

Win Cash Money In News-Times Football Guessing Contest

There seems to have been some incorrect information in Lamar County about the requirement of persons "to file their intentions" as to whether they are going to spend money for or against either the county jail bond issue or the Prairiland school bond issue, or both.

The two issues come up for a voter verdict this Saturday and both have developed into somewhat heated discussion points among proponents and opponents.

Lamar County Clerk Margaret Coplin was quoted as saying the statewide Campaign Reporting and Disclosure Act required the filing of intentions by both individuals and groups, as to whether they were going to spend money to campaign for or against an election issue, and that the filing had to be done before any money was spent.

This struck us as being highly unconstitutional—to tell someone he couldn't speak out against or for something, without first (or later for that matter) registering his intention on some governmental piece of paper. So, we contacted the Texas Press Association, which had obtained a ruling earlier on the Disclosure Act from the Secretary of State's office, the ruling body on election laws and procedures in Texas.

Filing of intentions by individuals or a couple, such as Mr. and Mrs. John Doe, is not required, the TPA says.

Filing of intentions is required only by political action groups or committees, such as those that may sign their ads with such titles as "Friends of—", "Citizens for—", etc.

Friday Duel At Cooper....

'Dogs Next For Rebels

The Rivercrest Rebels, lone area team to start the season on a winning foot, will try to make it two straight Friday night with a road trip to tangle with Cooper's big and tough Bulldogs.

"It looks like we're going to catch 'em when they're mad," Rebel coach Milford Groves says in reference to Cooper's 33-19 shellacking at the hands of Paul Pewitt—after Cooper had held a 19-3 halftime advantage.

Despite the loss to Pewitt, a good Class Triple-A outfit, the Bulldogs are viewed as one of the top Double-A powerhouses in this neck of the woods and the smaller Rebels will have to be keyed on a sky high level. The pre-season rankings by the statewide Harris Rating System had the Bulldogs 16 points ahead of River-

crest. Kickoff time in the 'Dog pasture is 8 p.m.

Tickets for Friday night's game will be available at Rivercrest High School.

"There's no doubt about Cooper being a good team. They're also much bigger than Prairiland and they're faster," Groves says.

Two key players for the Bulldogs are flanker-back Ronald Morris, a 6-2, 190-pound speedster, who is perhaps the swiftest ball carrier in the area; and mammoth lineman Bud West, a 6-3, 260-pound powerhouse with amazing speed of his own.

The Bulldogs also have a veteran signal caller in Keith Boles, who

guided Cooper to a district title last season.

Morris, who scored Cooper's lone TD in last year's 7-0 win over Rivercrest, started the season in good fashion when he scored all three of Cooper's touchdowns in the game against Pewitt. However, all of the TD's and most of Morris' freedom came in the first half, before the Brahmas slammed the gate on Cooper's highly touted offense in the second half.

The Rebels will likely field the same line-up against Cooper as they did against Prairiland, although Groves says, "We're still looking at some positions."

"Overall, our boys played a good game against Prairiland, offensively and defensively. Prairiland had a good drive going against us, but we had it shut down until we got that pass interference call on fourth down and they went on in for a score," Groves says.

Matheidas, Kelsey Also Win....

Van Deaver Is First Grid Contest Winner

Entries were few, misses were many, but James Van Deaver of Deport came up with the fewest misses and \$12 first place money in the opening round of The News-Times weekly football guessing contest.

Two Bogata contestants, Brad Matheidas and Joe T. Kelsey, claimed the \$7 and \$5 second and third place money respectively, although Kelsey was first involved in a three-way tie for third money.

Van Deaver was all by his lonesome with the fewest mistakes, missing the winner on nine of the 26 contest games. There were supposed to be 28 games, but the Boston College-Clemson and North Carolina-Vanderbilt games were listed in error and did not count in the contest.

Matheidas was just one step behind Van Deaver as he finished with 10 wrongs, to win the \$7 second money prize.

Kelsey joined Tim Wood of Bogata and R.W. Baird, Route 1, Bogata, in a three-way deadlock for third place, each with 11 mistakes.

