

# Rebels Take Redwater Lose To Ore City

The Rivercrest Rebels advanced in district play last Tuesday night as they defeated the Redwater Dragons 60-42.

The Rebs high scorers were Kelly Jeffery with 18, Anthony Brown with 17, and Scott Branch with 11.

Rivercrest scored 13 points in the first quarter to their opponent's 10. Anthony Brown hit for five and Branch, Anderson, Jeffery

and Galloway each hit two.

The Rebels marked up 16 more in the second period but allowed the Dragons only seven for a halftime score of 29-17. Jeffery scored eight and Branch and Galloway added four each.

In the third quarter Jeffery and Brown contributed six each and Branch and Anderson added two each for a quarter score of 45-31.

Fifteen more points in the final stanza sealed the Rebel

victory. Anthony Brown hit for six, Scott Branch for three and Tony Jasso, Kelly Jeffery and Kyle Hatley each for two.

Other scoring totals for the Rebels were Randy Galloway with six, James Anderson with four and Tony Jasso and Kyle Hatley each with two.

The Rivercrest Rebels dropped their first district game of the season last

Friday night to the Ore City Rebels 80-53.

Two digit scorers for Rivercrest were Tony Jasso and Kelly Jeffery with 10 each.

Rivercrest trailed by one at the end of the first period, 17-16. Kelly Jeffery scored eight, Anthony Brown four and Tony Jasso and Randy Galloway two each.

Galloway put through four points, Branch and Anderson added two each

and Jasso one to bring the halftime score of 33-25, Ore City.

Ore City blasted the third and fourth quarters with score after score for 47 points. Rivercrest continued to trail with quarter totals of 10 and 8.

Scott Branch hit for six in the third period and Randy Galloway and Bobby Thomas each added two.

Tony Jasso scored seven of his 10 points in the final

period. Anthony Brown added five, Kelly Jeffery two and Marc Anschutz and Charles Glass, one each.

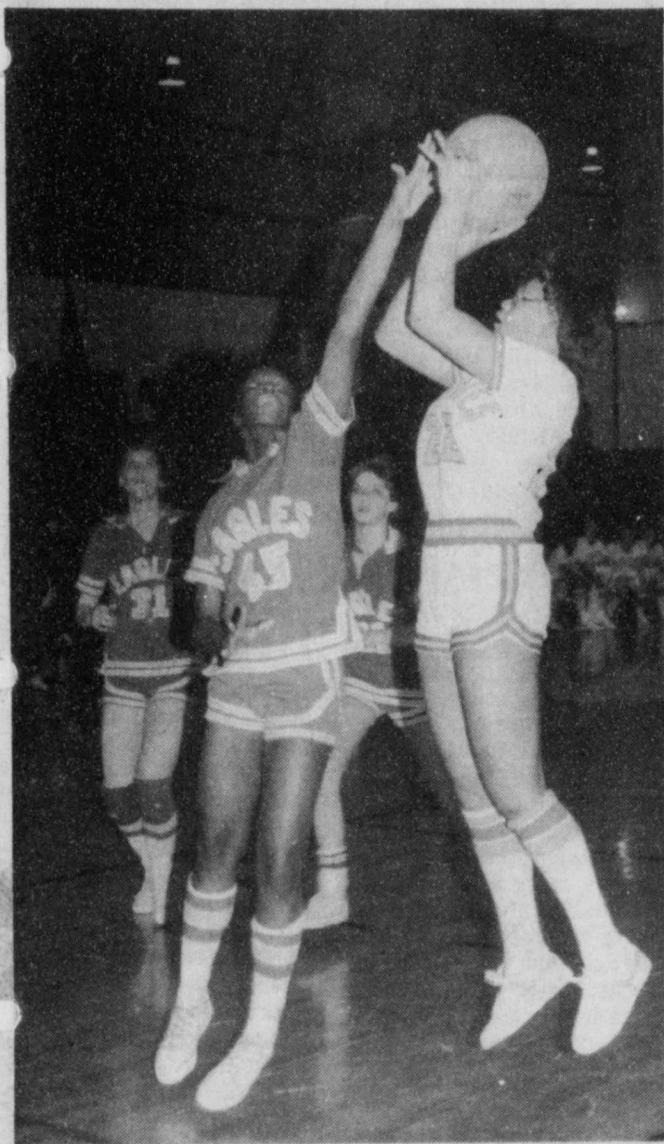

The Rivercrest Rebelettes waltzed over the Redwater Dragons last Tuesday night, 78-18.

