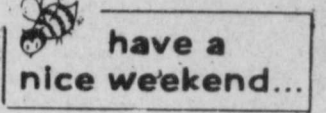

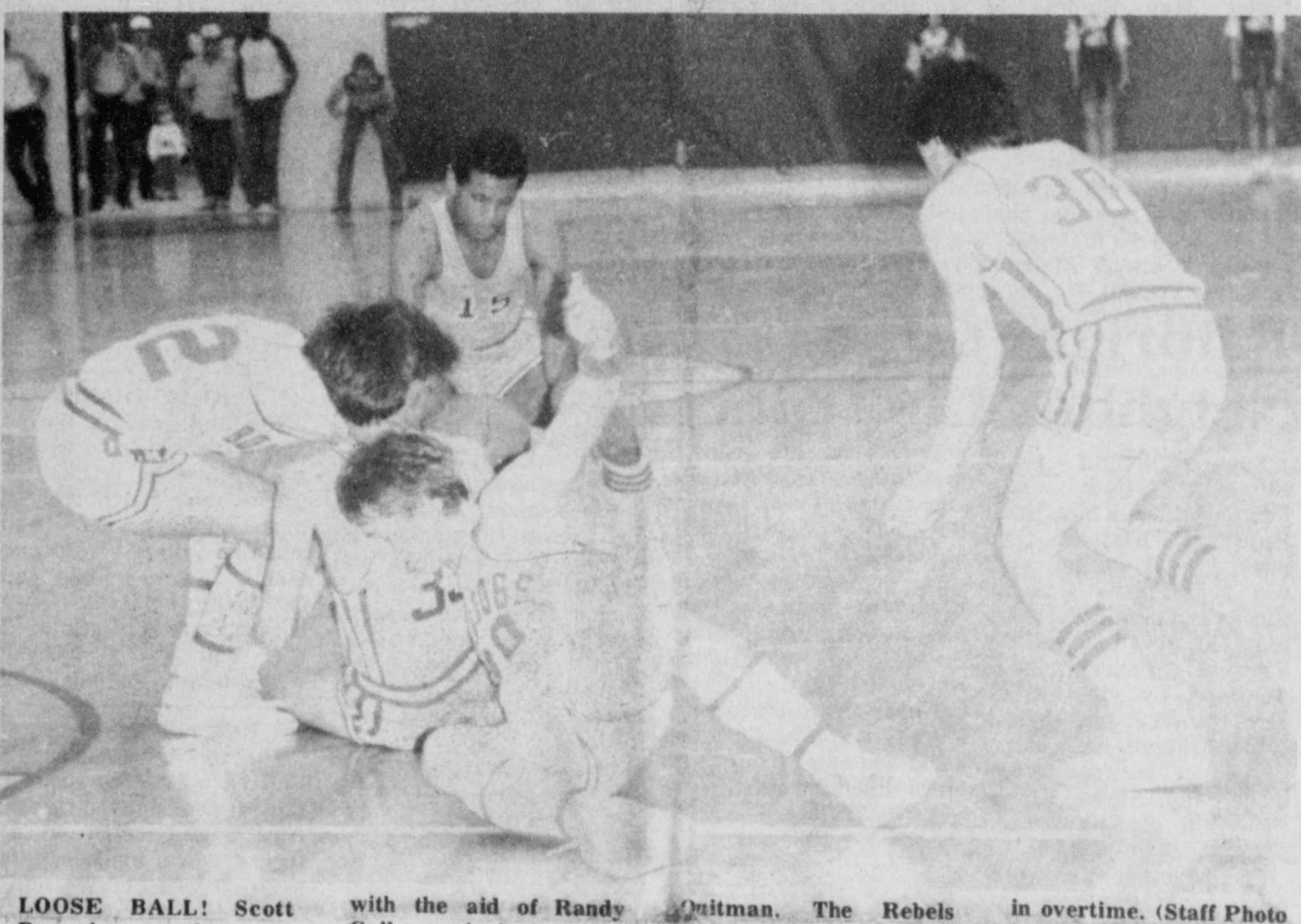

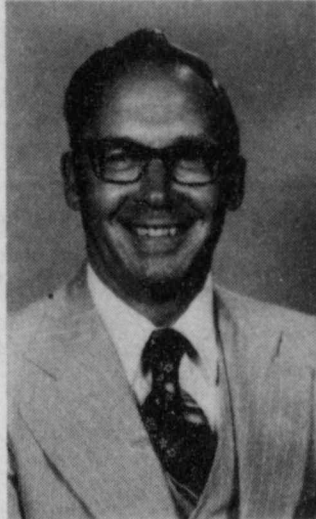

## Beef Cattle Short Course Set For March

Livestock producers and other interested adults are reminded of the Beef Cattle Short Course to be held March 5, 6, 7, 8 at 7 p.m. in the Rivercrest High School. Dr. Elmer Krehbiel, Beef Cattle Specialist with Texas A&M University, will conduct the program. Subjects to be covered in the short course are: nutritional requirements, winter feeding, minerals, vitamins, feed additives, implants, facilities, equipment, selection of bulls and cows, animal identification including freeze branding, crossbreeding, feeder cattle grades, diseases, parasites, reproduction, market trends, and management for efficient production. Additional information may be obtained from the Community Education Director, Kay Kennedy, at 632-5205. The course will be on selection of breeding and stocker feeder cattle, methods of breeding, feeding, controlling parasites, diseases and marketing for efficient beef cattle production. Dr. Krehbiel was born in Blaine County, Oklahoma in 1925 and was reared on a livestock and grain farm and had livestock for FFA projects. He graduated from Hydro High School in Hydro, Oklahoma, received a B.S. degree in Animal Husbandry from Oklahoma State University in 1950, received an M.S. degree in Animal Breeding from the

University of Arkansas in 1959 and received his Ph.D. degree in Animal Breeding from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. Dr. Krehbiel is Beef Cattle Specialist for the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program, Texas A&M University and has been since 1972.

## Judge Pesek Hands Down Sentences

On December 19, District Judge Leon Pesek sentenced Milton Ray Coleman to 5 years probated on felony driving while intoxicated charges. On January 5, Pesek sentenced William R. Mayes of Bogata to 2 years in prison for aggravated assault committed against Pete Smith. Pesek sentenced LaFonda Monkhouse to three years deferred adjudication and \$2,000 restitution for felony criminal mischief involving damage to the pickup of Mary Ann Rhodes of Mt. Pleasant. Joseph Doolittle received a sentence of five years probated, a \$1,000 fine and \$3,032 restitution for felony theft from his brother and burglary of a storage building near the Wag-A-Bag in Annona. On Monday, February 13, Judge Pesek revoked the probation of Gary Raulston of Rt. 6 and sentenced him to 2 to 5 years in prison on felony charges of aggravated assault and retaliation. Pardons and Paroles Board has notified Red River County officials that the following persons are being considered for parole: A man sentenced in October, 1981, by a Red River County jury to 5 to 16 years in prison for burglary of an apartment in Detroit. A man sentenced in December, 1983 to 2 to 4 years in prison for felony aggravated assault in Clarksville.

## GTE Explains Request For Increase

General Telephone Company of the Southwest recently filed an \$84.8 million request for new revenues with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. E.L. Langley, president, said \$62.7 million of the filing is to allow the company to begin earning on the new investments made since the last filing, and to produce a fair return on the company's investment in Texas. The additional \$22.1 million is for revised depreciation rates that are more consistent with today's rapid technological changes and customer demands for accelerated change to more modern service, and to comply with recent Federal Communications Commission proposed accounting changes in regard to company owned telephone instruments leased to customers at regulated rates.

