## Soy Bean, Milo, Harvest Looks Good

Area farmers are beginning to harvest early soybeans and milo crops, and are pleased with the heavy yields that they are getting so far.

A wet spring allowed milo heads to fill out, in spite of some losses to midge, a small moth which destroys the individual grains of milo.

Soybeans reaped much the same benefits from the rains, with a heavy bloom

stage having enough moisture to keep the blooms on the plants and develop into a well-filled bean pod.

Many soybeans in the area will not be harvested until much later, however, since they were planted behind a wheat crop.

The dry weather which set in suddenly at the last of July may affect those beans.

Prices on soybeans are also up from last year,

partially because of the heavy participation in the PIK program, which cut down sharply on the number of acres of grain sorghum and soybeans planted.

Cotton farmers, however, are not nearly so pleased. The cool, wet spring and serious insect infestation has created a cotton crop that looks to be one of the poorest in many years, according to several area cotton producers.

Cotton prices are not up, even though the terrible drought situation in west Texas and the PIK program has reduced cotton acreage in the United States by an estimated one-third.

poor, in fact, that many

farmers figured spraying for the insects would cost more than the profit for increasing the yield would make. Others, however, initiated a late spraying program in an attempt to salvage what they could.

In all, farm prospects, the farming is the major source of income throughout most of the area, are somewhat better than last year. Hopefully the area's agricultural economy will improve to the point where

farmers will not constantly be on the brink of financial disaster and can once again make a reasonable profit.

Many agriculture experts, however, think that time may still be quite a way into the future.

