt Rivercrest Rebels lift the curtain on their new-look football machine Friday night when they host Prairiland in the seasonal opener for both teams.

Kickoff time in Rebel Stadium is 8 p.m., with Coach Milford Groves and his Rebs squaring off against an enemy that has shown the desire and ability in pre-season tests to shake loose from its dreaded losing ways and break out of the chute with a

victory. The invading Patriots went winless last year, have won but twice in three years and have never enjoyed a winning season since starting varsity play in 1975---but they have never thrown in the towel against the Rebels. Rivercrest had to come from behind last year to defeat the Class Triple-A Pats, 13-6.

The Rebels have undergone wholesale rebuilding and shuffling since last year's district championship 6-3-2 season. As a result, 18 of the 22 starting positions on the defensive and offensive units will be manned by people who either weren't on the team or were reserves last

There is only one returning offensive starter, junior tackle Stanley Jessee. The three returning defensive starters are senior backs-cornerbacks John Hines and Larry Davis and free safety Bradley Moore.

"With our small size, we're not going to be running over anyone this year, and we're not blessed with speed either." Coach Groves says.

Groves, however, isn't exactly on a gloom trip. He's high on the spirit and enthusiasm of the Rebels. "They're a good group, one of the hardest working teams I've ever had and they're willing to try anything we coaches ask.

Groves and his assistant coaches, Perry Cowan, Wake Wood, Andy Jones, John Gable and Jerry Craig, are uncertain about some of the starting positions against the Patriots. Here's the way the probable starters looked earlier this week:

On offense, the leading candidates for ends are a pair of juniors, Scotty Goates, 160, and Clay Tidwell, 150. Tackles are Jessee, 195-pound junior and David Mauldin, a 182-pound sophomore; while the likely guards are junior Harold Holt, 180, and sophomore Mikeal Alford, 180; and Wade Walker, 150-pound senior, may man the center slot.

Decisions remain unmade in the offensive backfield, especially at quarterback and fullback. Kelly Jeffery, 135-pound junior, appears to have the inside track for the quar-

Prairiland's last victory over their neighboring Rebels came in 1978 when the Pats came from a 10-point halftime deficit to nip the Rebs in the highest scoring game of the series, 34-

The fullback slot is being contestested by Greg Russell, 191-pound sophomore; and a pair of 140pounders, junior Jeff Bivins and senior Jim Earley

Probable starting halfbacks are Davis, 145-pound senior and Hines, 140-pound senior; although Randy Galloway, 145-pound junior, will be putting in some time at one of the

halfback jobs. Going over to the probable starters on defense, where the Rebs are especially expected to have some bright moments, Jessee will be at one defensive end post with either Tidwell or Goates at the other. Tony White. 205-pound senior, appears to have one tackle post nailed down, while the other will likely go to either Holt or

Billys Mays, 196-pound junior. Galloway is expected at middle linebacker and will be flanked on the weakside by Lonney Sheffield, 135pound junior; and either James Noey, 130-pound senior or Bobby Wisinger, 130-pound junior, at the strong side.

With a father's love, through a journey of strife, a laborers hand led a laborer's life. Though his time was short and his world was small, his life was large and his dreams were tall.


His lot on earth was to toil and sweat for there were children to be fed and deadlines to be met.

And as he glimpsed of heaven with the morning sun---the Almighty's hand touched this laborer's shoulder and the voice of God spoke, "Well done."



Talco Sales Tax Tops 1981 Pace

Talco continues ahead of last year in its revenue from the city's one-cent sales tax, while Bogata is running about 3.5 percent behind last years receipts through the first eight months of the year.

The state comptroller's office reports that Talco has received a check for \$8,067.44 for the period ending Aug. 6. That makes for a total of \$31,394.75 Talco has received in reimbursement of the sales tax through the initial eight months of 1982, a total that is some \$3,400 or 12.3 percent more than Talco had received through the same period one year ago.

Bogata's sales tax reimbursement from the state was some \$526 behind last year, receiving a check for \$3,715.72 this month. This hiked

Bogata's sales tax money for the first eight months to \$14,197.24, compared to \$14,724.11 through the January-August period of a year ago.

Clarksville is showing a very healthy increase, with its sales tax refund running more than 56.6 percent ahead of last year. The Red River County city received a check for \$29,892.79 this month, to shove Clarksville over the \$100,000 mark for the earliest time ever.

Clarksville has now received \$125,678.70 from its one-cent sales tax for the year to date, more than \$45,000 ahead of what it had received in the first eight months of last year.

Deport, with \$4,900.75 in sales tax money for the initial eight months, is 2.1 percent ahead of last year.





Q: Recently, I was to Modify, showing a

stopped by a highway patrolman for speeding. My driver's license says I should have glasses on to drive a car. I was wearing contact lenses when the officer stopped me; he made me remove the contacts to prove I had them. Did he have the right to require that?

A: Under the law, the Department of Public Safety is authorized to issue driver's licenses which are restricted in various ways including requiring the use of corrective lenses while operating a motor vehicle. Peace officers are authorized to enforce the laws of the state of Texas. It is a reasonable request that a peace officer require the user of contact lenses to show the officer that such corrective lenses were in fact in use.

Q: I sold my car to a person who is paying me \$25 a week until it is paid in full. At that time, I will sign title over to her. If she has a wreck or is involved in some wrongdoing, can I be held liable since the title to the car is still in my name?

A: Although your sale agreement may specify otherwise, the certificate of title still names you owner, and you are presumed to own the vehicle. Depending on the facts, you could be sued and found liable for negligent entrustment of your vehicle, say, if the buyer did not have a driver's license and you knew it. However, from your question it appears that you have surrendered custody and control and are merely a lien holder. Telephone the Motor Vehicle Division of the State

Highway Department to discuss whether title should be changed while you are selling the car.

Q: My husband and I are divorced. We have a 10-year old son who lives with me. My ex wants the boy to go and live with him, but my son wants to stay here with me. At what age may a child refuse to go with his father?

A: To change custody, the father must file a Motion change in circumstances; that to retain Mother as Managing Conservator would be injurious to the child's welfare; and that Father as Managing Conservator would be a

positive improvement. A child may be allowed to testify to his preference, and this factor may be taken into consideration. However, the Judge alone will make the decision based on the standard of "the child's best in-
