Granddad Jeffus' are frequently associated with cold winter mornings and waffles cooking. Grandmother Marshall's often came when roaming her precious rocky hillsides or creeks.

Cast back to childhood...take a look back and see if you can't bring up a few of those stories of long-past days and people. Tell them...even if some of the details are hazy...for they will undoubtedly enrich some youngsters life as yours was.

And sometime they may say "way down in Northeast Texas...I listened..."

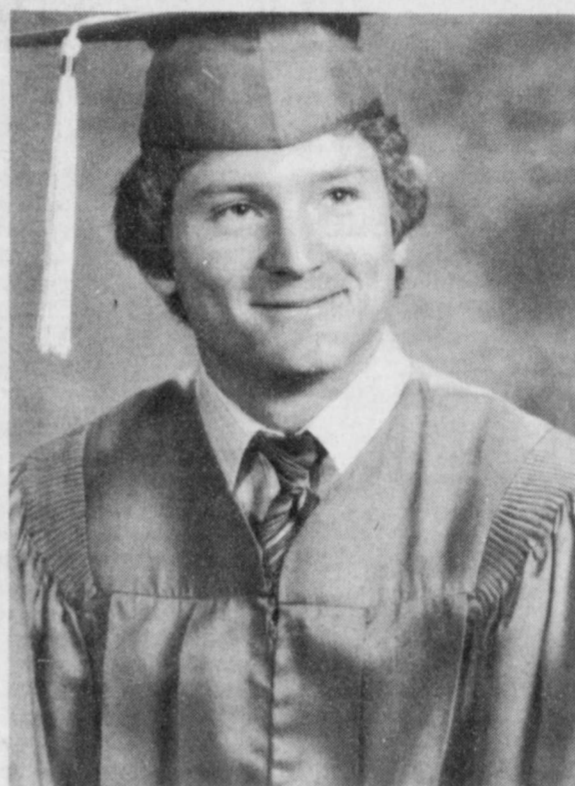
Academic awards sweaters are given each year to those graduates who

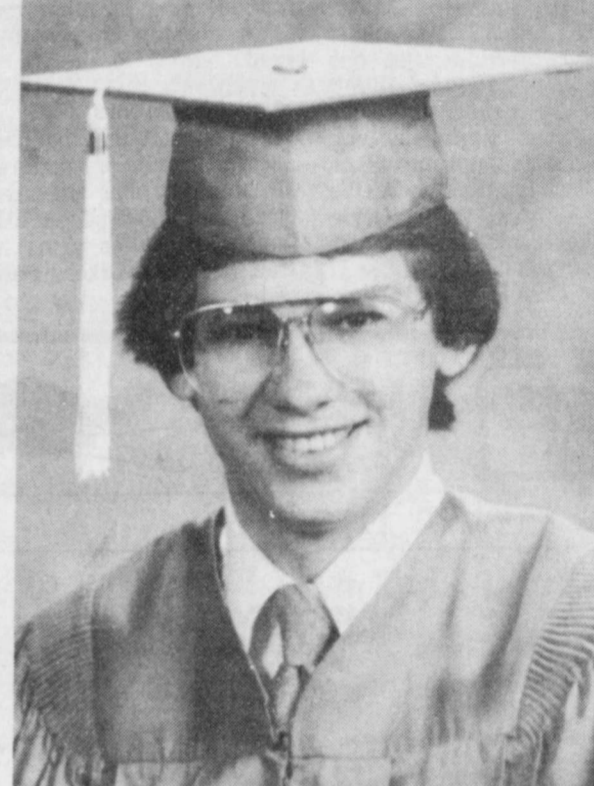

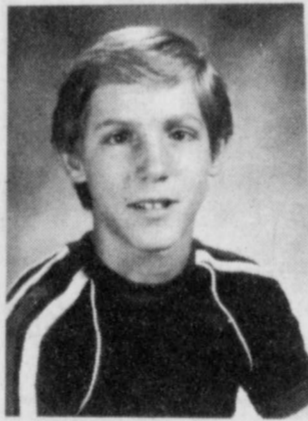
Barbi Rackliff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Scott

### Second Quarter Income Due

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to make estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Generally, if you have income, with no tax withheld, of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$300 on this year's return, you are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax and for making payments.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return, Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments.

