All over the United States, Future Farmers of America will begin celebrating FFA week on February 20 and Rivercrest High School FFA has a good reason to celebrate.

Their program has a total enrollment of 112 members. Jena Mangrum serves as district co-sweetheart. She

will compete for the Area VI Sweetheart in Tyler February 21. There will be eight girls in the competition, two from each district.

The overall program in addition to its regular courses, offers free employment training in meat lab and ag mechanics.

Four students will receive area proficiency awards next week. Randy Randolph, agricultural processing; Jeffery Bivins, horse production; David Rozell, agricultural mechanics; and Donnie West, meat processing.

These awards are based on the end of school last

year when the applications were sent in. Brad Bass, State President of FFA, visited the Rivercrest Chapter during the year. He is from Mt. Vernon.

The FFA organization is for students studying vocational agriculture in public high school, providing exceptional learning ex-

periences for its members.

This is the 56th anniversary of FFA, which is run by student-members with adult guidance.

At Rivercrest, L.P. Taylor, Craig Ingram and Vincent Lum are the advisors for the members of the program.

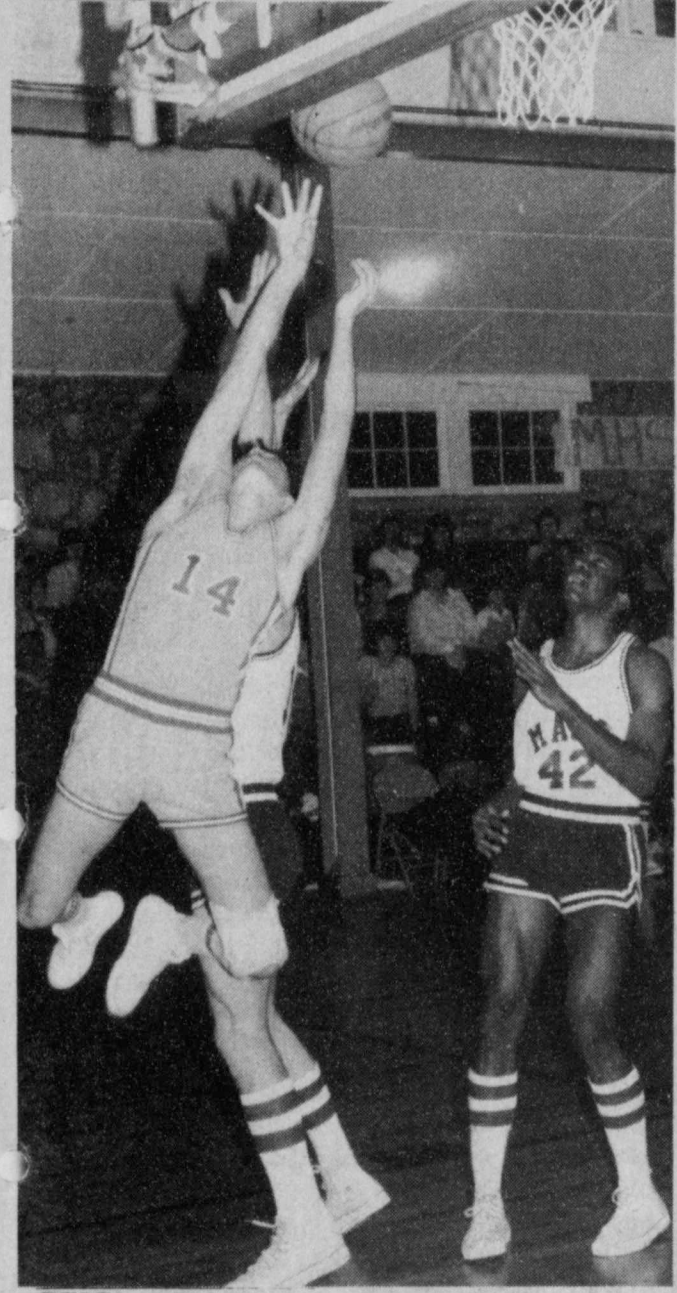
The FFA program provides practical training beyond the traditional classroom approach. The instruction is made interesting by actually doing the job at hand, from welding, carpentry, livestock judging, showing animals, field trips and a

large range of projects.

