An 84 year old gentleman, disoriented by a move to a new community, nearly blind and unable to walk well, was missed around noon in Deport Friday.

Within a few hours, most of the able bodied men in town were combing the fields and creeks behind the house where the man lived. The volunteer firemen turned out in force, searching the area, asking door to door questions.

Because the area was overgrown and rough, two aircraft were called in...one a helicopter belonging to McKay Enterprises at Mt. Vernon, the other a Cessna belonging to Roger Boxworthy of Paris, who used to inspect pipelines from the air.

Both of these men volunteered their time, fuel and aircraft to search miles of countryside, taking off from their busy schedules to look for a man who could easily have died if he had spent the night lost out in the cold.

The fact that the elderly man was located late in the evening in Paris, after hitching a ride to town, in no way lessens the contributions made by these volunteers.

Until it was known for sure where he was, the most obvious, and dangerous possibility had to be checked out, that he was lost in the fields.

It's nice to know that folks will help so readily, and it's nice to know that it wouldn't have mattered which community in the area such a thing happened at...the volunteers would come out, whether in Deport, Bogata, Blossom, Talco, Johntown, Cunningham, Pattonville, Cuthand or whichever small community.

Depending upon one another in times of trouble is a fact of life here, and a fact that can save lives too...a well deserved round of applause for everyone!

Rivercrest Rebels Capture Two More

The Rivercrest Rebels continued their winning streak as they came out on top in their district game against Big Sandy 49-41. The end of the first quarter left the Rebs trailing by three, 10-7—they soon remedied the situation!

The Rebels pushed hard in the second quarter and came up with 18 big points. The Reb defense held Big Sandy to 10 as they took the half-time lead 25-20.

The Rivercrest boys came out of the dressing room looking for bear! They scored 10 points to Big Sandy's eight and continued to control the game.

The fourth period added another 14 points to the Reb scoreboard in answer to Big Sandy's 13. This Rivercrest win dropped Big Sandy's district standing to 3-1.

The Rebels connected on 11 of 15 trips to the free throw

line for a 73 percentage marker. High scorers for Rivercrest were David Rozell with 16 and Bradley Moore with 10.

The Rivercrest Rebels came up with another big victory Friday night at Rebel Gym as they bested the Jamies Bowie Pirates 67-45. Ten players produced points for the Rebels as they eased by James Bowie. James Bowie now stands at 1-3 in the district.

The Rebels dominated the game in the quarter scores. The first quarter racked up 13 for the Rebs and nine for the Pirates. Bradley Moore connected on two free throws and a two point basket for four in the first quarter.

The Rebels hit the hoop for 22 big ones in the second period of play. Stan Wood came up with six and Wyatt Bush added four from the free throw line. The half

ended at 35-22.

In the second half, the Pirates seemed to tire—the Rebs took advantage. They netted 18 points to James Bowie's 11 (three of which resulted from Rivercrest fouls) in the third stanza.

Rivercrest continued to outscore the Pirates in the fourth quarter. They popped the net for an additional 12 points and brought their total to 67. The Pirates managed 10 more to bring their total to 45.

The Rebels connected on 15 of 23 free throws during the game. Rivercrest, with the win, remained atop the district 18-AA standings with a 4-0 record. The Rebels are tied with Redwater who also has a 4-0 record. The district 18-AA standings in boys play up until last Tuesday's

games are as follows: Rivercrest, four wins, 0 losses; Redwater, four wins, 0 losses; Big Sandy, three

wins, one loss; New Diana, two wins and two losses; Maud, two wins and two losses; James Bowie, one win and three losses; Ore City, 0 wins and four losses; and Como-Pickton, 0 wins and four losses.

Games slated for Friday, January 21 are Redwater at Big Sandy, Rivercrest at Como-Pickton, New Diana at James Bowie and Ore City at Maud.

According to the Tyler Morning Telegraph, here is the East Texas Elite schoolboy basketball poll with first place votes in parenthesis and total points received, voting on a 5-4-3-2-1 basis. A close race occurred in AA standings as Sabine, last year's No. 1 team all season, and Rivercrest shared the honors.

