Although the Dragons haven't enjoyed too much gridiron success over the years, the same cannot be said for their coach of the past 2-3 seasons, Bill Spann.

Spann's years of wide acclaim and honors in the coaching profession started in 1962 and continued for a decade and more as he head coached the Dumas Demons of the then Panhandle district of 1-AAA.

Spann was an assistant Dumas coach in 1961 when the Demons won a district title for the first time in 30 years and parlayed that into the '61 state Triple-A championships. Burl Barlett, head coach for the '61 Ding Dong Daddies from Dumas, resigned after winning the state title and Spann moved into the top chair.

The Spann-coached Demons not only repeated as state champs in 1962, but they went on to win district every year through 1971, a string of 10 straight, and for seven straight years during that streak the Demons never lost a district game. Several times they were ranked No. 1 in the state.

Somewhere around the mid-70's after winning one more district title, Spann left Dumas.

If you ever go through Dumas on a trip to Colorado or other points and want to talk high school football, just stop at any place in town and mention the name of Bill Spann.

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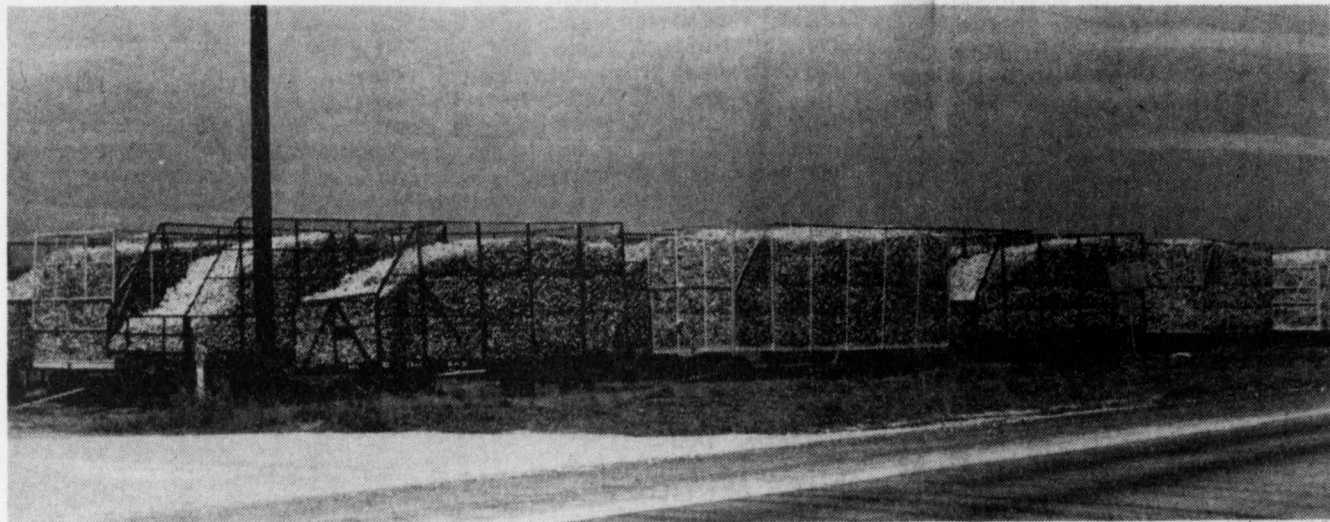

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Homecoming Ceremonies Start At 7

