



## News Set To Begin 73rd Year

The Bogata News, which was established in October, 1910, concludes its 72nd year of publication with this edition. That really is not a correct statement, but it has been that long since the newspaper was first established by the late R.L. Stanley.

There were several intervals when Bogata was without a newspaper, but The News has had continuous publication for about 50 years.

For some of the early history about the newspaper, here is what The News had to say in its Oct. 17, 1952 edition when the newspaper, then owned by the late Sam Holloway, noted completion of its 42nd year:

"For a number of years, the Bogata News was printed a page at a time on a job press. It was necessary to fold and re-fold the four-page sheet of newsprint and run it thru the press four times.

"The type was set by hand and it was quite a laborious job to get out the paper, according to W.R. Baxter of Jolntown, who worked as a printer for Publisher Stanley, even though only a few hundred copies were printed each week.

"Baxter, who is 70 years old, still does a little printing, and has operated a job shop in Jolntown since 1930. From him, we learn something of the early history of The Bogata News and a neighboring newspaper called the Rosalie Courier, Published By W.A. Crooks.

"Bud Baxter had first learned the printing trade in the office of the Deport Chronicle, beginning in 1905. Later he worked for Crooks at Rosalie. Following Crooks' death, Dr. W.L. Gibson of Rosalie bought the Rosalie Courier and Bud operated it for a while.

"Bud was born near Bogata, Sept. 15, 1882. He began his newspaper work by acting as a reporter for the Rosalie Courier by supplying the news from the Glendale community, where his parents lived. This was before Bogata had a newspaper.

"After establishing The Bogata News in October, 1910, Stanley operated it for about a year. It proved to be an unprofitable venture and he sold it to Brice Collins, who had formerly published a newspaper at Petty in Lamar County.

"Collins was an able writer, but he could not sell enough advertising to make the paper pay. In July, 1912, he advertised it for sale in The Dallas News. Sam Holloway, who had a job at that time in the editorial department of The Dallas News, answered the ad.

"Holloway had been bitten by the country newspaper bug and he wanted a weekly of his own, where, he thought, he could get off to go fishing or hunting when he pleased. How wrong he was!

"Failure of two good newspapermen to make the Bogata News pay its way caused Holloway to decide against the purchase. But, he liked the looks of the country for farming and for game and fish, and bought the Deport Times on Sept. 1, 1912.

"Collins sold The Bogata News to J.P. Nance, who ran it a while and sold it to H.M. Houser who operated it nearly a year, became disgusted with the lack of patronage, suspended the paper and moved the plant to Dawson County.

"Then came a man by the name of Bush, according to Baxter, who had

# Titus Oil, Gas Adds \$73-Million

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Titus County wells in 1981 enriched the county's economy and accounted for \$73.6-million of the \$44-billion value placed on Texas petroleum production last year.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas Dallas-based Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association said the county ranked 125th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of value of its marketed petroleum production. This production includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 2.1-million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$73,581,138 and 19.7 million cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$35,220. Owners of royalty in the county received \$9.2 million as their share of the output, the Association noted.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county supported state government through production tax

payments estimated at \$3.4 million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$2,642, while natural gas levies totalled \$3,387,374. Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 601 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$13.1-million in 1981.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county oil and gas operators spent a reported \$8.7 million in the drilling of 27 wells, including one wildcat, or exploratory, well. This effort resulted in the completion of 25 oil wells, although some \$1.1-million lost in the drilling of two dry holes. As of April 1, 1982, there were 536 producing oil wells in the county.

## Life Insurance Not Mandatory

# Insurance Sales Pitch Draws State Probe

Investigators from the State Board of Insurance are in the Bogata area this week, investigating possibility that a Sulphur Springs insurance salesman may have given false statements in his effort to sell life insurance to senior citizens who have Medicare coverage.

At least two women in the Bogata area say they were told by the same insurance agent that mandatory life

insurance would be required of all persons with Medicare, effective Jan. 1.

The salesman promoted his company, the women told The Bogata News, by claiming he could offer a life insurance policy at a rate much lower than what will be required of a state-issued mandatory policy.

One of the women said she paid the agent a one-year premium of \$249.36

for a \$2,000 life insurance policy. The other said she paid \$169 for a six months premium for her \$2,000 policy. The woman who paid for the full year says she has since stopped payment on her check, while the other says she made her payment in September and thought the check had cleared her bank by now.

## Bogata Told To Get Dump Site Covered

The Environmental Protection Agency wants Bogata to get its antique dumpgrounds covered over and as soon as possible.