The tie was quickly broken in going to the contest tie-breaker game, the Rivercrest-Prairiland game which was won by Rivercrest 14-8. Kelsey was the only one of the trio to figure Rivercrest would win; so, he takes

down the \$5 third place loot.

The prize winners can pick-up their money, starting Thursday, with Van Deaver's award being at the Deport Times office and the prize for Matheidas and Kelsey being available at the Bogata News office.

The entry deadline is 5 p.m. this Friday, unless mailed, with the entries to be deposited at either The Bogata News office or the Deport Times office. Both offices will be open until the Friday deadline.

If mailed, the entries must be mailed in time to arrive with the Saturday morning mail. Mail entries can be sent to either The Deport Times, Box 98, Deport, Tx. 75435; or The Bogata News, Box 306, Bogata, Tex. 75417.

Now Arriving In Mail....

New Valuation Notices 'Shock' Some Taxpayers

The guessing game for most Red River County and Talco-Bogata School District taxpayers is ending this week with the arrival, in the mail, notices of the new taxable valuations of their property.

As expected, the new appraisals are a shock to many homeowners and business property owners—perhaps more so for the owner of an older home than the owner of a new home.

The new valuation on a taxable parcel is the same valuation—for the first time ever—on the tax rolls for all involved taxing entities—county, city, school district, water district, college district or whatever. It's all a part of Texas' new property tax code.

Appraisal notices on some 12,000

taxable parcels went in the mail Tuesday, with the remaining 3,000 or so expected to follow suit Wednesday and Thursday, says Gary Lesniewski, chief appraiser for the Red River County Appraisal District, based in Clarksville.

Many of the notices began arriving in the Bogata area mail Wednesday.

Lesniewski says the mailing includes some 4300 taxable parcels within the Talco-Bogata School District and 900 parcels within the Bogata city limits.

The degree of shock by a taxpayer will probably depend on when the taxpayer's property was last appraised, Lesniewski says. He adds that he has found no records indicating a completely countywide reappraisal.

Many homes in Red River County have been on the tax books, up to this year, with valuations ranging from 10 to 15, some 20, years old. These are the ones that may feel the largest percentage of jump in valuation.

"We found very low valuations on homes in the Talco-Bogata School District," Lesniewski says. This could indicate a substantial rise in valuation for those homeowners as a purpose of the countywide appraisal district is to equalize valuations.

"We found that many of the newer homes are nearer to the actual valuation than most of the older homes, simply because the newer homes have been added to the tax rolls within recent years since the increase in market values, while the older homes remained on the tax rolls at the valuation placed on them 10 to 15 years ago," the chief appraiser explains.

In a sense, this has resulted, Lesniewski points out, in an unfair advantage by the owners of older homes over the past several years by paying taxes on property that had not been valued under update values while the owner of a newer home may have been paying more than his fair share of taxes to make up for the difference.

In Football Season Opener....

Rebels Nip Late Patriot Rally; Win 14-8

A costly nonsense penalty, followed by Bradley Moore's pass theft with 1:53 seconds left in the game, killed off a surging Prairiland rally and helped the Rivercrest Rebels salt away a 14-8 win over the visiting Patriots in the football opener for both teams Friday night.

It was the first opening night win for Rivercrest since 1974 while the Patriots went down to their 12th consecutive defeat. It was also the District 17-AA Rebel' fourth straight win over the 13-AAA Patriots.

The game was played in three exciting chapters. The first half was a scoreless stand-off between the Rebels' sputtering offense and Prairiland's staunch defense. Three times in the first half, the Patriots turned back the Rebs after the latter had struck within 12 yards or closer of TD land, including one tremendous goal line stand after Rivercrest had first down on the 3.

The Rebels got things perking offensively and defensively in the third period to erupt for a 14-0 lead, only to have the scrappy Patriots come up with a final quarter rally that had everything going their way until the costly penalty then Moore's interception.

In the climatic second half, the Rebs took the pighide the first time they had possession and powered by the running of Randy Galloway stormed 68 yards in 8 plays (actually it was 83 yards since the Rebs had a 15-yard violation fine) to take a 6-0 lead.

Galloway, 145-pound junior half-back, carried the ball five times for 70 of those 83 yards, including a 32-yard blast that carried him to the 4 before he was hauled down by Prairiland's William Newman. On the next play Galloway slashed through his left side and fell across the goal.

