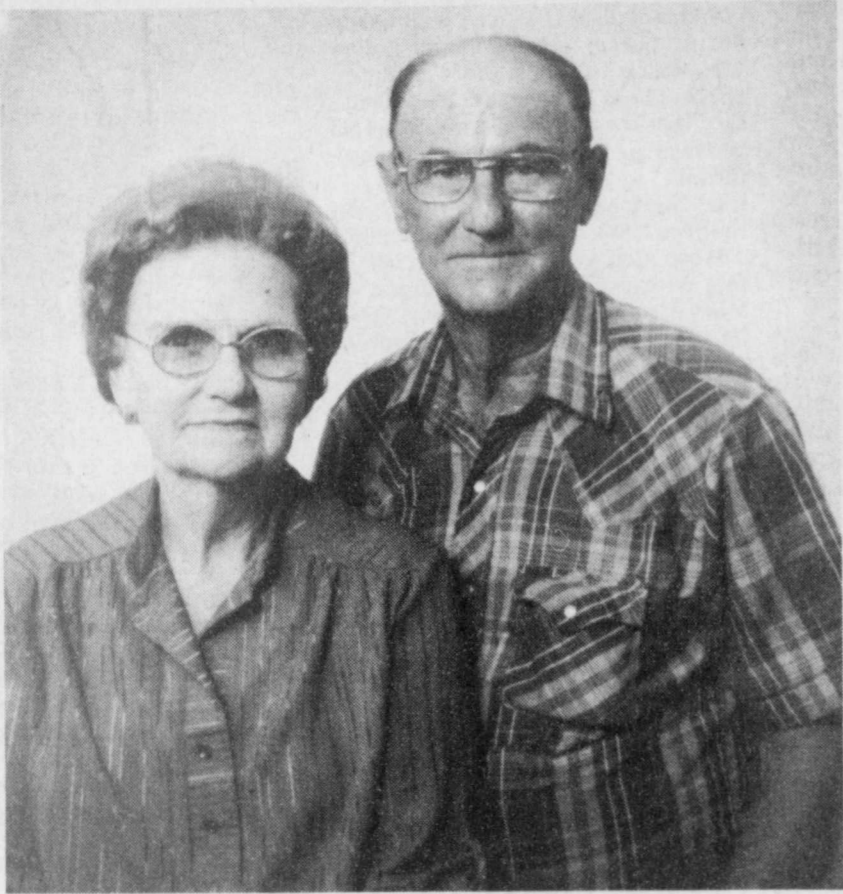

Bogata May Name Judge, City Marshal

A discussion on the possibility of appointing both a city judge and city marshal was a major agenda item at the Tuesday night meeting of the Bogata city council.

