Tuesday Night Victory Puts Boys In Lead For District Rebels, Rebelettes Drop To New Diana

THE RIVERCREST Rebels and Rebelettes hosted James Bowie Tuesday night. The Rebels took their game 65-42. Rivercrest led 27-25 at the half. The strong outside shooting of Stan Wood, Bradley Moore and John Hines pulled them away in the second half. Stan Wood scored a total of 18 while Bradley Moore hit 16. The Rebels are in first place in their district as Redwater lost to New Diana Tuesday night. The Rebelettes won their game handily by a score of 47-13.

The Rivercrest Rebels dropped a tough game in New Diana. The Eagles edged them out 60-59.

Rebel points were spread out in the first quarter. David Rozell, Bradley Moore and Larry Davis each put them through four points. Stan Wood added two for a total of 14. The Eagles also came up with 14 for a tie at the buzzer.

The halftime score gave the Rebels a two point edge with 35-33. Bradley Moore hit for eight points and Stan Wood added six. David Rozell connected on a basket and two free throws and Larry Davis popped a basket and a free throw.

The third period was low in scoring by both teams. They each managed only eight points. John Hines hit the basket for four and David Rozell and Larry Davis each added two. The Rebels two point advantage held 42-41.

The fourth quarter held problems for Rivercrest as the Eagles scored 19 points to their 16. The Rebs held a slight edge in momentum, taking a 53-49 lead with 2:24 left on Rozell's second straight baseline layup.

Stan Wood then sank one of two from the foul line to put the Rebs up, 54-51, before the Eagles added two to close it to 54-53.

With 1:16 to go in the game, Coach Wood drew a technical foul sparked by a foul call on one of his players. This led to four consecutive Eagle free throws.

Before the foul was called, however, is when Wood believes the turning point occurred. As 6'5" David Rozell went up for a short jump shot, Eagle Ken Johnson, 6'6", got a hand on the ball and knocked it down, the officials called a jump.

Bradley Moore had grabbed the loose ball and started up for a shot but the decision had been made. Johnson controlled the tip giving possession to the Eagles.

In the final minute, Rozell made three of four free throws. Moore drove the lane for a bucket with two seconds remaining. The Rebels came up short with a final of 60-59.

Points totals for Rivercrest were David Rozell with 20, Bradley Moore with 15, Stan Wood with 11, Larry Davis with nine and John Hines with four.

The Rebels romped to victory Friday night on home ground as they downed Big Sandy, 71-55.

Rivercrest scored a big 23 points in the first stanza to Big Sandy's 13. Larry Davis handled six points and Rozell and Moore each added four. Wyatt Bush, Stan Wood and Kelly Jeffery each connected on a basket and Rozell, Moore and Jeffery added a free throw apiece.

The second period added 11 for the Rebels and 16 for Big Sandy. Stan Wood drilled the hoop for six and Bradley Moore hit for four. Jeffery added one from the foul line. The score read 34-29 at the half.

Rivercrest gained 13 more in the third quarter to bring the score to 47-41. Rozell contributed two baskets and a free throw. Bush, Wood, Moore and Jeffery each added two.

The Rebs cinched it in the fourth period as they added 24 big ones to Big Sandy's 14. The final tally was 71-55.

Scoring for the Rebs were David Rozell with 17, Stan Wood with 14, Bradley Moore with 13, Kelly Jeffery with eight, Larry Davis with six, Wyatt Bush and Randy Galloway each with four, John Hines with three and Mark Brown with two.

District 18AA standings are as follows: Rivercrest 9-1; Redwater 9-1; New Diana 8-2; Big Sandy 5-5; Maud 5-5; Ore City 3-7; James Bowie 1-9 and Como-Pickton 0-10.

Last Friday's results were Rivercrest over Big Sandy, New Diana over Ore City, James Bowie over Como-Pickton, and Redwater over Maud.

Rebelettes bow to Eaglettes The Rebelettes bowed to the Eaglettes in New Diana, 55-35. Guard Angela Johnson used her exceptional speed to create havoc for the Rebelettes as she racked up 24 points.

"She played a tremendous ballgame," said Stubblefield. "We tried to get position on her, and at times I thought we had it."

It was only the second district loss for the

Rebelettes, who are 9-2 and 13-9 for the season. They sit in second place in District 18AA.

Rivercrest got off to a slow start as they scored nine points in the first stanza to New Diana's 13. Becky Brooks put through four and Kristi Foxworthy and Jerry Ann Smith each hit for two. Mary Savage added one from the foul line.

