T-B Board Hears Progress Reports

Prior to their meeting on November 9, the Talco and Bogata school board inspected the facilities of the Talco Elementary School. At the October meeting, the board inspected the Bogata School facilities and will look over the Rivercrest facilities in the future.

While there are still plans to improve and upgrade facilities on each campus, the board was favorably impressed with improvements that have been made in recent months and

with projects now under construction. In keeping with a commitment of the Board to try to keep facilities in good repair and to make improvements and renovations as needed, authority was given to a Longview firm, Scott Partnerships, to make a facilities study of each campus and the district to lend some guidance to the board for long-range planning.

Rivercrest principal, Tillman Hale; Bogata principal, Gerald Stegall;

and Talco principal, Robert Giddens; met with the Board to give preliminary teacher evaluation reports and progress reports related to programs and activities on each campus.

In other matters, a group of parents met with the Board to discuss the makeup of the junior high girls' basketball program on the Bogata Campus with the major concern being that there were no plans for a

"B" team thus reducing the number of girls who could participate in the basketball program and especially the 7th grade level.

Representative of the Talco PTO met with the Board to request that the district contribute one-half the cost of a new clock-scoreboard for the Talco Gym with the PTO contributing the other half. Board approval was given to the request.

In other Board action, two

Rivercrest students were suspended for the remainder of the semester for violation of the school policy on drugs. In final action, approval was given to the various

financial reports, the resignation of Tom Larue as a bus driver was accepted, and approval was given for advertising a surplus metal lathe for sale by bids.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, December 14, 1982 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Ambulance Must Have Support

The Red River Ambulance Service is a non-profit organization furnishing county wide ambulance service to the residents of Red River County, and has been in existence for almost three years. Red River County is composed of approximately 15,000 residents, covers 1,033 square miles and is located in the northeast portion of the state. To date, no monetary assistance has been received from outside or, Governmental sources. The only means of revenue has been from the sale of memberships to the residents of the County and from charges made for patients transported who are not members of the service.

The organization is managed and operations are directed by a board of Directors, composed of a group of civic minded individuals who are leaders in the various segments of the County and who serve without compensation. Red River County is one of the lowest income, per capita, areas in the state. There is a very large population of elderly residents and with the income from this County being low, the service is of the opinion that in raising the cost of membership to any great extent, it may be putting the cost of membership out of the reach of many people who are the prime potential users of the service.

The service serves three nursing homes and has one General Hospital in the County. The hospital is limited in some areas of service in that it does not furnish some medical services, for example, obstetric and orthopedic, so that cases of this sort and some others require transportation of a minimum of 64 miles round trip to other facilities.

The service has three ambulances. Two are manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and the other vehicle is used as a backup.

It is manned by volunteers when necessary. One of the ambulances is positioned in the southern portion of the County. From that area to the hospital it is a round trip of approximately 25 miles. Due to the large area the County covers, the miles per run are high.

One of the ambulances is approaching having 200,000 miles on it and needs to be replaced. The service also

has another vehicle that should be replaced. At a cost of \$40,000 each, the service would be able to purchase modular ambulances so that not only would the maintenance be lower as compared to the van type now used, but the replacement of the truck and chassis would be about a third of the cost of a totally new ambulance in the future.

The entire operating budget is \$125,000.00. The service is coming to the close of the third year and while it will be close to breaking even on operations, the budget does not provide the funds needed so badly to replace two vehicles. To raise membership fees sufficiently to cover the cost of replacing these ambulances, it is felt, would make the cost prohibitive for many of the residents.

The winners in last week's game, the final one in the contest, were: first place, Paul Lyles of Paris, who missed only one game, the Tennessee-Mississippi

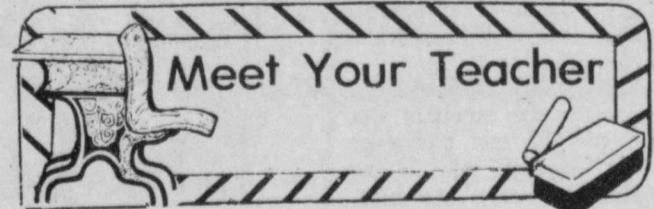
game. He had picked Pittsburg to win over Hooks 10-3.