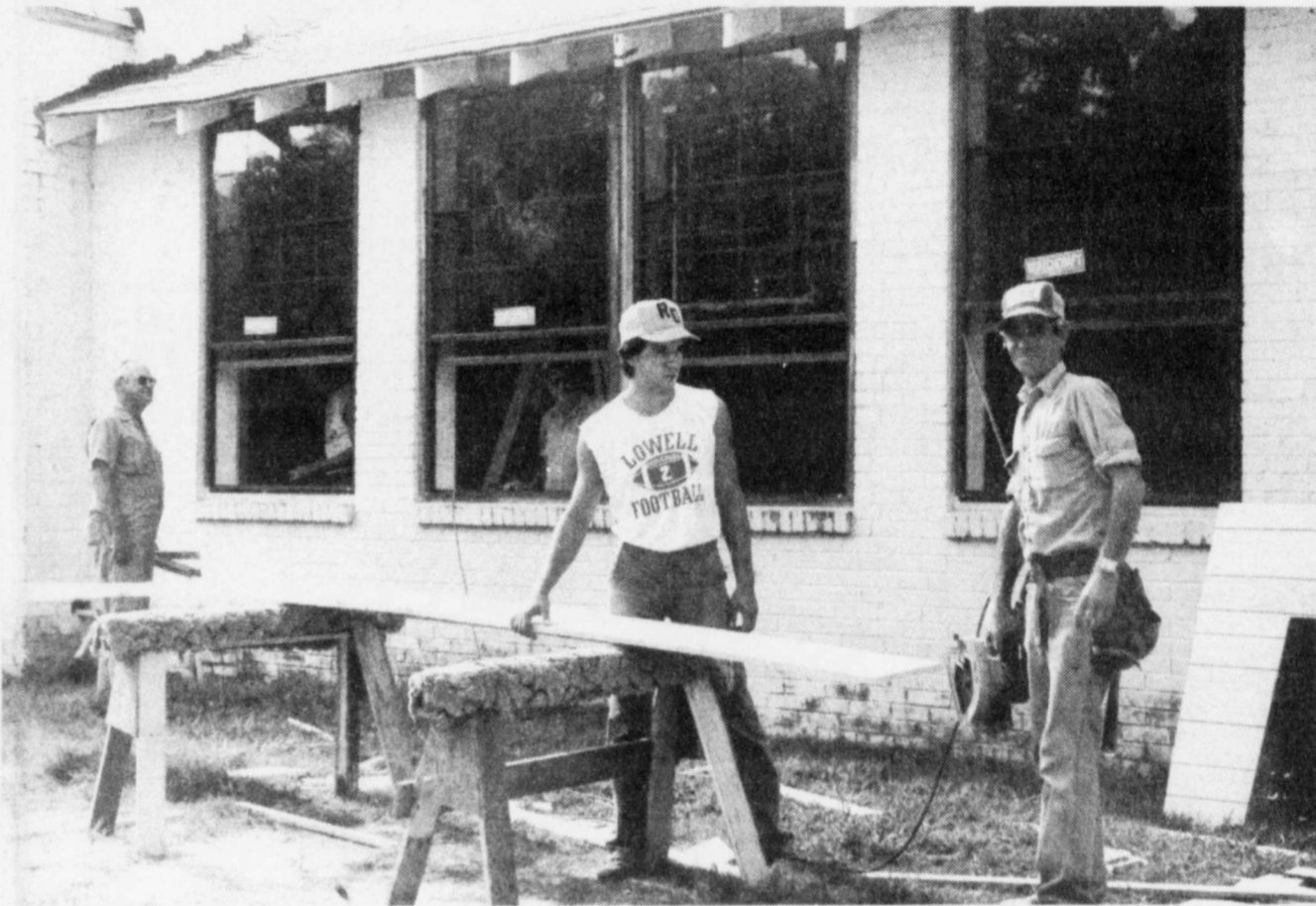

## Talco First Baptist To Celebrate 100th Birthday

The First Baptist Church of Talco will celebrate its one hundredth anniversary Sunday, August 28 beginning at 9:45 a.m. with a homecoming and old fashioned day.

The church was organized September 2, 1883 in Goolsboro, two miles east of

the present Talco townsite with 12 charter members. The first pastor of the church was R.W. Billups.

In 1915, the church was moved from Goolsboro to its present site. The building was remodeled several times until 1957 when a new church was built. On Sunday

night, November 19, 1967, this building and all the contents were destroyed by fire. The present church was completed for May 5 services in 1968.

On Wednesday, June 17, 1981, the church voted to start pouring the foundation for a 30x40 metal building for a fellowship hall. Although the building was

not quite complete on the inside, the church enjoyed a Thanksgiving fellowship in it and by the time the District WMA met with the church in January, all work was completed with the exception of floor covering.

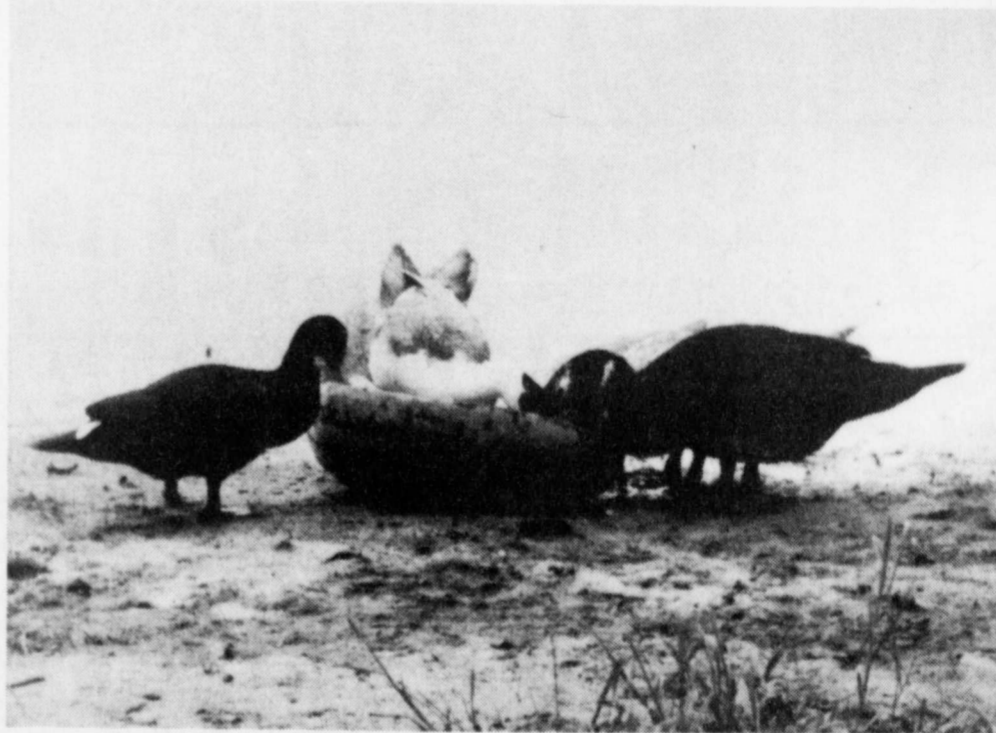
Wesley is a graduate of Northeast Louisiana

