Titus-R R Accident Statistics Noted

In Titus County, troopers worked 21 accidents during April with no fatalities, but 13 people were injured in nine accidents.

Red River County troopers records show 12 accidents during April with

four people being injured in three of the accidents. One fatality was recorded.

Rural traffic accidents were down 17 percent and deaths decreased 15 percent in the 18 county Tyler High-

way Patrol District during the first four months of 1983 compared to the same period of 1982.

Thirty-nine rural fatal crashes claimed 48 lives through April compared to

45 fatal accidents which killed 57 persons through April, 1982.

During April, 1983, rural accidents within the district totaled 442 with 14 fatal

accidents killing 17 people and 171 accidents causing injury to 276 people.

Texas Veterans Bill Would Provide Housing Assistance

Texas veterans will have the opportunity to purchase a home through the Veterans Housing Assistance Program if it is approved by voters as a constitutional amendment in November, Garry Mauro announced. The legislature completed action Tuesday on a measure which will provide a loan of up to \$20,000 for eligible Texas veterans to purchase a house.

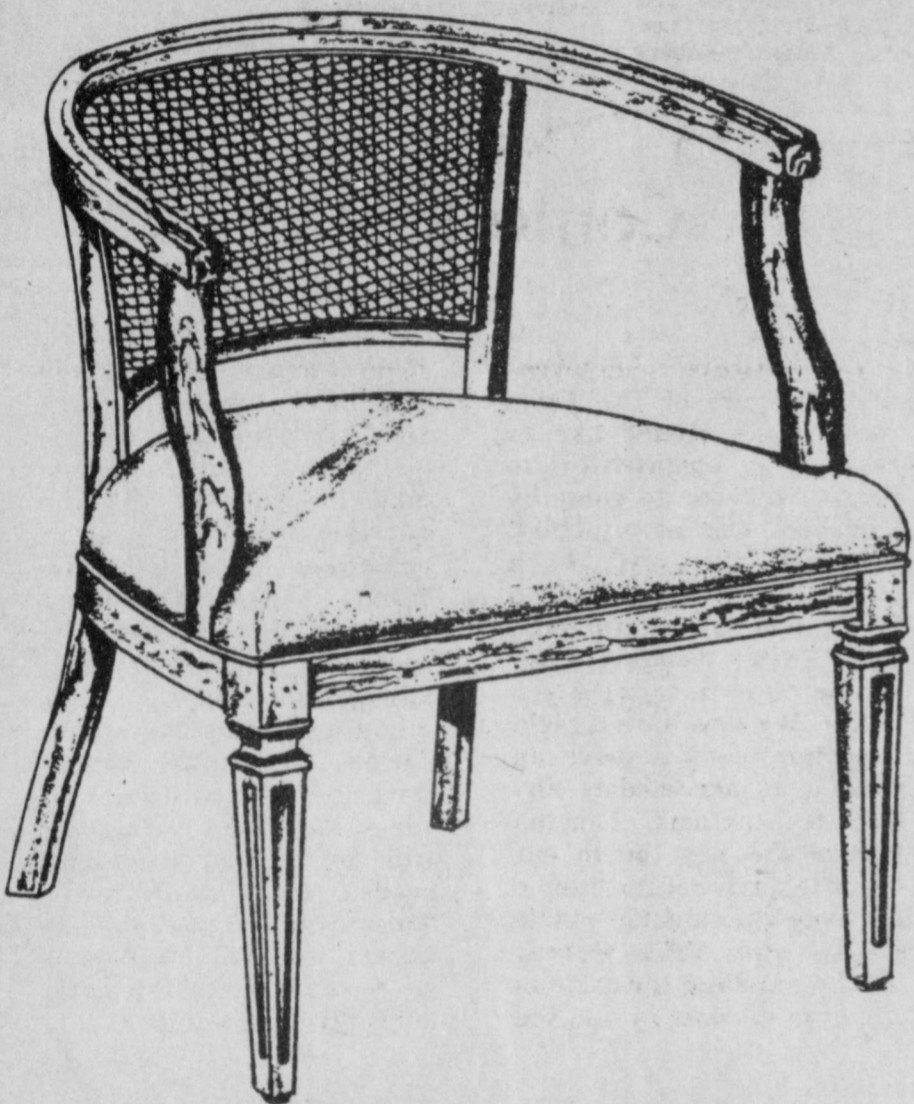
The proposed amendment will allow for the sale of \$500 million in bonds for the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program and \$300 million for continuation of the Veterans Land Program. The election is set for November 8, 1983.