That was the point, expressed clearly by an EPA official as he spoke to the Bogata city council in a special session Tuesday night.

The six-acre dump site, filled with an accumulation of disposed items and materials over nearly a half-century, includes three large dump areas that the EPA wants covered, quick like.

The EPA official, from Tyler, however indicated his agency will be willing to wait through the winter months if the city can obtain an agreement with the National Guard that it will use its equipment to assist the city in covering the dump, by early next Spring.

If an agreement with the Guard cannot be obtained, the city will have to come up with the full amount of needed funds and equipment to do the job itself.

Mayor John W. Hood says the Guard frequently does this type of cooperative work with cities, with the city providing the fuel and some other expenses, but is unable to do the work in the winter months.

and possibly retain their district title is simple to say: Just keep on winning!

If, and that's always a might big word, the Rebs win their final three games they definitely will pick-up playing rights to compete in the bi-district round...and there's still a longshot they could grab a hunk of the district jewels for the fifth straight year.

However, and that's always the stumbling block word, saying it may be a lot easier then getting it accomplished as the Rebs will have to hit the trail for those final three games and the first stop is this Friday at always mean and tough New Diana.

New Diana has extra reason to be laying ambush plans for the Rebels. The Eagles, one of the two surprise teams in the district this year, shocked title-thinking Big Sandy into a 14-14 tie last week and that places the Eagles alongside Big Sandy in the top spot, each with a 3-0-1 record, compared to the Rebels' 3-1 chart.

Big Sandy won the statistical edge in the game, which will give the Wildcats the title in event they and New Diana finish the season in a first place tie.

However, and there's that word again, Rivercrest can take over second place and bounce New Diana down to third if they can gun down the Eagles tomorrow night. At the same time, the other surprise team in the loop, James Bowie—which has the best overall record at 5-1-1 and is 2-1-1 in league play, is at Big Sandy. Bowie is the last obstacle of any worthy caliber between Big Sandy and the title.

But the Rebels will have to do it themselves if they are to pick-up at least the runner-up ticket into the playoffs and they have to win at New Diana tomorrow night. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m., and a bunch of Rebel fans are needed to be on the scene.

"The Eagles will be higher than a kite," says Rivercrest coach Milford Groves, referring to New Diana's tie with Big Sandy.

Groves says the Eagles are a vastly improved team from the one that started the season by losing all three pre-district games.

"It will be a tough game for us, especially playing on their field," the head Reb adds.

For the record, the last time Rivercrest went to New Diana, in 1980, the Eagles not only defeated the Rebels, 28-14, but used that victory as the key to represent the district in the playoffs. Last year, at the Jolntown ballyard, the Rebels won, 12-7.

Rivercrest came through last week's nerve-tangling 18-14 survival over Ore City in fairly good physical shape. Tackle-linebacker Charles Lewis came up with a shoulder injury but is expected to be in go-condition for the Eagles. Halfback-cornerback John Hines was also injured against Ore City but was back in action at the early week workouts.

The cliffhanger with Ore City was not for the weak-hearted and was in questionable status until the final 38 ticks on the clock when Bradley Moore pulled off a pass interception to stop Ore City's last-ditch "Hail Mary" effort.

The game actually started like a blow-out for Rivercrest as the Rebs erupted for two touchdowns to a 12-0 lead in less than three minutes after the kickoff.

The first score came quick. Randy Galloway, who was to gain 165 rushing yards from scrimmage, zoomed the kickoff back 48 yards, then on the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Moore fired a 44-yard TD bomb to Richard Winkler.

The attempted run for two extra points failed, but the Rebs were back for six in quick fashion. After forcing Ore City to punt when three plays failed to produce gains for the visitors, Moore legged the punt back to the Ore City 26.

Rivercrest lost a couple of yards, so on 2nd and 12, the ball went to Larry Davis who skirted his right end and didn't stop until he streaked into the endzone. Again the extra point try fizzled but it was 12-0 after only three scrimmage plays for Rivercrest.

Ore City, powered by the pitching arm of Mark Moble, came right back to tie the game in the first period. A pair of aerial bombs from Moble to Terry Jimmerson did the damage, one for 35 yards and the other for 19. Both Ore City extra point tries failed and it was 12-12 at the first half.

Rivercrest scored the clincher in the second period when the Rebels marched 80 yards. Galloway and Moore were the big yardage gainers in the drive and Galloway got the score when he crashed over from 3 yards. The extra point kick was no good, but Rivercrest had an 18-12 edge at intermission.