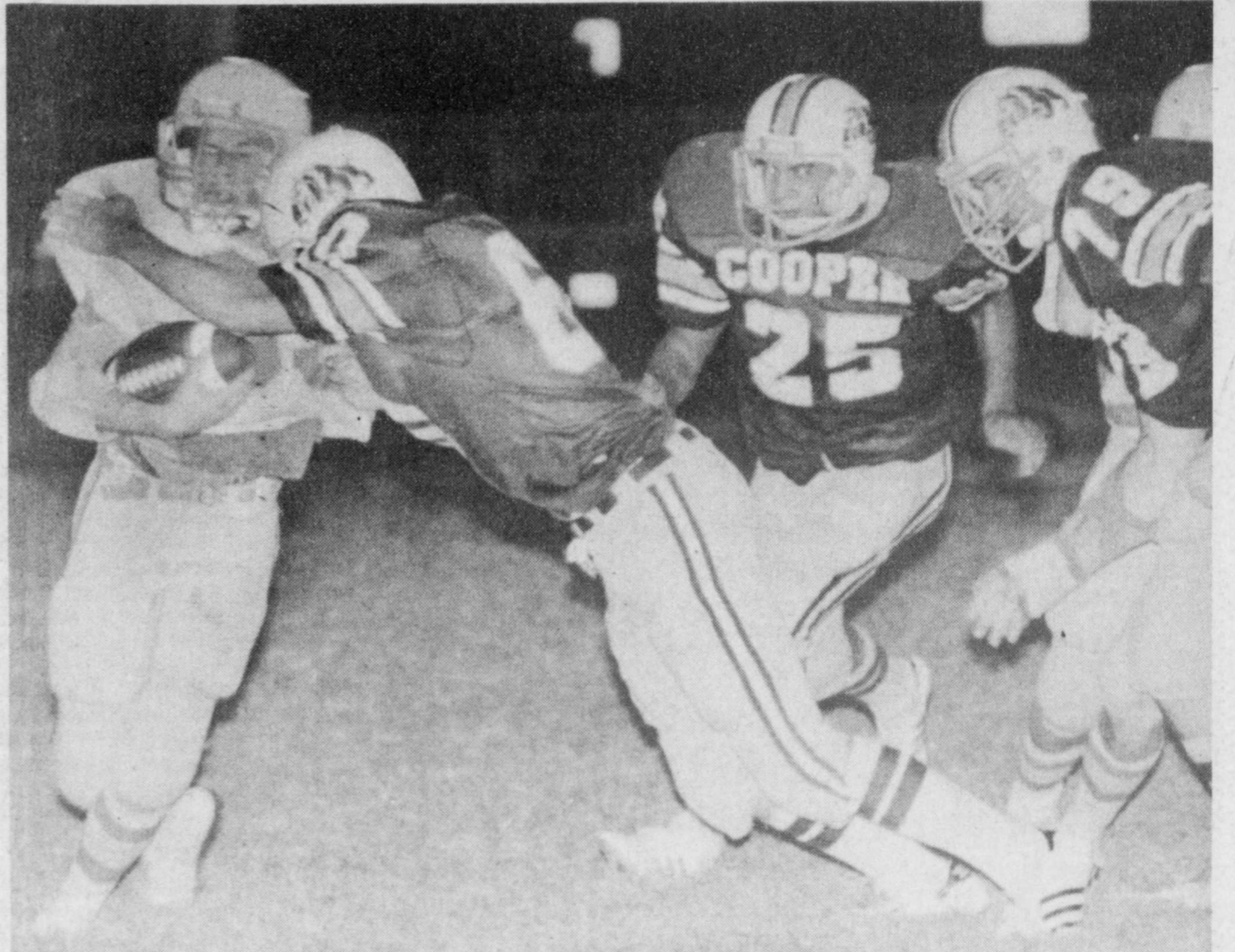
City officials discussed the duties and responsibilities of the two appointive positions with attorney Jack Herrington of Clarksville. Bogata has had neither a city judge or marshal for the past several years.

Although no decision was reached, the council agreed to continue consideration of filling the positions at a special meeting next Tuesday, following a public hearing on the city sewer treatment facilities.

In other activity at the Tuesday meeting, Gary Lesniewski, chief appraiser for the countywide appraisal district, turned over the city's new tax valuations.

Bogata has 893 taxable parcels within the city limits, with a total valuation of \$14,011,683, based on 100 percent full market value, Lesniewski reported.

The city's new budget is now being prepared and a tax rate, based on the new valuations, will be set following a public hearing at a date yet to be announced.

Most Reaction To New Valuations Favorable

Most Red River County taxpayers have received their new tax appraisal valuations by now, says Chief Appraiser Gary Lesniewski.

RR Jobless Rate Climbs

Latest available employment statistics place Red River County's jobless rate at 7.9 percent, more than one-half percent above the state average.

The 7.9 percent rate is based on preliminary figures for July, according to John Riddles, office manager of the Paris office of the Texas Employment Commission. The rate is four percent higher than what it was in both May and June, TEC figures show.

Red River County had a total labor force of 6,407 in July, Riddles says. From this total, 5,904 Red River County citizens had jobs, while 503 were unemployed.

The July figures represent an increase of 41 in the county's labor force (See **JOBLESS**, Page 8)

For the most part, reaction from the taxpayers, especially homeowners, has been well received, Lesniewski reports.

"Most of the inquiries about the new valuations have been on land values, especially by those who failed to apply for the agriculture use adjustment," Lesniewski says.

In addition, a number of homeowners who had failed to apply for homestead and other available exemptions have either called or visited the tax office in Clarksville.