Steve Stephenson's kick for the extra point was blocked by Chris Spann, but the Rebs had a 6-0 jump with 4:32 left in the third.

About three minutes later, Rivercrest was back with the eventual winning score--this time with 130-pound junior linebacker Bobby Wisinger shooting through to pick off a Todd Davis pass and zipped 22 yards for the TD. John Hines romped around his left side for the 2-point dessert and the Rebs appeared to have route the Patriots with a 14-0 lead and 1:25 left in the third.

The Patriots, however, were making a determined effort at shaking loose from their losing ways and refused to toss in the towel. After an exchange of punts, the Pats switched from their unsuccessful air show to turning Ronald Nichols and Dennis Rhodes loose on the ground.

Behind some hole-clearing blocks for the 160-pound Nichols and the 170-pound sophomore Rhodes, the Patriots suddenly took over the game's momentum as they marched 75 yards in 21 plays to score. A fourth down pass interference call against Rivercrest was a big help for Prairiland then Nichols completed the drive when he dove over from less than 2 yards out.

Quarterback Davis circled his right side unmolested for the 2 extra points and the Patriots had closed to within 14-8 with 2:22 left.

The momentum stayed with the rallying Patriots on the ensuing on-side kickoff as the Rebs fumbled the bouncing pighide and Jeff Ballard pounced on it for Prairiland at the Rebel 43.

That was Prairiland's last good deed of the night. On the first play, Nichols slammed for four yards, but a personal foul by an emotionally too-high Patriot, completely away from the play, cost the Pats back to their 46. On the next play, Moore had his pass interception and 53-yard runback to Prairiland's 17, securing the Rebel victory.

The game had started as though the smaller but speedier Rebels were going to blow Prairiland out of the pasture. The first time Rivercrest had the ball, Galloway, Larry Davis and Greg Russell alternated at carrying the ball 45 yards in 5 plays to the Patriot 12. The Rebs did make it to the 9, but on fourth down Spann pulled Galloway down from behind at the 11 to halt that bid.

Rivercrest had its second op-

portunity early in the the second period when Hines broke loose for 29 yards to a first down on the Patriot 12. This bid ended three plays later when junior quarterback Kelly Jeffery, who went all the way for the Rebs, tried his first aerial of the season and it was promptly intercepted in the endzone by the Patriot's Darrin Gifford.

Minutes later the Rebs were back to try again. On the third play after Gifford's interception, Ballard fumbled the ball when he was clobbered after catching a 14-yard pass from Davis and Wisinger claimed possession for Rivercrest on the Patriot 32.

From the 32, Galloway and Davis led the Rebels to a first down on the Patriot 3 in five plays--but this was where 145-pound linebacker Nelson Hevron and 220-pound Dennis Bedford charged up the Patriot defense.

On the first Reb play from 3, Hevron dropped Davis back on the 5. Next, Bedford crushed Hines to the turf back on the 6; and then it was Hevron again coming through to dump Hines at the 7. After that, Jeffrey's fourth pass went astray and Prairiland fans were cheering the defensive unit.

The Pats took over on their 7 with 2:28 left and Davis finally got on target with his passing and completed three straight, but time ran out as the Patriots crossed the midfield stripe.

For the game, Davis managed to complete only 7 of 26 passes and had three interceptions. He missed on his final 9 aeriels of the game, with two of them intercepted. However, on two occasions, the Patriot receiver fumbled the ball to Rivercrest after catching a Davis pass.

The Rebels gained all 242 of yards on the ground, in 50 carries. Galloway led the way with 134 yards in 21 carries for a 6.4 average. Davis netted 56 yards in 11 carried, while Hines had 48 in 8; Russell, 13 in 4 and Richard Winkler 2 for 2. Jeffery was nailed for a loss of 8 on 3 keepers and James lost 3 in his one carry.

The Patriots, who had only 8 running plays in the first half for 26 yards, finished with 115 yards in 33 scrimmage runs. Nichols was the top Patriot gainer with 68 yards in 17 carries, while Rhodes had 20 for 6; Davis, 19 for 6 and Hevron carried 4 ytimes for 8 yards.

