

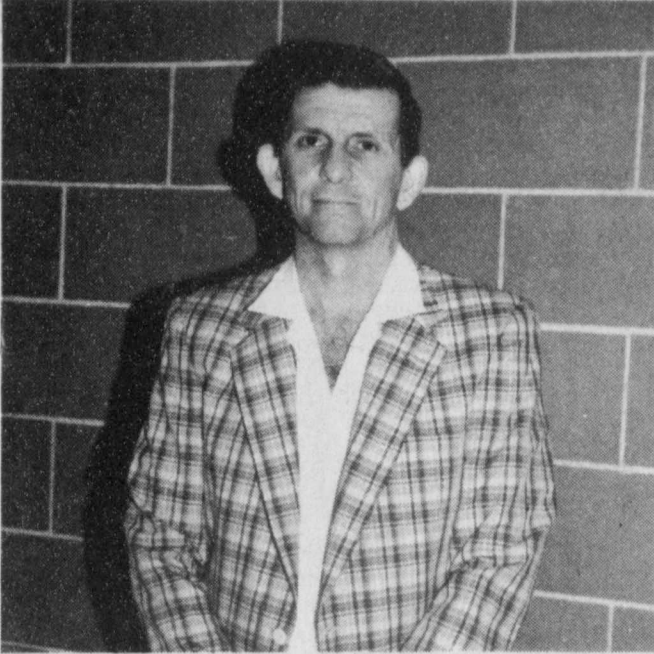

Site Needed For New Post Office

The U.S. Postal Service is seeking a suitable site upon which to build and lease a new main post office building in Bogata, Postmaster Jane Crane said.

The "preferred area" for site consideration is bounded on the north by Sixth Street, on the east by city limits, on the south by Fifth Street, and on the west

by Hwy. 37. Minimum site size needed is 18,750 sq. ft. of land, or a lot with dimensions of 125 ft. by 150 ft.

Property owners are asked to submit their site offerings not later than April 26, 1984 to Bill McMillan, realty management and acquisition specialist, Field

Real Estate and Buildings Office, U.S. Postal Service, P.O. Drawer 239, Dallas, Texas 75221-0239.

After a suitable site has

been located, the Postal Service will call for construction bids for a building that will be built with

private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a long term period. The proposed new post

office building will have approximately 2,320 sq. ft. of interior floor space.

Last week's column on old sayings related to horse drawn travel received such a response that we decided to give it a little more attention, this time at old sayings, not just about horses and their attendant subjects.

Probably one of the oldest sayings we know is "Penny proud, pound poor". This travels across the centuries and the miles to colonial times when America was a colony of Great Britain and used the pound instead of the dollar monetary system.

Other sayings, of which their are millions, that have roots in the past are: "Cutting off one's nose to spite one's face". This may very well have roots in the early penal system of England when "such punishments were meted out." So is the expression "having one's pound of flesh." Back then, when a thief was caught stealing food, it was often fated that the thief had a literal "pound" of flesh slicked off of an arm or leg! Ugh!

Grist for the mill, referring to thought material, usually, is obvious. So is too many cooks spoil the broth or many hands make light work, both sayings from an age when machines and pre-packaging were non-existent to homemakers.

"Tempest in a teapot" is a very old and time-honored expression, and is said to stem from sailors, used to the major storms of sea, making light of small turmoil, usually of a domestic nature.

another ancient wisdom. "Beware of Greeks bearing gifts" although it sound somewhat obscure (there not being too many Greeks in the area) stems from the Biblical time when Greek traders were known to "fleece" customers after first presenting them with trivial presents.

"Idle hands are the devil's workshop" is one which is directly connected to our puritan ancestors who believed in the practice of honest, diligent work, with no time for idleness.

And the last one that comes to mind, although there are many, many more, concerns bad luck. and it goes "if it were raining soup...I'd be out with a fork". Someays, that just about says it!

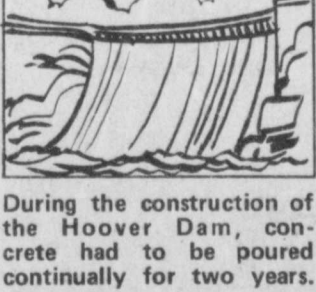

Excess S.S. Tax Can Be Claimed As A Credit

If you worked for two or more employers during 1983 and received wages totaling more than \$35,700, IRS suggests you check the Social Security amount on your Form W-2. If it shows more than \$2,391.90, you can claim the excess as a credit on your tax return, the IRS says. However, if you file a joint return, you and your spouse must make separate computations.

The IRS added that, if you worked for only one employer and more than \$2,391.90 was withheld, you may not claim the excess as a credit against your income tax. Your employer should refund the overcollection to you.

