Key To Preventing Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever has been identified as the cause of death of a 10-year old girl from Tool, Texas near Cedar Creek Reservoir in Henderson County. According to Region 5 and Region 7 public health officials, the characteristic skin rash, so important for a correct diagnosis, failed to appear in her case until one day before death. It was disclosed that she had found a tick attached to her scalp two weeks prior to becoming ill.

Quoting Dr. Jim Lovick, Region 7 Zoonosis Control Veterinarian, there have been five cases so far in Region 7, the northeastern part of Texas. Region 5, the 19 county area surrounding Dallas and Ft. Worth has had 38 cases confirmed so far this year compared with only 21 during all of last year. Two other deaths from this disease have occurred earlier this year. All health officials agree that because of the mild winter, heavier than normal tick infestations will be seen.

RMSF is a serious tick-borne disease that has a high mortality if not diagnosed and treated early. Children are often the victim, probably because they are more likely to be exposed to ticks. Ticks will

continue to be active until the first frost.

The key to preventing this disease lies in following these rules, Dr. Lovick said:

1. avoid tick infested areas.
2. use repellants if going into woods.
3. inspect yourself and your children every three to four hours with prompt and careful removal of ticks.
4. keep family dogs tick-free by use of dips.
5. Inspect them regularly for ticks. They show no apparent symptoms when infected with RMSF.
6. Exercise care when removing ticks from yourself or from animals.

Symptoms of RMSF usually appear three to ten days after being bitten by an infected tick, and may include chills, nausea, fever, headache, and muscular aches. A rash usually appears about the third day and can spread over the entire body. An individual with a history of tick bite followed by illness symptoms should seek the advice of their family physician.

between 1 and 6 p.m. Entries in this building include educational booths, preserved food, household textiles, sewing, art show, and crafts and hobbies.

Horticulture Exhibits are to be checked in on Tuesday, September 20 between 1 and 6 p.m.

Produce entries are to be checked in Wednesday, September 21, between 1 and 8 p.m.

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Footprints From The Past

I just spent the weekend in Dallas with a family that had some little kids and it seemed that everything that they were told to do they would not and everything that they were told not to do they would do. I guess that kids have not changed very much from when I was a small kid.

I remember that one time my parents were in the field picking cotton and as me and my little brother were too small to leave by ourselves, they carried us to the field and told us to play around the wagon, but not to climb up in the wagon as it was too high and we might fall, well we started to play and after a while we grew tired of what we were playing so we started to look at the wagon and it sure did look like it would be fun to climb up in the wagon and play in the cotton, so that is

what we did or at least what we started to do. I made it into the wagon and I was the oldest, I think that I was about five at the time so that would make Jack about three years old, well Jack never made it into the wagon as he was about to put his leg into the wagon he slipped and fell head first luckily his head missed the wheel but his shoulder did not and he broke his collar bone and that sure did stop all the cotton picking for that day for by the time they got him to the doctor and got his collar bone fixed it was too late to go back to the field and as I remember we never did get to go back that year. Sure wish it had applied when I got bigger.

Back in those days when the farmers got their cotton ginned if it was not selling for as much as the farmer thought it should he would store it some place and wait for the price to go up. Well, Dad had some of his cotton ginned and it was not as high a price as he thought it should be so he brought it home and stored it in the back of the yard and when

he unloaded it all of our little playmates and us were watching so Dad told us to be sure and not play around the bales of cotton or we might get hurt and to be sure and not have any matches anywhere around as we may set it on fire. When all the cotton was unloaded Dad went back to work and I went in the house and got me a big hand full of matches and made a run for where the cotton was stored.

We were all playing all over the bales of cotton and of course we got tired of what we were playing and then is when I got out my matches and began to strike the matches on the metal bands that were tied around the cotton to keep it in the bales. Well I was doing just great with my match striking with everyone telling me to stop, but I was so smart that I thought that I could put the matches to the cotton and not set it on fire and I was doing pretty well at it that is until I got to my last match and that is the one that did it, the cotton caught on fire and we could not put it out so we all run

home that is all except me and I run and crawled under the smoke house. We were all too scared to go to the house and tell what I had done and I guess every bale of cotton would have burned except one of my uncles came by and saw what was going on and he run and got something to put it out with, but not before one bale was completely destroyed.

When they got the fire out they began to look for all the kids and they found everyone except me and I did not come out from under the smoke house until it was dark and everyone was worried to death about me. When it got dark and I got hungry I came out from under the smoke house and by then they were so glad to see me that all I got was a good talking to. Watering Of Trees Can Be Crucial

This week's article will focus on watering. When establishing an orchard, watering is the number two problem.