The second half was both offensively and defensively high-keyed for both teams. Galloway had an apparent TD in the third period but it was erased by a costly holding penalty. After that, the Rebs had to use all their defensive skills to keep

## \$23,035 Contract Let For Walkways' Cover

A Clarksville firm, J-D Steel Buildings, has been awarded a \$23,035 contract for the construction of covered walkways on the Bogata school campus.

Selection of J-D Steel from a group of six bids was made at the October meeting of the Talco-Bogata school board, that began with a tour of the Bogata campus and concluded with the business portion at Rivercrest.

In addition to providing cover for the Bogata walkways, the Clarksville firm was awarded a contract in the amount of \$3,360 for the construction of a canopy at Rivercrest, connecting to the vocational building.

As a follow-up to the school board's visit to the Bogata campus, the trustees have agreed to plan for an inspection of the Talco school

facilities prior to the board's next regular meeting on Nov. 9.

In other activities at the October session, approval was given to a new procedure for accounting for the various student activity funds on the three campuses. Community Education Co-ordinator Kay Kennedy gave a report on community education activities of the previous year and of those planned for the present school year.

"In the meantime, Nance acquired a second-hand newspaper plant and a motion picture machine. He reasoned that both of them would make him a living at Bogata, and moved back here, revived The Bogata News and opened a picture show. He had been away two years.

"Nance did fairly well with both the newspaper and the show." after a sojourn of a year, he sold The News to Martha Tanner, a little red-headed newspaper girl from Oklahoma, who later married Charlie Allen, and they operated it for several years.

"Charlie was a good merchandiser, but he didn't like the newspaper business, so they sold to H.L. Kimsey, who published The News for two years and in August, 1937, sold it to Sam Holloway, who still owned The Deport Times and the year before had started The Talco Times.

"While under the ownership of the Allens, fire destroyed the plant which was then housed the Masonic building on North Main, but it was replaced by

another a short time later. The greatest loss was the back files of the paper.

"During World War II, not too much merchandise was available for merchants and they did little or no advertising. The News went in the hole several dollars week after week for two years, but we kept the paper going. On its subscription list were the names of over 200 men in our Armed Service from the Bogata area. We were determined they should have the news from home, cost what it might.

"We also published each week a feature, 'News of Men In Our Armed Service,' from which they derived some pleasure.

"When conditions returned to normal after the war The News was \$1,600 in debt, but we considered the money well spent.

"Again we thank those who have favored us with advertising, subscriptions and commercial printing, and expect to continue to give Bogata just as good local newspaper as advertising patronage will permit.

"For every column inch of advertising it can sell it can afford to print a column inch of local news. Any town can make its newspaper what ever it wants it to be."

would become mandatory on Jan. 1, "or any other date" is completely false, says Bill Gibson, manager of the investigations division of the State Board of Insurance in Austin.

The agent, who called on the two Bogata women and accepted payment, said their policy would not be mailed to them but that he would deliver it, according to one of the women. She has yet to receive her policy, although it is not overly past due at this time.

Gibson said field investigator Bill Hamby will arrive in the area either Tuesday afternoon or sometime Wednesday and would interview the two women, along with anyone else who may believe they were given misrepresentation by the agent.

Gibson, a native of Lamar County, says the agent named by the two women represents a small Texas-based insurance company that specializes in supplemental insurance to Medicare. He says his office has received no serious complaints in the past against the company and that no previous misconduct charges had been lodged against the agent. The agent does have a state license, he added.

"This could be a case where the agent got a little anxious to make a sale, or it could be a misunderstanding in what he may have said. In either case, our field investigator will make a thorough investigation and report back to us," Gibson says.

"We do want to make it clear to everyone that life insurance for anyone is not compulsory," added Gibson.

He also pointed out that his office wanted to hear from anyone having a problem with their insurance, or who may believe an insurance salesman may make a misrepresentation.

"All anyone has to do is to send the State Board of Insurance in Austin their policy number, the name of the company and tell us what the problem is. We will take it from there and make an investigation," Gibson says.

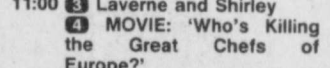

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### Career Potpourri

About one year from now, many of you who are high school seniors will be going to college and preparing for your various careers.