The Rebelettes marked up 22 points in the first period to the Dragons' five. The pace was set for a runaway Rebelette victory. Pam Ward hit the hoop for eight points, Mary Savage and Donna Sessums each for four, and Kristi Foxworthy, Delores Simpson and Staci Griffin each for two.

The Rebelettes scored 16 and 27 respectively the third and final periods to Ore City's 10 and 2. The final tally was 77 to 19.

## Trustee Election Set For Talco-Bogata

Friday from 9:30 until 5:30, Thursdays from 9:30 until 12:30 and are closed on Saturday and Sunday.

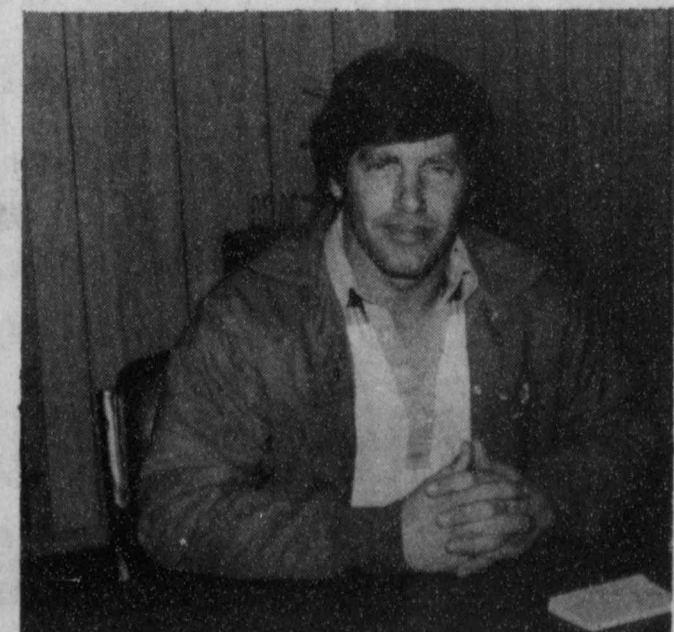
Mike Turner, area manager for the new Pool Well Service brought only two pulling units to Talco Monday, but said the company hopes to expand in the coming months. Their

