

Cold, Wet Winter Puts Area Work Behind

For those people who don't work in offices and factories, the coming of spring is likely to be very, very busy.

That is because winter during 1983-84 has been one of the coldest, and wettest in many years.

Farmers, most of whom have been able to be in the fields preparing for spring planting only three to five days since the last week in November, will be running equipment fourteen and sixteen hours daily when it finally becomes dry enough to begin readying the soil for

planting. Construction workers, such as housing builders and road crews are only now beginning to get much done as bitter cold and seemingly almost daily rainfall kept them from finishing much during the months of December, January and

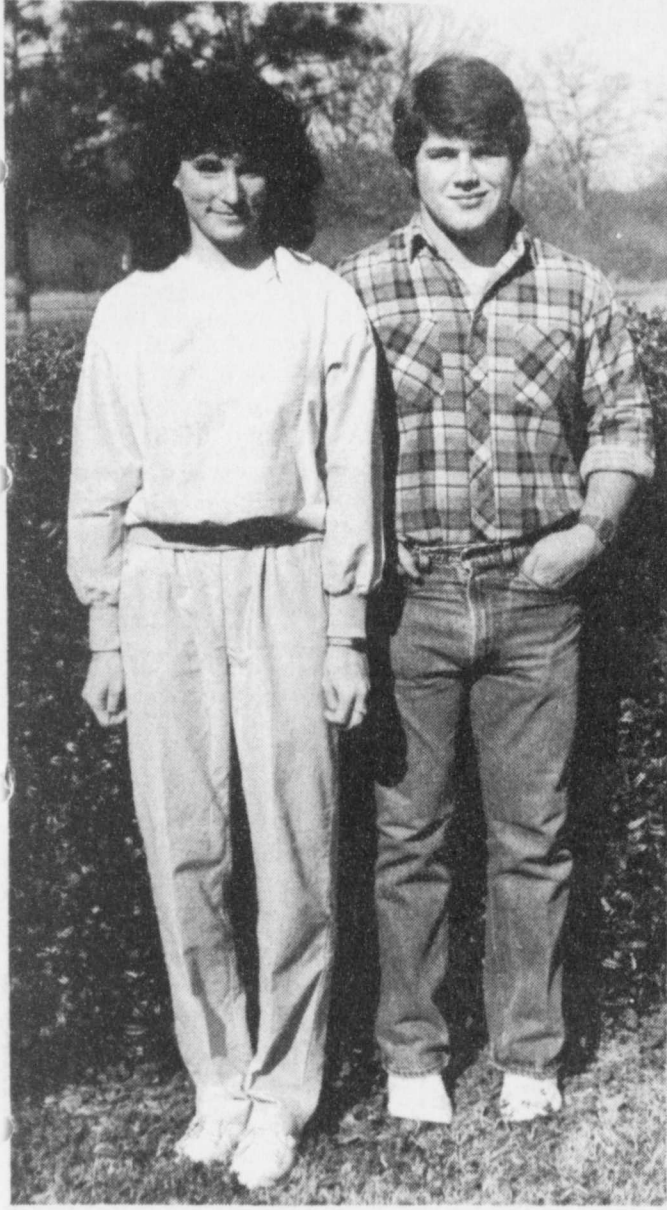
February. In addition, the weather has caused severe damage to a number of area roofs. For nearly three weeks, the temperature in December hovered near the zero mark, and during that time huge amounts of the snow and ice were trapped

in layers on older, flat roofs common in business districts throughout the area. After repeated freezing and thawing several of the roofs actually collapsed and many, many more have begun to leak. The damage to shrubs,

trees and grasses is as yet undeterminable, but appears to be rather severe, as plants not at all accustomed to such bitterly prolonged cold succumbed to the unusual weather. Rainfall is not actually much above normal, that is another peculiar thing.

Instead of large, two or three inch rains, the winter months have been filled with drizzle or showers day after day. And as the weather forecasters begin more hopeful and pleasant sounding predictions, farmers, construction workers,

and anyone else whose activity is dependent upon reasonable good weather, are smiling and making preparations to begin with the almost staggering amount of work that faces them.

