Accidents Prompt Safety Call

Rural motor vehicle traffic accident information for the North Central Texas area has been released by Captain J.A. Dumas, commander of the highway patrol headquartered in Garland. The six counties in his responsibility are Hunt, Delta, Lamar, Fannin, Grayson and Cooke. In the six counties there were a total of 148 motor vehicle traffic accidents worked by the Texas Highway Patrol, of which five were fatal accidents, 100 property damage accidents, 43 personal injury accidents in Delta, Lamar, Fannin, which 78 persons were in-

jured, out of the five fatal accidents, eight persons were killed.

In Lamar County there were a total of 23 motor vehicle traffic accidents for the month of October reported by the highway patrol, of which two were fatal accidents with two fatalities, eight personal injury accidents with 19 injuries, and 13 property damage accidents.

The troopers of the county enlist the aid of all Lamar County residents in aiding them by using seat belts, no matter how short the trip, and please observe the speed limit, and waiting until arriving at their destination before using alcoholic beverages.

With the Thanksgiving holidays coming up, the troopers urge all Lamar County motorists to use caution and be alert and use good judgement when operating a motor vehicle.

Thanksgiving is one of the most special times I can remember from my childhood days.

All the family gathered at my grandmother Hood's home for a day of feasting and visiting, and talking about the Christmas holidays ahead.

Back then my granmom insisted that everyone come to her house for a "big feed" and no place else would do. Thanksgiving was such a good holiday. As far as I was concerned, it was one of the best.

There was always a lot of good eats and all the other kids and the aunts and uncles. After we had eaten all we could hold, us kids would go out to play while the older women would clean up the dishes, and by the time they were all through, it would be time for the football game between Texas and Texas A&M.

All the men would gather around the radio to listen to the game, and Mam would quit the women and join the men and boys, because she loved football. Football wasn't her favorite sport, but it always held her until the baseball season began!

Mama could tell anyone the leading rusher, and who was the leader in passes or punts. She knew who all the coaches were, and the standings in the Southwest conference, and she would spend a lot of time explaining the game to us little ones.

When baseball season

began, Mama very seldom missed a game on the radio. She knew all the big league players, what position they played and their batting average.

Her favorite was the Texas league, and she would gather all us young ones around her and explain all the things that went on, who was the next hitter, whether he was liable to hit or not. Mama would get excited over the home town teams too.

Intense rivalry would go on between the Bogata and Deport teams, and mama knew everyone. She would holler at the opposing pitcher trying to get him rattled so he would make a mistake, and darned if I don't think it worked sometimes.

Mama helped us kids in sports a lot. She made yam baseballs, and if we didn't have enough on a team, she would come out and play with us.

Thinking back to past Thanksgivings I know now that there was never anytime greater than sitting around that radio, stuffed with good food and my mom's face glowing with the excitement of a football game!

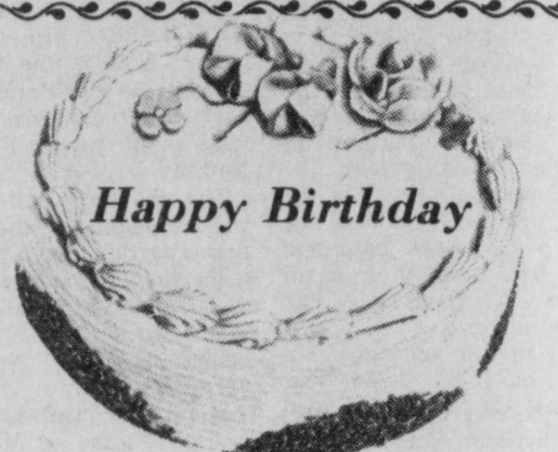

PECAN RICE STUFFING

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup snipped parsley
- 8 cups cooked white or brown rice (cooked in turkey or chicken broth)
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 2 teaspoons ground thyme
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon ground or rubbed sage
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg





Melt butter in a large pan. Add onions, celery, and parsley. Cook over low heat until tender, stirring constantly. Add cooked rice, pecans, and seasonings. Toss together lightly. Makes enough stuffing for a 12 to 15 pound turkey.

Note: Stuffing may be cooked separately in a covered baking dish at 325° for 30 to 40 minutes.

