

Five Race For Talco-Bogata Trustee Positions

The Talco-Bogata CISD trustee election will be held Saturday, April 7 from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Polling will be at Bogata and Talco Elementary Schools.

Five candidates have filed for the three positions to be filled. Filing from the Bogata area are Mildred Eudy, Dr. E.E. Brooks and A.D. Stephenson. Filing from the Talco area are Jerry Russell and Jim Carroll.

One three-year term is to

be filled from the Bogata area; one three-year term to be filled from the Talco area and a one-year term at large will be filled, which will come from either area.

Mildred Eudy is a life-long Bogata resident, married to Bill Eudy. They have two grown children, Sheila and Danny and four grand-children currently in the Bogata Elementary and junior high school system. She is a member of the

First United Methodist Church of Bogata, and active in a number of civic activities.

She is interested in serving on the school board with the interests of what is best for both the school system and the students in mind.

Dr. E.E. Brooks is another long-time Bogata resident. He has served on the school board for the past several years.

Dr. Brooks has his medical clinic in Bogata and he and his wife Carolyn have four daughters. He is very active in the community, and is a member of the First United Methodist Church of Bogata.

A.D. Stephenson has also

served on the school board in past years. He and his wife, Miriam, have two children, one grown and the other still in school. They are members of the First United Methodist Church of Bogata.

Jerry Russell is a life-long resident of Talco and has served on the board for the past three years as member, vice-president and president.

Russell is an Exxon employee and past employee of the Talco-Bogata school district.

He serves as deacon and choir director at Calvary Baptist Church and is coach of the newly organized girl's softball team, the Oilers.

He received his BS and

MS degrees in 1970 and 1974 from ETSU. He and his wife, Barbara Mankins Russell, a teacher at Rivercrest, have two children, Greg and Jerilyn.

Jim Carroll has been a resident of Talco for six years. He is a self-employed building contractor and serves as Sunday School Superintendent of the Assembly of God Church in Bogata.

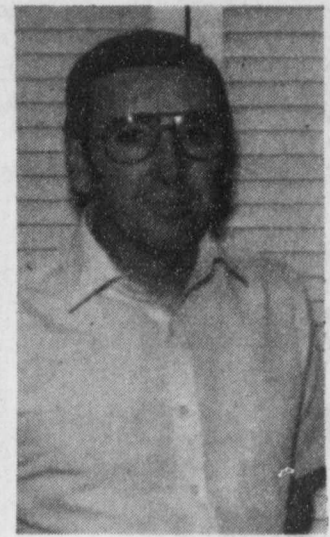
He is on the board of directors of the Talco Housing Project. He is administrator of the First Responders of the Talco Fire Department.

Texas Instruments before coming to Talco. He and his wife, Nelda,

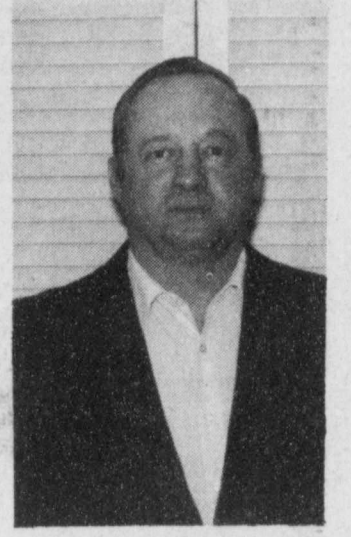
have one son, Gary and a daughter-in-law, Cassie, who reside in Talco.

In the beginning of junior and senior banquets here in Bogata, the activities were held in someone's home. The first one was held in 1929 in the home of Mrs. Neil Howison. The second one in 1930 was held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Luther DeBerry. Aunt Kate wrote to us that her brother, Ona Hudson who was a carpenter, built her a horseshoe shaped table for the banquet. She put it in her living room. Their home was northeast of Bogata where the Gordon Strain home is now. All the mothers helped to prepare the food and also gathered flowers from their yards for decorations. Even with all this help, the

The junior class members were Floyd McCrury, N.A. Harbison, Rayford Bryson, Delbert Wilson, Arlie Guess, Sid Hamilton, Irene Humphreys, Lucille Devlin, Lila Mae Guess, Frances McCluer Griffin, Travis Brook and Leola Ford.

The sophomore girls served the meal. The DeBerry house was a very busy place with 12 juniors and 30 seniors for a meal and party, don't you guess? This was of course the big event of the year for these boys and girls. This night is a pleasant memory for Aunt Kate. She may not be able to attend the homecoming this year but she will be thinking of these students and all her other friends here in Bogata, her home that she loves so much and that she and Mr. DeBerry gave so much to.

The next year, 1931, the banquet was once again held

in the home of Mrs. Neil Howison, which is now the home of John and Joan Howison.

Thank you Aunt Kate for sharing your memories with us and on behalf of this junior and senior class...even now 54 years later again thank you for providing your home as a place for them to enjoy their banquet. This was just wonderful.

We have been having fun the last few weeks reminiscing the past school days and we plan to honor our valedictorians and salutatorians of years past, but we want you to know you need never to have gone to school one day here to be welcome. We want you to come and visit with your friends and perhaps make some new ones. Let's all have a good time together at Bogata School on April 14.

Weatherization Kits Available For Elderly, Disabled In Talco

Texas-New Mexico Power Company has announced a company sponsored program to provide qualified customers with a home weatherization kit. The Help for the Aged Needy and Disabled Program was developed to meet the needs of individuals who are unable to purchase the necessary materials to properly winterize their homes.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company will provide the weatherization kits without

cost. To qualify for the home weatherization kit, the individual must be a residential customer of Texas-New Mexico Power Company and be at least 62 years old, retired or physically disabled.

The Talco Volunteer Fire Department of Talco will be the sole distributor of the kits. Fire department members have indicated that they will assist in installing the materials for qualified applicants.

The home weatherization kit includes: four plastic storm windows, seventeen feet of 'v' seal weather stripping, thirty-six inches of self-adhesive door sweep, thirty feet of rope caulk, eight electrical outlet foam

insulators, four electrical switch foam insulators, one roll of clear weatherstrip tape.

Any aged needy and disabled customer of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in Talco who is interested in participating in the H.A.N.D. program should contact the Talco

Volunteer Fire Department at the City Hall in Talco on Saturday, April 7 from 9 a.m. until 12 noon.