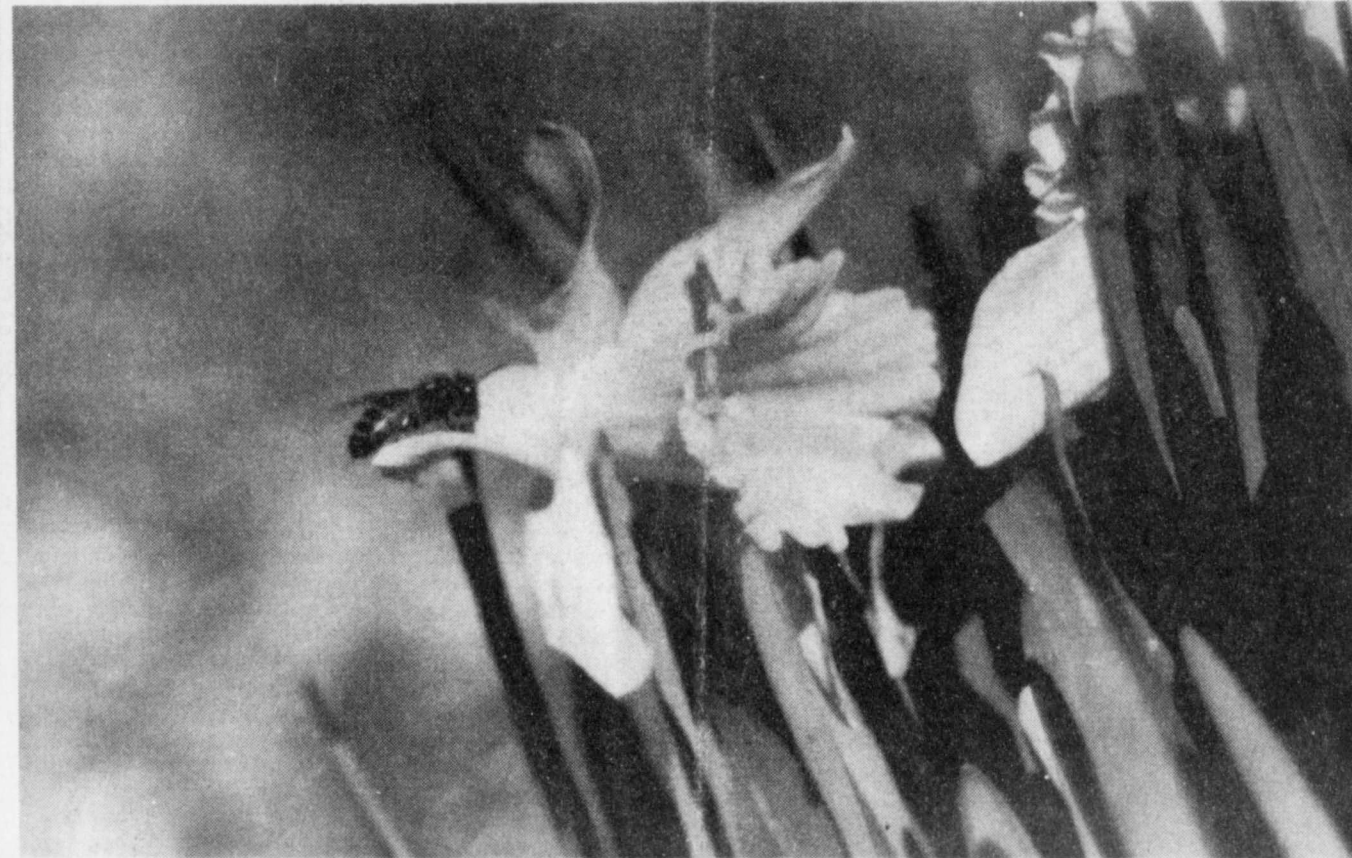

Accident Statistics Show Increase

A four percent increase in rural fatal traffic accidents was recorded in the 18 county Tyler highway patrol district during the month of January, 1984 compared to the same month last year, according to a statistical report released today by district commander Capt. Bill Maley of Tyler.

The report includes two persons who died during January from injuries they received in traffic accidents during the last month of 1983 in Cass and Van Zandt counties.

The report lists nine deaths and nine fatal crashes last month compared to 10 deaths in seven fatal accidents during January, 1983.

Smith County recorded three deaths in three accidents and Wood County reported two fatalities from two fatal accidents during the month. Camp, Cass, Greg and Red River counties recorded one fatality each during the month of January.

DPS troopers investigated 377 total rural traffic accidents during January, 1984 with 229 persons listed as injured in 133 of the accidents.

Non-use of safety belts is a factor in many of the deaths and serious injuries, Capt. Maley pointed out.

"DWI is still a major problem with five of the nine deaths last month being alcohol related," Maley said.