The second period the Rebelettes hit for nine again but New Diana answered with 14 and stretched their lead to 27-18 at the halfway mark. Foxworthy hit the basket for four and Branch added two. Mary Savage connected on three free throws.

The third stanza was much the same as the Rebelettes were held to six points while their opponent got 14. New Diana's Johnson and Richardson, both seniors, were major factors in the game with 24 and 16 points respectively.

The final period sealed the Rebelettes fate as the Eaglettes racked up another 14 to Rivercrest's 11. The final tally was 55-35.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Kristi Foxworthy with 10, Mary Savage with eight, Becky Brooks with four, Jackie Via, Pam Ward, Kim Reeder, Rhonda Branch, Lorry McGee and Jerry Smith each with two and Nelda Anderson with one. The Rebelettes were back

in the groove Friday night as they handed down a defeat to Big Sandy 46-18. The points were spread out over the Rebel squad as they hit basket after basket.

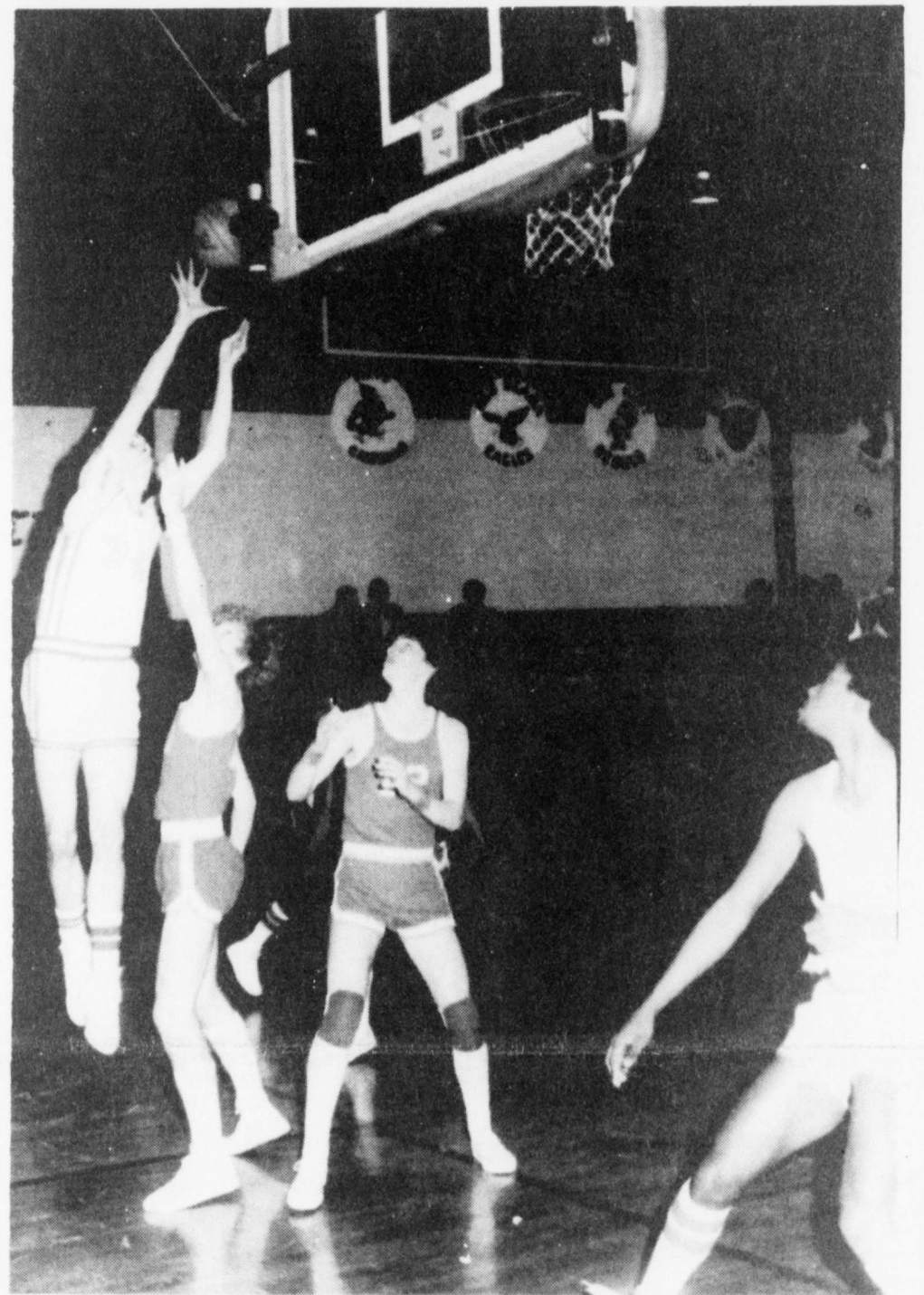

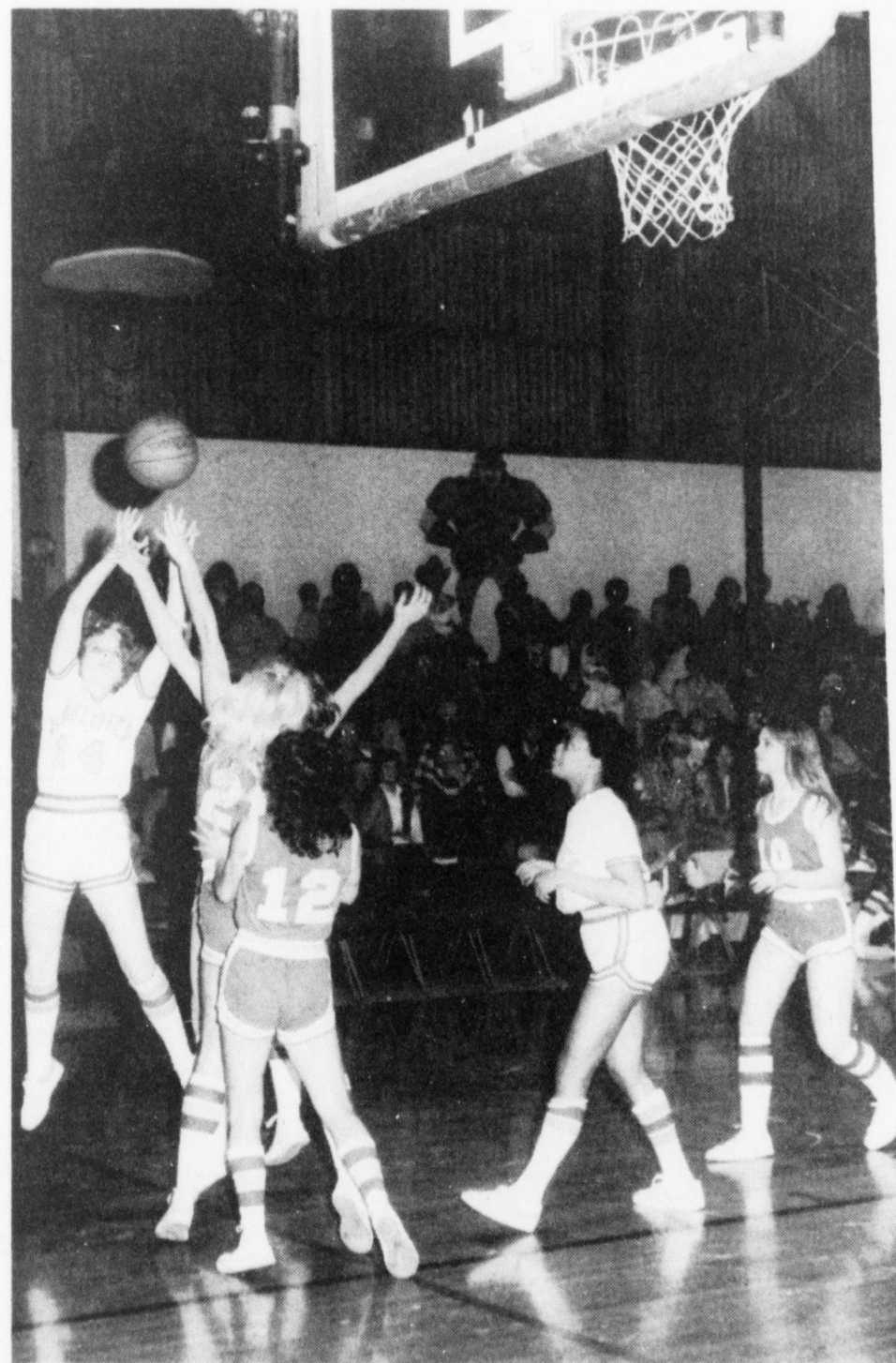

Rivercrest High School. Incumbent Jerry Russell from Talco signed up at the Tuesday night board meeting.

