Both the Varsity boys and girls teams met defeat Tuesday night as they met New Diana. The losses now total two for the girls team in district competition and brings the Rebels tied in district with the team from Redwater.

Stan Wood added two and Davis and Jeffery each connected on a free throw. The halftime scoreboard read 37-22.

David Rozell was hot in the third quarter as he popped the net for 12 points. John Hines hit for two which brought the score to 51-30.

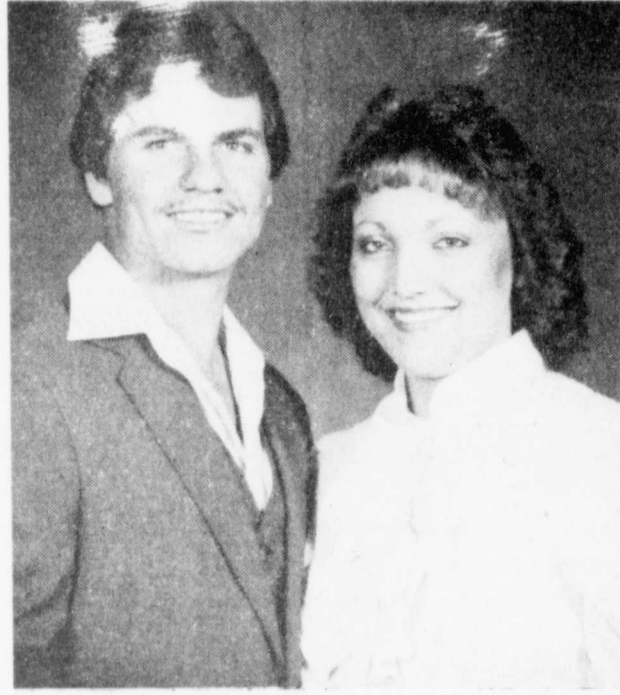

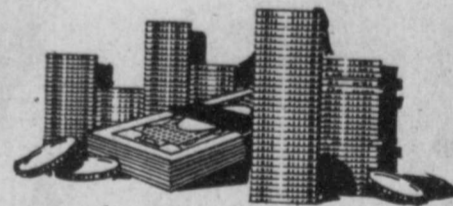

## Cattle Need Appraising Before Weather

Time is rapidly running out for planning tax strategy for 1982, says Wayne Taylor, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Producers need to get their records together and decide if additional sales or purchases are needed before January 1 or if these transactions need to be delayed until 1983. Taylor says that proper planning can save on the tax bill or delay the taxes. This is an important management tool available to all producers and should be used.  
With many heifers approaching one year of age, now is an excellent time for brucellosis vaccination, according to Dr. Randall Grooms, Extension livestock specialist. Heifers should be vaccinated between the ages of four and 12 months of age, regardless of the current intended use of the animals. Grooms says that the sooner all heifer calves are vaccinated for brucellosis, the quicker the state will be rid of the disease. A vaccination program, carried out by all producers, will put the entire beef cattle industry on more stable footing. Vaccination will give the producer more alternatives for selling the heifers at marketing time and will allow the heifers to go either to the feed lot or as replacements in a cow herd. Local veterinarians will vaccinate the heifers free of charge. A fee for the trip to farm may be made if the number of head to be vaccinated is extremely small.

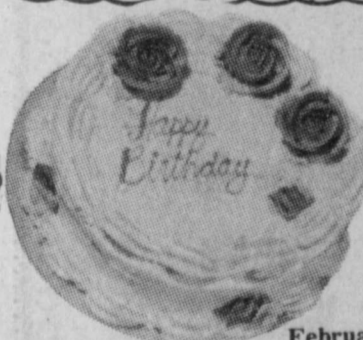

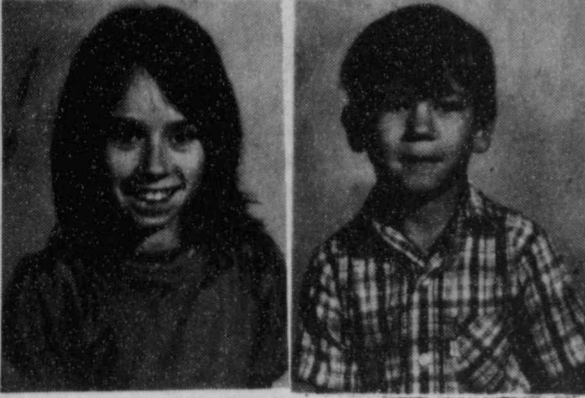

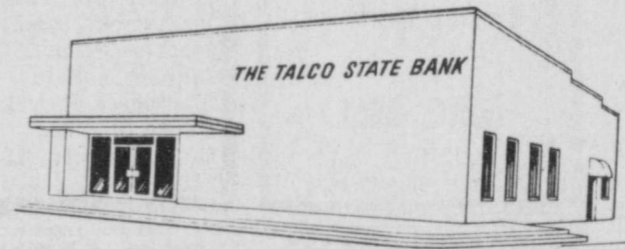