At Rivercrest, a meat processing lab is one of the program's features. Students actually process meat, trimming, packing and wrapping the meat.

The FFA provides a unique opportunity to develop the potential of

young people, and it is a growing, expanding and improving program.

The Rivercrest Rebels defeated the James Bowie Pirates 72-40 in last week's

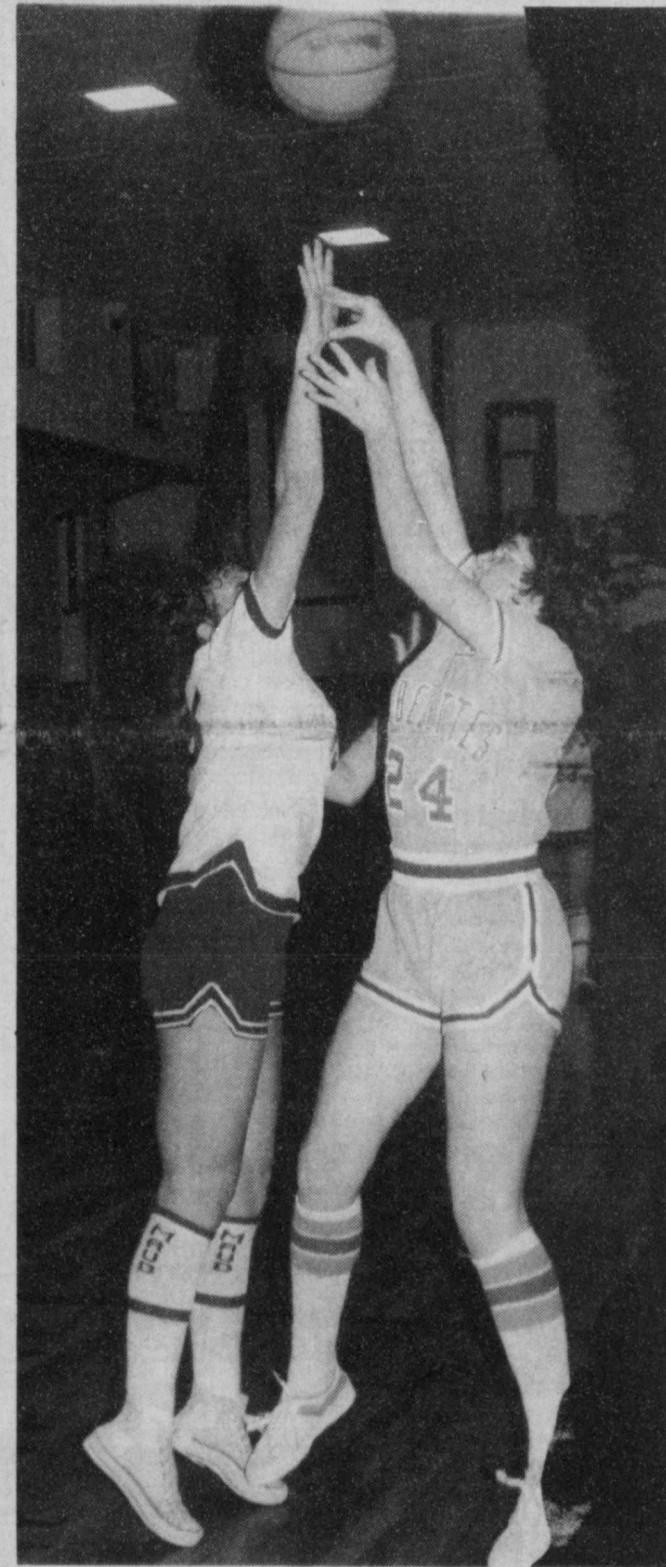
clash in the Rebel gym. Scott Branch led the Reb's scoring with 17 points. Kelly Jeffery and Anthony Brown