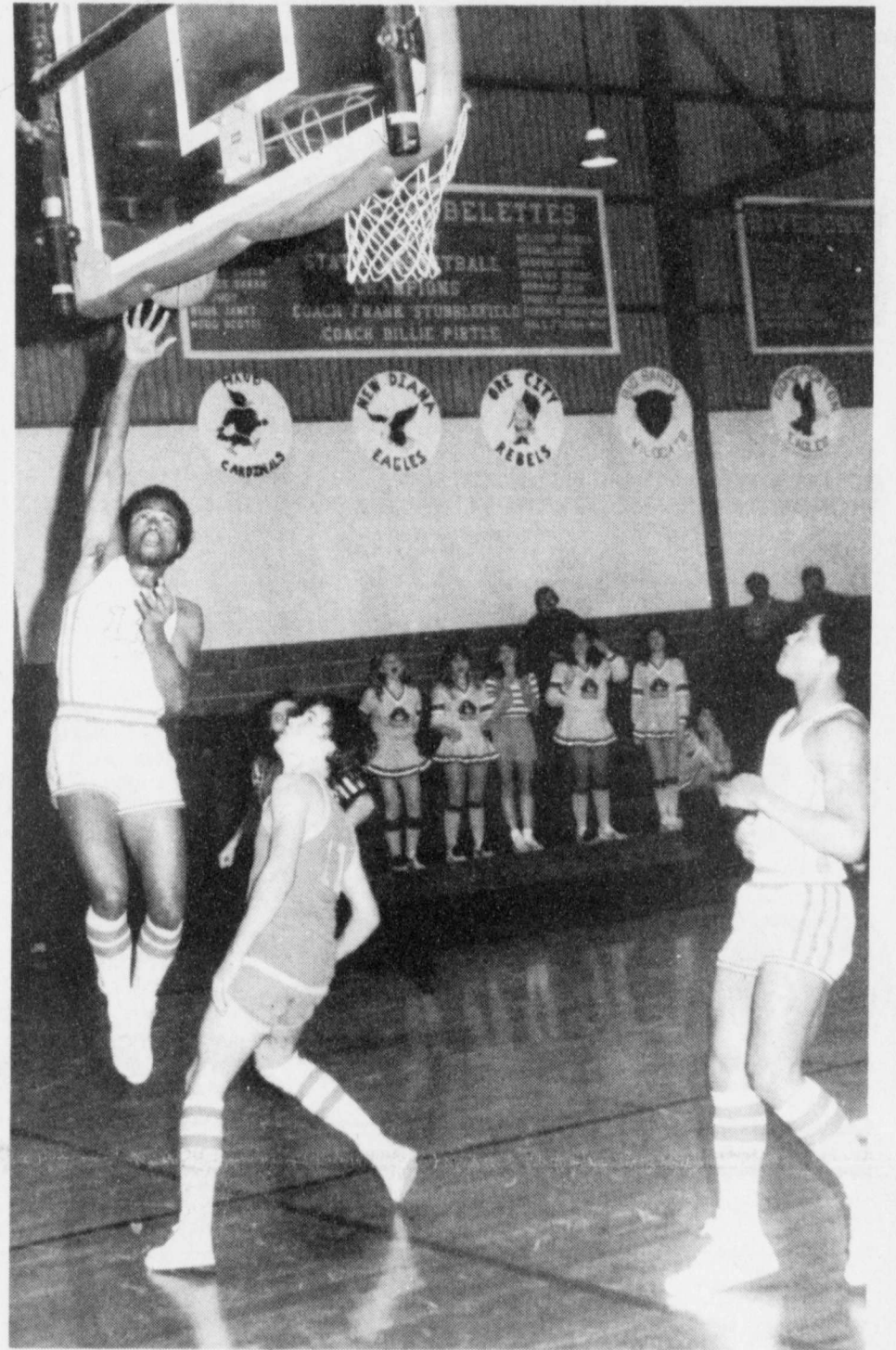

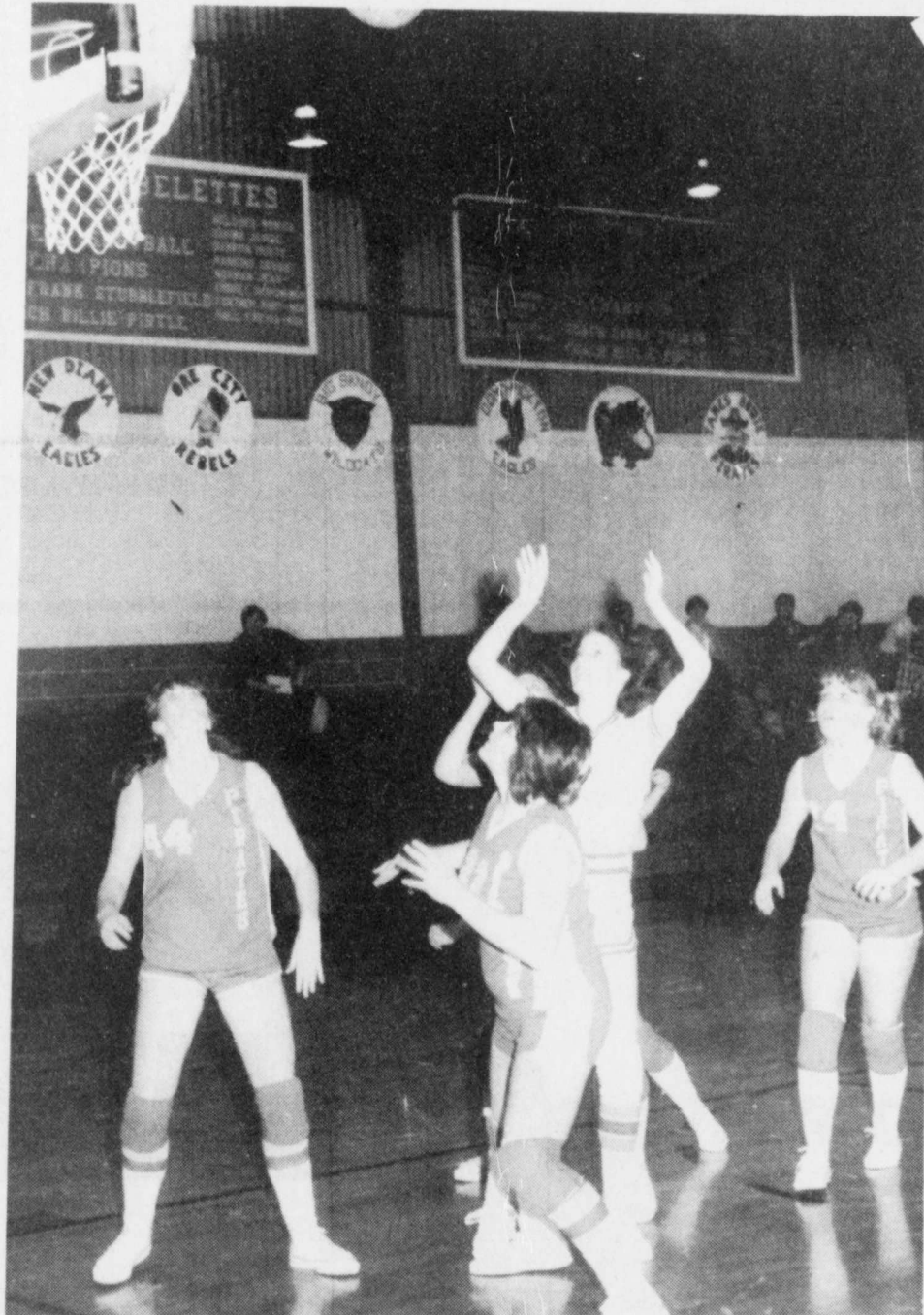

New Talco Bank Building Another Step In Long History

The Talco State Bank is beginning construction of a new, better building to serve the community.

Weather has delayed progress on construction of the bank, but hopes of continued progress and good weather are high. The new bank will be on the block just east of the present bank site.

A look into the past of the bank might be in order now that yet another phase of the bank's history is shaping up.

From July 26, 2962 edition of The Talco Times: Talco State Bank opened for business in Goolshoro, which was about 2½ miles east of the present location on FM Road 71, on July 6, 1912 with a capital of \$12,000.