ourselves around Great Britain.

Perhaps an explanation might be in order. Well, it isn't learning to drive on the left hand side of the road, although that is certainly different...it is adjusting one's mental attitude in such a manner that survival is possible!

Because the average Britan is kind, courteous and helpful...until he gets behind the wheel of a car!

Then it seems that they all decide they needed to be where they were going on yesterday...and heaven help whoever gets in their way.

They also have a clever little device called a roundabout. This has saved the government millions of pounds in under and overpasses, we are sure. But it is a hairy way to introduce an American to traffic patterns, and there is one every few miles!

They are a complete circle, with various roads splitting off from the left hand or right hand lane, depending how far into the circle one goes. These are not large circles, either, so one goes around with tires screaming, looking for the proper exit.

We had a lot less difficulty after finding out that if there is a broken white line across the lane we were in, it meant for us to yield! Until we found that out...well, I'm afraid we tried the patience of many drivers rather sorely.

The speed limits are 60 mph on the ordinary roads, and 70 on the dual carriageways...what we would call an interstate.

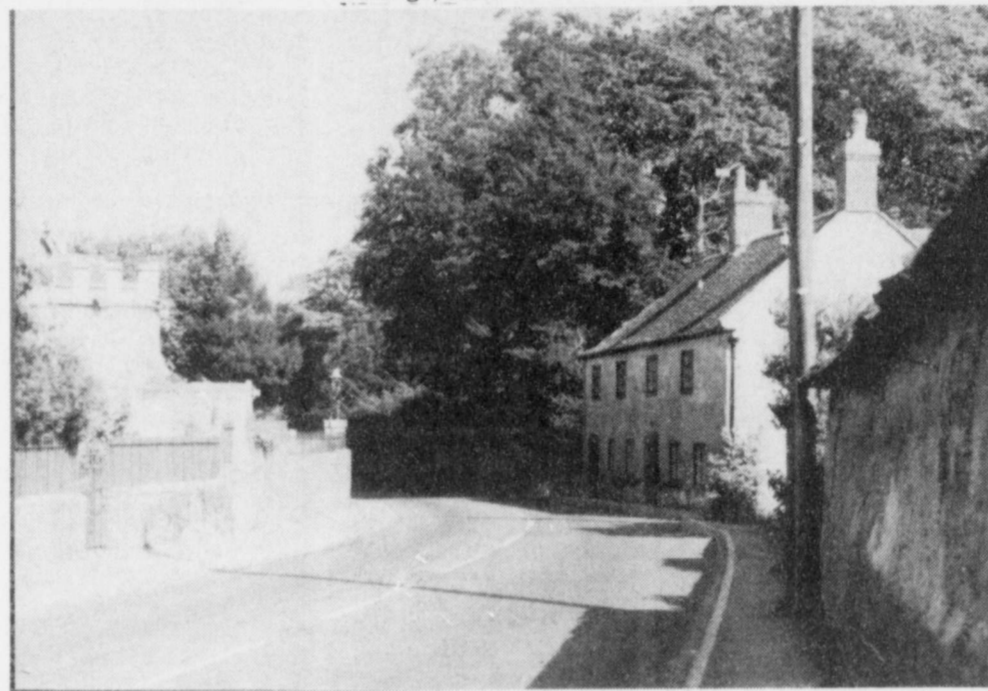
