Bogata May Name Judge, **City Marshal**

A discussion on the possibility of appointing both a city judge and city marshal was a major agenda item at the Tuesday night meeting of the Bogata city council.

City officials discussed the duties and responsibilities of the two appointive positions with attorney Jack Herrington of Clarksville. Bogata has had neither a city judge or marshal for the past several years.

Although no decision was reached, the council agreed to continue consideration of filling the positions at a special meeting next Tuesday, following a public hearing on the city sewer treatment facilities.

In other activity at the Tuesday meeting, Gary Lesniewski, chief appraisor for the countywide appraisal district, turned over the city's new tax valuations.

Bogata has 893 taxable parcels within the city limits, with a total valuation of \$14,011,683, based on 100 percent full market value, Lesniewski reported.

The city's new budget is now being prepared and a tax rate, based on the new valuations, will be set following a public hearing at a date yet to be announced

The Rivercrest Rebels, hopefully, got a bad one out of their system last week and will now zero in on the Mt. Vernon Tigers this Friday in what will be the Rebels' final tune-up before starting the play-for-keeps district campaign against Big Sandy next week.

The lack of varsity experience, combined with small size, a week of bad practices, and a severe case of fumblitis were some of the main reasons the powerful Cooper Bulldogs slaughtered the Rebels, 42-8 last Friday.

Rivercrest Coach Milford Groves said the Rebels had not put 100 percent in their practice sessions last week "and simply were not mentally prepared to play a team of such caliber as Cooper.

The Rebels were expected to return to the "drawing board" on some of their football techniques in getting ready for Mt. Vernon, including the procedures for holding onto the slippery pigskin.

Gametime in Mt. Vernon is 8 p.m. The host Tigers, beaten by the Rebels last year, 18-7 have been having their troubles with injuries this year. They lost their first game to Rains, 17-9 (and Rains lost last week to Big Sandy, 19-11) then were pounded by undefeated Paul Pewitt, 40-0 last Friday.

Cooper stretched the gap to 21-0 late in the second period when the speedster Morris scampered around left end for 69 yards and his second TD.

Rivercrest came up with its best scoring chance of the half when cornerback Larry Davis intercepted a Boles pass and raced 36 yards to the Cooper 9 with just second left in the half. But, guess what? On the first play the Rebs once again coughed up the ball on another fumble and time expired on the first half embarrasment.


"I think the Cooper game will make the boys realize they are going to have to work to have a successful season, and I think they know this, now," Groves said.





ownership or address correction, this can be handled by phone, if desired;

-- if the taxpayer wishes more information about exemptions or special use valuation (such as ag use) a visit to the Appraisal Office inperson is recommended;


-if the taxpayer feels the valuation is either too high or too low, that is, if the question specifically concerns the value only, the the taxpayer will be directed to an adjacent office to meet with a representative of the Southwestern Appraisal Company; the field appraisers will be available with all data indicating how the value was determined to talk with the citizen;

-if the taxpayer, following this explanation, is still not satisfied with valuation, he may sign a Notice of Protest and he or she will be scheduled for a meeting with the Appraisal Review Board.

The Appraisal District Office is 807 East Main Street, Clarksville, and regular office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Campbell has served on several district and state committees for the Texas



House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible

to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state

colleges and universities. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax.'

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxa-No dollar limits tion. would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husband-(agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing

the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution

119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional

amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:


