

# Rivercrest Rebels Drop Game To Mt. Vernon

The Class AA Rivercrest Rebels dropped their first game in season play to the AAA classes Mt. Vernon Tigers.

In their second possession, the Tigers fumbled on the Rebel's 30 yard line. Kelly Jeffery, Reb quarterback, took advantage of this opportunity to zip a pass to split-end, Bobby Thomas, for a 65 yard touchdown. Stanley Jessee made good on the point after to make the score 7-0, Rebels. There was about four minutes left in the first quarter.

The Tigers gave up four fumbles in the first half, but their defense held the Rebels. Coach Milford Groves said, "We were outweighed man to man and we blew some opportunities in the first half. We lacked about a half step being where we needed to be."

"Mt. Vernon played a tough ballgame. We were just outmanned," he added. "Overall, I was pleased with our boys' performance."

The Tigers pushed 96 yards for a TD in the second quarter to even the score at halftime 7-7.

In the third stanza the Rebels fumbled the ball on their own 11 - Mt. Vernon was ready and immediately made the score. The Tigers were destined to score six more in the same period. Both extra points failed - the first one blocked by Reb defenders. The board read 20-7.

The Rebels then pulled off a spectacular halfback option pass play. Kelly Jeffery tossed to Joel Mangrum who reared back and sailed a pass to James Anderson. Anderson scampered to the end zone for the score. The extra point was no good, 20-13, Tigers.

Mangrum, five foot eleven inch, 160 pound senior, serves as back-up quarterback and also is a member of the defensive squad. Once again the Tigers hit pay dirt with about three minutes left to play in the game. They went 80 yards for the score. This made the final tally 26-13.

## H. Drue Pirtle Appointed Precinct 1 Commissioner

H. Drue Pirtle, a Johnstown rancher and civic leader, was named Friday morning as Commissioner of Red River County Precinct 1, the southwest quadrant, by County Judge Wm. S. (Scotty) Whiteman.

Pirtle will fill the unexpired term of Bruce Scott, who took office Jan. 1, 1981 which will expire Dec. 31, 1984.

Scott Monday submitted his resignation to the Commissioners Court Monday, effective at 4 p.m. Thursday.

The new Commissioner was sworn in at 9 a.m. Monday by County Clerk Mary Hausler and immediately assumed his duties.

Pirtle, a native of Johnstown, retired from a successful and financially rewarding career as an accountant and oil company executive a few years ago and built a show place home at Johnstown which he and his family occupy.

In making the appointment, Judge Whiteman asked for co-operation by the citizens. "I call on each person in Prec. 1 and, indeed the County, to aid and assist Commissioner Pirtle for these 15 months left on his term. I feel he is doing the County a great service to occupy this position at considerable personal sacrifice," Judge Whiteman commented. "I am very pleased and gratified that he has accepted this appointment."

Pirtle said he was looking forward to working in his new post. "I am interested in government and in Red River County, my home and I hope I can contribute something to the Commissioners Court," he said. "My career has been mostly in the business field, and I think my experience in this field may perhaps be helpful to operation of the County's financial program."

Pirtle said he had no thoughts either way on any future political career beyond his present appointment, although he did not rule out continued county service.

Pirtle was reared in the Johnstown community in Red River County and attended Paris Junior College and East Texas State University. He received a BBA degree with a major in accounting in 1956 and moved to Longview where he worked in public accounting for three and one-half years. He joined Oleum Incorporated, an independent oil company in Longview, in 1959 as a staff accountant and was promoted to Chief Accountant in 1967, elected as Assistant Treasurer 1969, elected as Vice President in 1973 and as Treasurer in 1975.

While with Oleum Incorporated, Pirtle served as a director of the corporation and as an officer and a director of several wholly owned subsidiary companies. He also served as President and Chairman of the Board of East Texas Data Center, Inc., a computer company in Tyler, Texas.

After Oleum Incorporated was merged into Diamon Shamrock Corporation in 1979, Pirtle became self employed in the oil business. He built a new home and moved from Longview to Johnstown in June 1981 where he operates the Pirtle Farm and raises Simmental Cattle.

Pirtle and his wife, Tommie Joy, are both active members of the Johnstown Missionary Baptist Church where he serves as deacon.

There are regular trash pickups in our communities... please, don't dump on other people's property.

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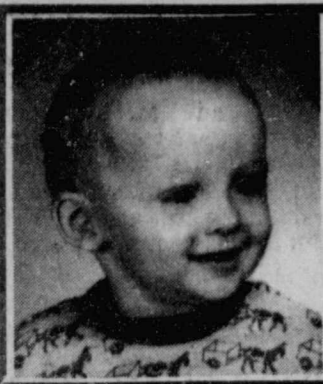