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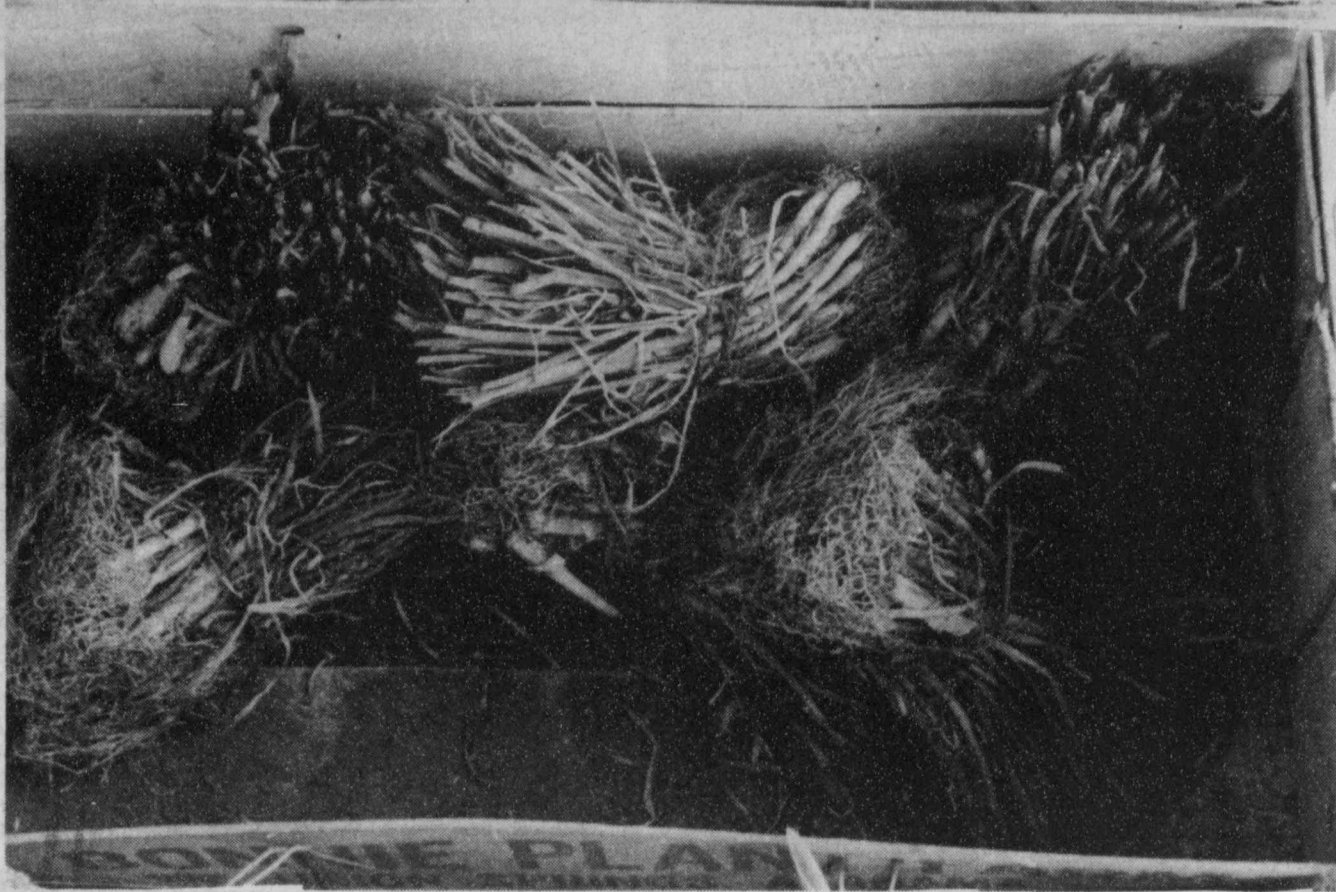

## Margie Rice To Teach PJC Cooking Classes

Margie Rice, who writes "The Cook's Corner" for the Paris News, will teach a series of three cooking classes at Paris Junior College beginning Tuesday, February 7.  
In the first class from 6 to 8 p.m. on February 7, Mrs. Rice will lecture and demonstrate "stick to the rib dishes" which cook while the preparer does something else. The next class on Thursday, February 23 will be on speedy, hearty meals using the microwave, conventional cooking and the food processor. Wok mastery, stir frying and other techniques will be the topic of the final session on March 20.  
Classes will be from 6 to 8 p.m. in the Alford Center at PJC, and a \$5 fee will be charged for each class. Participants will taste each dish, and recipes will be provided.  
Mrs. Rice, who has written the Paris News cooking column for the past four years, has interviewed more than 200 cooks in the Red River Valley area. She also writes a column called "East Texas Eating" for the Deport, Blossom, Talco and Bogata papers.  
She holds a B.S. degree in home economics from Texas Woman's University, and a master of education with an emphasis in home economics from the University of Maryland. The instructor has taught food classes at the University of Houston and homemaking at Avery High School. Her husband, Sam Rice, is a Presbyterian minister in Clarksville.

