Suit Asking For Removal Of Bruce Scott

It's spring...at least that's what the calendar says. And it was surely spring-like for a little while.

That "while" was just long enough to whet everyone's appetite for warmer weather, gardening, yard work and outdoor sports.

It was also long enough to "thin" everyone's blood down so that when the cold came back, it bit down harder than before.

Somehow the brief spell of balmy sunshine just made all those gray skies and chilly temperatures that much worse.

At least we're not celebrating the first day of spring with an ice sculpting contest like they are in New York State. Or trying to keep the blizzard driven snow off a football field as they were up in Denver, Colorado.

But our poor fruit trees, which have been in full bloom, probably are in a state of shock. Those cautious enough not to bloom during the first cold spell found themselves caught by the second one!

Critters such as horses and cows started to shed out their heavy winter coats, then found themselves shivering in a cold rain.

Besides all the cold and rain, the wind has howled practically non-stop for the past few weeks. In warm times, the wind doesn't bother much, but when it turns off chilly, it seems to drive the temperature right into bones.

In July everyone will probably think back to the cold with wistful longing, but right now, our typical March weather is making it a little hard to know whether to put on a summer short set or a pair of long handles.

A number of Red River County, Precinct One residents, have filed a quo warranto legal proceeding against Commissioner Bruce C. Scott.

The quo warranto action challenges Scott's right to hold office, and is based on an article of the Texas Constitution.

The civil action is filed in the name of the State of Texas through the County Attorney's office on the part of several relators. Relators are: Neil Rozell, George Marshall, Sr., Clifford Ritchie, W.C. Covington, C.O. (Son) Welch, Tim Rogers and Thomas C. Welch.

Although the suit is channeled through the County Attorney's office, the proceedings will be handled by Pat C. Beadle, senior member of the Clarksville law firm of Beadle and Beadle, a private attorney engaged by the relators.

The quo warranto action asks that Scott's term of office be terminated as of the date he filed for election and the return of all salaries and

allowances, in the amount of \$14,625, plus interest, since that time, alleging that Scott has not legally been an official since his date of filing on February 1, 1982.

The cause of the action resulted from events of 18 months ago when the Commissioner's Court readjusted the County Precinct boundaries to make more equal the population in each of the four Red River County precincts.

Clarksville is the most heavily populated section, and was considered the easiest to adjust without seriously affecting county roads, therefore it received the most changes.

Scott, who lives a few hundred yards south of Clarksville on FM 910, was in Precinct 1 under the old precinct lines. The road at that time served as the Precinct line.

The new line moved west several blocks, placing Scott, who was ending the first year of his four-year term, in Precinct 4.

This put Scott out of compliance with the ruling

that a Commissioner must reside in his district, although by a special ruling he could have served the remainder of his term, ending December 31, 1984, without moving.

However, Scott chose to run for the position of Precinct 4 Commissioner in the Democratic Primary elections of 1982. Darwin Floyd, Precinct 4 commissioner, had resigned, and the office was being filled by Don Cole, an appointed official who chose not to run for office.

The suit charges that Scott violated the portion of the Texas Constitution which states that an official cannot run for an office while holding another.

The Constitution provides that if more than one year remains on the original term, as it did in Scott's case, filing for the office constitutes an automatic resignation at that time.

Scott apparently was relying in part on decisions of a U.S. District Court and the U.S. 5th Court of Appeals that at that time this particular portion of the Texas

Constitution was not valid. The U.S. Supreme Court, however, later ruled that it was in effect.

Visiting Judge David Moore of Gladewater was in Clarksville last Friday and presided over the court.

The quo warranto legal proceeding requires that a District Judge must give leave to file the suit before it can be activated, and after a

brief hearing, Judge Moore, gave permission to file the suit.

The action will proceed now much as any lawsuit. Scott must obtain private counsel if desired in this case, as the County Attorney is a party to the suit. Normally the County Attorney represents members of the court.

Scott has been heavily criticized by residents of his precinct during his service as commissioner, with several complaints being brought before the Commissioner's Court, mostly relating to road maintenance, and often coming

from the Bogata, Fulbright and Cuthand area.

Scott has maintained that he has utilized his funds to the best possible use.

