

Host Tough Big Sandy In Opener Rebels Begin District Crown Defense Friday

Back on the winning track after last Friday's 22-10 over Mt. Vernon, the Rivercrest Rebels begin the second part of their 1982 football campaign Friday night when they launch the critical play-for-keeps district season.

And the Rebels will be doing it against a newcomer to the district family and one which at least one statewide forecast tagged as the team most likely to keep Coach Milford Groves' crew from a successful defense of their district title-the Big Sandy Wildcats

Kickoff time in Rebel Stadium is 8 p.m., instead of the previously scheduled 7:30 p.m.

Advance tickets for the game, to which a large crowd is anticipated, may be purchased through regular school hours at Bogata Elementary, Talco Elementary and at Rivercrest.

Like Rivercrest, Big Sandy has a winning tradition and moves into the local district for the first time after being shuffled over from tough District 19-AA where the Cats won in 1980

While Texas Football Magazine picked Rivercrest to repeat as district champion this season, the Harris Rating System gave the nod to Big Sandy in its pre-season poll.

Big Sandy has a mediocre 1-2 district record, but those two losses were to former district rivals, powerful Hawkins, 26-8, last week and a 6-0 loss to Winona in the season's opener. In between was a 19-11 win over Rains, a team that blasted Mt. Vernon, 17-9.

The main cog in the Big Sandy system is tight end Fred Long, a 6-0 175-pound toughie on both offense and defense with 4.6 speed. Among other things last year, Long caught 35 passes from quarterback Ira Vovloin, who also is back; made 105 tackles, recovered five opposition fumbles and intercepted six passes.

The Rebels jumped away to a 14-0 halftime lead against Mt. Vernon last week, survived a third quarter scare when the Tigers poured all of their points on the board, then clinched their second win in three starts as halfback John Hines rambled for 87 yards in the final period.

Rivercrest started the game as though still ailing from fumblitis, but got things righted. The Rebels started their first TD in the opening period when, after a pair of key aerial from quarterback Kelly Jeffery to Bradley Moore and a 14-yard gainer

A pass theft by Hines helped set the Rebels up in scoring business in the second period. Some more aerial acts between Jeffery and Moore were keys in the second score, with Moore latching onto a 29-yard bomb for the TD. The same duo repeated their act for the two-point conversion and Rivercrest had a 14-0 command.

Mt. Vernon made a scoring threat late in the second period but it was canceled when Tony White recovered a fumble for the Rebs.

The Tigers did their scoring in the third, first in a 30-yard field goal, then after holding Rivercrest following the ensuing kickoff, Mt. (Continued On Page 8)