After nearly six months in that location it was moved to a frame building at the corner of Broad and Fourth

Streets, in Talco in December, 1912 and to its present location in 1913. The building was remodeled and modern fixtures installed a few years ago, keeping in step with the bank's rapid growth the past decade.

The original stockholders were: from Talco, G.C. Glass, T.R. McLean, F.A. Loveless, Ben Clark, Dr. A.A. Smith, T.L. Leake. From Mt. Pleasant, Morris Lillinstern, R.F. Lindsey, J.M. Burford, George Lillinstern, Oscar Lillinstern. From Lavada, D. Warner and George Moyer. From Cookville, Oscar Keith.

The original board of directors and the dates each served: Morris Lillinstern, 1912 to 1916; Oscar Keith, 1912 to 1917, R.F. Lindsey, 1912 to 1947, George Moyer, 1912 to 1916; T.R. McLean, See Talco Bank, Page 3

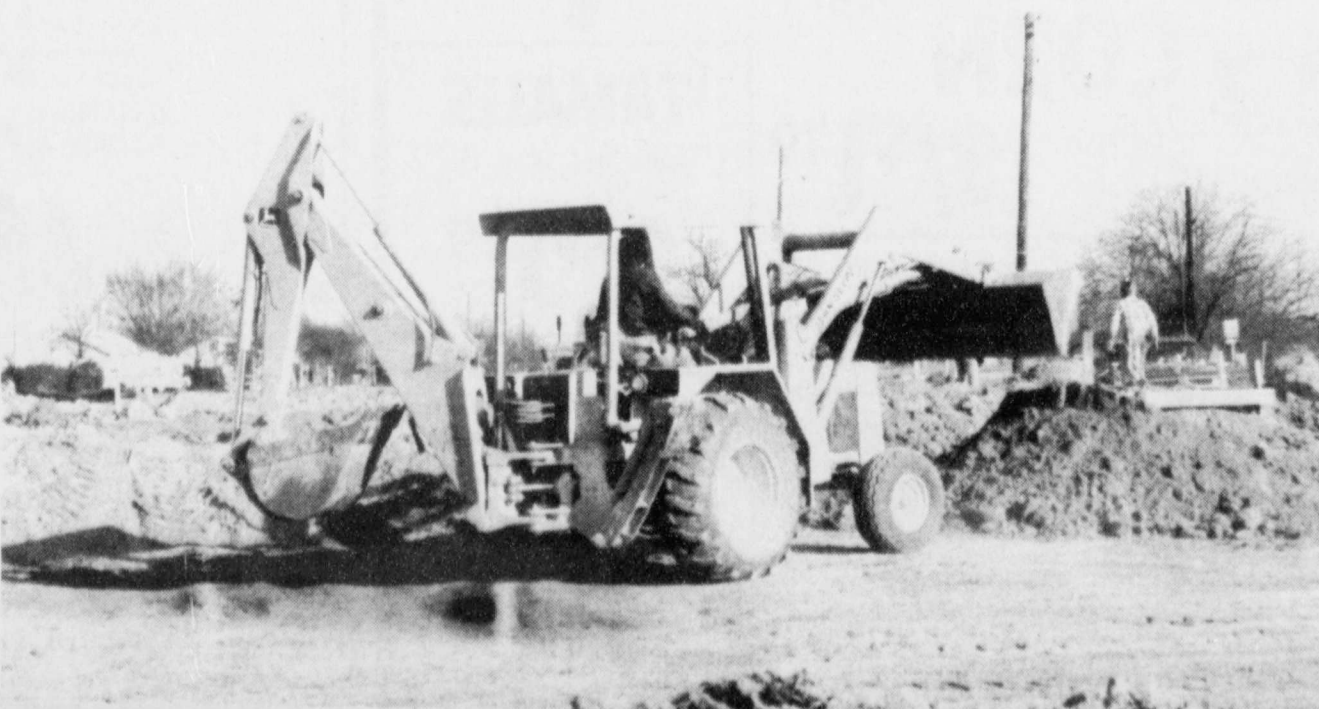
Dear News:

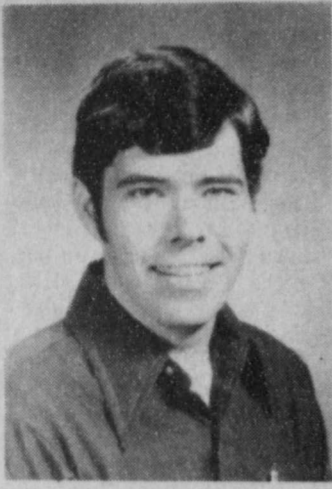
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Scott Receives Honor

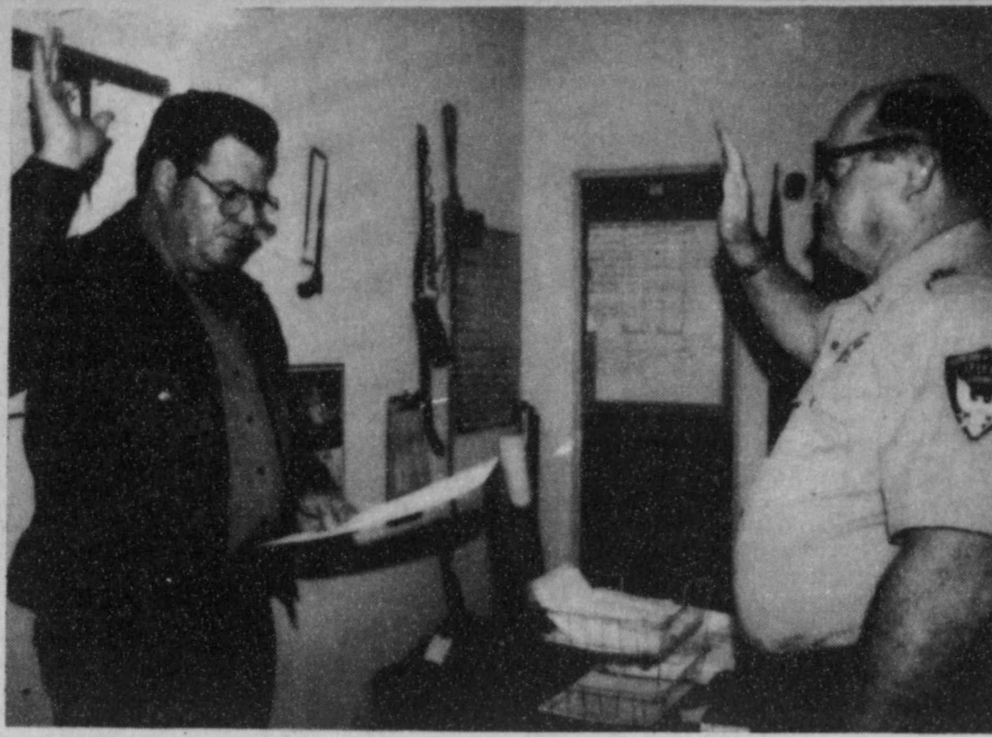
Britt Scott

Capital and surpluses have grown from \$12,000 to \$935,000 at the present time. Deposit growths at 10 year periods have been as follows: 1912, \$3,020; 1922, \$45,426; 1932, \$36,376; 1942, \$118,110; 1952, 480,410; 1962, \$913,855; 1972, \$2,986,226; 1982, \$9,157,318.

The PTO discussed and made further plans for the chili supper and music show coming up January 29.

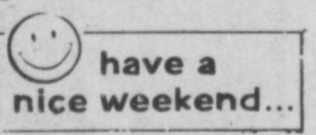

Ag Seminar Can Help In Financial Planning

By Herb Brevard
Now is an excellent time to soil test for spring and summer fertilizer needs, according to Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr. agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Good representative soil samples should be taken of several areas in the field, avoiding unusual areas such as low places.
Boxes for mailing the samples are available at local county Extension offices. The producer should fill out an information sheet for each sample giving the past history of the field so that fertilizer recommendations can be made by personnel in the soil testing lab.
If the soil tests show that pastures or hay meadows need phosphorus, potassium or lime, apply these nutrients as soon as possible. Reeves says apply nitrogen on winter pasture in February in East Texas. Winter pastures are growing in some areas due to the warm weather, but normally, little growth is obtained this time of year. Shop for the availability

and prices of fertilizer in several locations. Fertilizer prices are down somewhat from last year so shopping may save a few dollars on the fertilizer bill.
If weeds have been a problem in hay meadows or pastures, now is the time to make plans to apply a preemerge herbicide. Weed control can save money on fertilizer costs and allow much better quality forage to be produced.