If the ruling by the District Judge goes against the Commissioner, he could stay in office during the appeal process if he chose to. However, salaries and allowances paid during this period would remain in doubt.

Meteorite Team Works In Shadowland

There were some strange things going on at the old Shadowland Plantation over the past few weeks, and Chris Kennedy, ten year old son of Bob and Jo Ann Kennedy, decided to investigate.

He ended up spending his spring break from school helping a research team look for meteorites.

The group of men swinging metal detectors over the plowed fields turned out to be a Meteorite Recovery Team, headed by David Baker.

Shadowland, located between Deport and Bogata, has long been recognized as a site for the unusual chunks

of iron that fell from outer space, according to Baker.

James Rhodes discovered the first reported Shadowland meteorite in 1930, when he was 17. Realizing that it was something unusual, he sent it to the Smithsonian Institute.

Kenneth Gifford found three more on the place, and to date, 23 pieces of meteorite have been located at Shadowland. Four of them turned up last week during the meteorite recovery team's search of the area.

Baker says that meteorites are probably asteroid fragments that have been deflected into earth's orbit following collisions in space.

The ones found in this area are probably about 500 years old. Carbon dating is non-applicable to meteorites, but the amount of rust on them helps determine their age.

Baker is writing a book on meteorite showers in the United States. He has searched for them in many places, including Plainview, Albuquerque, N.M. and Flagstaff, Az.

There are around 900 known meteorite locations in the U.S., and Baker's book will cover around 130 sites.

The four pieces found locally ranged in size from one and a half pounds to only an ounce.

The bigger chunk was lying exposed in the middle of the road, the rest were located by metal detector.

Kids are responsible for many of the finds, because they take time to look at the world around them and notice things a little differently.

When questioned as to why meteorites were important Baker explained that they actually contain minerals not found on earth, but often from other galaxies entirely!

Sixty minerals not found on this planet have been identified in meteorites.

The oldest is 700 million years older than the oldest known earth rock, and 500 million years older than nearly all lunar rocks. The study of them provides significant facts regarding the origin of the solar system and formation of the planets.

How to identify a meteorite? Baker says that they are "rusty", and can be attracted by a hand magnet. If a corner is ground off, they will show a bright, white metallic surface, or flecks of shiny metal.

The ones found in this area are mostly iron, with about seven percent nickle in them.

Four Candidates Listed On Talco-Bogata Trustee Ballots

Four candidates' names will be listed on the ballot for the April 2 trustee election to elect three school trustees for the Talco-Bogata School District.

From Bogata, John M. Ward, incumbent and present chairman of the Board, and Mildred Eudy will be listed on the ballot. From Talco, Jerry Russell, incumbent and present vice-chairman of the Board and Johnny Hood will be listed on

the ballot. One candidate from the Bogata area will receive a three-year term; one candidate from the Talco area will receive a three-year term, with the next candidate receiving the

largest number of votes receiving the one-year term at large.

Absentee voting will continue through Tuesday, March 29 at Rivercrest High

School. Voting boxes for the Saturday, April 2 election will be held at the Talco Elementary School and the Bogata Gymnasium.

Junior Livestock Show Set

The annual Spring Youth Project Show and Junior Livestock Show will be held on Saturday, April 9 at the

Legion Park Fairgrounds. The livestock show will begin at 8:00 a.m. with the weighing for market lambs. Public viewing of the project show begins at approximately 11:00 a.m.

This will be the third annual open show for beef and dairy cattle. Beef Classes will be: Angus, Gray Brahman, Red Brahman, Brangus, Charlais Hereford, Limousin, Santa Gertrudis, Simmental, Other Breeds and Steers.

Dairy classes will be: Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein and Jersey.

County youth will also be showing sheep for the first time in the Junior Livestock Show. Three weight divisions of market lambs

will be shown with the top twenty to be sold at auction. All activities will be stopped for the sale which begins at 12:00 n.oon.

In addition to the livestock show, county youth will display their various projects which will vary from clothing, canned goods and poster art to wood-working.

These projects will be judged and be on display in the exhibit building and livestock barn of the fairgrounds.

The public is invited to view all the activities on Saturday, April 9th. It should prove to be an interesting day.

Robbery Suspect Apprehended In Bogata

A long chase which began in the Paris area last Friday afternoon ended at the junction of Highway 271 and 37 in Bogata.

