for warming beverages. Hot Spiced Cranberry Lemonade warms the spirits as well as the body. For the very best version, make it with fresh cranberries and lemons. The quick version, made with canned cranberry juice and frozen lemonade is mighty good, too. It keeps in the refrigerator for several days, which makes it a handy as well as delicious and warming beverage to the two cur ugar. Heat serve chilled family to a rolling boil. you want a

Jellied Cranberry Sauce 4 cups cranberries (1 lb.) 2 cups boiling water Sometime during the 2 cups sugar

Optional: 2 inches stick cinnamon, 2 whole cloves, 1/4 tsp. salt

Wash and pick over the cranberries. Make sure you have 4 cups. Most packages available this year contain only 12 ounces; you will need another cup of cranberries.

Place the cranberries in a saucepan. Cover with the boiling water. As soon as the water begins to boil again, cover the saucepan with a lid. Boil the berries 3 or 4 minutes or until the skins burst. Put them through a strainer or ricer. If you desire a clear jelly, strain the puree through three thicknesses of cheesecloth to remove pulp and seeds.

Stir into the ree or juice members and guests. A not too firm sauce, remove friend and I served freshly from the heat at once. If you

want a molded sauce or jelly, boil about 5 minutes, skim, then pour into a wet mold. If the cranberries are very ripe, cook a few minutes longer.

Fold in: 1 cup raw cranberries, cut in halves

Pour into a greased 9x5x3" loaf pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven until toothpick stuck into center comes out clean, about one hour. **Hot Spiced Cranberry**

Lemonade 1 (12 oz.) pkg. cranberries 8 lemons

13/4 cup sugar 2 sticks cinnamon 6 whole cloves

8-10 cups water Heat cranberries with 3 cups of the water. Bring to a boil, simmer five minutes. Squeeze lemons, remove seeds. Add juice and pulp to cranberries. Put through a strainer or a ricer, or puree in food processor in two

Add sugar and spices to the cranberry and lemon juices. The spices can be tied in cheesecloth, put in a spice ball, or strained out after heating. Bring to a boil. Turn heat off, cover and let stand five minutes. Remove spices. Serve hot.




