Do-it-yourself books are available at public libraries and book stores. Some are very detailed and clearly explained how many small problems around the home can be handled. Become acquainted with some of the professionals in the nearest town-plumbers, electricians, etc.-before an emergency arises. If your home is very old, you should have plumbing and wiring inspected before the severest weather arrives. The plumber can tell you whether or not you have pipes that should be insulated and how to shut off the water in the event of an emergency. The electrician should be consulted about the steps you need to take when a fuse is blown, the adequacy of your electrical system, etc. You will probably have to pay a service charge for the call, but it's a good investment.

Another good investment would be supplemental sources of heat and light. Ask the professionals.
