Anything of any value to the settlers were placed in the most inconspicuous places available so as to be secure from the thieving hands of the Indians. When an Indian raid was expected, all the settlers congregated the women folks at one of the houses, most often the Humphries home, and, leaving some of the eldest men and the youngest boys to protect them, the most able bodied men would sally forth to meet the

marauders. The early settlers of Maples Springs experienced the same difficulties and hardships in securing a livelihood as any other small settlement of Texas at that time, and as volumes have been written concerning this early life, little needs to be said about it. Cloth was spun or woven or brought from far away markets at a rather fancy price. Animal skins were called into use in many instances, not only for household use but also for use as clothing. Owing to abundant game found in the woods, the early settlers experienced no difficulty in providing themselves with plenty of fresh meat, and this, together with the corn and other products raised in the family "patch" of four or five acres, and the fuel and water that was available in the very front door of the settlers, afforded the settlers a seemingly carefree existence. Later, when these people wished for luxuries they drove overland, in their ox-wagons to Jefferson, Texas, usually carrying something to trade and returned with many products of the outside

It might be well to note the type of houses used by the earliest settlers, and a few things might be said about their mode of living. As wood was plentiful, the first houses were built of logs. They seldom had windows with glass till a much later date, as glass was then considered a costly luxury. If a window was left it was covered over with a skin or cloth, which could be removed or left in place according to the weather. A door was usually made for these windows so as to be able to fortify the house. A door was left in one end and a bar was also made for the door in the event of fortification. Roofs were made by making rough shingles from the trees, when the proper tools were available. These cabins were small at first later, possibly a small sideroom being added to be used as a bedroom for the children. The earliest cabins were built with dirt floors, which, of course, were covered over later with rough planks.

The furniture of these early homes was, of necessity, very meager indeed, usually consisting of a rough topped table, beds being made by placing poles between the logs of the cabin, perpendicular to the wall. Chairs were a few stools made from logs. Cooking utensils were scarce, and meals were usually cooked outside over a small campfire, a family being indeed fortunate if they had indoor cooking facilities.

A daughter of the first settler of Maples Springs was the first person to be buried in the new settlement. She was buried on the plot of ground that is now the property of the Bogata Cemetery Association, which was on the eastern boundary of the Humphries Estate. The second person to be buried was a child of the Neugent's, the first settlers of Rosalie.

The little settlement grew unhampered till the Civil War. However it was by no means a metropolis, and people lived with only the barest necessities of life. With the Civil War came the same suffering in this little community that was ex-perienced in nearly every


Courses in art, piano, voice, guitar, woodwinds, brass, percussion and

Healthy Lawns Should Start Now

Many of us have been looking forward to the end of lawn chores. However, now is an excellent time to do a few things that will make our lawns healthier and more appealing in time to come.

Fertilizing in the fall can produce great benefits. We can prolong the green color of our lawns and help Bermuda and St. Augustine recover early in the spring. A dense turf will also be promoted which helps resist winter weed invasion. Fall fertilizer prepares the lawn for winter dormancy through the nutrients that

come from the fertilizer. Nitrogen is the key, and fertilizing with a nitrogenrich fertilizer in the fall will promote a good survival rate in the winter and an early recovery in the spring. A 3-1-2 ration of fertilizer is best. The first number represents the nitrogen, the second, potassium, and the third, phosphorus.

Examples of 3-1-2 fertilizers are 15-5-10 and 12-4-8. If you use a 15-5-10, you should apply between 7 and

14 pounds per 1,000 square feet of lawn. If you use a 12-4-8, the rate is 8-16 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

In newly developed yards, it's too late to plant a permanent lawn. To prevent tracking in mud and sand, you might consider planting cereal rye, wheat or oats to provide a soil stabilizing effect. In the spring, this can be turned under, and you can plant your permanent

If you don't care to look at your Bermuda or St. Augustine, you can overseed with the rye grass or wheat. The planting rate for rye grass is at least 5 pounds per 1,000 square feet. When your winter lawn reaches a height of about three inches, it's time to mow. Set your mower at a height of two

Overseeding and fall fertilization can be done at the same time. If you do overseed with a winter grass, another application of fertilizer six weeks later will be needed. This overseeded grass should slowly die out next spring with the return of warm weather, and the permanent summer grass

will take over. Your permanent lawn should continue to be mowed at the normal height until dormancy. Watering should also be continued as needed but slack off on the frequency to harden the turf for winter.

For spring weed control, apply pre-emergent herbicides at the end of February and early March. Dacthal, balan or betasan are excellent herbicides for the control of warm season grasses.

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