"We have begun a selective traffic enforcement project in Smith and Gregg counties aimed specifically at the DWI offender," Maley stated. "The federally funded project will continue six months," he said.

The statistical report lists rural traffic accidents investigated by DPS troopers during January as follows:

Red River, 12 total accidents; one death; four injuries.

Titus County, 23 total accidents; nine injuries.

Footprints From The Past

Watching television today they had an article about the upcoming baseball season and it got me to thinking about when I was young and had the urge to play baseball every spring and how I would get together with my friends. We would go to all the merchants in town and try to get them to give some money for us to buy some balls and bats.

Well, we would make all the people who had any kind of business, or anyone else we thought that would help, then we would count our money and sometimes we would have almost \$5 or \$6 and as that was during the depression, that much money would buy a lot of balls and bats.

Then we would try to find enough kids to play so we would have enough for a team, sometimes we would have more than we could use and sometimes we wouldn't have enough to play. When we were kids we would have to walk to our games so we would have to get someone close by so we would not have to walk so far.

As we got bigger, we would scrounge around until we found some kids who could get their dads car and then we would have to let him play, even if he was no good, but by the time we were teenagers, we would elect someone who had a car or truck to be our manager and that way we always had a way to go to the games.

Bert Grant was one of the managers that we had and he was a good manager and besides, he had a truck big enough for all of us and he would furnish the gas. We had a pretty good country ball team and we would play anyone anywhere, anytime and we also won more than we lost. We got Boyd Jackson to play with us and he was one of our best players and he had a place where we could play.

Every spring we got together with our hoes and met at Boyds to scrape off the infield and measure off the bases and put up the back stop, then we were ready for anyone we could get to come play us.

We used to play a lot of games with Jhntown and

they had some very good players and we always had to play our very best or we would get beat.

Some we lost, some we won. Some players that I remember as playing for Jhntown were the Pirtle boys and the Guess boys and the one that I will always remember was Chick Dryden. He and I always had a long talk when we played at Jhntown.

Cunningham was another team we had some good games with, as they also had a very good team.

We also played games with Bogata but not very much for some reason or another. I guess it was because that Bogata and Deport did not get along very well with each other. I think that was because we were both jealous of the other as at that time we were about the same size as far as population and each town was trying to be the best and besides it was some old feud that was started long before my time, but both towns still carried it on like the old time feuds from the Tennessee hills.

Do not plant vegetables and other crops too early, warn specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The temperature of the soil plays an important role in the success of early planting. Most crops have limited tolerance to low soil temperatures at planting. A sudden change in weather conditions following planting can be detrimental to the crop, particularly a cool, wet spell that can lower soil temperatures drastically.

Soil temperatures are normally taken at a depth of four inches. Average minimum temperatures for planting are: corn, 50 degrees; sorghum, 55 degrees; and soybeans, 70 degrees. Hardy vegetables such as onions, cabbage and potatoes can be planted once soil temperatures range between 45 and 50 degrees while warm season vegetables such as tomatoes, melons, beans and peppers need soil that has warmed into the 60's.

High quality seed should always be used for any crop. The use of fungicides and other seed protectants is also important. Planting in cool soils often leads to poor seed germination and poor crop stands. Plants that do come up often lack vigor for early growth and this opens the door to early season disease and insect attacks.

Soil temperature information is taken at various locations throughout the state and are included in daily agricultural weather advisories issued for each of the regions by the National Weather Services Southwest Agricultural Weather Service Center at Texas A&M University. The advisories are fed into the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration weather wire teletype system to be received by commercial radio and television stations. The advisories are also carried over the NOAA Weather Radio Network.

Microwave Divinity
 3 c. sugar
 1/2 c. light corn syrup
 Two-thirds c. water
 1/4 t. salt
 2 egg whites
 1/4 t. vanilla extract
 1 c. broken pecans
 In an 8 cup measure combine first three

ingredients. Microwave on high 17 to 19 minutes until mixture reaches hard ball stage, 260 degrees.

Add salt to egg whites in large mixing bowl and beat on high speed with electric mixer until stiff peaks form. Slowly pour syrup in a thin stream into egg whites, beating constantly until mixture loses its gloss and thickens, about 4 or 5 minutes. Stir in vanilla and nuts. Drop at once by spoonfuls onto foil or into buttered dish.

After this very informative program, refresh-

ments were served and the business meeting was held. Secretary Mary Belcher read minutes and discussion was made concerning the scholarship award.
