Como-Pickton Never In Picture

Rivercrest Takes Out C-P Eagles 46-6

The Rivercrest senior football players ended their high school careers on a high note Friday night, defeating the hapless Como-Pickton Eagles 46-6. In spite of the lopsided score, it was a hard hitting ballgame, with the Rebels often struggling to control Como-Pickton's two large running backs.

It was also a game plagued with penalties, as the Rebels were sentenced to 115 giant steps backward. Fortunately, the 350 yards rushing made up the difference, both in the statistics and on the scoreboard.

The Rebels lost the toss, and watched while two 15 yard penalties in consecutive series gave the Eagles two first downs and good field position on the Rebel 33 yard line. With fourth down and one yard to go, the Rebel defense caught the Eagle ball carrier six yards behind the line of scrimmage and took over on downs.

Seven plays later the Rebels were in the Eagle end zone on a drive highlighted by a 40 yard run by Richard Mayes and a 13 yard effort by Randy Galloway. Mayes ran around the right side for the six points, but the pass from Bradley Moore to Richard Winkler for two points after was incomplete. The Eagles earned their next first down on the ground, but fumbled in the next series, with Jeffery Bivins falling on the football. Galloway scampered 21 yards to the Como-Pickton 13 yard line, then Mayes cut through the center for the touchdown. A fumbled snap thwarted the attempt for ex-

tra points. The second quarter was marked by the first punt of the game, when the Eagles quarterback managed an eight yard effort, and the Rebels took over on the Como-Pickton 41 yard line. Galloway picked his way through the center of the Eagle line and raced 39 yards for the third Rebel score, then tacked on the two points after.

The Eagles earned three first downs in the second quarter, the first real ground the Rebels gave up. Joel Mangrum and Harold Holt were credited with saving tackles in the series, as were Lonny Sheffield and Larry Davis. It was Billy Mayes, however, who came up with the football when the Eagles fumbled, and Rivercrest took over on their own 47 yard line.

Moore kept the football for a 16 yard gain around the right end, then Mayes and Moore worked the ball to the Eagle 15 yard line. Galloway followed the blocking right side in for the score, giving Rivercrest a 26-0 halftime lead.

Exceptional broken field running marked by the intense effort of Mayes began the series immediately following the half, then the Eagles recovered a Rivercrest fumble on the Eagle 27 yard line, and suddenly Como-Pickton had their best field position of the ball game. James Noey stopped the run three times, aided by other Rebel tacklers, forcing a punt by the Eagles. The ball rolled to the Rebel 19 yard line.

With starting quarterback Moore injured, Kelly Jeffery

took over and the Rebels continued to move the football, with Mayes breaking loose for 33 yards on one run and 28 yards on the next for a touchdown. John Hines fell across the goal line for the extra points.

An attempted onside kick was recovered by the Rebels on the Como-Pickton 23. Hines made the first down at the goal line to the four yard line. Larry Davis went through the center of the line for the touchdown with 49 seconds left in the third quarter. An attempted extra point kick was not good.

The Eagle running back who took the Rebel kickoff following the score was met with a shattering tackle by Wade Walker, but managed to hold on to the football. Penalties for roughing the passer and a late hit helped the Eagles to their single touchdown in the fourth quarter, against the Rebel second and third squads.

Another attempted onside kick by the Eagles was recovered by Rivercrest, but the Rebels were unable to move the football beyond the Eagle 34 yard line for the remainder of the game.

Other defensive players credited with outstanding work were Steve Stephenson and Stanley Jesse.

"We wanted to end the season with pride," head coach Milford Groves said Tuesday morning, "and I think we did that. Como-Pickton has some big boys, but they let their small enrollment give them an excuse for losing. We say attitude is 90% of winning."

