Rebels Head For Bi-District Competition

for adults, sold at the door. No advance tickets will be sold.

The Rebels took an easy victory over Como-Pickton last Tuesday night 94-24. There were three Rebels in double digits, David Rozell with 22, Kelly Jeffery with 15

and Bradley Moore with 14. In the first quarter, the Rebs came out with a big 28 points to their opponent's four. David Rozell hit for 14, Bradley Moore for 8, Larry Davis for 4 and Stan Wood for 2.

Second period action

netted Rivercrest another 30 points. Their defense allowed Como-Pickton only 4 points. John Hines scored 8, David Rozell and Bradley Moore 6 each, Larry Davis 4 and Stan Wood 2 points. Rozel also added 2 from the foul line. The halftime score stood at 58-8.

The Reb's scoring dropped off in the third period with 9 points to their opponent's 10. Wyatt Bush got 4 and Kelly Jeffery hit for 4 and 1 free throw.

The final period had the Rebels back in the groove as they scored 27 points to six for the Eagles. Kelly Jeffery hit for 10, while Randy Galloway added 9. Mark Brown put through 4 and Wyatt Bush and Scott Brown each added 2 points. The final tally was 94-24.

Rebel scorers were David Rozell with 22, Kelly Jeffery with 15, Bradley Moore with 14, Randy Galloway with 9, John Hines and Larry Davis each with 8, Wyatt Bush with 6, Stan Wood and Mark Brown each with 4 and Scott Brown with 2.

Rivercrest traveled to Redwater last Friday night for a very important contest. This game decided the winner of District 18AA-Rivercrest. The Rebels came out on top, 63-45.

Things didn't look very good during the first stanza as the Rebels and Dragons were nip and tuck at six points each. Bradley Moore hit four and John Hines made two points.

The second quarter things picked up as Rivercrest hit 23 points to Redwater's 12 for an 11 point spread at the half.

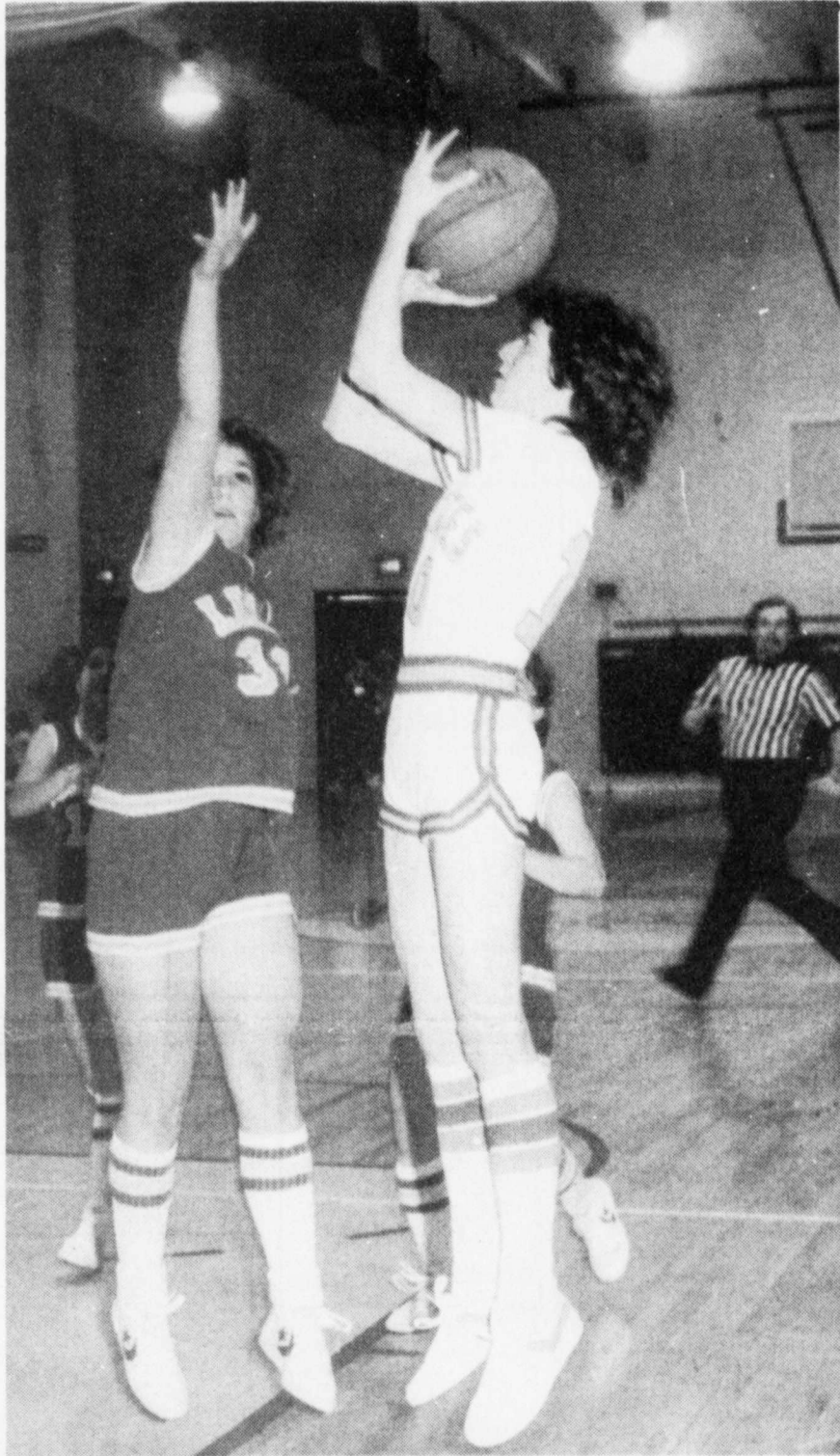
The third period brought the Rebels another 16 big ones. The Reb defensive action held the Dragons to 10 points. Bradley Moore came down with 14 rebounds for the night.