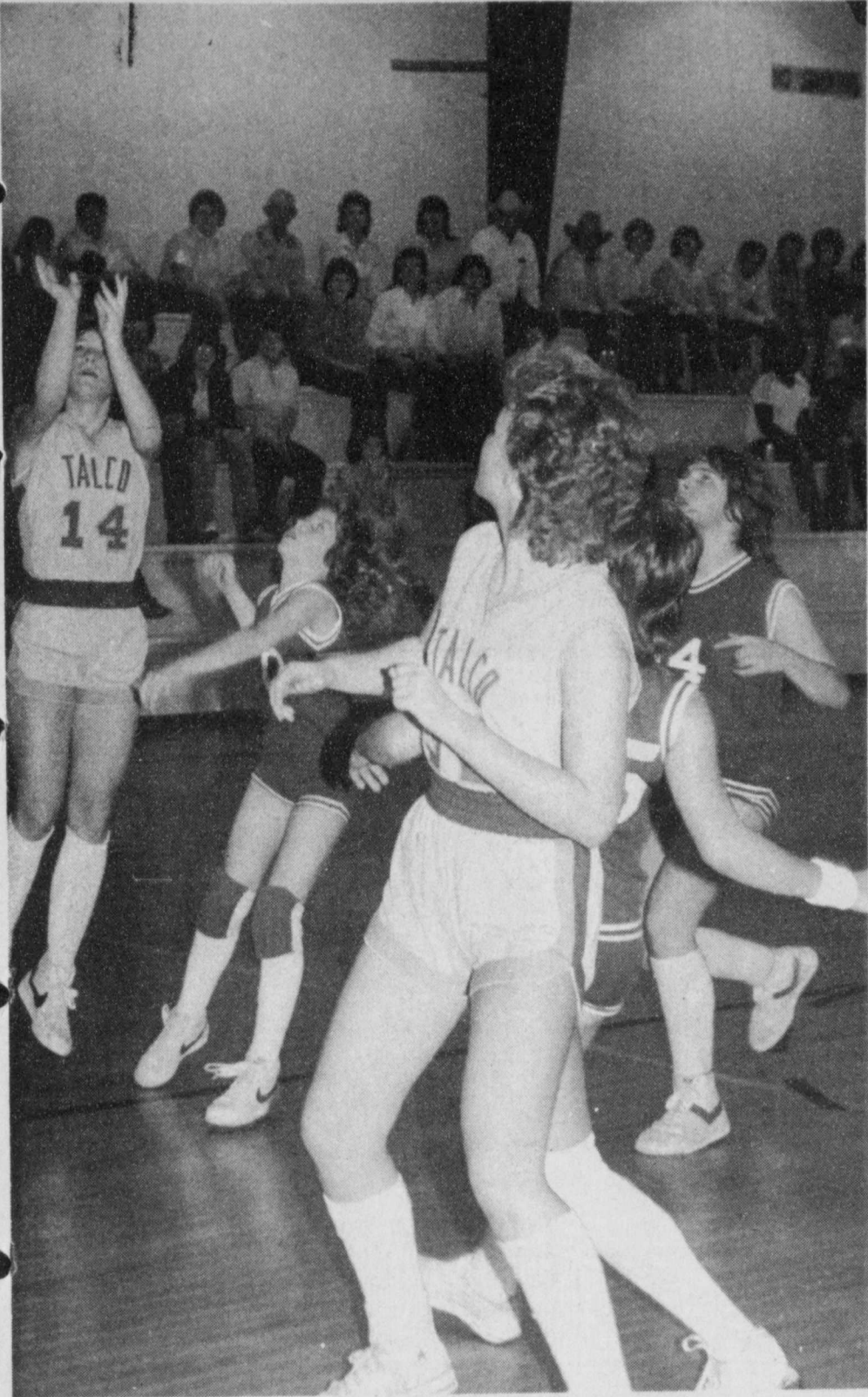

Footprints From The Past

When I was a small boy and going to school in a country school, there was not too much to do during recess except play basketball, spin tops, play marbles and also you could play mumble peg if you could find some of the kids with a knife and that was not too hard to do as all the boys had a knife as you were considered a sissy if you did not have a knife. I almost

always managed to have some kind of knife, sometimes it had no handle and only one blade, but that counted as long as you had some kind of knife. Some of the kids had them a really good knife and they were not about to loan it to anyone, just their very best friends and then you had to promise not to play mumble peg with it, as that was supposed to be bad for the knife, as it would get dirt in it and

besides, it would make them dull and they always keep them sharp enough to shave with, if you had any hair on your arm to shave. None of us were old enough to have any whisksers as we were only from eight to twelve years old.