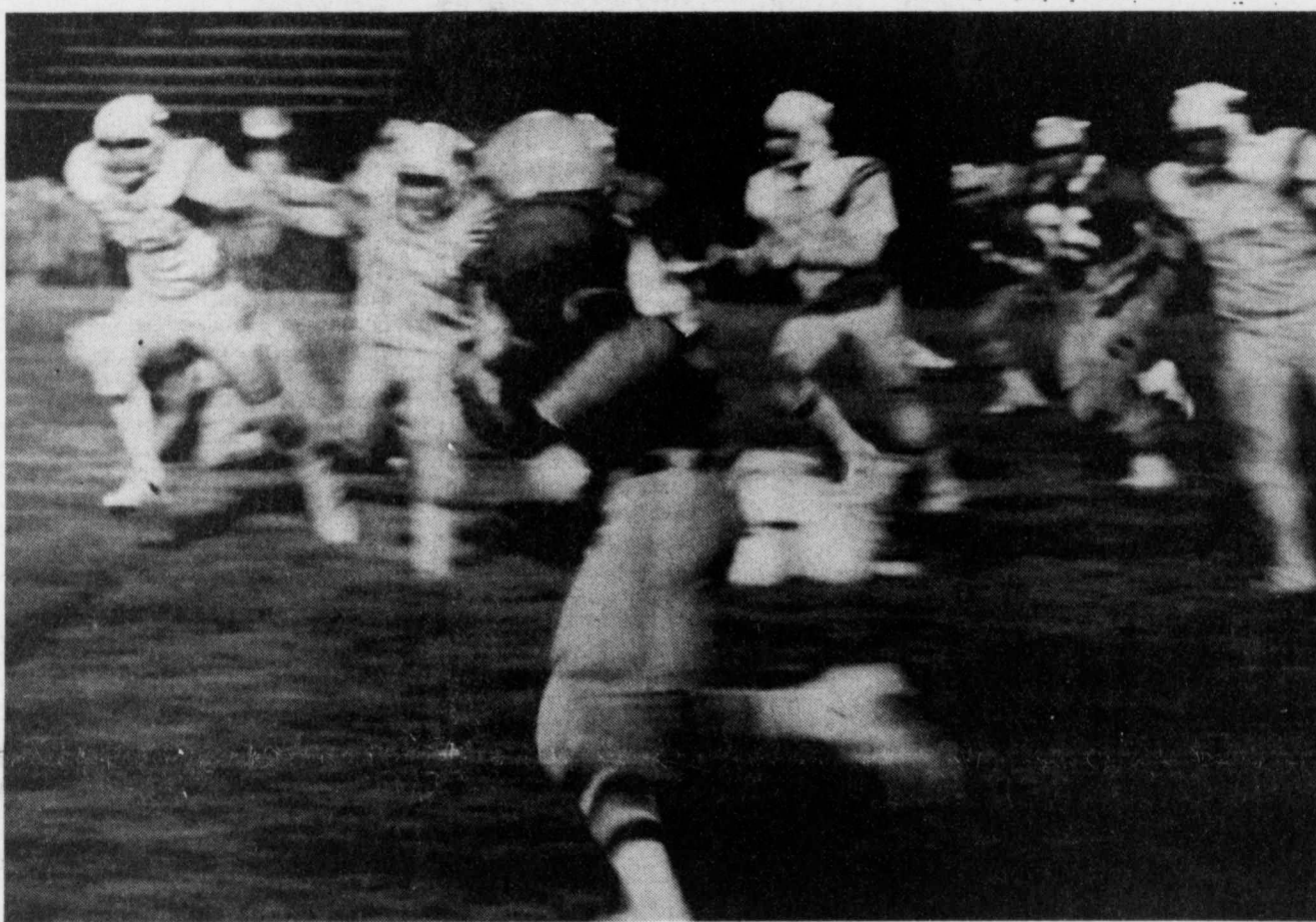

Grand Opening For Putt-A-Bout Course

Grand opening festivities for Bogata's newest recreational happening, the Putt-A-Bout Golf Course, on Highway 271 just north of the city limits, are scheduled to get underway about noon this Saturday.

Home-Heating Aid For Low-Income

Low-income Texans faced with home energy cutoff for heating or cooling may qualify for payments from \$3-million in federal funds set aside for energy crisis intervention (ECI), according to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

The money, made available to Texas counties, will be distributed to energy suppliers on behalf of eligible households.

One payment is allowed each household between Oct. 1 and March 31. Another payment is allowed between April 1 and Sept. 30. A maximum of \$90 per period can be paid if the household applies and is found eligible.

Officials at DHR explained that once the fund is exhausted, no further payments can be made.

The department has negotiated contracts with local agencies to handle

outreach, applications, eligibility determination, and payments to energy suppliers

Qualification for ECI payments is limited to households with a total gross monthly income of less than \$305.50 for a one-person household; \$499.50 for a two-person household; \$684.50 for three; \$845.50 for four; \$998.50 for five; and \$1,166.50 for six.

At least one person in the household must be a U.S. citizen or a legally admitted alien. If a household's past due energy bill exceeds \$90, and funds from other sources are not available, the household might not qualify for ECI help.

Vaccine Clinic Oct. 7th

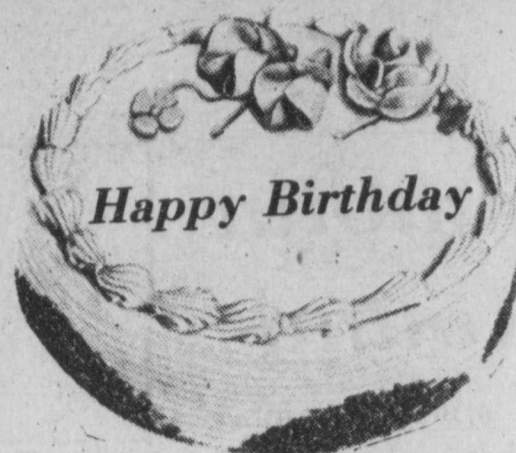
The October immunization clinic for all area children needing immunizations will be held Oct. 7 in the Bogata City Hall, from 2-4 p.m.