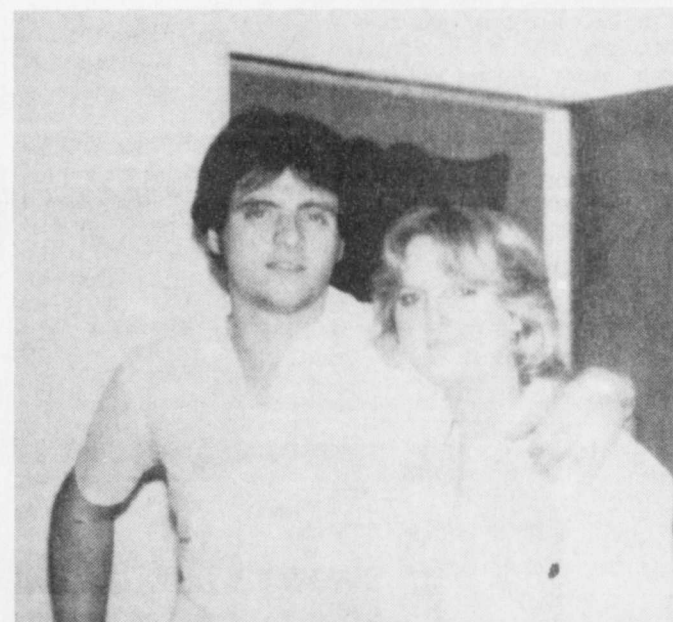

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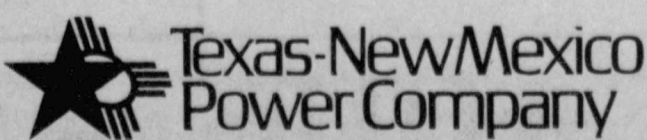

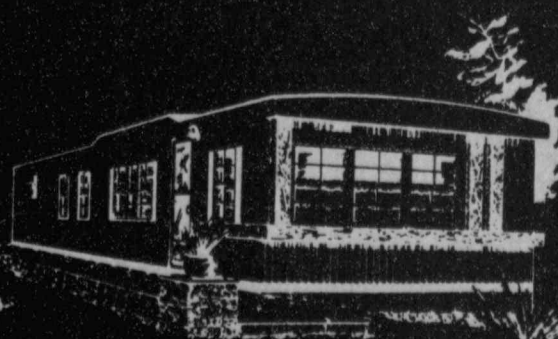

Jellied Cranberry Sauce
4 cups cranberries (1 lb.)
2 cups boiling water
2 cups sugar
Optional: 2 inches stick cinnamon, 2 whole cloves, 1/4 tsp. salt

Wash and pick over the cranberries. Make sure you have 4 cups. Most packages available this year contain only 12 ounces; you will need another cup of cranberries.

Place the cranberries in a saucepan. Cover with the boiling water. As soon as the water begins to boil again, cover the saucepan with a lid. Boil the berries 3 or 4 minutes or until the skins burst. Put them through a strainer or ricer. If you desire a clear jelly, strain the puree through three thicknesses of cheesecloth to remove pulp and seeds.

Stir into the puree or juice the two cup sugar. Heat to a rolling boil. You want a not too firm sauce, remove from the heat at once. If you

want a molded sauce or jelly, boil about 5 minutes, skim, then pour into a wet mold. If the cranberries are very ripe, cook a few minutes longer.

Cranberry-Orange Bread
Sift together:
2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup sugar
Mix in thoroughly:
2 Tbsp. shortening
Grated rind and juice of 1 orange plus fresh or diluted frozen orange juice to make 3/4 cup
1 egg, beaten
Fold in:
1 cup raw cranberries, cut in halves

Pour into a greased 9x5x3" loaf pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven until toothpick stuck into center comes out clean, about one hour.

Hot Spiced Cranberry Lemonade
1 (12 oz.) pkg. cranberries
8 lemons
1 3/4 cup sugar
2 sticks cinnamon
6 whole cloves
8-10 cups water

Heat cranberries with 3 cups of the water. Bring to a boil, simmer five minutes. Squeeze lemons, remove seeds. Add juice and pulp to cranberries. Put through a strainer or a ricer, or puree in food processor in two batches. Strain.

Add sugar and spices to the cranberry and lemon juices. The spices can be tied in cheesecloth, put in a spice ball, or strained out after heating. Bring to a boil. Turn heat off, cover and let stand five minutes. Remove spices. Serve hot.