In pass catching, Ballard snagged 4 of Davis' aeriels for 45 yards. Nichols caught a pair but had a plus of only one yard, while Chuck Ray caught one for 22 yards.

Wisinger, Moore and Hines each a pass interception for Rivercrest with Wisinger and an unidentified teammate also grabbing Patriot fumbles.

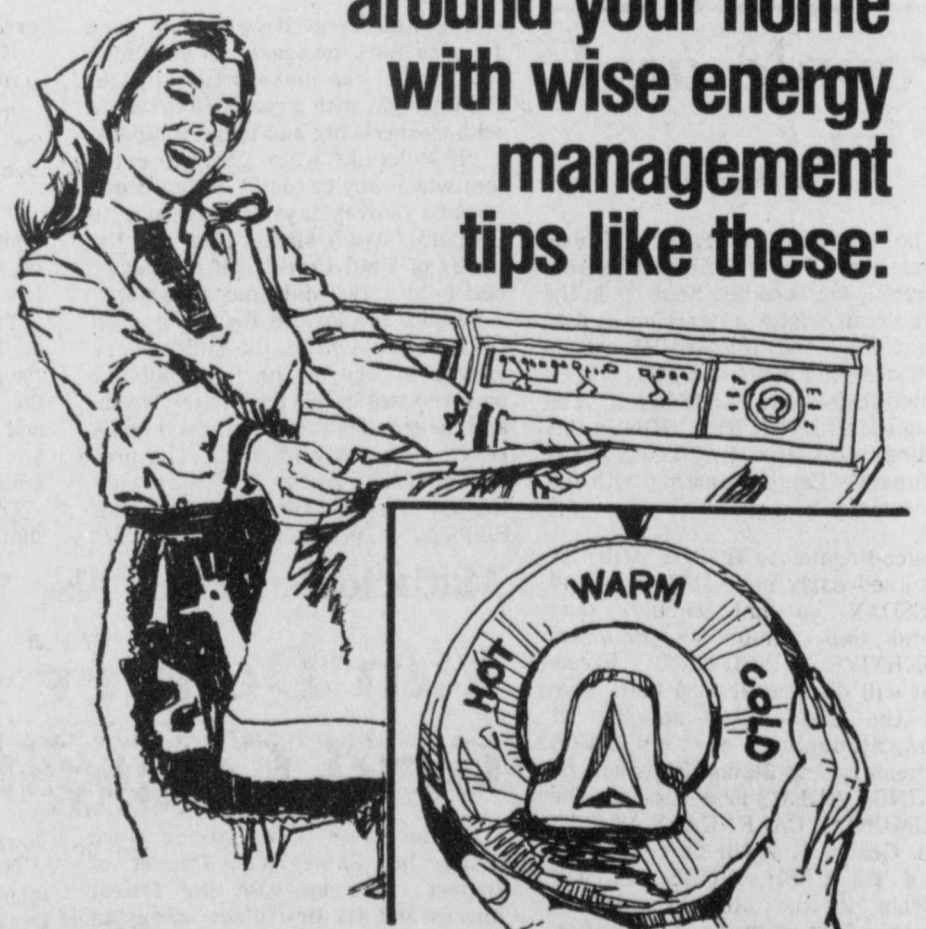

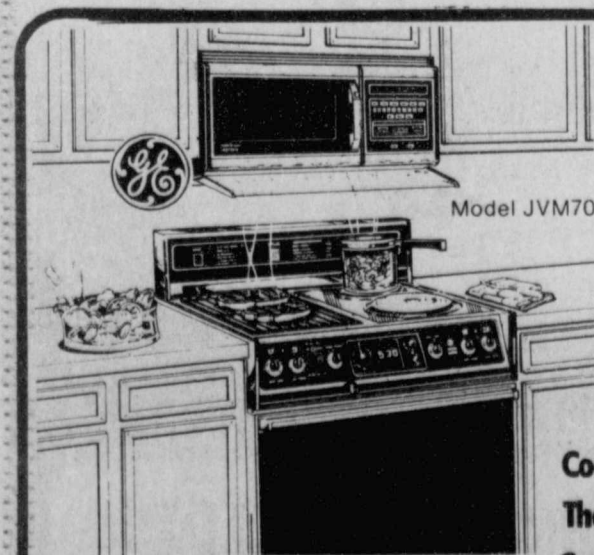

AMA Journal finds no evidence of toxicity from polyurethane foam insulation in homes

An article in the respected and influential *Journal of the American Medical Association* reported no evidence of toxicity problems in homes insulated with fully-cured polyurethane, and disclosed additional evidence for toxic reactions among occupants of homes insulated with urea formaldehyde foam.