Procedures for taxpayers to follow after receiving their valuation notices have been set out as follows by Lesniewski:

-if the description is correct and the value appears to be fair, then no action whatever is necessary;

-if, however, there are any questions whatever about the valuation notices taxpayers are invited to call the Appraisal Office at 427-2938 in Clarksville.

3 Area Gins Await 1st Cotton Bales

The number of area gins will apparently rise to 3 this cotton season, as the Bogata gin is getting ready to process the first cotton in Red River County in two years.

Blackland Prairie Gin in Deport, and the Cunningham Co-op are also ready for their respective first bales, although recent showers may delay that event for a day or two.

The exact number of acres of cotton planted in either Red River or Lamar County is unavailable, but harvest is expected to be somewhat below average because of the heavy infestation of boll weevils and the high rainfall, throughout the summer.

Cotton is a dry-weather crop and takes high rainfall less well than some others.

Many farmers report only 3 to 4 locks of fully matured cotton per boll, and 5 lock cotton is scarce.

Although cash prizes are no longer given to the farmer bringing in the opening bale for the year, anticipation as to whose it will be is still keen.

The cotton trailers trundling along behind pickups will soon become a common sight up and down farm to market roads, and for the next two months the sound of gins in all three communities will fill the air, and fluffy white cotton will adhere to surfaces as it passes by.

A Mt. Rebs Face Rebound Test At Mt. Vernon

The Rivercrest Rebels, hopefully, got a bad one out of their system last week and will now zero in on the Mt. Vernon Tigers this Friday in what will be the Rebels' final tune-up before starting the play-for-keeps district campaign against Big Sandy next week.

The lack of varsity experience, combined with small size, a week of bad practices, and a severe case of fumbleitis were some of the main reasons the powerful Cooper Bulldogs slaughtered the Rebels, 42-8 last Friday.

Rivercrest Coach Milford Groves said the Rebels had not put 100 percent in their practice sessions last week "and simply were not mentally prepared to play a team of such caliber as Cooper."

The Rebels were expected to return to the "drawing board" on some of their football techniques in getting ready for Mt. Vernon, including the procedures for holding onto the slippery pigskin.

Gametime in Mt. Vernon is 8 p.m. The host Tigers, beaten by the Rebels last year, 18-7 have been having their troubles with injuries this year. They lost their first game to Rains, 17-9 (and Rains lost last week to Big Sandy, 19-11) then were pounded by undefeated Paul Pewitt, 40-0 last Friday.

That dreaded disease of fumbleitis all but knocked Rivercrest out of the Cooper game before the Rebels had a

chance to get organized. The Rebels fumbled eight times and lost possession five times, all in the first half.

The \$12 represents a savings of \$2 from the cost if the yearbook is purchased at a later date.