Jeffery Wayne Whitworth, age 30, apparently stole his stepfather's 1980 Chevrolet and then fled from Paris City Police officers in the vehicle.

The Lamar County Sheriff's deputies pursued

whitworth over much of the east end of Lamar County. He ran into another vehicle in Bogata, where Highway Patrolman Parsons apprehended him.

Whitworth was taken to Red River County Jail and later transferred to Lamar County facilities. Charges have been filed in the matter.

This Crusade is held each year not only to collect funds but to distribute literature to help wipe out cancer in our lifetime.

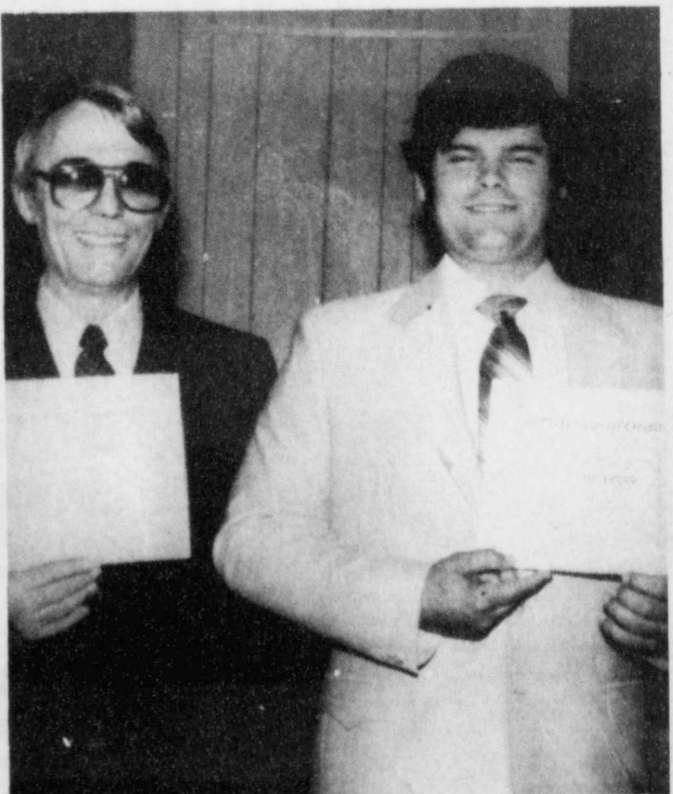

Local Sales Tax Rates Reflect Economic Situations

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently returned \$34.9 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities who levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Statewide, these payments are running 4.5 percent behind last year," Bullock said. "This decline in both local and state receipts from the sales tax was part of the reason I have lowered my estimate of available state revenues."

Locally, Blossom received \$844.01 this period, bringing the 1983 total to \$2,515.58, for a 12.88 percent increase over last year. Deport received a check for \$579.60, compared to no payment the previous year, for a total of \$1,868.35 as compared to \$1,575.83, or a 18.56 percent increase.

Paris received a check totaling \$65,625.34, bringing the 1983 total to \$426,350.14, for an 8.44 percent increase over 1982.

Bogata received \$2,369.26 for its share, comparable to

\$735.95 for a 34.17 percent increase over the same period in 1982. Clarksville received \$7,716.42, comparable to \$11,282.03 for the same period last year, for a 0.63 percent decrease.

Talco received \$2,094.91 for its payment this period, bringing the 1983 total to \$6,708.78 for a 7.97 percent decrease.

Bullock also sent March rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$7.9 million, compared with \$10.8 million last March. The San Antonio MTA got \$1.1 million, compared with nearly \$1.2 million last March.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The March checks were for taxes collected on sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller by the end of February.