Mauro said private businesses and the entire state economy will benefit from the establishment of the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program. "Existing lending institutions will administer the housing program so we will not have to create another state agency or bureaucracy. We will also

stimulate construction of 25,000 new homes and provide another 45,000 jobs for people in Texas. This program is the best example of the cooperation between government and private enterprise which can work to benefit all people," Mauro stated. Texas currently has more than 1.6 million veterans including 525,000 Vietnam era veterans.

"The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program has the support of our state leaders, veterans organizations, lending institutions and thousands of other Texans. I am hopeful Texas will agree with me in November in voting for this program and the continuation of the Veterans Land Program," Mauro said.

HOW DIABETES THREATENS VISION

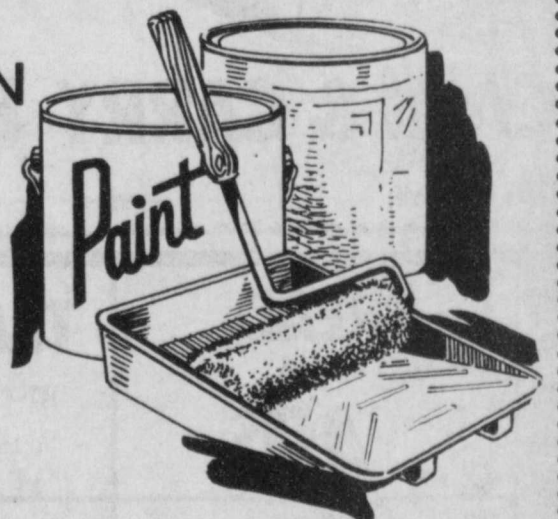

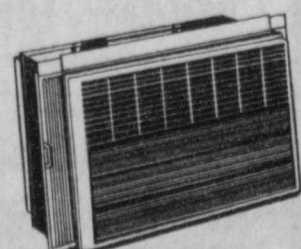

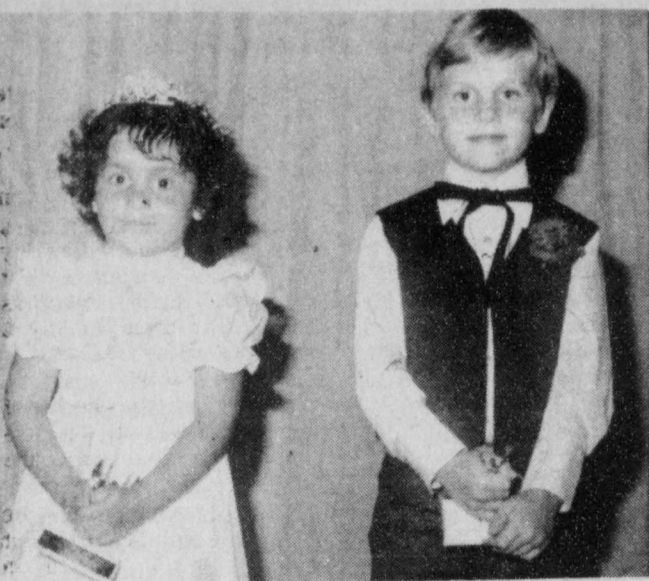

Agricultural Briefs

By Paul D. Payne
Scattered outbreaks of Armyworms in county wheat fields, particularly in the western part of the county are being reported by farmers. It is my opinion that chemical treatment cannot be justified at this time unless the worms are feeding heavily on the grain.

Most wheat is beginning to turn color which would indicate that the leaves have served their purpose. The grain has entered the dough stage and harvest is two weeks or so away; so do not sink any more money in this year's crop by spraying at this late date.