## Texas Businesses

### To Get Chance To "Make Good"

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday Texas businesses operating outside state tax law will get a one time only, penalty free chance in February to get right with the Comptroller's office before Bullock lowers the boom in March.  
"We'll give them 29 days in February to get right with the law," Bullock said. "If they come in and wipe the slate clean, we won't charge them penalty and we won't file charges against them. If they wait until March or if they wait until we find them, they'll be too late."  
Comptroller enforcement officers will begin using new procedures designed to more quickly identify and collect taxes from errant taxpayers in March. Under the law, the Comptroller can collect a 10 percent penalty and has the power to file criminal charges for unreported state taxes.  
"We will only waive penalties and charges if the taxpayer comes forward voluntarily during February," Bullock said. "Chronic late filers, delinquent taxpayers and other taxpayers already under investigation or court prosecution don't qualify for this relief."  
The February only, no

penalty period is aimed at: A business operating without a tax permit. A business which owes Texas taxes even though a tax permit isn't required. A business not reporting taxes on a new activity added since it got its original tax permit. A business with a single tax permit, but more than one business location. "The February period is for the business operating outside the tax law or beyond the limits of its tax permit. We want them to come out in the open, get a permit and start reporting taxes like most other Texas business people," the Comptroller said.

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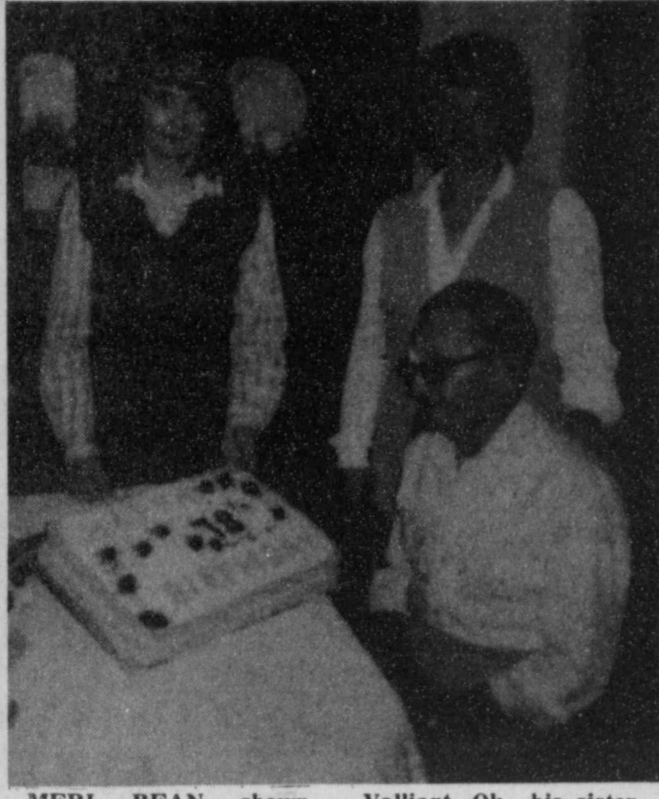

