Local Elections Present Few Surprises

There were few surprises
in the local elections, as
Bogata and Talco City
Council decisions were
made, and the Talco-Bogata
CISD Trustee election was
held last Saturday.

Incumbent John Ward
returned to his three-year
position as Bogata
representative of the Talco-
Bogata Board of Trustees.

In the April 2 school
trustee election for the
Talco-Bogata CISD, two
incumbent members and one
new member were elected to
the Board. John M. Ward of
Bogata received a total of 157
votes winning the three-year
term from the Bogata area;

Johnny Hood of Talco
received a total of 196 votes
winning the three-year term
from the Talco area; and
Jerry Russell of Talco
received a total of 186 votes
winning the one-year term at
large. Mildred Eudy of
Bogata received a total of 134
votes.

In voting, Bogata cast a
total of 157 votes with
Mildred Eudy receiving 101,
John Ward 96, John Hood 83,
Jerry Russell 82. In Talco
voting, 123 votes were cast
with Johnny Hood receiving
113, Jerry Russell 104, John
Ward 61 and Mildred Eudy
33.

Write-in votes were
received by the following:
A.D. Stephenson, 10 votes;
Kenneth Jeffery, two votes;
and Roger Dale Simmons,

three votes. The following
received one write-in vote
each: Pat Cowan, Mary
Joplin, N.A. Stevens and
Russell Foxworthy.

The Board will be
reorganized with new
members being sworn in and
new officers elected at the
next regular meeting on
Tuesday, April 12.

Unopposed Talco mayor
Joe Morse an incumbent,
received 102 votes in a good
turnout. Johnny Cook,
incumbent councilman, lost
his seat with two ballot
positions going to Lindon
Ray Reed and Billy Joe
Vickers.

The three candidates for
the Bogata City Council were
unopposed. Robert Bishop,
incumbent, and Morris
Foster and Travis Hale were
elected. Voter turnout was
extremely poor, with the
three candidates receiving
35 votes each in the city;
with 600 registered voters.

McCarty Sentenced 35 Years For Murder

Christopher McCarty of
Deport received a sentence
of 35 years for the murder of
James Harris of Fulbright as
McCarty's request for
probation was denied last
Thursday.

The nine woman, three
man jury heard closing
arguments from the
seventeen witnesses
presented by the state on
Wednesday, and spent
around four hours con-
sidering punishment on
Thursday.

The case was heard in
Sixth District Court with
Judge David Moore
presiding in the absence of
Judge Henry Braswell,
recuperating from surgery.
Assistant County Attorney
Ed Ellis called a number of

witnesses to reconstruct
the events of Friday, November
26, 1982. The state contended
that these events led to the
arrival of James Harris at
the McCarty residence.

Harris was found face
down in a water-filled ditch
in front of the McCarty home
on Highway 271, Deport on
Saturday morning.

Dr. Marshall K.
Dougherty, local pathologist,
testified that Harris died as a
result of suffocation and or
drowning. Dougherty said
that during an autopsy
several bruises on Harris'
neck were discovered, and
that the autopsy indicated
that he had been deprived of
oxygen for a period of time.

That, he told the jury, could
have caused un-
consciousness which
resulted in death if the man
was lying with his nose and
mouth restricted.

Harris had gone, ac-
cording to the testimony of
relatives, to the McCarty
residence looking for his
cousin, Dorothy Smith, after
a disturbance at the Mc-
Carty home.



Mrs. Smith is the sister of
Mrs. McCarty.

Charlene Harris, the dead
man's wife, testified that he
failed to come home Friday
night after leaving around 10
p.m. to go and find Mrs.
Smith.

The defense presented no
witnesses in the case.

McCarty's attorney, after
the verdict of guilty was
returned, asked that Mc-
Carty be granted a 10 year or
less sentence and receive
probation.

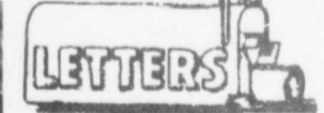
Lamar County Attorney
Tom Wells, presenting the
closing argument in the
case, said that probation
would be "a slap on the
wrist" for such an offense.

