



kept the Rebel scoring gun silent and helped Big Sandy make off with a 13-0 jump in the district opener for both teams.

Now, the Rebels face the task of finding the ladder that leads out of the basement if they are to grab at least a share of a fifth straight district title.

It may be difficult to lay full claim to the title since Big Sandy will have to stumble twice along the way while the Rebs get perfect and stay that way. But then, this is the year that the bridesmaid also gets into the state playoffs. Besides, with six games to go, a lot of things can happen.

The first, and now a must, op-portunity to start the upward climb comes this Friday when the Redwater Dragons come into Rebel Stadium for the annual Rivercrest homecoming game.

Kickoff time becomes 7:30 for the balance of the season.

The Dragons, 1-3 for the total season, lost their district debut last week, to previously winless New Diana, 28-6, have the worst defensive record among 17-AA teams--allowing an average of 26.5 points per game. The Rebels, however, have not been too prolific in scoring. They are next to last in that feat among district teams, averaging only 11 points per game, compared to 13.5 for the Dragons.

Although down by 7-0, the Rebels were very much in the game against Big Sandy until they were completely deserted by Lady Luck in the final five minutes. The first Rivercrest opportunity came on the kickoff. The Rebs kicked off to Big Sandy, with the ball touching down about the 28 and started flopping end over end toward the Wildcat goal. As Big Sandy players stood aside to watch the bounding ball, Jim Earley dove through to cover the pighide at the Wildcat 23. The Rebels made to the 16 in two plays, then lost back to the 21 and surrendered the ball on a fourth down pass that gained only back to the 17. Big Sandy quickly served notice that it was through standing around. On the second play, quarterback Dennis Glenn pitched a long aerial to the speedster Fred Long for a startling 67-yard gainer to the Rebel 13. the Cats edged to the 12 on the next play but after two pass plays, the Wildcats were back on the 13. Stephen Hitt's 26-yard field goal try was a dud. Rivercrest, taking over on its 20, was unable to get a first down and got off a punt, the only one in the entire game, that set Big Sandy in business at its 42 and this time the Wildcats

DEMONS TO DRAGONS When the Redwater Dragons take the field at Rebel Stadium to do battle with the Rivercrest team Friday night, the man walking their sidelines as head coach has a background record as one of the most outstanding coaches in Texas high school football.

Although the Dragons haven't enjoyed too much gridiron success over the years, the same cannot be said for their coach of the past 2-3 seasons, Bill Spann.

Spann's years of wide acclaim and honors in the coaching profession started in 1962 and continued for a decade and more as he head coached the Dumas Demons of the then Panhandle district of 1-AAA.

Spann was an assistant Dumas coach in 1961 when the Demons won a district title for the first time in 30 years and parlayed that into the '61 state Triple-A championships. Burl Barlett, head coach for the '61 Ding Dong Daddies from Dumas, resigned after winning the state title and Spann moved into the top chair.

The Spann-coached Demons not only repeated as state champs in 1962, but they went on to win district every year through 1971, a string of 10 straight, and for seven straight years during that streak the Demons never lost a district game. Several times they were ranked No. 1 in the state.

Somewhere around the mid-70's after winning one more district title, Spann left Dumas.

If you ever go through Dumas on a trip to Colorado or other points and want to talk high school football, just stop at any place in town and mention the name of Bill Spann.

Home-Heating Aid For Low-Income

Low-income Texans faced outreach, with home energy cutoff for heating or cooling may qualify for payments from \$3-million in federal funds set aside for energy crisis intervention (ECI), ac-cording to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

The money, made available to Texas counties, will be distributed to energy suppliers on behalf of eligible households.

One payment is allowed each household between Oct. 1 and March 31. Another payment is allowed between April 1 and Sept. 30. A maximum of \$90 per period can be paid if the household applies and is found eligible. Officials at DHR explained that once the fund is

exhausted, no further payments can be made. The department has

Eligible voters who have not registered to vote must do so by Monday it they wish to cast their ballot in the Nov 2 general election. Registration is required of all citizens who are otherwise eligible to vote, but who may have changed their address since they last voted.

In addition, youths who have turned 18 or will be 18 on or before Nov. 2 are eligible to register as voters. State officials estimate some 188,000 high school seniors should be eligible to join the Texas voter power this fall.

Registration can be made at the voter registrar's desk in the county tax assessor-collector's office in each Texas county.