## Weekly Agricultural Briefs

Several plant diseases are beginning to show up, says Dr. George Phillee, pathologist for TAES. Uncontrolled, these diseases will have a detrimental effect on the production and growth of the plants.

Peach leaf curl is appearing in some peach orchards. This disease usually occurs during a long, cool spring and subsides when the weather gets hot. Phillee says it is too late for fungicide applications. Many commercial peach producers use Kocide in the fall to help control the disease.

Stripe rust is prevalent in many wheat fields. This is also a cool weather disease and tends to go away in hot weather. Each field must be judged individually to determine whether to apply fungicides for control.

In ornamentals, black spot on roses is beginning to appear. A spray schedule with Benomyl, Funginex or other fungicides should be followed. Azalea leaf gall is affecting azaleas and

camellias. The disease thickens and deforms the leaves. If the infestation is small, pick off and destroy the leaves. If the infestation is heavy, prepare to spray next year when growth begins with Zineb.

Dampening off or seedling disease should end with warm weather. Plants in the garden will begin growing rapidly with warm weather and form a thick canopy. Several tomato diseases, such as early blight, Septoria blight and fruit rots may occur under these conditions. Staking tomatoes will help keep the fruit off the ground and prevent fruit rot. When diseases first appear, spray with an approved fungicide and get an early start on control, Phillee advises.

Another example is pork, which has been high in recent weeks. Pork, along with poultry, is a good buy right now.

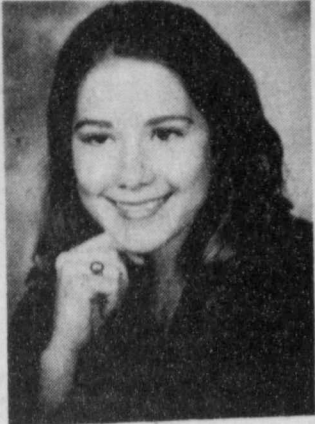
The best buy is usually the whole shoulder rather than a boneless half, for some of the most tender tidbits are around the bone.

# Weekly Agricultural Update

By Paul D. Payne

A large crowd of area beef cattle producers attended the special breed sale of Limousin cattle last Saturday in Paris. At the end of the day, the 81 lots of cattle had found new pastures to roam in this area as well as Missouri.

Limousin pair consigned by James Hart of Paris. The thirteen head of bred cows averaged \$807. Hart consigned the top two selling in this category at \$1025 and \$985. Association members were pleased with the number of buyers making

their first purchase of Limousin cattle at the sale. The association is to be commended on putting together such a fine offering of quality cattle for area producers. Arkansas and Louisiana. The cattle averaged \$907 per head with the top price

being paid for a couple of fullblood cattle consigned by Lowder Limousin of Canton, and high selling bull purchased by H.R. McMinn of Pittsburg for \$1950 while the fullblood heifer sold for \$1850 to Joe Staley of Nacogdoches. The 47 head of cow-calf

pairs averaged \$927. Gene Dykes of Honey Grove made the top purchase in this category at \$1700 for a black Insects are becoming active on many crops throughout East Texas, according to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Pecan nut casebearers have emerged in the southern portions of East Texas and

should emerge along the line of Interstate 20 about May 10-15. Farther north, activity should begin about May 20. Robinson suggests looking at the nutlets to check for eggs and small larvae. When one to two percent of the nutlets have larvae present, treatment should begin. Aphids are still active in home gardens. Treatment for squash bugs should begin

when the eggs hatch and small nymphs appear. Early detection and treatment is essential for good control. Add one-fourth teaspoon dishwashing detergent per gallon of spray solution for a surfactant. This makes the insecticide stick to the plant better. Thiodan 50 percent wettable powder and seven 50 percent wettable powder have been effective in squash bug control.

Robin says that scale crawlers are emerging on ornamentals. Treatment with orthene, malathion or diazinon should give good control. A repeat treatment in seven days may be required.