Sometimes we would play marbles, but it always wound up with just a few of the boys with all the marbles, as they were the best shooters and the only way

they would play with you was if you played for keeps and they always wound up with all the marbles and you had to wait until you could get some money or something they wanted so you could trade for your marbles back. I remember one kid that always had a pocket full of money as he was the best player and he won all the marbles. By a pocket full of money, I was talking about 50 cents to a dollar, as that was a lot of money in those days, especially for a ten year old kid.

There is something else that I remember from going to a country school and that is that someone was always getting into trouble and the teacher had to give them a spanking. As they had no regular paddle, the teacher would let some of the boys go outside and cut a switch to use to whip the culprit with.

They always had a lot of volunteers to cut the switch, so you could watch someone else getting a spanking, and if it was one of your best friends, you would cut the switch nearly into so it would break after it was used for just a few licks. They had to be cut just so, so the teacher could not tell it had been cut and after a while, you got to where you could do a good job of notching the switch.

Life was not all bad going to a small country school, as nearly every Friday afternoon we would either have a spelling match or something like that to break up a long, weary week of school. And we always had a Halloween carnival and a Thanksgiving play of some kind and Christmas was best of all, as we got to draw names and have a Christmas tree and that was always a lot of fun.

1 jar (1 ounce) pine nuts (optional)

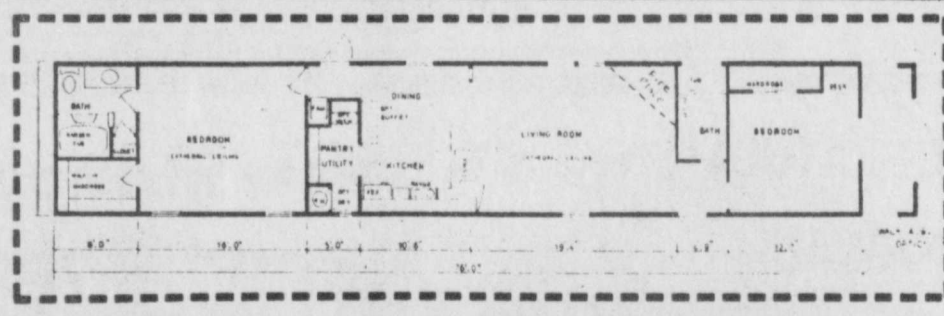

Heavenly Angel Cake Surprise

This old-fashioned cake has a surprise pineapple cream filling.

- 1 pkg. (14.5 oz.) angel food cake mix
- 1 can (8 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Juice
- 2 1/2 cups whipping cream
- 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
- 1/4 cup toasted chopped almonds
- 1 tsp. sugar

Prepare cake according to package directions. Drain pineapple well, pressing out excess juice with back of spoon. Whip 1 cup cream. Fold in pineapple, cherries and almonds. Slice and reserve a 1-inch thick layer from top of cake. Cut cake around outer sides and inner sides, leaving about 1-inch thick border. Remove inside cake with hands; break in chunks. Fold into pineapple cream. Spoon pineapple mixture into cake hollow. Cover cake with reserved top. Whip remaining cream with sugar. Spread over cake. Refrigerate 2 hours, or overnight. Makes 8 to 10 servings. *Reserve juice for beverage.