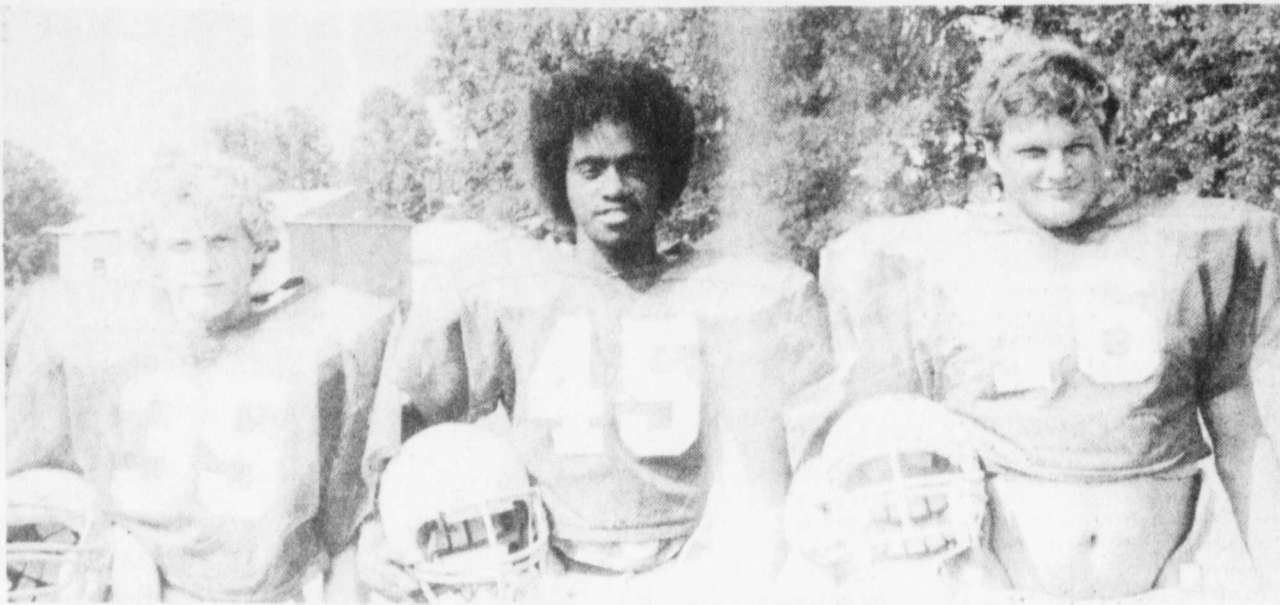

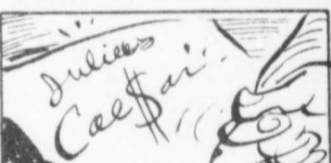

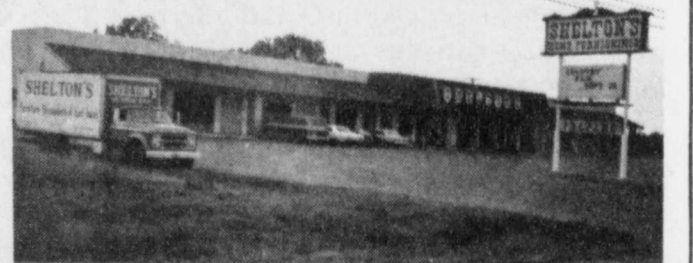

Career Tips

Now that all of us are starting to settle into our routines for this academic year, it's time to take a look at a wide variety of different matters related to careers. First, I want to give some advice to high school students--don't let up on your studies.

Fairly often, many students (particularly high school seniors) tend to ease up with their studies as they get closer to graduation because some high schools allow these young people to skip some parts of the school day if they have completed the minimum requirements for graduation.

If this time off is used to get other educational-vocational experiences, the student stands to gain greatly. However, often this time is used to watch television, to hang out with friends and to do nothing. When this happens, everyone loses.

This extra time could and should be used in many worthwhile ways. If possible, students should take college-level courses under a concurrent enrollment plan. Most of these courses will be freshman-level courses which will go on the students' transcripts once they have actually enrolled in college. By doing this, the students will be able to go ahead with more difficult courses after they graduate from high school.

This extra time also could be used in high school by taking additional courses which might not be required for graduation. For example, I think that all high school students should complete four years of English--with the emphasis being on grammar and composition. I believe this primarily because the ability to write correctly is essential to success in college as well as in most careers.

For November Election...

Voter Registration Deadline Is Monday

Eligible voters who have not registered to vote must do so by Monday if they wish to cast their ballot in the Nov 2 general election.