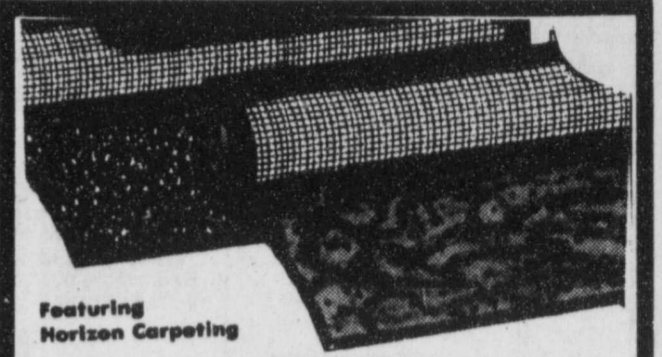

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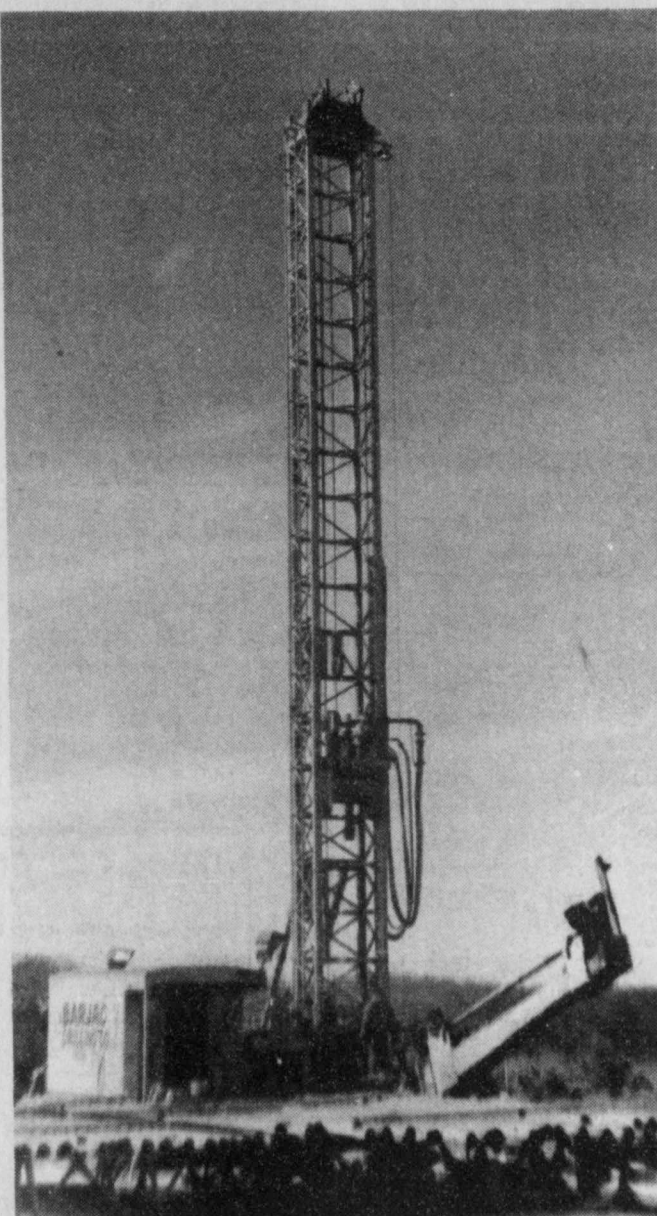

**Weekly Agricultural Update**

The December freeze wiped out the Greenbugs in the wheat research plots at the Dallas Research and Extension Center. Interesting figures that all wheat producers should find interesting came from this research. However, keep in mind that the greenbug situation in your field may be different.

In checking the same place each week in the wheat nursery plots, none of the greenbugs were sprayed with chemicals. The change in their number is a result of the weather.

Taking twelve, one foot rows, counts each week and the average counts were: November 21, 36.5 greenbugs; November 29, 35.5; December 5, 49.5; December 12, 76.9; January 3, 7.6; January 11, 0.5; January 18, 0.1.

You will note that the big drop in numbers took place when the temperatures plunged to a single digit temperature. Research work several years ago found that temperatures below 28 degrees would cause some greenbugs to die and that significant population reduction did not occur until the temperatures dropped into the single digit range.

Wheat fields that were covered with snow during the cold spell could have had better survival of the insects than the research plots which were not covered with the snow pack.

A number of agricultural educational meetings have been scheduled during February and March.

On February 9, beef producers will want to attend a beef cattle outlook meeting. The meeting will be held in the North Lamar High School Cafeteria beginning at 7 p.m. with a chili supper, compliments of Gibson-Mabry Ranch of Paris, Burrell Great Oaks Ranch of Paris and Paris Real Estate.

Dairymen will be meeting on February 14 for a session on raising herd replacements. It will begin at 10:30 a.m. and adjourn after noon. Dr. Max Sudweeks, will be the speaker. More details in next week's paper.

Wheat producers will want to get an update on the disease situation at a breakfast meeting February 28. Breakfast will be provided by MoBay Chemical Corporation and Estes Chemicals of Paris. Meeting location will be Brownigan's in Paris.

A spore trap to monitor the wheat disease situation in the area has been installed at Petty on the farm of A.W. Shelton. The trap is one of nine erected throughout the state by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. George Phillely, pathologist at Overton, was instrumental in getting the trap in the county. He states that we should be able to pinpoint disease potential in our area based on spore counts in areas south of here.