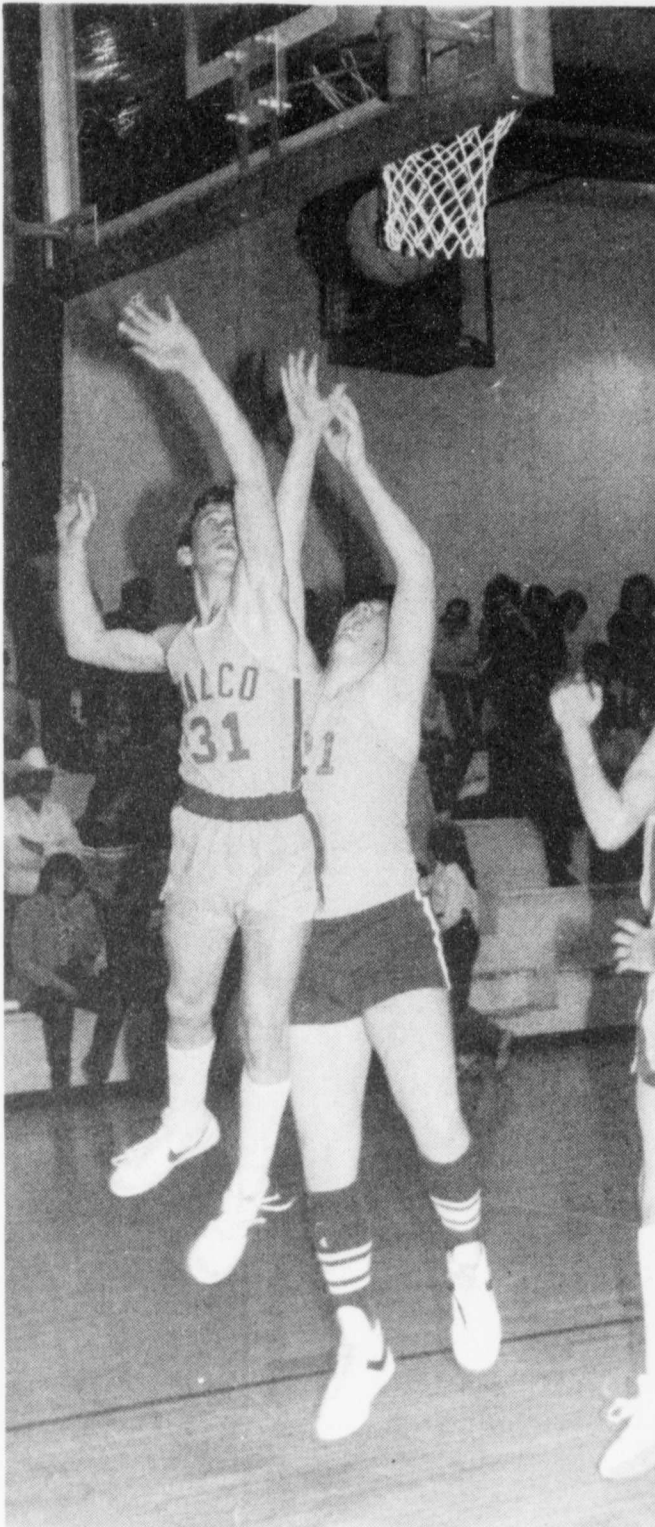

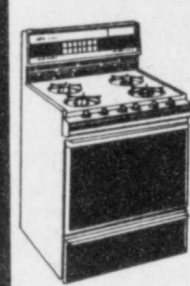
Q. If I look at my contacts in the mirror, they appear to hang low on my cornea. Should this be corrected?

A. Only when your private doctor finds that the lenses ride too low. The lens may

Price Comparison Tips
In the beef department you will find choice cuts such as T-bone and rib still carrying premium prices. Some of the less tender cuts such as chuck may be a better buy. Before making a selection, consider cost per serving and ways to prepare less tender cuts of meat. Chuck, for example, should be cooked at a low temperature by moist heat until tender. Prices for choice cuts aren't expected to ease off much in the near future. Pork prices are still inching up and are expected to continue until seasonal supplies become available later this fall.

Ground beef and market style bacon are both better buys, as are fryers.

There is an excellent crop of apples and the price is the lowest in four years.

All stores have good prices on canned vegetables. For the next few weeks, compare prices on canned, frozen and fresh vegetables before buying.