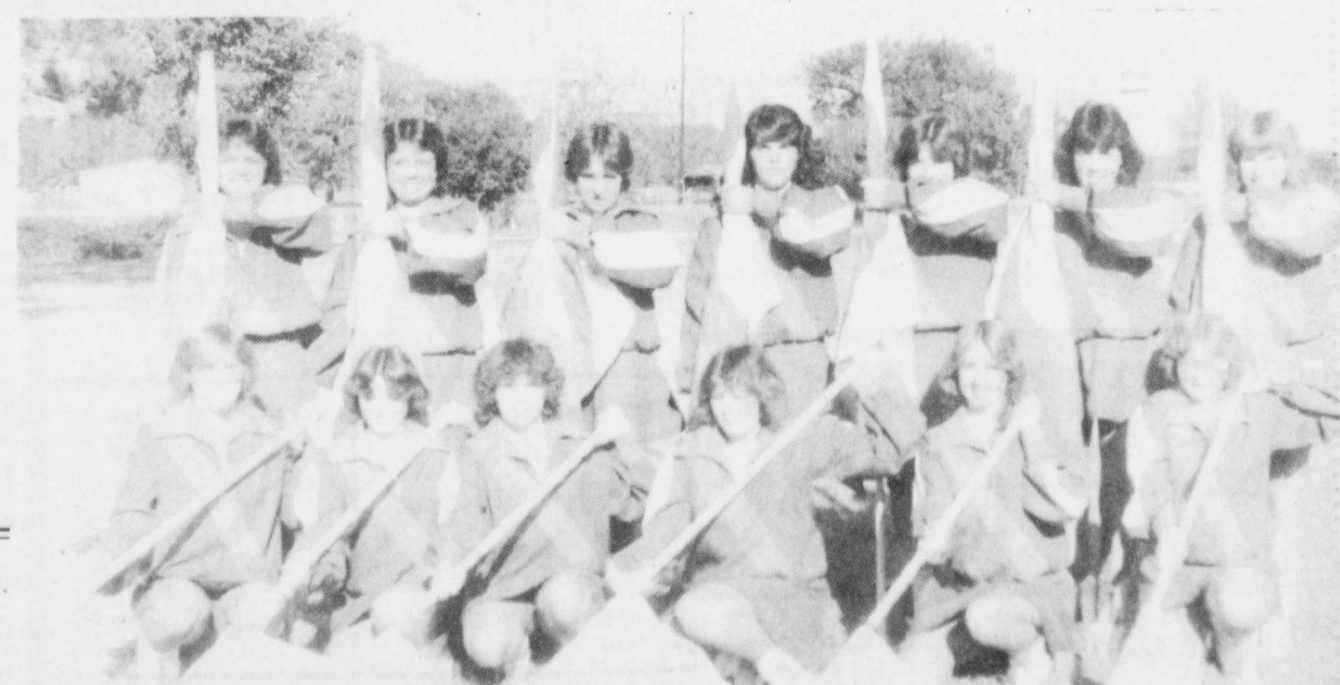

East Texas Eating

Ah, the sweet potatoes have cured enough to bake.

As with most seasonal vegetables, I think the first big mellow sweet potato should be eaten with a certain amount of ceremony. I favor choosing one large, perfect sweet potato per person, baking them until the skins crackle and the golden-orange interiors are soft when gently squeezed. The distinctive aroma is



bound to whet the appetites of family members as it summons them to the table. I really feel that a generous pat of real butter and a sprinkling of salt and freshly ground black pepper are all that those first, perfect sweet potatoes need to make a complete meal. However, if your family is bound to ask "Is this all?" then choose medium size sweet potatoes and small braised pork chops and crisp rings of new fall apples.

Then, next Sunday, top off dinner with an old-fashioned Sweet Potato Custard pie. Here is a recipe of the late Mrs. J.E. VanDyke (1850-1944) that is included in the "Baker's Dozen Early Red River County Recipes" put together by the Red River County Historical Society. If you prefer a less sweet meringue, reduce the sugar in the meringue to one-half cup.

SWEET POTATO CUSTARD

Pint mashed sweet potatoes, half-pint sweet milk, cup butter, cup sugar, yolks of four eggs, 1/4 tsp. of nutmeg, half teaspoon vanilla. Pour into pan lined with crust; bake. Beat whites of eggs well, one cup sugar, spread over top and brown.

There would be plenty of good barbecue cooked by Jim Breedlove, who cooked it over an open hickory fire. He made some of the hottest barbecue sauce ever concocted but it was sure good.

Jim would dig a pit about six feet long and three feet wide and he had iron bars he kept to do his barbecuing on. Jim's barbecue was some of the most famous around, and everyone liked him a lot. He had more friends than most folks, both black and white.

I don't think I mentioned it, but Jim was black, and one of the most respected men in this part of the country.

