## MANY IMPROVEMENTS BEING MADE IN HASKELL

Many feet of sidewalks are being put down at this time by the citizens of Haskell and quite a bit of building activity is going on within the city limits. R. V. Robertson is now erecting a modern six room residence on the corner of Lamar and Bradford streets, which will be one of the prettiest homes in the city when completed.

C. D. Grissom is also building a new residence on the corner of Matthew and Bradford streets which will be another splendid home close in. The Kingston-Lancaster brick on Campbell street north of the Farmers State Bank is now under construction and the foundation of these buildings are being put down.

A ten-foot sidewalk is being built from the corner of the square south of the Haskell National Bank on Walton Street to the Ford Garage. Virgil Hudson, R. J. Reynolds and the Dr. J. P. Collier place have recently completed sidewalks, and the city has built many street crossing connecting the walks which is putting Haskell out of the mud.

## Former Haskell County Citizen Dies at Bartlett, Texas.

Below we give a clipping from the Bartlett Tribune of Bell County, of the death of Will Via, who for 10 years was a citizen of Haskell county and moved back to his old home in 1918. He had many friends here who will regret to learn of his passing away.

On last Sunday afternoon at the Temple Sanitarium Will Via, who lived on the Clark-Bolding farm succumbed to an attack of appendicitis. He was taken to the institution Sunday morning, but too late for an operation to be of any avail. He was brought to Bartlett Saturday afternoon to be taken to the sanitarium, but on account of the washouts on the railroad he did not reach Temple until the next day, with the above results.

The remains were brought to Bartlett Monday and on Tuesday, following the funeral services at the home of his brother, Walter Via, were laid to rest in the Bartlett cemetery. Rev. J. A. Siefcoff conducting the services.

Mr. Via was 54 years and 7 days of age. With the exception of a few years, he had resided here for the past 30 years. He was an industrious farmer, and loved by all who knew him. Besides a wife, he leaves seven children—three sons and four daughters—to mourn his death. All were here to attend the funeral, those residing elsewhere being Oscar Via, Byers, Okla., and Mrs. Rucker, Achille, Okla., and Mrs. Sprayberry of Temple.

## ROCHESTER REPORTS HEAVY COTTON RECEIPTS

## LARGE CROWD HEARS PAT M. NEFF HERE THURSDAY

Hon. Pat M. Neff spoke in the district court room here at 2:30 p. m. Thursday to a capacity house, and standing room was at a premium. He was introduced by Judge H. G. McConnell, who offered a few remarks in behalf of Mr. Neff and his standing.

Mr. Neff began his speech by paying a tribute to the large gathering of people that had come from all parts of the county and neighboring towns to hear his discourse. He made the statement that he was his own campaign manager and that his headquarters was the state of Texas that he was occupying wherever he might be during the campaign. His address was remarkably free from personal references both to his opponents for the nomination and to his predecessors in the office to which he aspires. He said "I am running on a platform with reference to what will happen if I am elected to the office of Governor of Texas—not on what has already happened."

He made no reference to the labor question at any time during his speech. He declared himself in favor of a better marketing system for the agricultural producers, better schools for the rural districts, prohibition and woman suffrage, conservation of flood waters and the manufacture of Texas cotton in Texas. In his audience was a good representation of women from all parts of the county, and his speech was greeted throughout with much applause.

A good county fair will place Haskell County where she belongs in a line-up with the banner agricultural counties of the State. We have soil, and climate that is necessary to the production of the very best, and the farmers of Haskell county are a wide-awake, energetic class of men that make farming pay. The County Fair will give us the necessary advertising, bringing before the people of Texas the real hidden treasures that lie within our borders, and pave the way to successful winning in the State Fair.

The Haskell County Poultry Association will co-operate with the County Fair and will have a splendid exhibit of poultry on hand. The stockmen and every other enterprise will be there with the goods when the time rolls around. This promises to be one of the biggest affairs ever held in the county and with the proper management can be perpetuated from year to year and the benefits gained from a real county fair is beyond estimation.

Mr. Whiteaker is now working on the rules and regulations of the management of the County Fair and they will be made public at an early date. Begin today and make plans for your exhibits in whatever line you wish, because the earlier we begin the better we will be prepared in the contest to win a prize.

The dates of the County Fair will be decided on later, it will doubtless be governed by the dates of the Dallas State Fair, in order to enter our products in the State Fair in competition for state prizes.