Wheat farmers who applied chemicals to wheat for rust control are encouraged to get yield information the treated and untreated areas. This type information will be useful not only to the farmer who treated but to the wheat farmers and agribusiness leaders of the area. I would be interested in knowing of your results.

We anticipate the time to spray pecan trees for casebearer control to be 10 days later this year than normal. This is due to the cool temperatures this spring and the lateness of the adult casebearer to emerge. Based on present projections, it would appear that spraying should not take place before June 1. More exact dates will be given later.

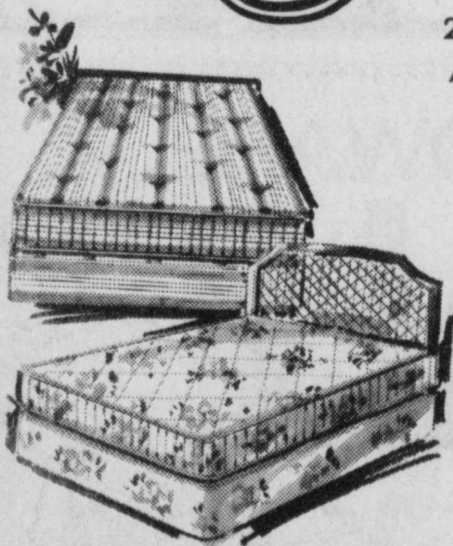

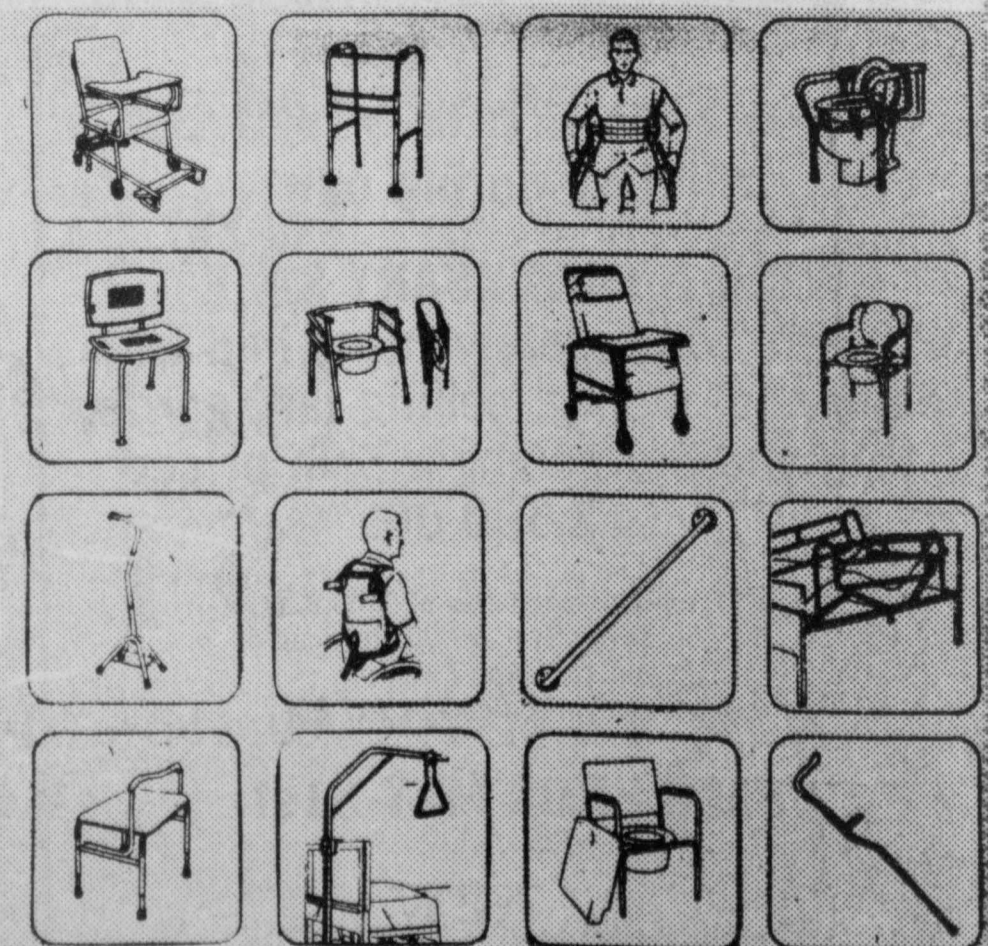
Give Special Attention To Mildew, Blistering Problems

What causes mildew on book covers and how should it be removed?