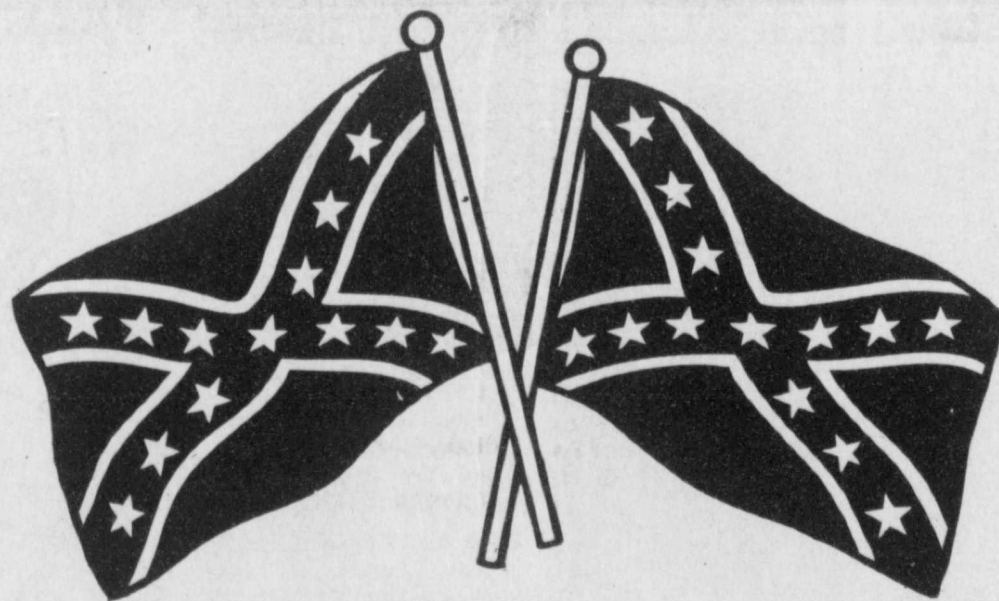

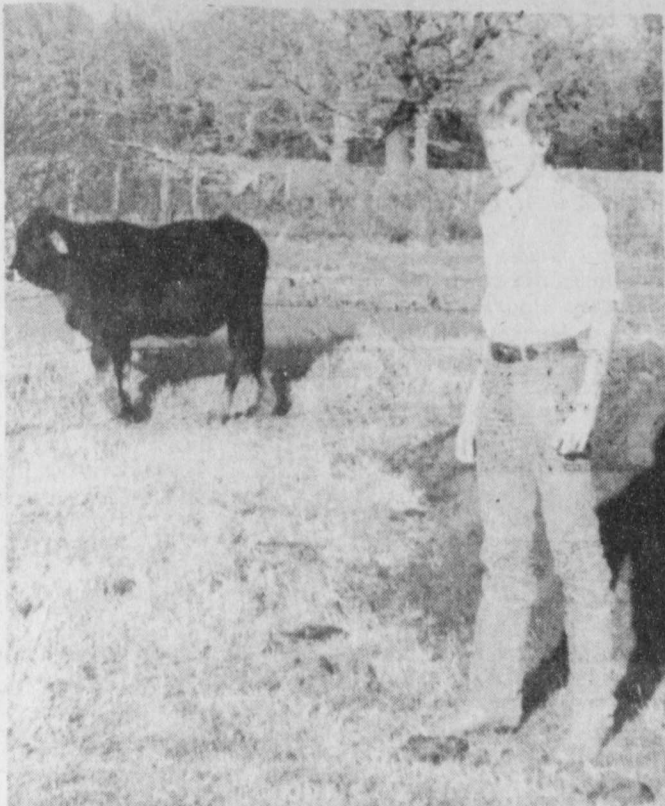

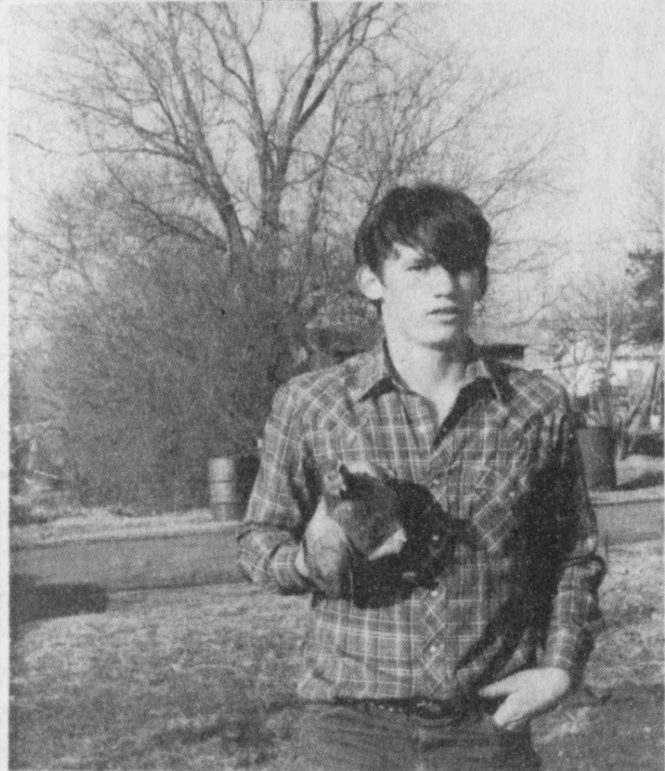

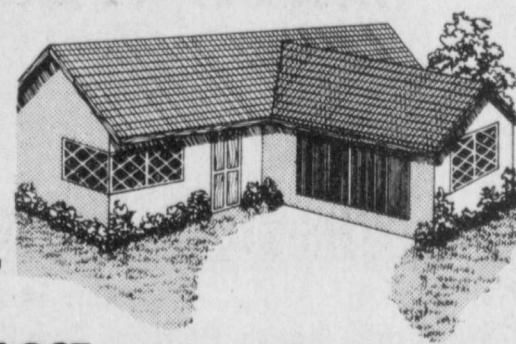

Valedictorians and Salutatorians of Bogata High School from 1965 back through 1946. Today we will start as far back as we have knowledge and work to 1945.

1898: There were seven members in the graduating class: Buck Joiner, Irene Horner Wadlington, Cecil Cox Mosley, Dr. Stephen H. Grant (Valedictorian), Elva Robertson, Robert Hilterbrand and Bessie Howison McCluer (Salutatorian).

1899: Three members, Lida McClinton, Dr. Riley Upchurch and Joe P. Burns.

1900 there were nine members: Tom Horner Guion, Opal Holt Commer, Lillian DeBerry, Soula Ray, Effie Deitz Sellers, Annie Lee Howison Rozell, Mamie Howison McCain, Luther DeBerry, Dr. Clifford McCain.

1901 through 1914 there were no organized graduating classes.

This year's boys basketball team went to State. They drew for the school they were to play. They drew El Paso and lost to them. El Paso went on to win State.

Valedictorian this year was Jack Rodgers, the Salutatorian was Ruth Craddock Wood.

1925: Johnnie Quinton, Margaret Howison (Salutatorian), Maggie Hardin Lee, Lucian Elder (Valedictorian), Jimmie Underwood, Wayne Ferguson.

This was the first year that football was played in Bogata High School. There were sixteen men out for the team. It seems that the team lost its first game and continued this luck throughout the season, but much was gained and the season ended with great anticipation for the next season.

This same year Jimmie Underwood went to State in track. He did well for his school, came out 6th in State in the high jump competition.

1926: Mary Lassiter, Thelma Harbison (Valedictorian), Edie McCrury Stogner (Salutatorian), Dan Wilkinson, Royce Brown, Marvin DeBerry, Margaret Rozell Lawson, Cleone Whitten Sullivan.

Cleone's thought expressed to the class could do all of us some good today: "It's a wise head that makes the tongue be still."

Most men were sentenced to 30 days beginning March 1, after the opening of the new jail. The men with jobs will be released during their work hours so that they can keep their jobs and support

their families. Judge Whiteman said that the new jail "would change some things in Red River County".