Leaf rust spores are already present in Lamar County. These spores were picked up in the trap on January 13, 15 and 16. However, growers should not get alarmed at this time. The count is very light at this time. You should check fields periodically for rust pustules on plants.

The only thing that the report would indicate at the present time is that spores are on the move in our area. In addition to leaf rust spores, the trap will be able to pick up powdery mildew

spores, stripe rust spores and serpitoria. None of these have shown up presently.

"Opportunities for Agriculture" will be theme of the 13th Annual Texoma Agricultural Conference to be held February 16, beginning at 9:30 a.m. in the Silver Wings Club, West Campus of Grayson County College, Sherman-Denison.

The highlight of the program will be a noon luncheon address by Charles Stenholm, United States Representative from Stanford. Other speakers will be Rutherford Stough, stock cattle operator, Corsidana; Dr. Wayne Sharp, economist, Dallas; Don Essary, Quarterhorse Association Consultant, Amarillo; and Dr. Jim Davis, aquaculture specialist, College Station.

Dr. Ernie Davis, livestock marketing specialist from College Station will be in Lamar County on February 9 for a special educational program on beef cattle out look. More details on this later.



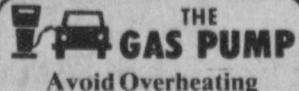
**HEALTHFUL TREAT**

If you want a delicious, healthful food treat try an avocado. Their butter-smooth flavor and texture are refreshing when eaten alone or as part of a salad or other dish. Also, because of record crops, this fruit is plentiful and inexpensive.

Avocados have a number of uses. They can be served fresh in salads and sandwiches, cubed and served with a dip or in soup, or mashed and added to scrambled eggs, spread on toast or in a variety of dishes. In souffles, sauces, cream pies, or ice cream, they add a unique taste and texture. Avocado half shells can be used to hold salads, cottage cheese, entrees, sauces or dressings.

When purchasing avocados, look for medium to large fruits because they offer more fruit for the money. Skins range from dark and wrinkled to smooth and green, depending upon the variety. Dark spots on the green varieties usually do not affect the quality of the fruit unless the dark spot represents a deep bruise or skin puncture.

Avocados are ripe when they give slightly when gently squeezed.



**Avoid Overheating**

At 55 mph, your cooling system handles enough heat to warm a seven room house in cold weather. Get your cooling system in shape for summer by checking hoses, belts and pressure cap. Clean the outside of your radiator by spraying with a hose from the engine side. Drain and flush system as specified in your owner's manual.