Writing in the January 16, 1981, edition of the *Journal*, Drs. John C. Harris, Barry H. Rumack, and Franklin D. Aldrich, of the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center School of Medicine acknowledged that publicity over the possible toxicity of urea formaldehyde has created confusion among physicians, their patients, and others about the health effects of polyurethane foam. According to the authors, the Rocky Mountain Poison Center, Denver, received "numerous calls regarding polyurethane foam"

following publicity about evidence for toxic effects from urea formaldehyde.

Following a discussion of the uses of polyurethane foam and a reference to its high R value making the material increasingly popular, the authors emphasized the complete lack of toxic problems associated with polyurethane.

"A fully-cured polyurethane foam contains no residual isocyanate or polyol, and, in contrast to the urea formaldehyde foams, presents no problems of bleed-off toxic products," they wrote. "There is no evidence of toxicity in occupants of homes insulated with fully-cured polyurethane."

The research which led to the article was based on a survey of health problems experienced by occupants of urea formaldehyde-insulated homes who lodged complaints with the Rocky Mountain Poison Control Center.

Among the symptoms most frequently reported were breathing difficulty, persistent headaches, nasal inflammation, eye irritation, persistent coughing, and frequent "colds."

The authors also discussed toxicity of the materials during combustion. They cited a Canadian study that determined "rigid polyurethane foam created about the same degree of toxic fire hazard as white pine," one of the most common building materials. The combustion products of urea formaldehyde foam, on the other hand, were rated "approximately three times more toxic than those of (white pine or polyurethane)."

Long-term consequences of domestic formaldehyde exposure are still uncertain, according to the authors. They noted that in-depth studies in this area are urgently needed.



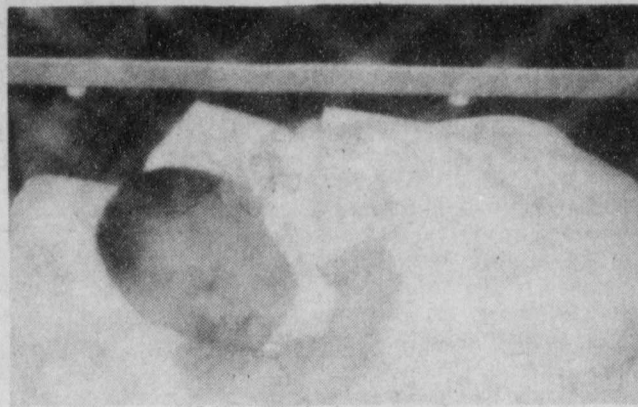

you and the LAW

Q: I am 15 years old; my parents are separated. I earn my own spending money and buy my own clothes. I would like to know what I have to do to be declared an adult.

A: You will be declared an adult on your 18th birthday. Alternatively, if you marry as a minor, with your parent's consent, you will be considered an adult for most purposes.

You may also petition the Court to remove the disabilities of minority. If you are at least 16, living away from your parents, self-supporting and managing your own financial affairs, you may seek to be declared an adult. Except for specific constitutional and statutory age requirements, such as voting, a minor whose disabilities have been removed for general purposes has the power and capacity of an adult.

Q: I am in the service. I am trying to change the registration on my car to my home state, not Texas. However, to do this I need the title to the car and the finance company refuses to relinquish the title for this purpose. What can I do?

A: I assume you've been in touch with the motor vehicle bureau in your home state to determine its requirements. If the original certificate of title had not been required, the state in which your car is currently registered may be able to provide a non-negotiable copy of the certificate. However, since the original is required, a let-

ter from the vehicle bureau to the finance company could request the original title be forwarded to the bureau for vehicle registration and for recording of the company's lien.