### CONSUMER CHECKLIST



#### CARPET SHOPPING

Careful measurement and a few minutes of thought about the daily traffic and activity in the room you're redecorating can help you make the wisest carpet purchase. You may want to consider the new nylon carpets that have soil, stain and static resistance built right in the fiber.

### GARDEN

#### Grow Vegetables In Small Spots

The fact that you don't have enough space for even a small vegetable garden doesn't mean that you can't grow something.

Consider that some plants are not unattractive shrubby—tomatoes, bell peppers and banana peppers, for example. You can place a few plants here and there, in the yard or beside the house, wherever you have good soil and sunlight.

A few plants will provide plenty of tomatoes for the average family. The same is true of bell peppers and most varieties of banana peppers are prolific.

Cucumbers offer good production from a limited amount of space if they are trained to climb a fence or a trellis. Unless you plan to make pickles, one or two plants will produce enough cucumbers for the table. You can pickle or preserve cucumbers, but they should not be frozen.

Squash takes up about three feet of space, but one plant will produce enough for the average family to enjoy on a regular basis. Squash takes about seven weeks from



planting to maturity and production usually lasts through summer.

If you like radishes, you can sow enough seed in a 4 ft. x 4 ft. space to enjoy radishes whenever you want them, for as long as they last. Some varieties take a little more than three weeks from planting to the time small radishes are ready to add flavor to your favorite salad.

Pick your favorite vegetable, whatever it may be, and set out three or four plants. You'll enjoy taking care of them, watching them grow; but the best moment of all will be when they come to the table as the fruits of your labor.

**SIGNS OF HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE**

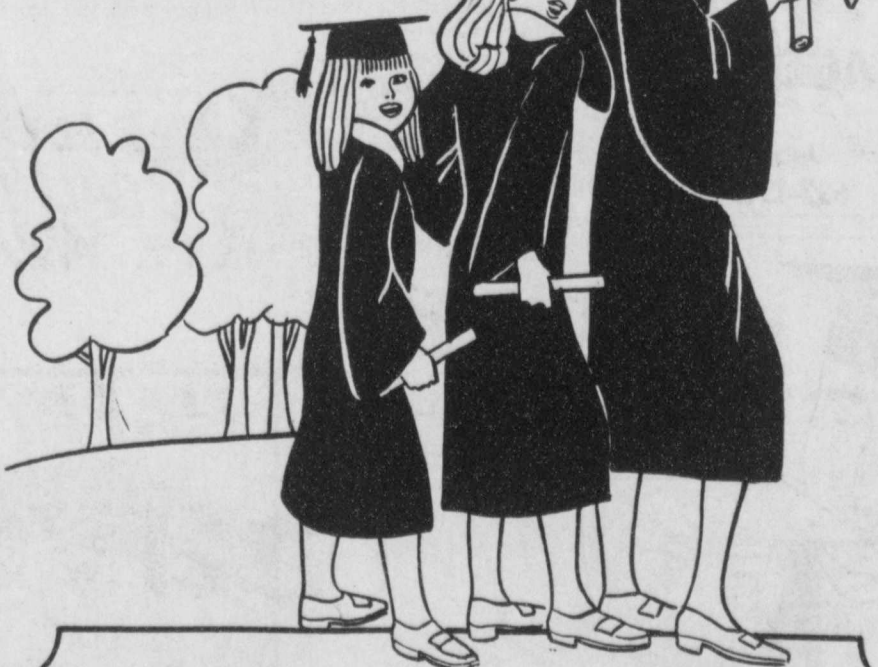

### Tips For The Amateur Photographer

Photography as a hobby can be one of the most rewarding...and inexpensive hobbies imaginable.

Investment in equipment can be as expensive, or as inexpensive as the individual desires. And it is simple to learn basics and proceed on to more complex forms of the art.

Few other hobbies can provide a creative sense of fulfillment, and record family history and events too.

Although 35mm cameras offer a wide range of effects, angles and challenges, they aren't by any means mandatory to enjoying photography.

In this column, we will endeavor to help amateurs eliminate some of the most common mistakes in photography, and later will proceed into more complex situations. We will also attempt to cover some basic camera and film care.