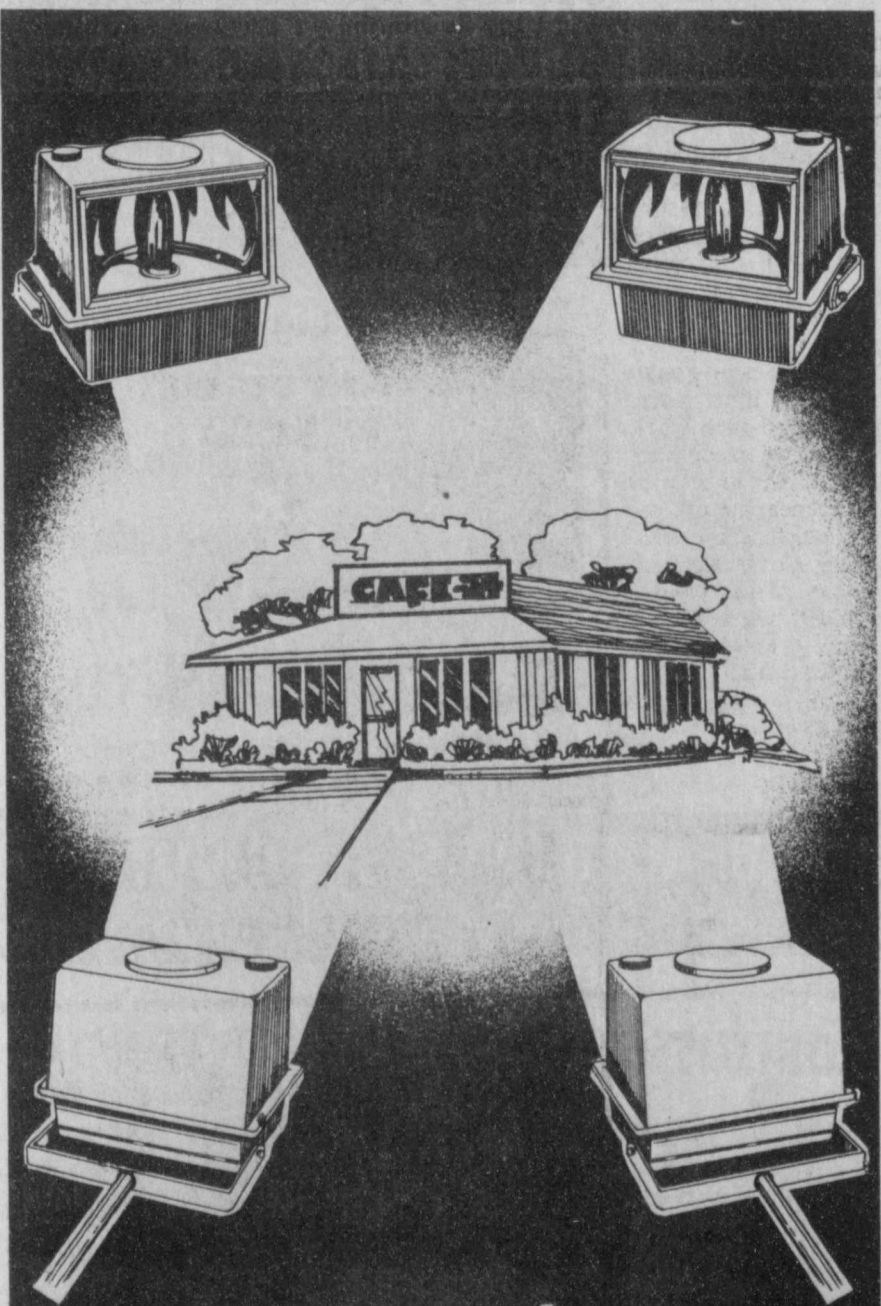

### Butterfly Weed Not Undesirable

The butterfly weed is a plant that may not deserve its name. It isn't ugly and undesirable. This long-stemmed plant has slender green leaves and clusters of small orange flowers that are delightfully scented. Cuttings of flowers and seed pods are excellent in dried bouquets.

Native to North America, the butterfly weed grows slowly, but sends its roots deep into the soil and, once established, is quite hardy if undisturbed. The plant is grown from seed, likes sandy soil that is well drained and should be watered regularly.

Flowers appear in early summer and usually last well into autumn.

Among the most interesting cactus plants is the bishop's cap, which is native to Mexico. The plant is spineless



and somewhat resembles the cap worn by bishops, with five separate, distinct ribs.

The bishop's cap is often seen outdoors in warm climates but elsewhere must be treated as a house plant. The plant requires plenty of light but should be watered sparingly, only when the soil becomes dry.

In summer, small yellow flowers with brown tips appear at the top of the plant but are short-lived.