Third place was claimed by Andrew N. Cox of Bogata, who missed five games and figured Pittsburg to win 17-10.

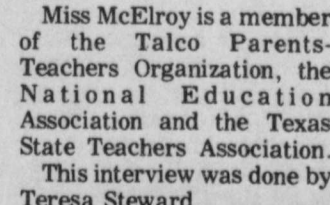

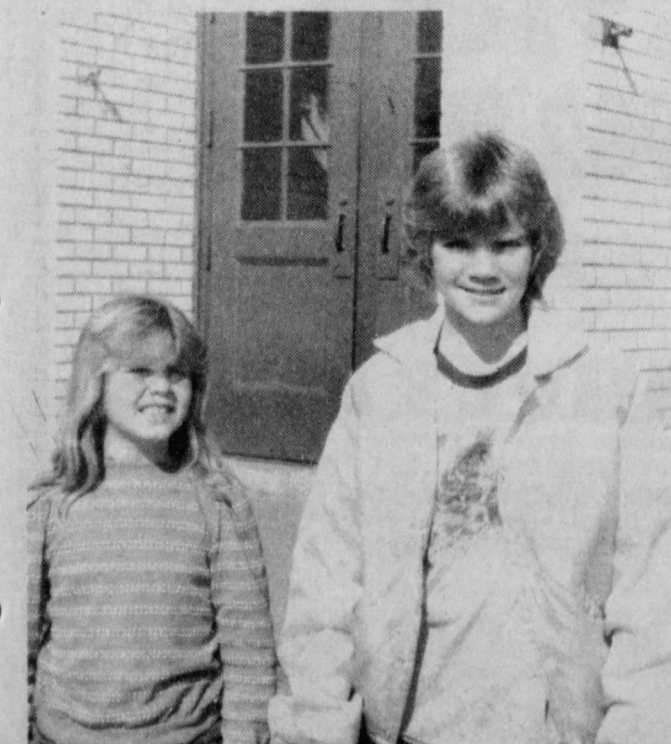

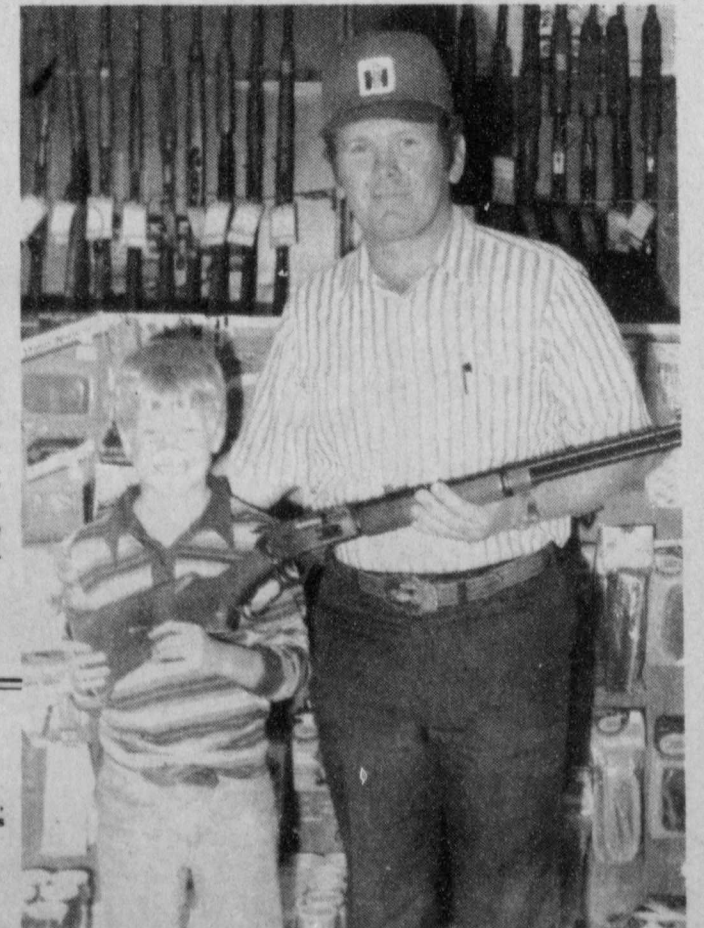

Talco-Bogata Expenditures Increase

Truth In Taxation laws can be more confusing than truthful as for instance the ad in this week's paper, as required by law, concerning a proposed increase in tax revenue. Total expenditures for the 1982-83 school budget are only 13 percent more than the 1981-82 school budget. The new tax rate that is being proposed is \$.54 as compared to a tax rate of \$1.00 for the previous year. However, new taxable values for the Talco-Bogata CISD as approved by the Red River County Appraisal District are \$201,381,000 as compared to \$81,488,000 for the previous year.