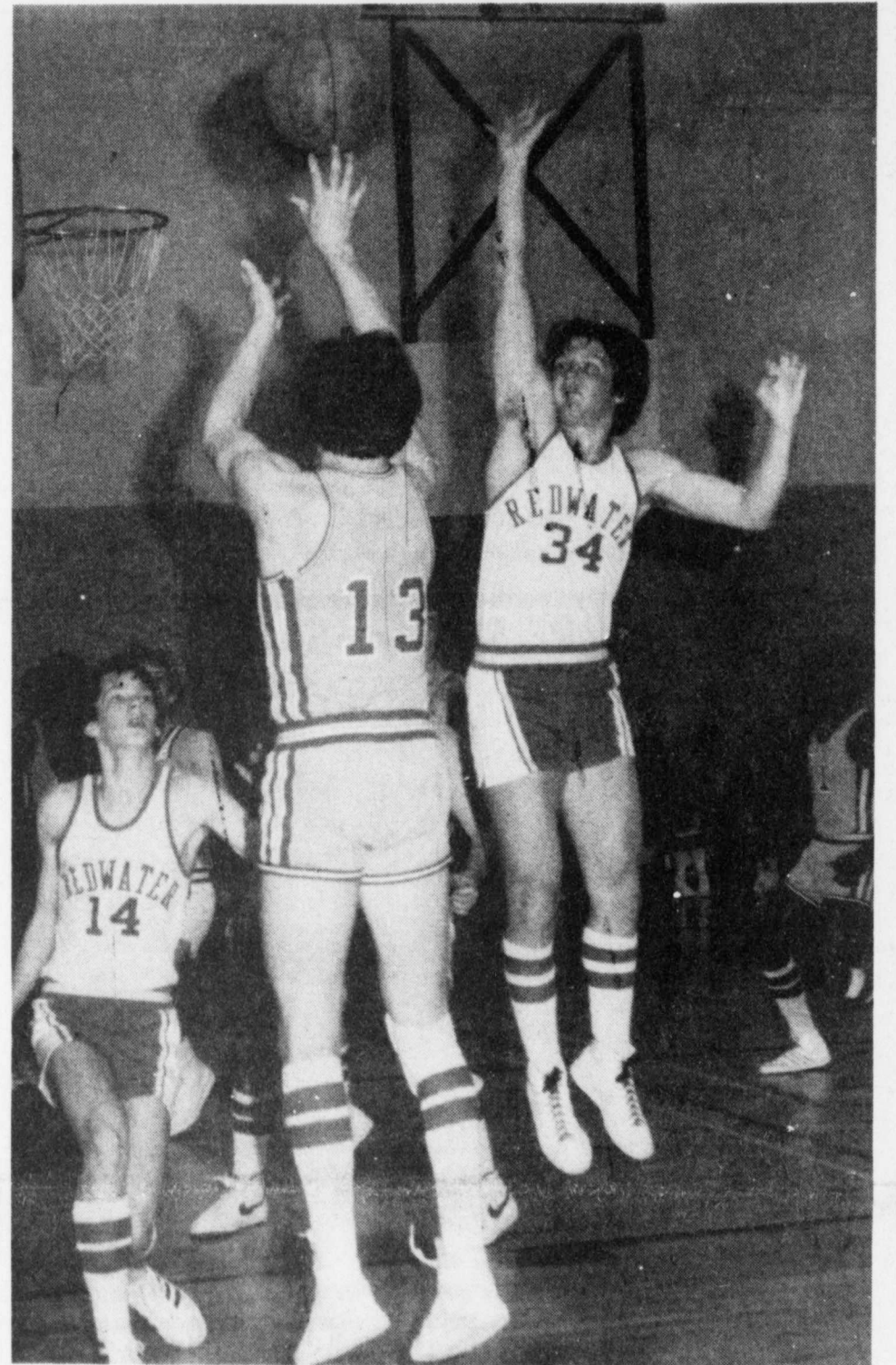

PJC Offering Stress Reduction Course

Paris Junior College will offer a course for stress and anxiety reduction through the use of biofeedback instrument training and self-hypnosis, said Lynn Rhodes, counselor at PJC. Purpose of the course will be to teach students to relax and the stress of everyday life, with emphasis on training, not therapy, Rhodes explained. Classes will be scheduled on an individual basis, but the initial class meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Monday, March 28 in the Mike Rheudasil Learning Center at the college. Fee will be \$25 for the continuing education course, or students may add the course to their schedule for credit.

Reservations should be made by paying the fee in advance in the PJC continuing education office, Alford Center, or seeing Rhodes to register for the credit course. Biofeedback instruments provide an individual with the opportunity to monitor the on-going physiological processes of the body,

thereby inducing relaxation and reducing stress, said Rhodes, who will teach the course. Included in the course will be filmstrips on stress and actual training on biofeedback instruments.

Conditioning Course For Women Set

Paris Junior College will begin another conditioning course for women on Monday, March 21, 6:30 p.m., said June Jones, director of community services. Classes will be held for one hour six consecutive Mondays in the PJC Gymnasium.