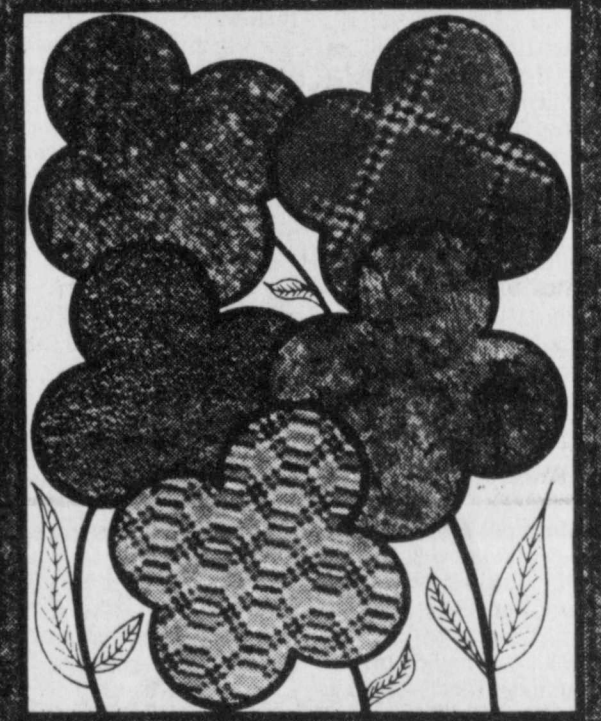

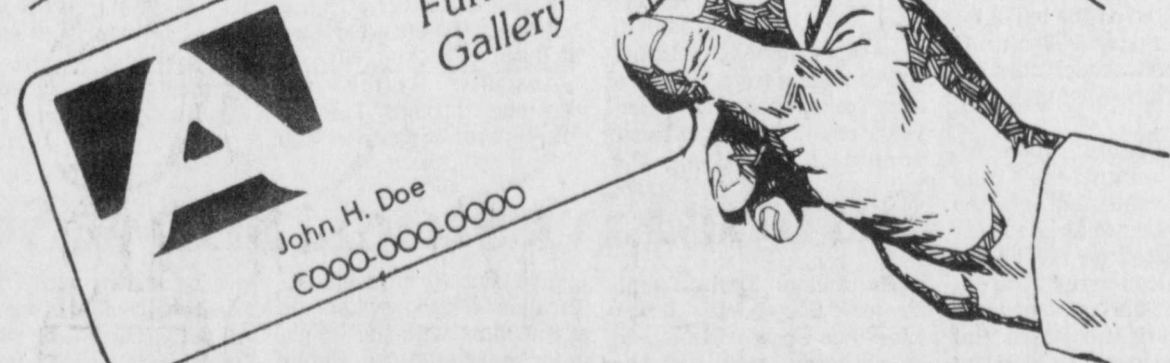

East Texas Eating

Here is a delicious fresh food idea that you can do with bananas which are appearing in several of our local produce departments with fairly attractive prices. I worked the recipe out several years ago after eating banana fritters with cinnamon sauce in a Houston restaurant.

The fritters are delicious as a fairly light dessert - or as a continental style breakfast with fresh, hot coffee.

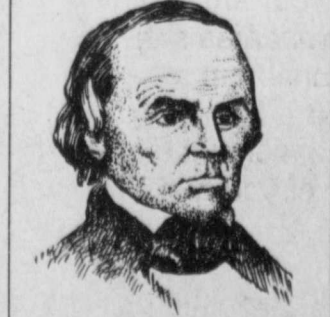
Banana Fritters with Cinnamon Sauce

Dip quartered bananas into fritter batter. Drop into hot (375 degree) deep cooking oil and fry until golden brown. Drain and serve hot with sauce.

Fritter Batter (for 4 or 5 bananas)
1 egg
1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. cooking oil

Beat eggs, stir in milk. Sift together and beat in the flour, baking powder, and salt. Beat in the 1/2 tsp. cooking oil.

Mrs. Miller Honored With Retirement Dinner

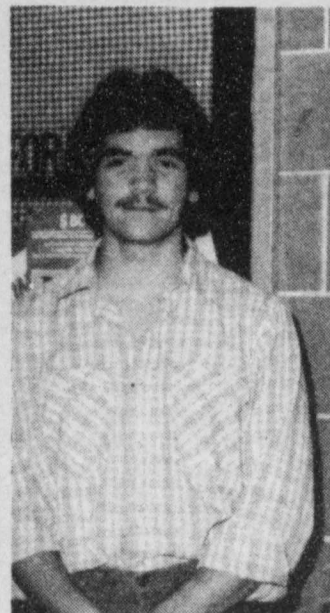

In summation, Mrs. Hooker pointed out that theirs was a typical experience of life on the early Texas frontier.