Mildew results from high humidity. There is no uniform method of mildew removal, as book covering materials may differ in water sensitivity. Books of recent vintage usually can be cleaned with a damp cloth. Older books are often more water sensitive and should be cleaned with denatured alcohol. Some covers may be sensitive to both water and denatured alcohol. Regardless of the age of the book and the type treatment you think it needs, test the cleaner you decide to use on the inside edge of the binding before you proceed.

I used a quality paint two summers ago when I painted my home and already I detect signs of blistering. I was careful to follow the paint manufacturer's directions, so what may I have done that was wrong?

Blistering usually results from the fact that there is moisture behind the paint. Exterior surfaces should never be painted unless they are thoroughly dry. Sometimes moisture may penetrate and blister interior walls because there is no moisture barrier.

I am back to work as of this week and so grateful for all my Bogata friends, they can't be beaten anywhere.

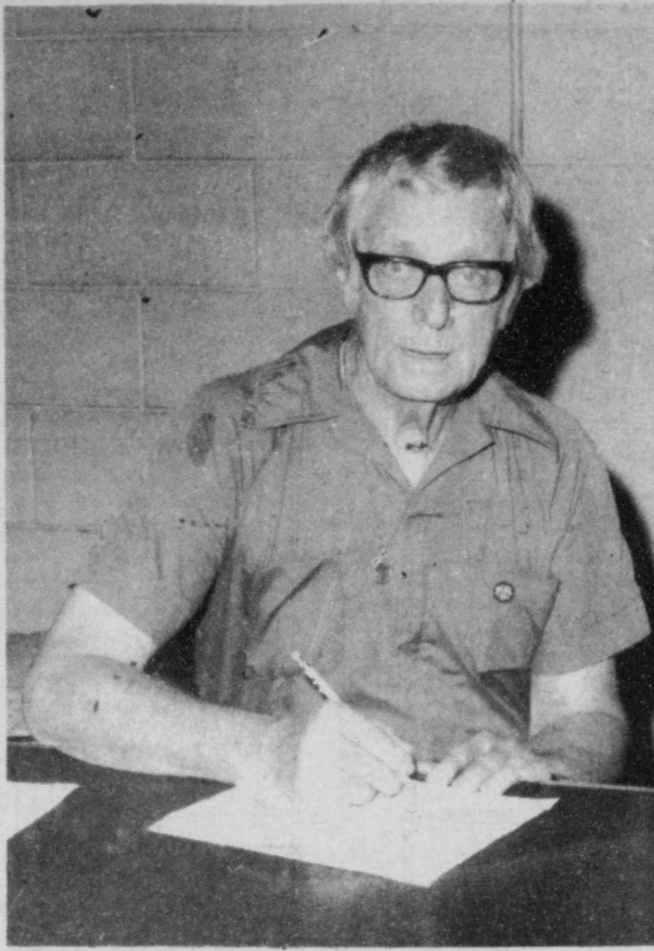
I just want to say to you good Bogata people, when you pass a PIG, give it more respect, (I had never been

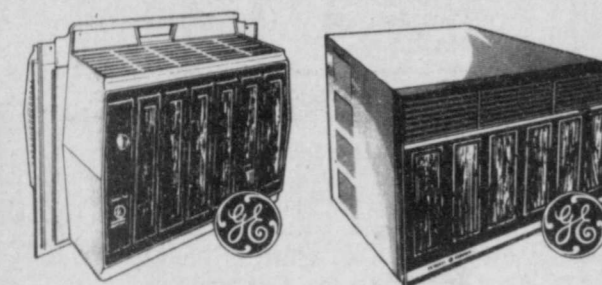