Clare Vaughan Rainey, who teaches gymnastics and dance at PJC, is the instructor. The course will include exercises for firming and toning and some outdoor walking when weather permits. Fee is \$10, which should be paid in advance in the PJC continuing education office,

Bids For Resurfacing

Bids for resurfacing more than 50 miles of highways in Lamar and Red River Counties are to be tabulated Feb. 15 by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission. The seal coating will seal roadway cracks against water and weather and provide increase skid resistance. In Lamar County, the work will be on Texas 24 from 0.5 miles south of Loop 286 to the Sulphur River in sections totaling 7.7 miles; Farm to Market Road 1501 from FM 1503 west 4.2 miles to FM 196; FM 196 from FM 195 east of Faught to US 82 in Blossom; US 271 from its intersection with Loop 480 east 0.7 miles to Stillhouse Road; FM 906 from FM 195 at Novice north 5.9 miles to Pine Creek bridge; FM 1500 from FM 79 north 2.5 miles to FM 1499; FM 1507 from

Texas 19 east 1.7 miles and FM 195 from FM 906 at Novice for 4.8 miles to the Red River County line. In Red River County, the FM 195 work will continue for 2.1 miles to FM 410 at Woodland; also FM 411 from FM 410 east 4.5 miles to Texas 37; FM 410 from US 271 south 5.3 miles to north of FM 196 and FM 1487 from FM 909 southeast 4.1 miles to FM 910. Richard Stauter, DHT engineer in charge from Paris, estimates the work will require 123 working days.

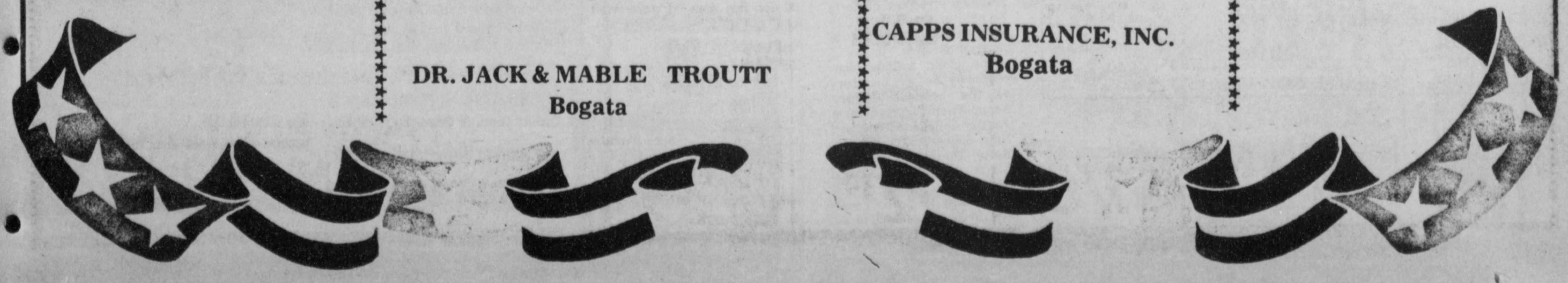