Registration is required of all citizens who are otherwise eligible to vote, but who may have changed their address since they last voted.

In addition, youths who have turned 18 or will be 18 on or before Nov. 2 are eligible to register as voters. State officials estimate some 188,000 high school seniors should be eligible to join the Texas voter power this fall.

Registration can be made at the voter registrar's desk in the county tax assessor-collector's office in each Texas county.

Along with numerous local county and precinct offices, Texas voters this fall will vote for U.S. Senator, U.S. Congressman, state representative, state senator, governor, attorney general and nearly every statewide office. In addition, there will be six proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution on the Nov. 2 ballot.

"It is important that all eligible Texans register to vote then to exercise that privilege on Nov. 2," says Joe Rothe, with the county of-

ficials program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Rothe points out that only 24 percent of those eligible voted in the May 1 Texas primaries, the lowest voter turnout in 30 years for a gubernatorial primary election.

"Everyone eligible to vote but unable to do so on Nov. 2 should apply at the county voter registrar's office to vote absentee," says Rothe. Oct. 29 is the deadline for voting absentee in person while absentee ballots will be accepted in the mail as late as 7 p.m. Nov. 2.

Any of the following conditions can qualify an individual to vote absentee:

1. Absence from the county of residence on election day.
2. Age 65 or older on election day.
3. Inability to appear at the authorized polling place on election day due to sickness, physical disability or religious belief.
4. Service as an election clerk or a poll watcher in an election precinct other than the precinct of residence.
5. Under certain circumstances, voters confined to jail may be eligible to vote absentee.





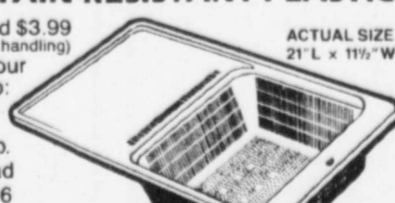

were not denied. A pair of Glenn passes helped the Cats to a first down on Rebel 6. The next play got inside the 5, but then Big Sandy was penalized back to the 18. From there, 170-pound Sheyne Burgin took the handoff, powered his way through the left side of the Rebel line and smashed away from at least six would-be tacklers to go into TD land just as the first quarter ran out of playing time. Hitt tacked on the extra and it was 7-0 starting the second period.

The Rebels started from their 19 after the ensuing kickoff and moved out to the 36 in four plays. Then came Disaster No. 1. Quarterback Kelley Jeffery completed his second pass in as many attempts, this one a six-yarder to Bradley Moore at the 42. That, however, was to be the last completed Rebel pass of the night, and it turned into trouble. As Moore caught the ball, he was slammed into by a couple of hard tacklers, fumbled the ball and it was grabbed in mid-air by Big Sandy's John Strickland who ran it to the Rebel 45.

With Burgin getting some good gainers, the Cats swept to a first down on the Rebel 24 in five plays. On the next play, Burgin made it on to the 16, but fumbled and Rivercrest's Stanley Jessee grabbed the handle.

Sticking to the ground, the Rebels got their first good drive going after the fumble recovery. With Randy Galloway, John Hines, Jeffery and Greg Russell each having some good gainers, the Rebs marched out to the 41. A penalty moved the ball back to the 31, from there Jeffery went to the air and his pass was promptly picked off by Long at midfield and legged back to the Rebel 34.

After Burgin led a ground gaining surge to get Big Sandy a first down on the Rebel 9, Glenn tried his hand at the air route and Moore pulled off an interception in the endzone with 33 seconds left in the half.

Sunday Is Start Of 4-H Week

Encouraging 4-H members to become responsible, productive citizens is the purpose of "Pathways to the Future," the theme of National 4-H Week, Oct. 3-9.

"During National 4-H Week, nearly 5-million 4-H Members across the nation will rededicate their heads to clearer thinking, their hearts to greater loyalty, their hands to greater service and their health to better living," says Dr. John Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Members of America's largest out-of-state youth educational organization and 568,000 volunteer leaders will celebrate with activities aimed at promoting individual growth and accomplishment, creativity, social responsibility and family involvement, Pelham says.

These boast about 140,000 members and has a support force of some 19,000 junior, teen and adult volunteer leaders.

Reviewing 4-H projects in Texas, Pelham points out that the top five projects the past year were food-nutrition, electric, safety, clothing and horse.

"In the past five years the top 10 projects have been about the same, though they frequently change positions," says the 4-H leader.

"4-H members learn far more than specific skills with projects such as food-nutrition, animal science, forestry or gardening," Pelham says. "They also learn to keep accurate records, make oral presentations and develop life-long management, consumer and communications skills."

Young people from 9 to 19 may participate in 4-H through organized clubs, special interest groups, nutrition education programs, television series, short-term activities and camping, he adds.