Simple 110 or polaroid cameras can be used for a wide variety of photos.

One of the first rules of photography is taking into account exactly what you are shooting. It is important to remember that backgrounds that do not even show up much to the eye will look obvious in a photograph.

Wires, messy book shelves, clutter of any sort will detract from a subject or grouping.

Shooting into the light will cause a silhouette effect that may leave figures black. It is best never to shoot into the sun or a strong light source, such as a window, unless the outline effect is desired.

Frequently, however, making subjects face the sun causes a "squint" that is unattractive. One way to

eliminate this is by facing people so that the light hits them sideways. Or, if this cannot be done, have them close their eyes, then open them on the count of three. Snap the picture then, before they have time to squint!

So, look carefully for attractive backgrounds. Shrubs, trees or flowers look good outdoors. Inside, curtained areas, if the light isn't strong, fireplaces with mantles, rocking chairs or similar settings make nice pictures.

Frequently people take pictures which would be wonderful except that there is a dark area, a black spot or blurriness.

One of the most common problems is the fact that for some reason, we feel there is some pressure to take a picture in a hurry! We have this group of people waiting and we mustn't keep them that way long. But it only takes a few seconds more to eliminate common problems that can spoil a snapshot.

One of the most common is cutting off people's heads or feet. The simple way to remedy that is to take a GOOD LOOK through the viewfinder. Don't look just at the faces...make sure that the viewfinder frame leaves a little space above the heads and at the sides of the picture.

Make sure that one area of the picture isn't very dark and the other light. This happens frequently when some of the group or subject is under shade such as trees, sheds, etc. and the rest in bright sunlight. It is difficult to take a good mountain picture down in a valley on a narrow road or space because of this...one side is always brightly lit and the other heavily shaded.

It is easy with a 110

camera to get a finger or strap across the lens. This is because you see the subject through one opening, and the lens is in another. Therefore you can't see when something is across the lens just by looking through the viewfinder. Always check to make sure that nothing is in front of the opening on the camera.

The next most common problem is fuzziness. This can be caused by something being out of focus, in cameras where focusing is necessary. Again, when focusing, take TIME to look carefully that the main objective in the photo is clear, and really sharp!

The next cause for it, even

on cameras that don't require focusing, is movement. Stand firmly, with legs spread slightly and one in front of the other. Hold the camera steady, and then MAKE SURE YOU DON'T JERK when you press the shutter. Shooting a picture is like shooting a gun...squeeze down slowly on the shutter button. For some reason, many people stab at it, causing a slight dip in the equipment. This results in a fuzzy photo.

Again, practice these things along. Don't ever be afraid to take pictures. For every truly outstanding photo, there are dozens of them that are still good pictures you can treasure.

## Fertilizing Pastures Important

Fertilizing is very important for the establishment and maintenance of grasses. Even though fertilizer may not be required for establishment, it is needed to maintain production. "Fertilizers insure more protein and minerals for plant use, resulting in better livestock production," said Soil Conservationist, Steve R. Smith.

There are four major plant nutrients needed by pastures; nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and calcium. A shortage in one or more of the nutrients will result in poor plant response.

Nitrogen's most important function is to stimulate plant growth. It is also the key plant nutrient in grass production.

Potassium, commonly referred to as potash, increases stalk strength and aids in disease resistance.

Phosphorus is necessary for plant industry, root development and seed formation. It is also the key plant nutrient in legume production.

Calcium is the principal plant nutrient found in limestone. It promotes proper root and stem development. Limestone is applied to correct the acidity of the soil. Most plants will grow best with a pH of about 6.5.

On low fertility soils without adequate fertilizer and lime, it is impractical to try to establish stands of desirable pasture plants.

Coastal and common bermudagrass are yellowish-green and short when fertilizer is needed. While clovers and other legumes will disappear when the soil content of phosphorus and potash becomes low.

To establish coastal or common bermudagrass for example, apply fertilizer and lime according to a current soil analysis. However, without a soil analysis, apply a fertilizer mixture with a 3-1-2 ratio of nitrogen phosphorus and potash.