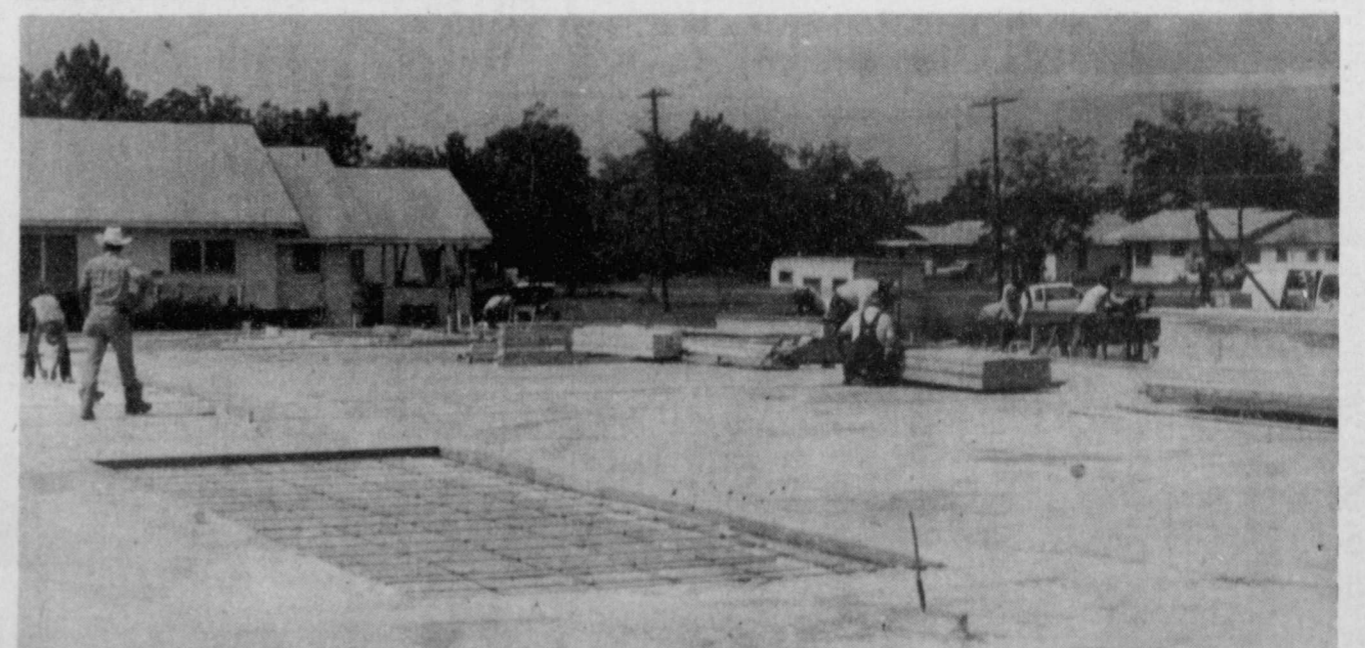
After fumbling on their first possession in the game, the Rebel defense held Cooper and took over on downs, but the Rebel offense had the ball for only one play before another fumble gave the ball back to Cooper on the Rivercrest 36. From there, the Bulldogs surged over with All-State candidate Ronald Morris scoring from seven yards out and after the PAT it was 7-0 with 2:13 left in the first period.

Fumbleitis struck again on the ensuing kickoff return and Cooper ended up with the ball on the Rivercrest 34. On the second play of the second period Cooper quarterback Keith Boles plunged over from the four, after which the extra point kick made it 14-0.

Cooper stretched the gap to 21-0 late in the second period when the speedster Morris scampered around left end for 69 yards and his second TD.

Rivercrest came up with its best scoring chance of the half when cornerback Larry Davis intercepted a Boles pass and raced 36 yards to the Cooper 9 with just second left in the half. But, guess what? On the first play the Rebs once again coughed up the ball on another fumble and time expired on the first half embarrassment.

Cooper took the second half kickoff and proceeded to march through the Rebel defense for another score, which came with Boles going over (See **REBELS**, Page 6)