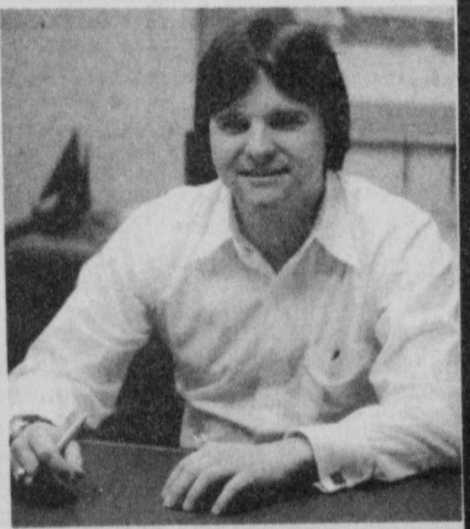

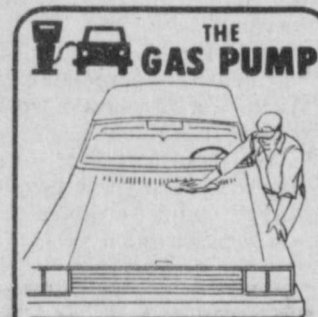

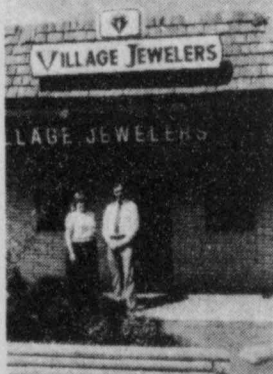

Two hundred twenty-five people were counted for the service. Chairs were brought into the auditorium. Several commented that it was the largest crowd they had seen at the church for any service.

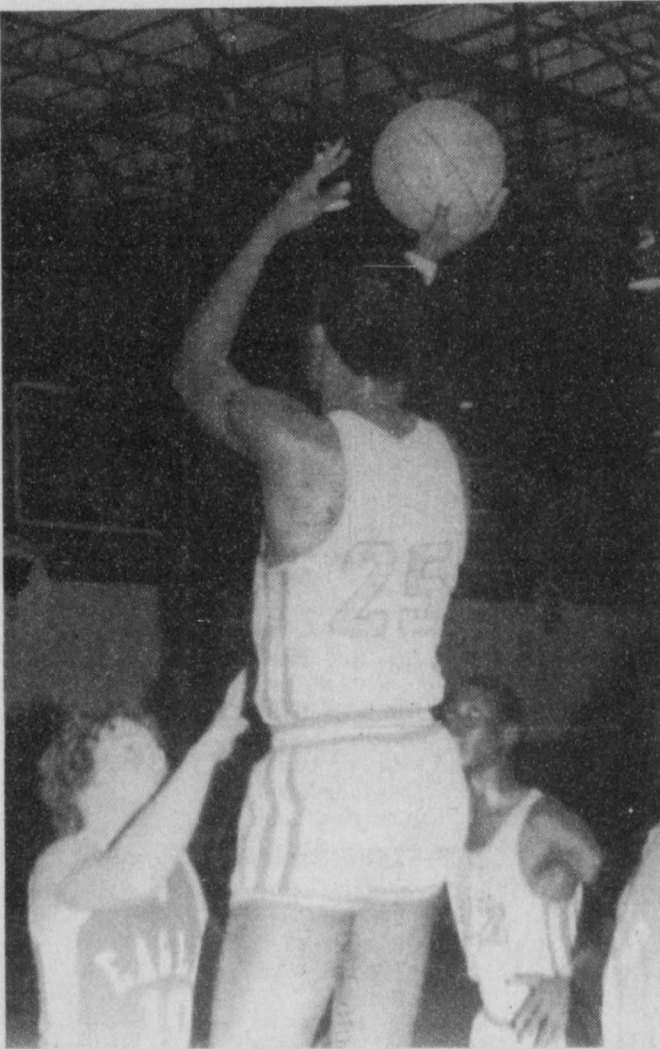
**GARDEN  
Tasty Radishes  
Are Quick, Easy**

When it's time to get the vegetable garden growing, what often comes to mind first? If you said radishes, move to the head of the class.

Radishes are popular for several reasons. Many consider radishes a tasty treat to be plucked from the ground, washed, and popped into the mouth as if they were a grape or a berry. They add a special flavor to a fresh garden salad. They add color, that bright touch of red.

While it is true that radishes will grow in almost any type of soil, don't plant radishes in the worst spot in your garden or in a spot subject to shade. Radishes can be planted early. You can have successive plantings in and out of the ground in time to use the same spot for beans, corn or other vegetables that should not be planted until the danger of frost has well passed.

There is another reason for planting radishes in good soil in good sunlight. Under ideal conditions, radishes mature quickly and are mild and tasty.