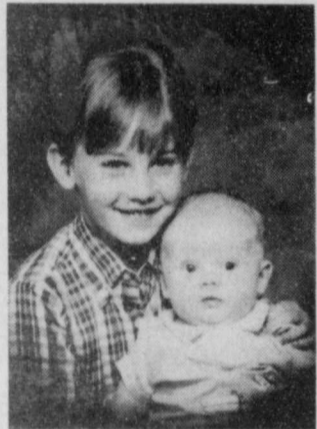

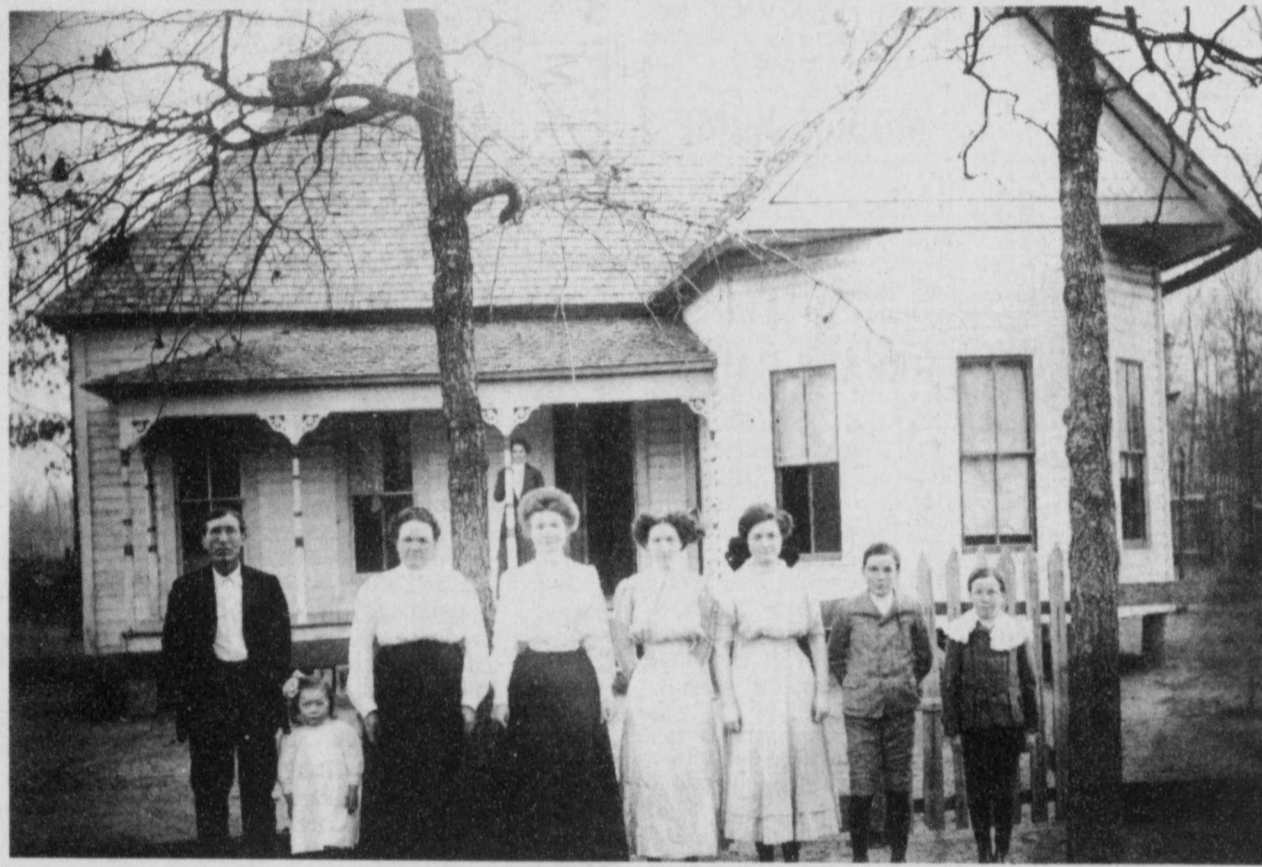