Anyway, now-a-days there isn't much fuss made over Veteran's day anymore, and I think it's a shame. The fireworks, parades, flag waving and get-togethers were something that said loud and clear "We're Americans", and that can be important.

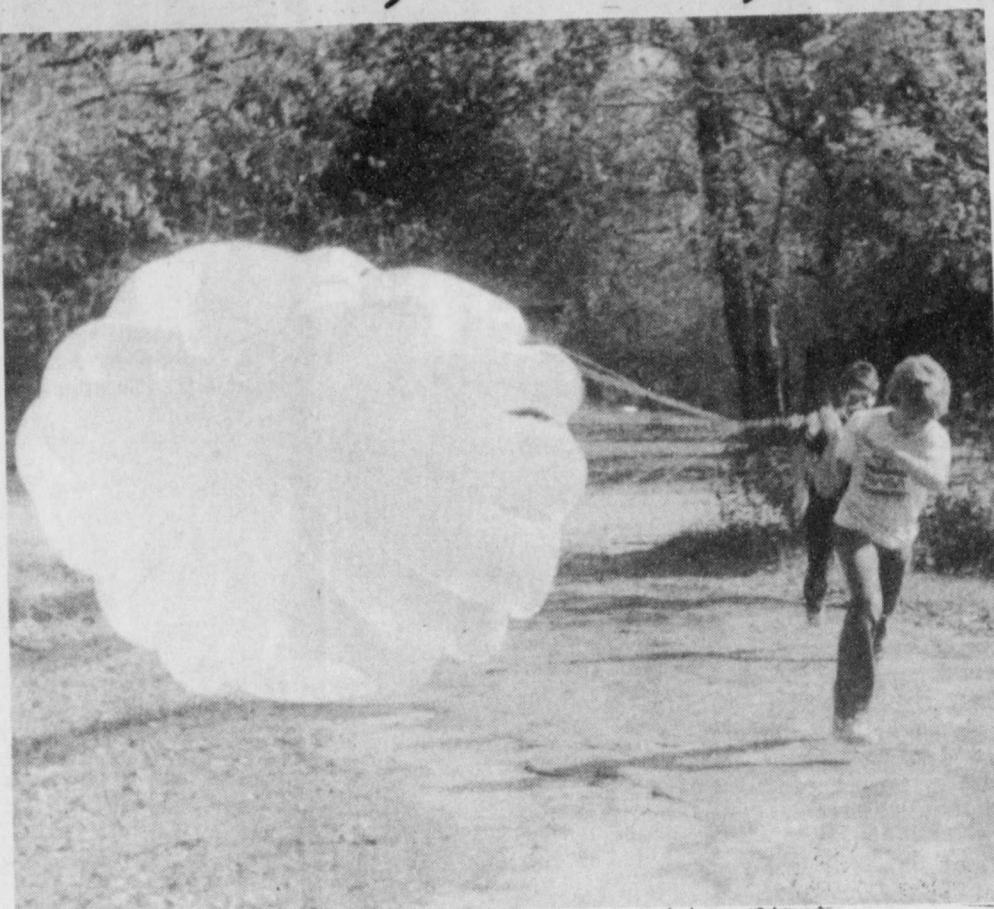

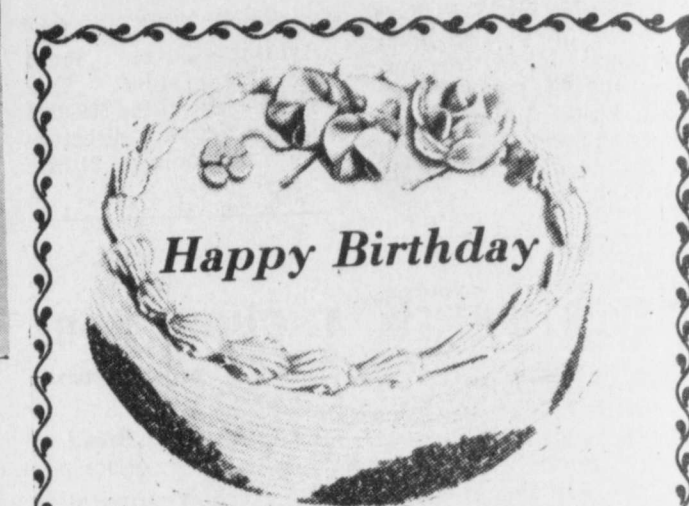