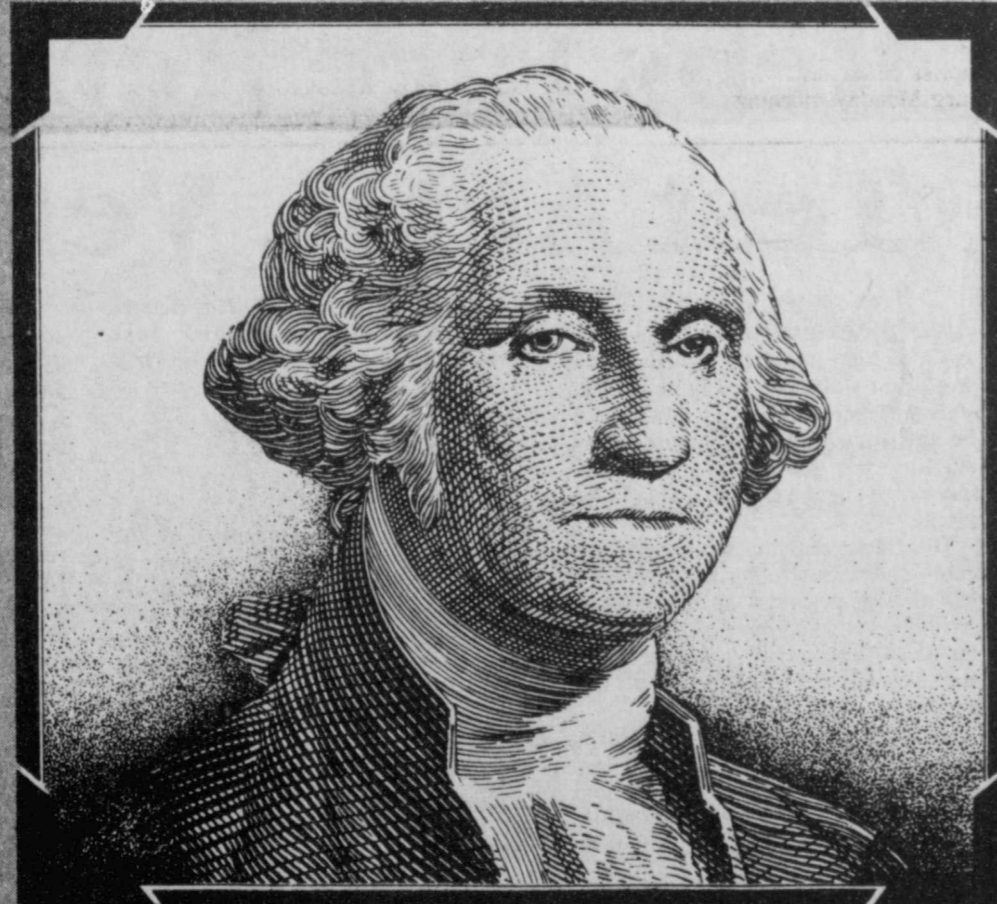

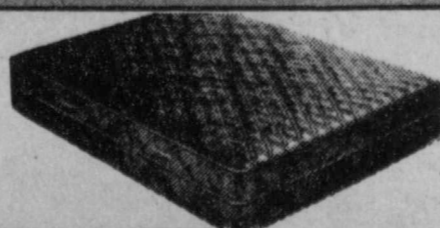
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WMU Elects Officers; Begins Prayer Week

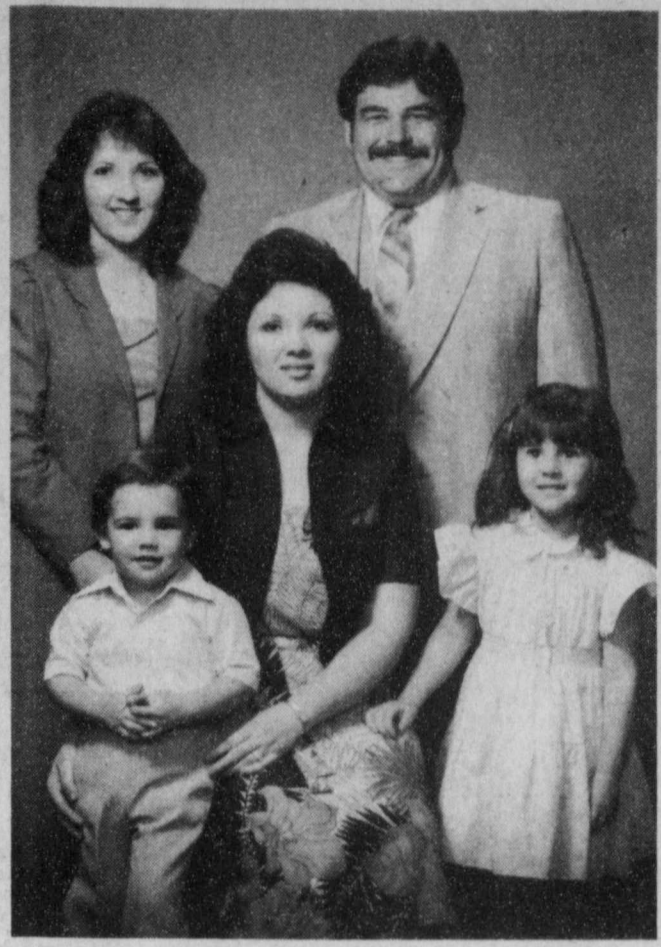

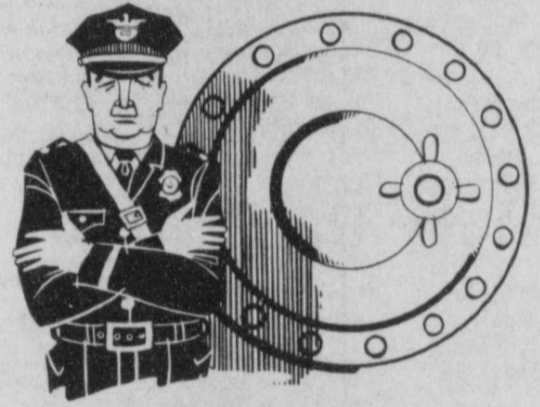

Campbell conducted several key clothing workshops, including an in-service training for teachers and a mail-out series on clothing for children.