4. Progress report was given on the various construction projects on the campuses.

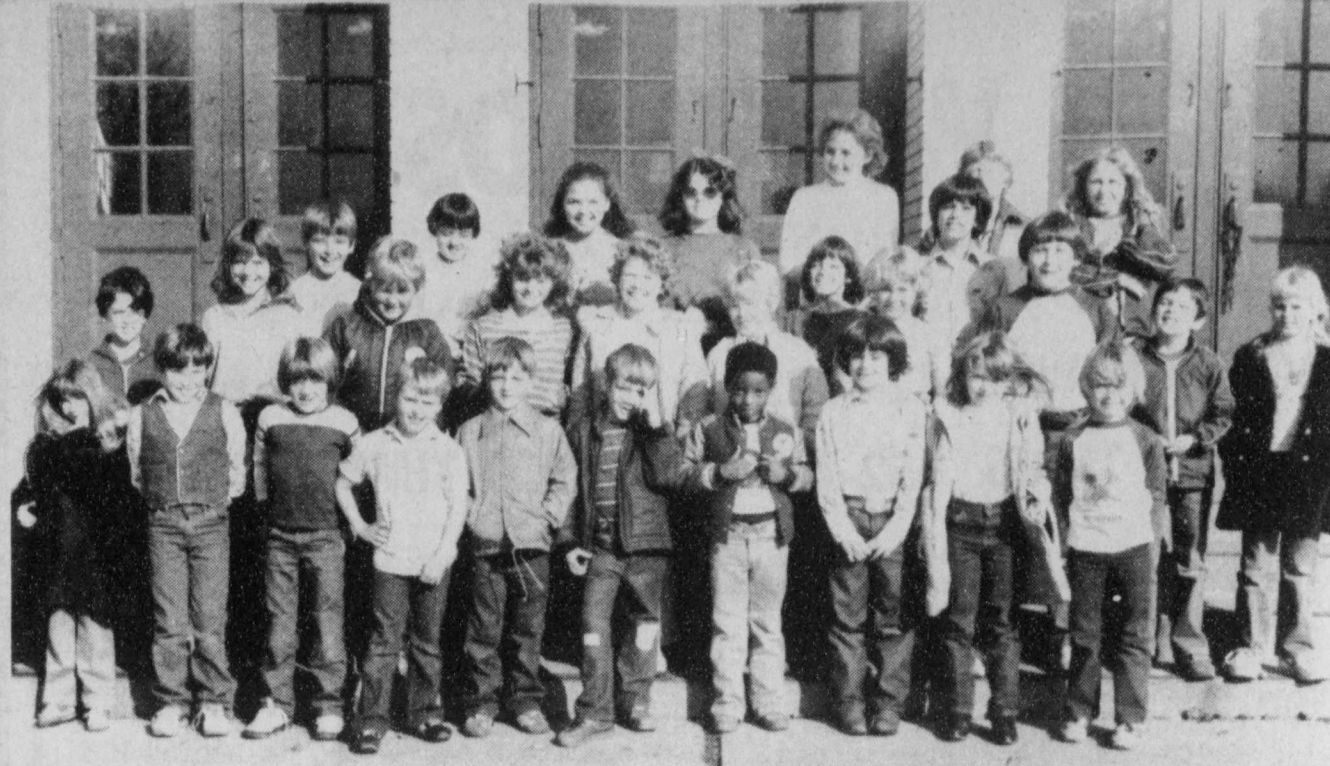

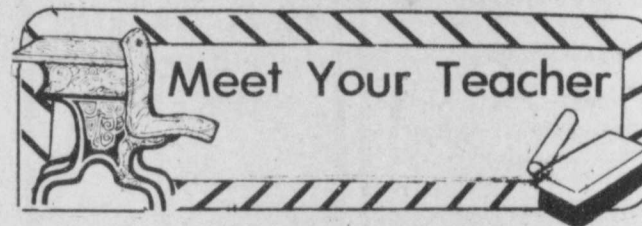