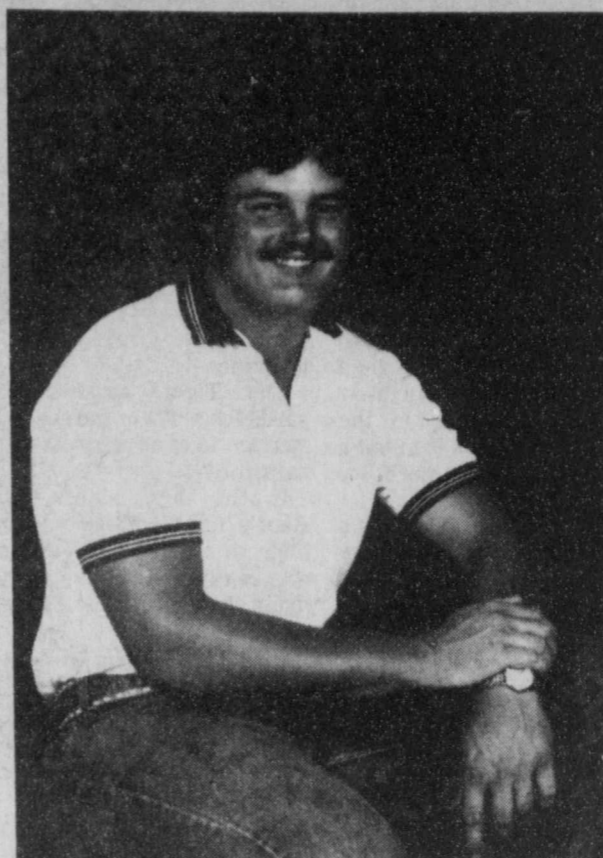

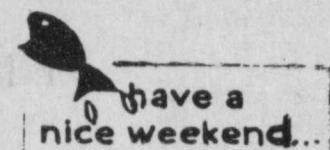

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in this state through research, education, and promotion financed by the producers of agricultural products."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor; after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds. The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize taxing units to exempt from taxation property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations."

### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate

jurisdiction and to county courts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewerage laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation sewer laterals on private property."

### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

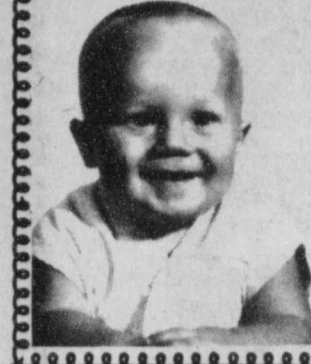

## Weekly Agricultural Update

This has been a good year for hay production in East Texas and most producers have an abundant supply in storage. However, winter feeding is just around the corner and beef producers need to make plans now to feed their hay in the most efficient manner, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Each cutting of hay from fields with different fertilizer levels should be tested for protein content. This is the only way a producer can determine the quality of hay being fed to various classes of livestock, Grooms points out.

According to Grooms, dry cows should be fed the lower quality hay that tests only six to eight percent protein. Growing calves, both steers and heifers, should be fed the best quality hay containing 12 percent or more protein. If these classes of livestock are fed hay of the suggested protein quality, supplemental protein will not be needed during the winter.

Grooms says that any class of livestock can always

be fed a better quality of hay than is needed if the hay is not obligated. This appears to be a year when it is cheaper to meet the animal's protein requirement from quality hay since protein supplements such as cottonseed meal have risen tremendously in price in recent months.

Even though protein requirements can usually be met with hay, Grooms points out that energy is usually deficient in hay fed to lactating cows and growing calves. Supplemental energy can be provided through either grain supplementation, small grain winter pastures or clover and ryegrass winter pastures.

Small grain winter pastures should be planted by mid-September and clover-ryegrass pastures should be planted about the middle of October.

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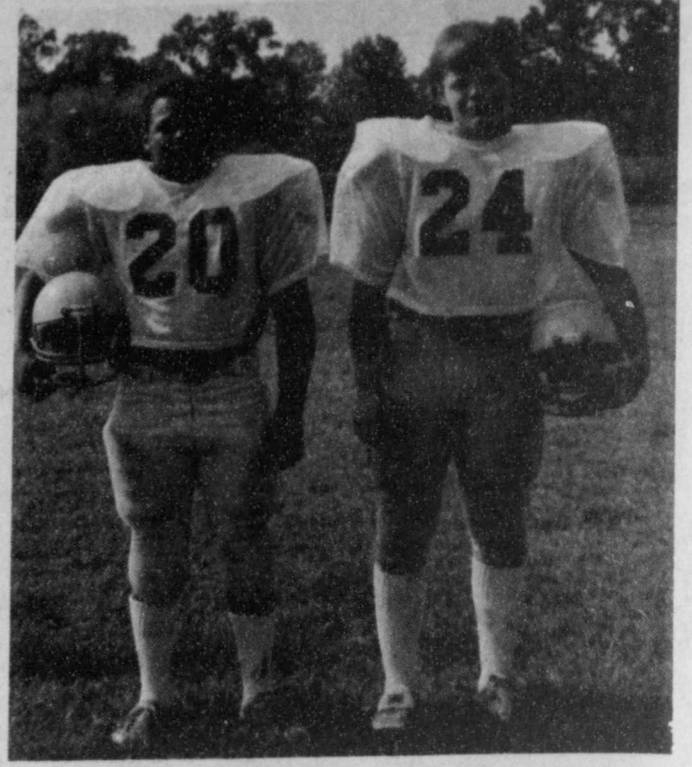

One yardstick used to measure the nation's growth and health is called the Gross National Product, or GNP. The GNP is the combination of all the goods and services, plus government expenditures, and is computed on a quarterly basis.

At the end of 1975, the GNP stood at nearly 1.5 trillion dollars. While there have been some quarter to quarter declines in the GNP, particularly in periods during the past 18 months, it has shown a steady growth pattern, indicating a basically healthy economy.

You may not realize it but the GNP affects our daily lives. If our GNP drops off sharply, this will lead to unemployment. If the GNP expands too rapidly, this can lead to inflation, and inflation to higher prices. So, you see, the entire growth pattern of the country affects you also.