That time may seem to be a long way off, but the next nine months will pass quickly. Therefore, you must take care of many matters before you graduate from high school:

- First, don't let your grades slip. These grades will go on your transcript just as all of the others did. Keep them up.
- Second, take as many solid courses as you can in high school. You will need these when you start your college work.
- Third, make arrangements to take either the ACT or the SAT as soon as possible this year. Most colleges require that you have at least one of these. (I suggest that you take both of them.)
- Fourth, check on the possibility of completing some college courses by examination (CLEP, etc.) so that you can skip these courses whenever you actually enroll.
- Fifth, start early to complete the necessary paperwork for admission to college or vocational school. This takes time and effort to complete. (You will feel rushed enough without having to do a lot of last-minute running around.)

This also applies to applications for financial assistance.

- Sixth, plan now to visit your prospective school early this year in order to firm up your plans and to meet with those who can answer any questions you might have.
- Seventh, prepare for yourself a list of dates when certain actions on your part must be completed and strive to be ahead of those deadlines.

Next week, I'll repeat some testing information you will need to know.

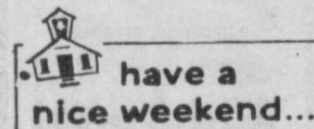

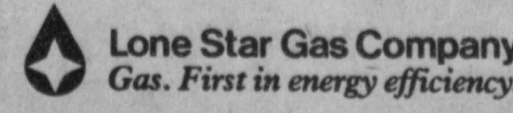

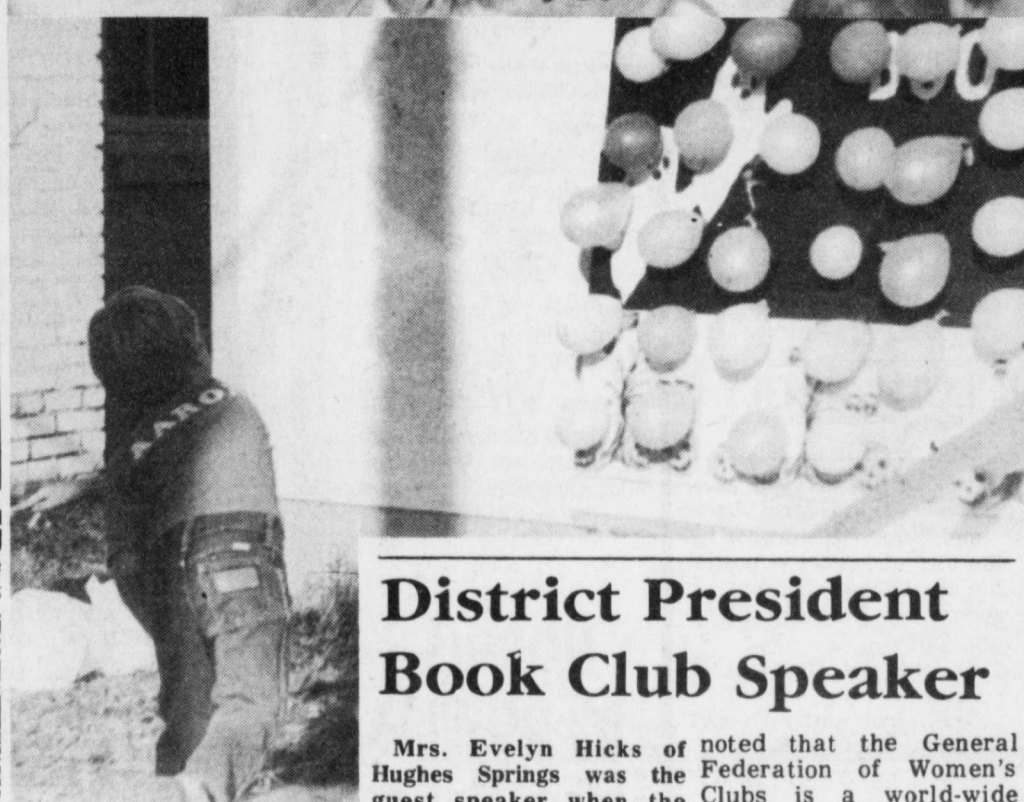

Program chairman, Mrs. Thomas Ridge, read the quotation "If you are patient in one moment of anger, you will escape a hundred days of sorrow."

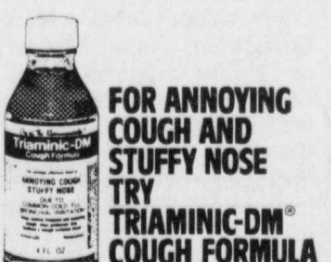