McCarty took the stand
Thursday morning as a
character witness in his own
behalf and professed his
innocence in the matter and
asked for probation.

Leslie Echols of Paris
served as counsel for Mc-
Carty.

The jury denied the plea
for probation and sentenced
him to 35 years in the Texas
Department of Corrections
for the murder.

McCarty is currently in
custody at Lamar County
Jail, and, according to Chief
Deputy Gibson, will
probably be transferred to
the State Department of
Corrections around April 26
if McCarty does not appeal
the verdict.

THE SINGLE VISION LENS
When most people get their first pair of eyeglasses or contact lenses, more often than not they're made with single-vision lenses. This doesn't mean they can see only in one direction. Nor at only one distance. The "single" stands for just one set of optical corrections in the lens.

The single-vision lens can be for reading or for seeing at a distance. It all depends on the problem that needs correcting.



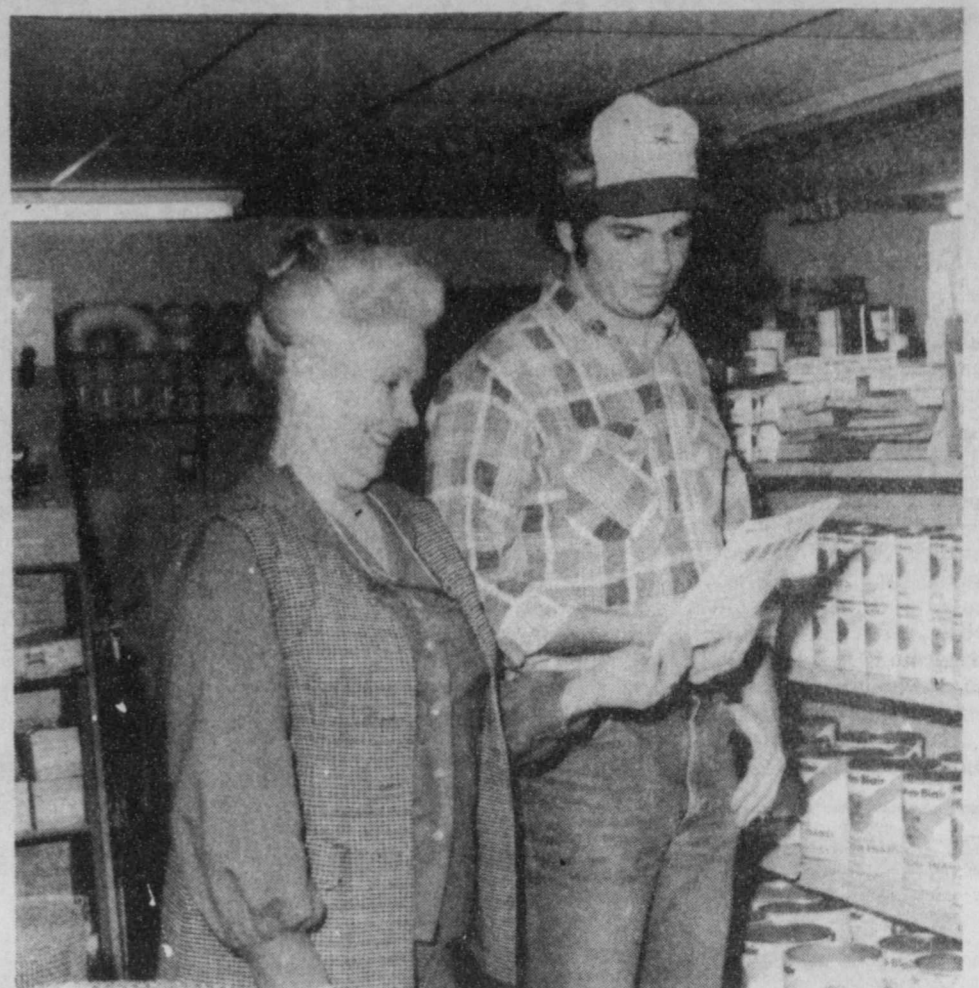