Q: When I moved into my apartment complex, I signed a long lease. I didn't take time to read the lease, and even if I had, I would not have understood the effect of all the clauses. Now a dispute has arisen. It doesn't seem fair that I am bound by a contract I didn't read and can't understand. Am I bound?

A: The answer is usually "yes". The law charges a person to read and understand any contract before he signs it. While this rule can sometimes be harsh, it is often necessary. Otherwise, any party to a contract could always avoid reading it and claim that since he didn't understand, he shouldn't be bound. However, there is one very important exception to this rule. If someone deceives you into signing a contract without giving it careful attention, you may not have to observe its terms. For example, if your landlord had tricked you into signing a contract by telling you that it only had to do with where you could park your car, when actually it increased your rent, then you would not be bound.

VALUATIONS
District is not involved in the setting of the tax rate for the various taxing entities. That remains to action of the local governmental board for the school district, city, etc. Most of those boards have been awaiting the appraisal notices before setting a definite tax rate, although proceeding on their budgets for the new fiscal year.
The Talco-Bogata School District, for instance, has set a tentative tax rate of 74 cents per \$100 valuation, which is estimated to bring in some \$1,080,000 of the district's new \$1.95 million budget.
Valuation notices begin received by taxpayers also contain information on how a dissatisfied taxpayer can request a hearing before the Appraisal Review Board. The Review Board is new this year and completely countywide. It replaces the old boards of tax equalization that each taxing entity previously appointed.
To appear before the Review Board, a taxpayer must complete the form, included with the valuation notice and return it either through the mail or in person to the Appraisal District office on East Main in Clarksville within 20 days of the postmark on the valuation notice.

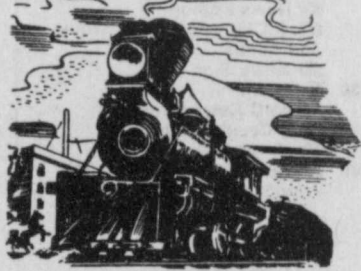

O-R-T

The notes and articles that I have on the old O-R-T and its later replacement, the Paris and Mt. Pleasant, are pretty faded. When they were written the Paris and Mt. Pleasant was still in operation, and one of the facts brought to light was that the motor-powered passenger car left Mt. Pleasant in the morning and arrived at Paris before noon, then returned to Mt. Pleasant again that afternoon.
The car stopped and picked up mail from all the post offices along the line, Talco, Bogata, Deport, Pattonville, all the small communities' mail service was helped along by the P & MP.
Passengers without autos could go to the "big city" (Paris) for shopping, or perhaps they just wanted to visit relatives somewhere along the line. The fares weren't specified, but they were low.
I can barely remember when the railroad was in operation myself. It ran right in front of the house, and was as common a part of living as breathing.
Several times I can recall being hauled along to the little depot at Deport, which was not very fancy, to pick up packages ordered. At that time all passenger service had been discontinued.
The whistle at night made an impression on my childhood. Apparently almost anyone who ever heard the sound of a train mournfully passing through the night remembers it.
Old-timers say that steam train whistles sounded twice as mournful and sad at night as they moved across the countryside.
Well, the last whistle on the O-R-T sounded some seventy years ago, and it's been almost thirty since the last blast from the longer-lived, better run Paris and Mt. Pleasant. But no matter how long it's been, there seem to be plenty of folks that recall it all!
Thanks to each and every one who contributed information about the O-R-T or P&MP.
The train stories are done now, the tales are all told, and the only thing left of even the P&MP is a slight rise in ground here and there, or a red streak where the gravel roadbed has been incorporated into black soil of some field near Hwy. 271.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.
The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."
PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.
Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."
PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

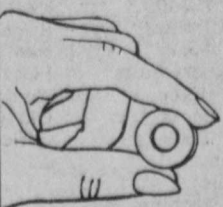

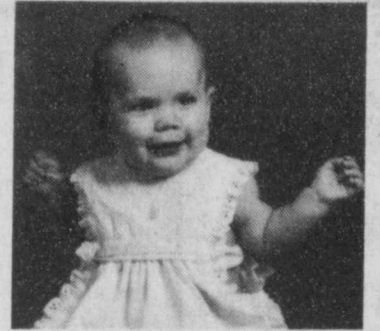