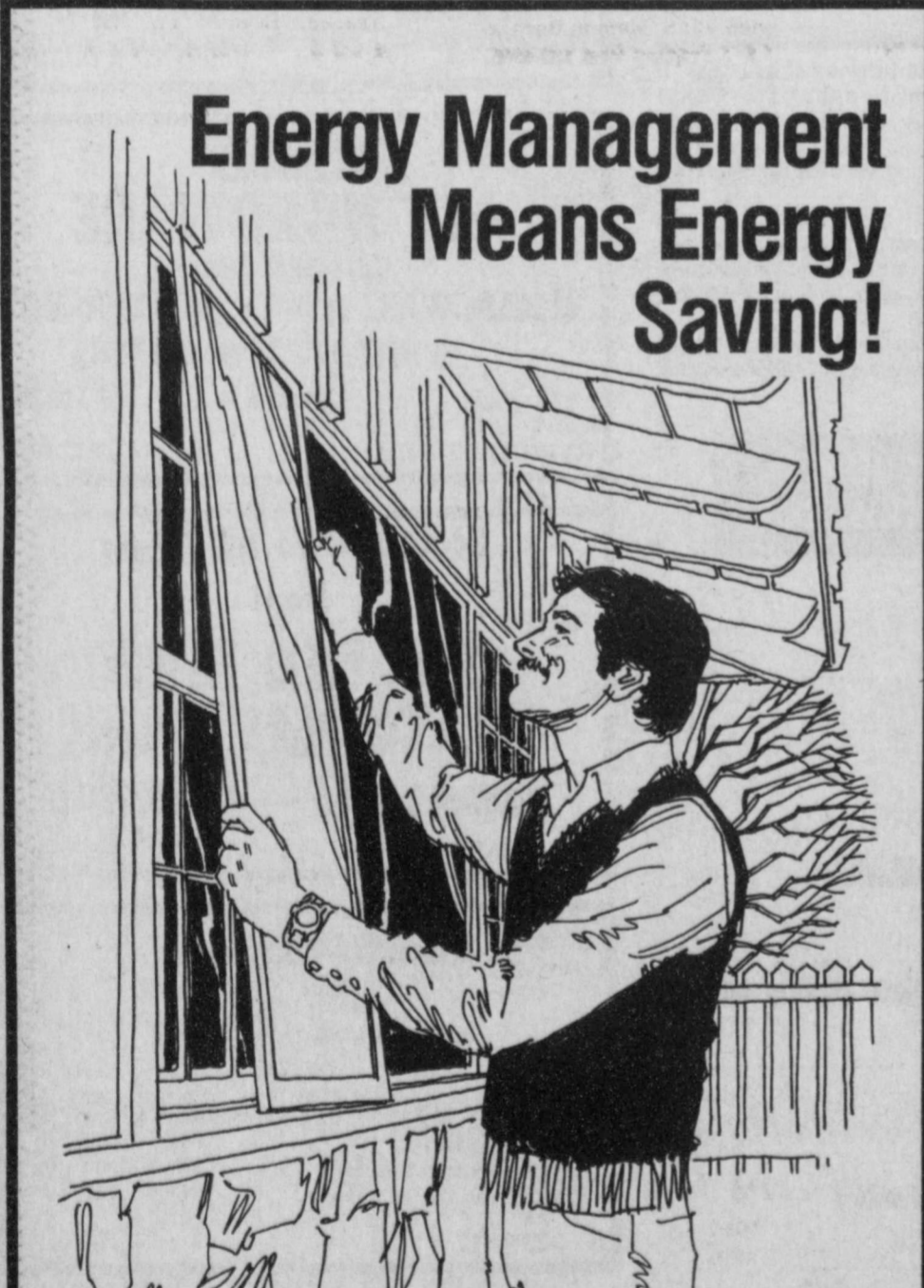

PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."