All horticulture crops in Texas require a minimum of one inch of water per week during the growing season and two inches is optimum. Horticulture crops should also never go more than three weeks without water. An irrigation system would be the ideal way to provide supplemental water for large orchards. However, small back yard orchards can be watered easily from the garden hose. First year pecans, peaches and grapes require the same amount of water. In April and May, give them seven gallons per week; in July and August, 28 gallons per week and during the winter, 28 gallons ever 45 days.

Maximum water for grapes is 56 gallons per week, so starting the third year this is the most water grapes should receive in any one week.

Maximum water for peaches is 40 gallons per day, so starting the fourth year this is the optimum amount of water for mature peach trees.

Maximum water for pecans is 120 gallons per day, so starting the eighth year this is the optimum amount of water for mature pecan trees.

By following these guidelines, your pecan trees, peaches and grapes should receive the right amount of water. Overwatering is a very common problem and is also detrimental so in addition to these suggestions, you should also check the soil moisture with your hand, and if the soil is still wet from the last rain or watering, it would be a good idea to delay the next watering.

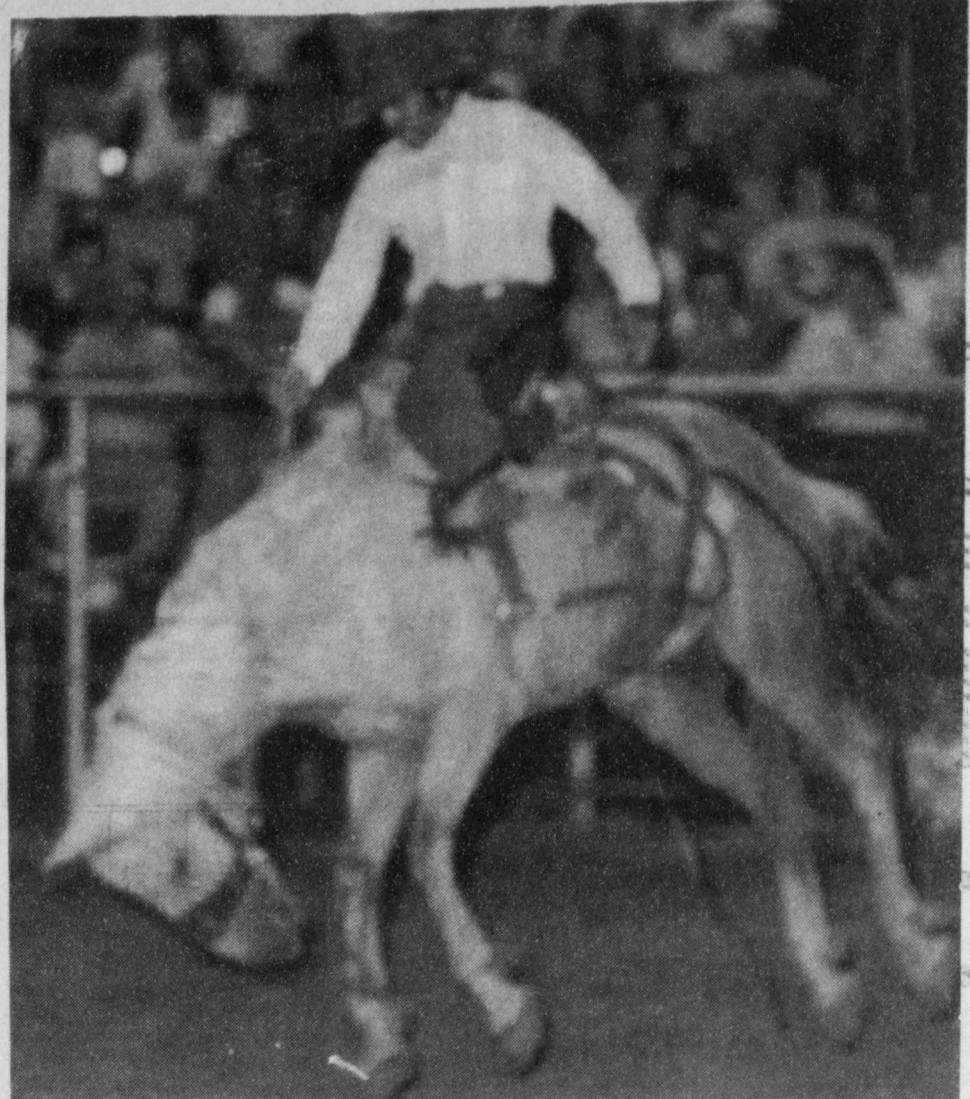

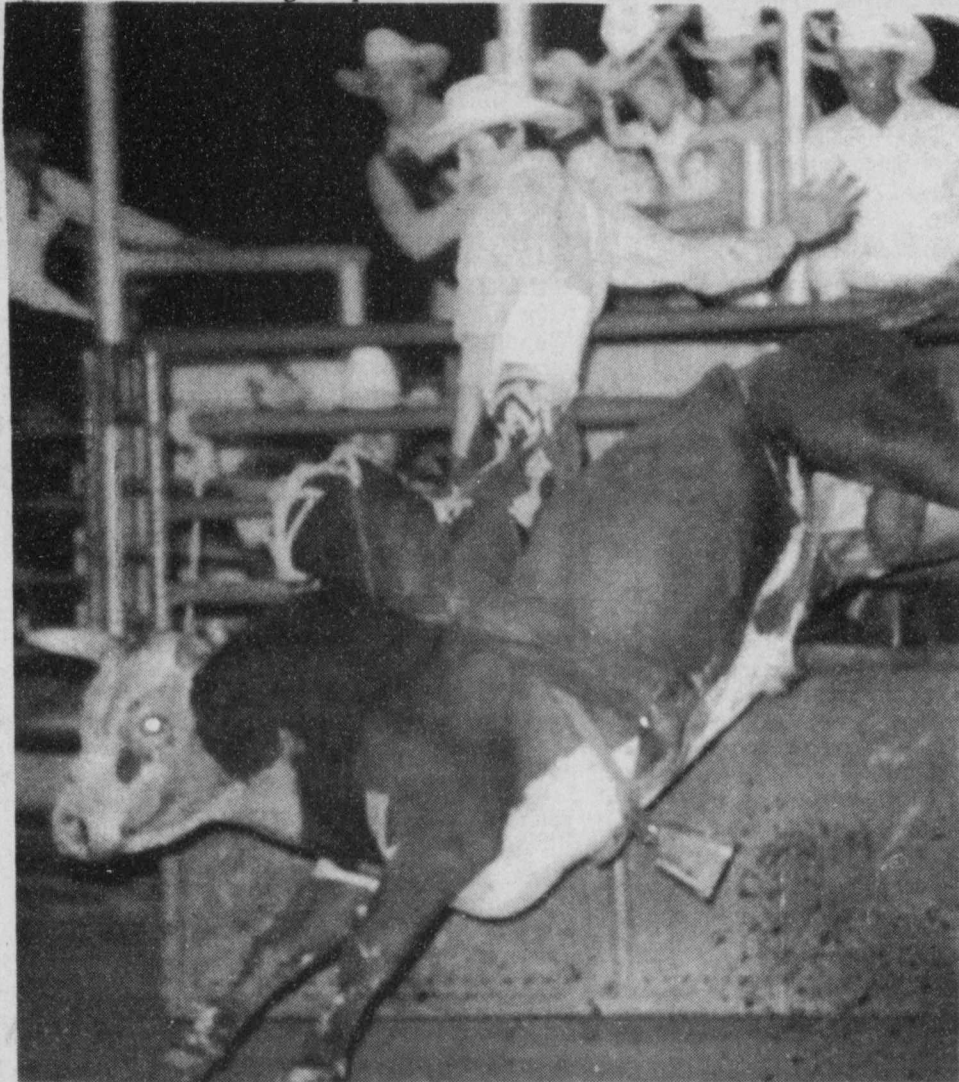

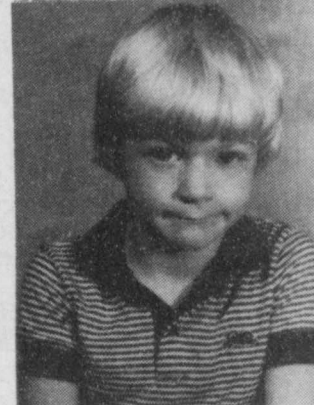

BANK DEPOSITS

 Virtually every bank savings account in the United States is insured against loss up to \$100,000 for each account by an agency of the federal government. The agency is called the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or FDIC.

The FDIC, which was created after the bank holiday in the early 1930s, also serves as a part of the bank regulatory process, along with the Federal Reserve System, the Comptroller of the Currency and in some cases state banking agencies.

The idea of banks pooling a portion of their funds is not new in this country. In 1819 the Suffolk Bank of Boston began redeeming the notes of other banks, so long as the bank issuing the notes had paid into a redemption fund (like the FDIC pool) established by the Suffolk bank.

Funds paid into the insurance pool to protect depositors' accounts do not come from taxpayers' pockets. The F D I C pool is financed by the banks themselves who each year pay a certain percentage of funds into the FDIC.