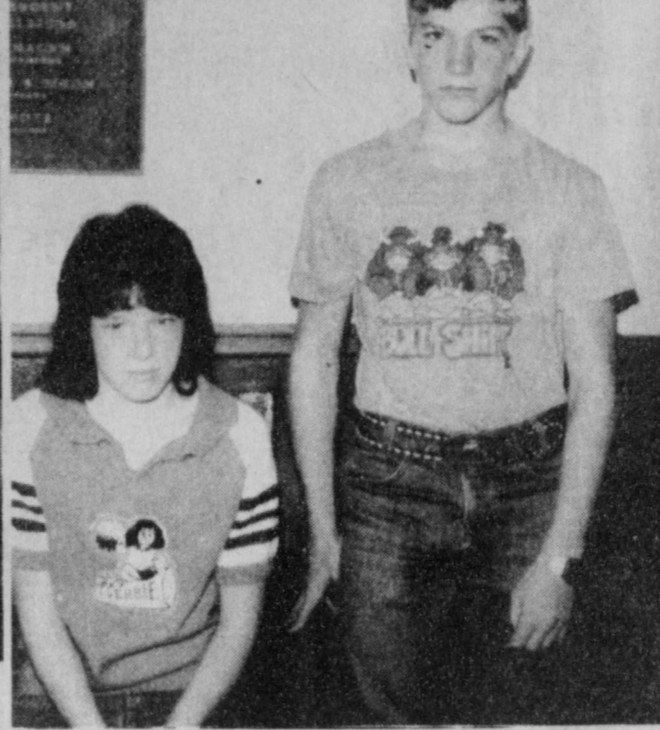

Footprints From The Past

On Saturday, I attended a birthday party for one of my Aunties who was 99 years old on March 16. She is the only living sister of my dad and she has one brother who is 89 years old and will be 90 next month.

It sure brought back a lot of pleasant memories when all of her kids arrived and also all of the rest of the family. Seeing all her boys now old like me, but I was carried back to the times when we were young and would visit and play all the games that were so popular with the young in those days.

Games like pop the whip where you would all line up in a straight line, hold hands and the one at the head of the line would use both hands as he was the whip. We would all start to run and then the whip would stop and see how far he could throw the ones who were on the other end, sometimes the one who was on the tail-end of the line

would get quite a spill and sometimes the little ones would be hurt and you had to stop the game.

We had a game where we would take hold of someone with both hands and give them a little spin. They had to stay frozen in the position they came to a stop in. There were a lot of funny positions, but we would usually get tired of it after everyone had a chance to be the one frozen, then it was some other game until we were all too tired to play any more. By that time it was dark and after we had our supper, we would all sit around and tell stories.

I remember one that always would send cold chills up my spine. I don't remember how it went now, but I do remember that it always ended by saying "It floats, it floats" and by that time I was long gone to hunt up my Mom, so she could hold me and not let the boogers get me.

I started this with the information that my Aunt Bessie Maddox was 99 years old and that she was my dad's sister, so it was at her house that I spent a lot of my time. I also had another cousin by the name of Sidney Maddox who would visit with the Maddox boys in the summer and we all had a lot of good times playing all the games that boys play including baseball, corn cob fights and hunting and fishing.

I want this to be all about Aunt Bessie and what fun it was to visit in her home. It was always the highlight of my summer visits to be privileged to visit her home, for she was never too tired to have something for tired little boys to eat or drink, like polly-pop as we called it when I was a boy.

If Aunt Bessie did not have something already fixed, she would take time out from her schedule and fix us something. A farm woman had a busy and hard life in those days, as she had no gas or electric stove to fix lunch on, but had to cook on a wood stove, no matter how hot it was and there was wood to be brought in to burn in the stove and no matter how hot it was, the stove had to be burning to cook.

Aunt Bessie was one of my favorite Aunties when I was growing up and she still is and I would like for her to know about it now. I have told her so many times but I

THE SINGLE VISION LENS
When most people get their first pair of eyeglasses or contact lenses, more often than not they're made with single-vision lenses. This doesn't mean they can see only in one direction. Nor at only one distance. The "single" stands for just one set of optical corrections in the lens.

The single-vision lens can be for reading or for seeing at a distance. It all depends on the problem that needs correcting.