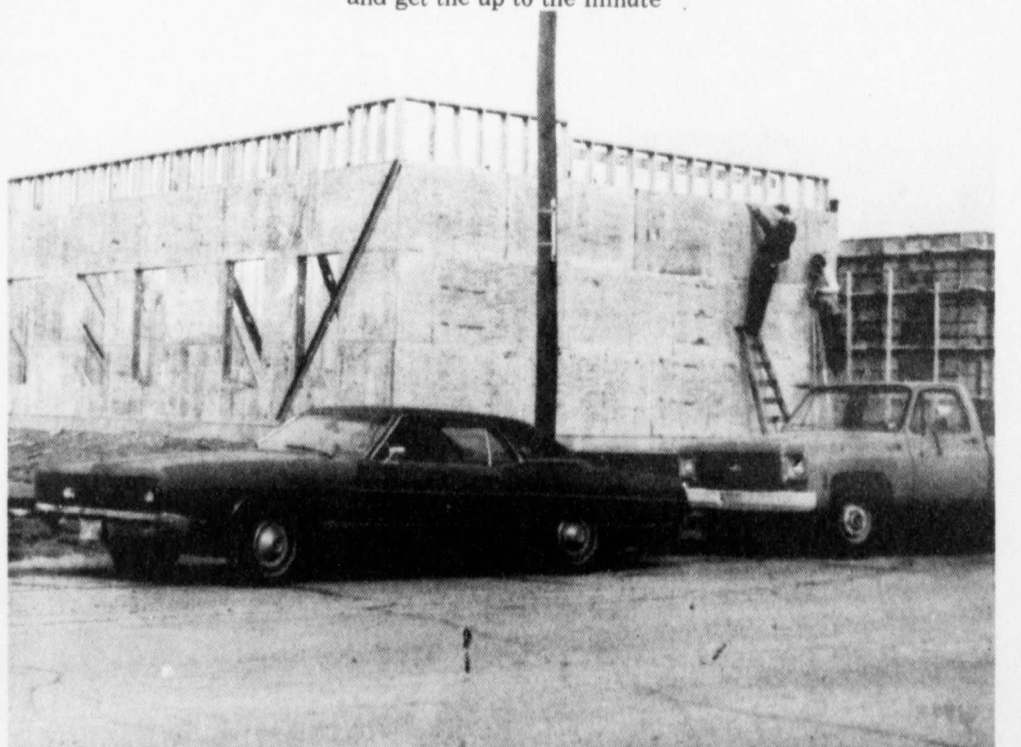

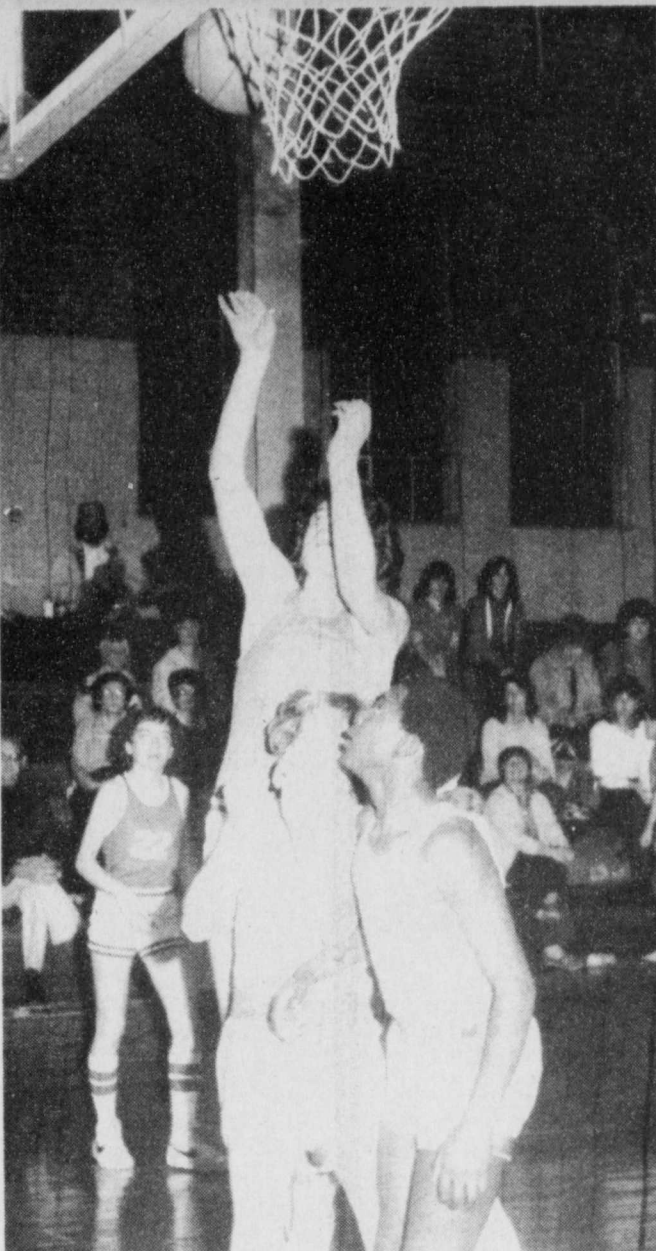

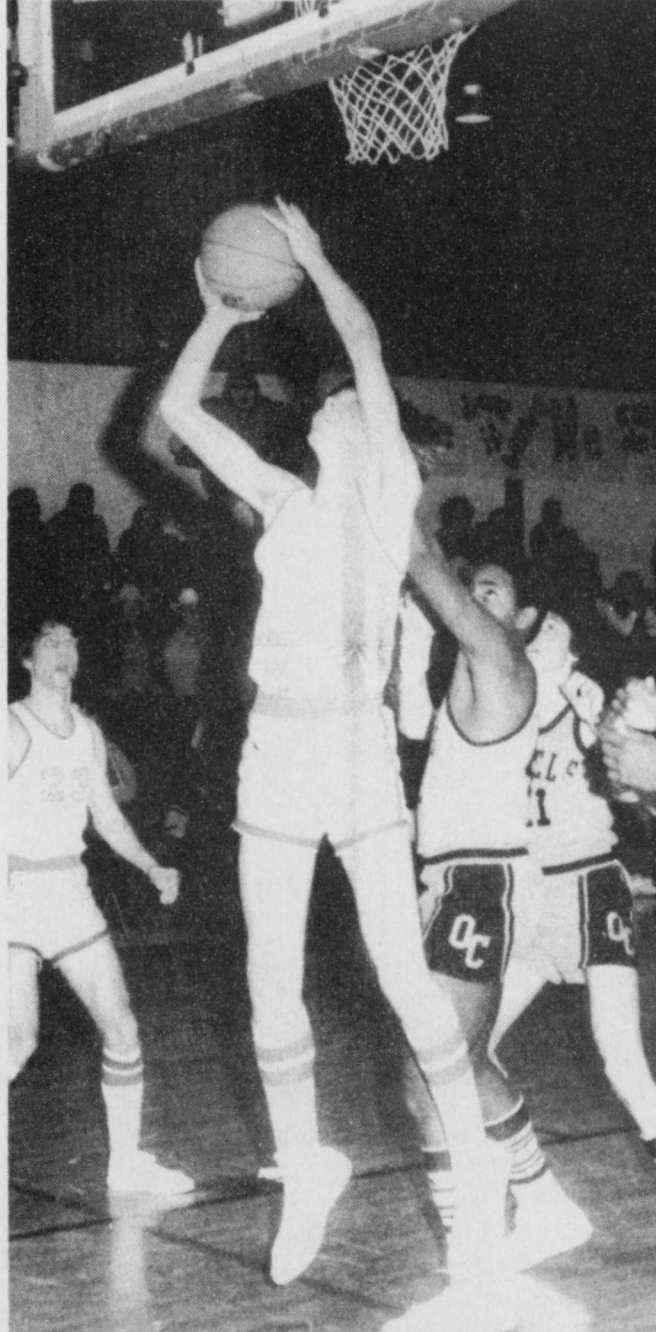

Texas-New Mexico Filing For Rate Increase

Texas-New Mexico Power Company announced today they were filing with the Public Utility Commission of Texas and the cities it serves for a 4.24 percent rate increase for all customers.
 Galen Legate, District Manager for Texas-New Mexico Power Company, said a typical residential customer uses almost 1000 kwh each month. If a customer uses this amount, their increase in the price of electricity would be \$4.54 per month. This is a 5.60 percent increase in the summer and a 5.86 percent increase in the winter.
 Galen Legate cautioned that consumption varies and that the amount you use may not be the same as the amount used by a typical customer.
 The overall increase for residential customers is 5.74 percent; for General Service customers the overall increase will be 4.64 percent.
 Maxie Davie, Vice President-Corporate Affairs, stated that the increase was necessary to cover increased operating expenses incurred in 1982.
 The Public Utility Commission normally takes about five months to make a final determination on a rate request.