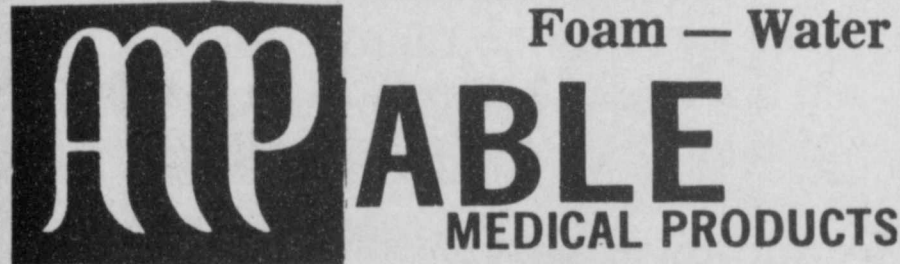

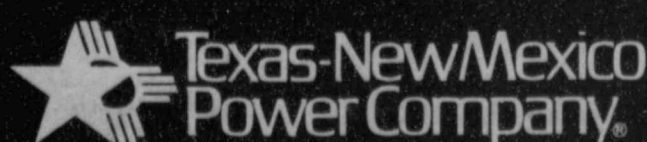

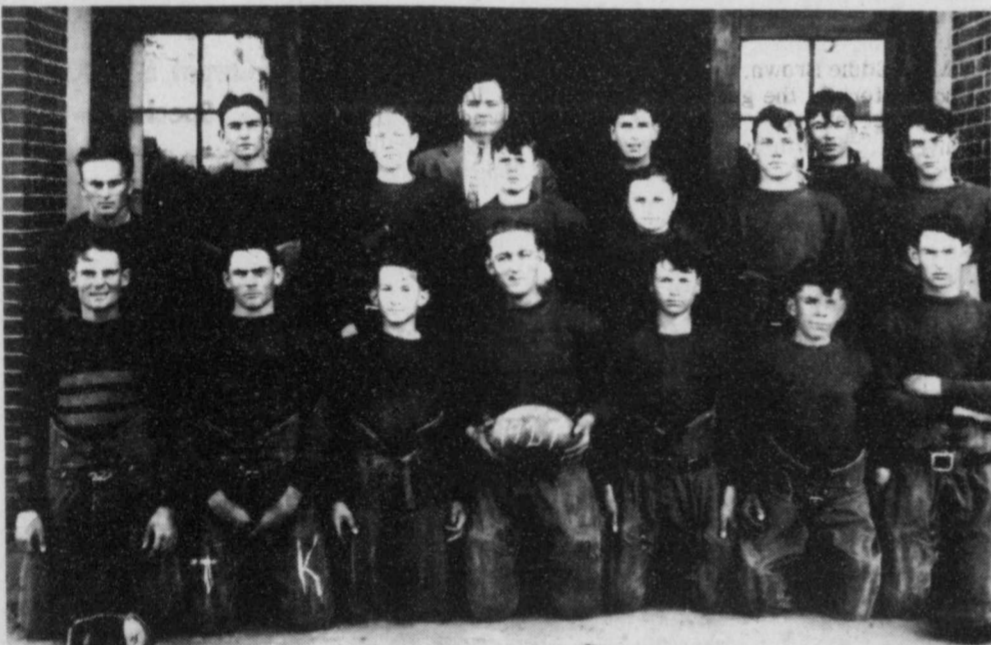

GTE Customers To Begin Dialing Area Code For Long Distance

All General Telephone customers in 214 area code will have to dial the area code for all long-distance calls beginning in June, according to Cynthia Hawthorne, Operations Manager for the company.

Hawthorne said the change affects all telephone companies serving the 214 area.

"The increasing number of customers in this growing area makes this change necessary," Hawthorne said. "We are running out of telephone numbers and the requirement for customers to dial their own area code when dialing long-distance calls within their own area code will relieve the problem by allowing new number combinations."

The change will become mandatory June 3. However, General Telephone customers can begin using the new procedure April 1.

Hawthorne pointed out that there will not be any charge in the way local or toll free extended area service calls are dialed.

She added that some special features in electronic switching systems used by businesses, such as speed dialing tables, toll restriction or route selection tables, will require modification prior to June 3. Customers with this type of system should contact their equipment sales service representative to arrange for any required changes.

Hawthorne said General Telephone personnel will contact customers with systems furnished by General Telephone before the June 3 change.

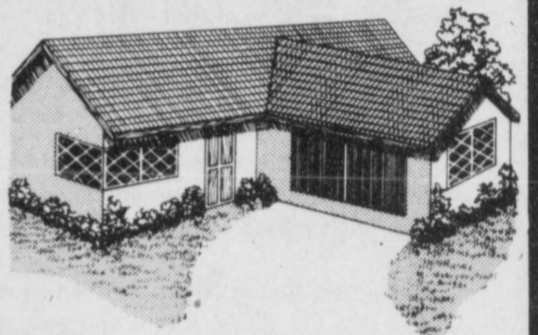

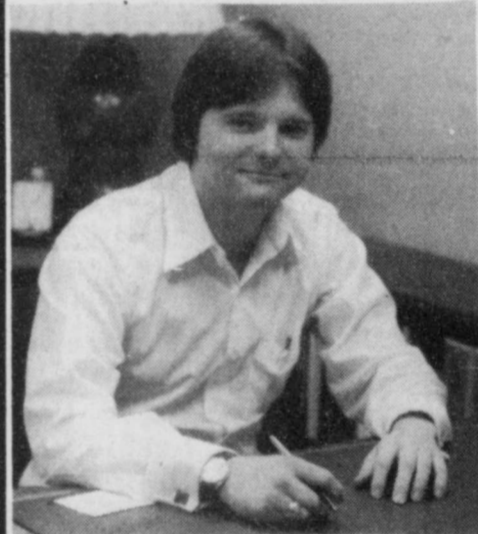

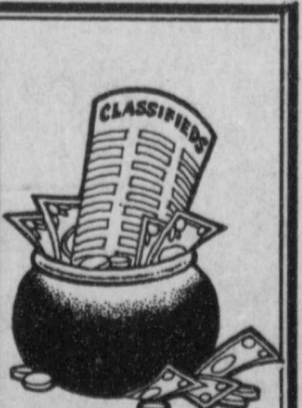