As to what effect this will have on an individual's taxes, reappraisals usually bring about a situation whereby some property owners pay more taxes, some pay about the same, and some pay less taxes.

The proposed increase in revenue, which is very misleading, is figured by a rather complicated formula that is required by law. To a large degree, the increase can be attributed to the big increase in taxable values over the previous year, granting of the various exemptions, such as the 40 percent homestead exemption which lowers the taxable values in the school district, and for the additional revenue needed to finance the new budget.

Regardless, meetings must be held to discuss and vote on the proposal. The first meeting to discuss the proposal will be held on Monday, November 29, 1982 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest. An effort will be made to get tax statements ready for mailing before the end of the year, but due to the various delays brought about by the late appraisal and the requirements imposed by law, it could be that tax statements may not be mailed until January, 1983.

Weekly Agriculture Update

By Herb Brevard
After buck fever gets to a low ebb or the limit of deer has been filled, producers should turn their attention to the financial situation of their operation, says Wayne Taylor, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The first chore is to put together expense and income statements. These will be necessary to determine the individual's tax status.

Depending upon the outcome of these statements, Taylor says that sales may need to be delayed until after December 31 or purchases may need to be made before the end of the year. Taylor recommends that each producer develop a cash flow statement and an operating budget for next year. If a loan is needed for expenses or to improve the cash flow situation, now is the time to begin arranging for the loan.

Most lenders will require a complete financial statement with the loan application. Lenders are interested in the producer's ability to repay the loan rather than so much emphasis on collateral which may decline in value. Accurate records are a must for today's agricultural producer, Taylor says. These records tell the producer the outcome of his past operations and can be used to plan and predict the success of future enterprises.

Agriculture Briefs

By Paul D. Payne
Acreage of a relatively new clover, Subterranean, has been planted in the county this fall. This has prompted a number of questions from farmers about which we will attempt to respond. Although Subterranean Clover is relatively new to this country, it was grown experimentally in Texas as early as 1921. It is so named because of its growth habit. The stems stay low to the ground and produce a dense carpet. This growth habit makes the clover unimpressive.

However, this is an important characteristic of sub clover. Since flowers are produced low and when pollinated turn downward to the soil surface, reseeding can occur under grazing. Sub clover has produced equal to and in some cases superior to other annual clovers such as Yuchi and Crimson. Mt. Barker has been the top forage producing sub clover. Its three year average at Overton on sandy soils has been 3595 pounds. Based on research conducted up to now, Yuchi arrowleaf clover is superior to sub. Nitrogen fixation is another important reason for planting clovers since nitrogen fertilizer costs are high. At the research station at Angleton in 1979-80, Mt. Barker sub clover produced 137 pounds of nitrogen while Yuchi arrowleaf clover produced 102 pounds and

Tibbee crimson clover produced 13 pounds.

In summary, sub clover will not be a big improvement over Yuchi. It does not appear to have an advantage over Yuchi in adaptability to heavy, wet soils. As a result of increased planting in the county this fall, more information will be available this next fall.

Farmers and ranchers can expect to receive the final 1982 crop and livestock survey questionnaire about the middle of the month from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The two-page questionnaire is short and can be completed in a few minutes. According to service representatives information on the form is confidential and is a dependable source of production statistics for farm organizations and legislatures in planning and developing farm programs. It is also utilized by exporters in planning and promoting sales of Texas agricultural production.

Many gardeners with pecan trees in their yard or garden are finding numerous limbs on the ground. Most of these limbs are small about the size of the little finger. They appear to have been cut off with a knife. Such is not the case, however. The cause is the twig girdler. This insect resembles the Cotton Boll Weevil, but is not present in the trees presently. The damage was done this
