

Economy Shows Slowdown, Some Decline

The government's forecasting gauge of future economic activity is said to have dropped 1.1 percent during the month of March, 1984, the first such drop in 19 months, the government says this is a signal that

economic growth is headed sharply lower. The Commerce Department reported that its Index of Leading Indicators fell for the first time since a small 0.1 percent slide in August of 1982.

Since then, the index, which is used to predict economic activity six to nine months ahead, has been on a steady upward climb since the nation began some recovery from the recession. The index was unchanged

during the month of November, 1983. A number of prominent economists predict that a slight decrease, or much slower growth rate will continue. They say that the index is

poised to go lower, they argue, because the economy, which had surged to an annual growth rate of 8.3 percent, had definitely slowed. Locally, both the recession and the recovery have

seemed to be slower to come and slower to depart. However, several building contractors contacted said that they definitely had experienced a surge of building growth, having more work to do than in

recent years. Local agriculturists report that their difficulties have not eased however, with skyrocketing expenses and low prices still making farming a risky business. Area businesses report

that they are seeing a reasonable growth rate or are at least holding event.

High Winds Sweep Through Area

High winds which ripped through the area Tuesday night created quite a bit of damage in a path from Paris through Reno and Blossom. Winds were reported in excess of 70 miles per hour and damage to several industrial buildings and businesses such as Hollywood Vasserette were reported. In Blossom a new barn, several carports, roofs and a number of big trees succumbed to the violent storm, which was accompanied by heavy rain, lightning and thunder. Throughout the entire area high winds, although not so extreme as in the Blossom section, did minor damage, tearing up small trees, breaking off limbs and doing some structural damage.

At press time Wednesday more severe weather was forecast, and farmers were watching apprehensively as their newly planted ground awaits the possibility of more heavy rain. Fred White is in St. Joseph Hospital in Paris for the removal of a malignant brain tumor. His hospital insurance was cancelled by the insurance company after his open heart surgery and he is not eligible for medicare until June. An account has been opened in the First National Bank of Bogata and the Talco State Bank for contributions to help them during this crucial time.

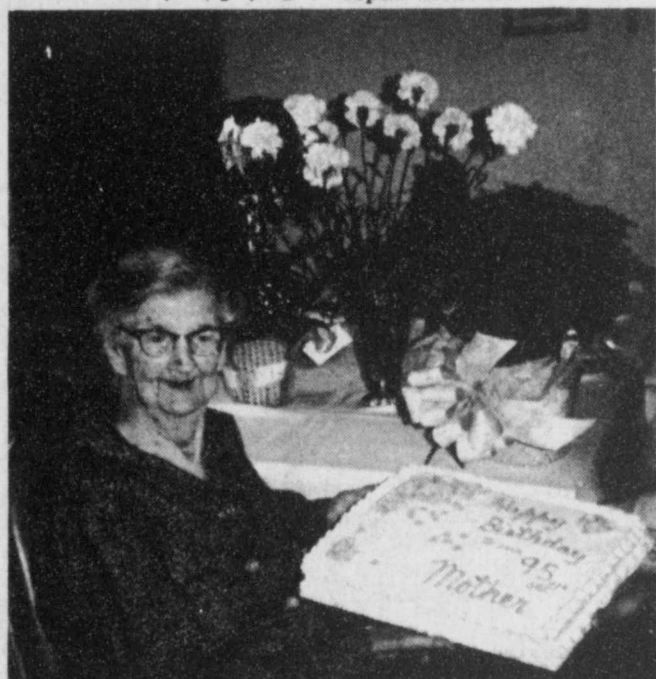
Girl Scouts in Bogata honored their leaders recently during leader appreciation week. Troop 32 gave Kay Ross a desk set and individual notes and gifts.

Speed Healing

Researchers at the University of California, San Francisco have partially purified a substance essential to the healing of wounds, and have shown in preliminary tests on animals that it can substantially accelerate wound healing, and promote it where it had been impossible before. The substance, called angiogenesis factor (in this case from rabbits), stimulates the ingrowth of blood vessels which provide oxygen essential to the cells that kill germs and repair tissue in the wound.

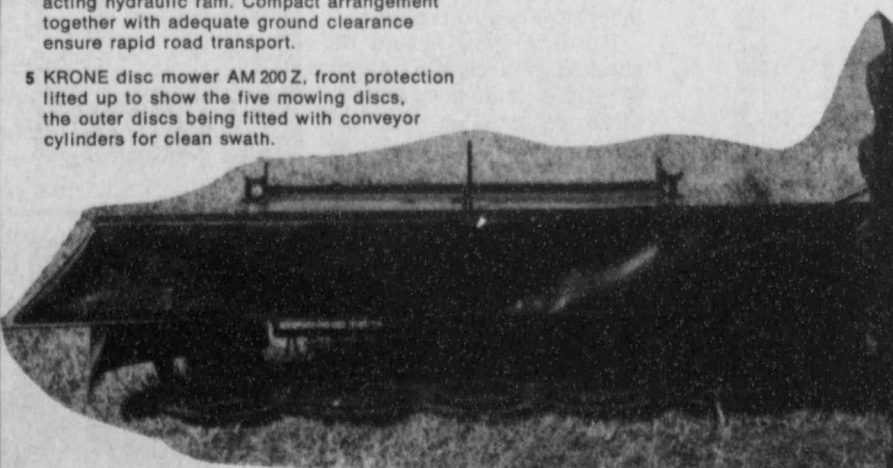

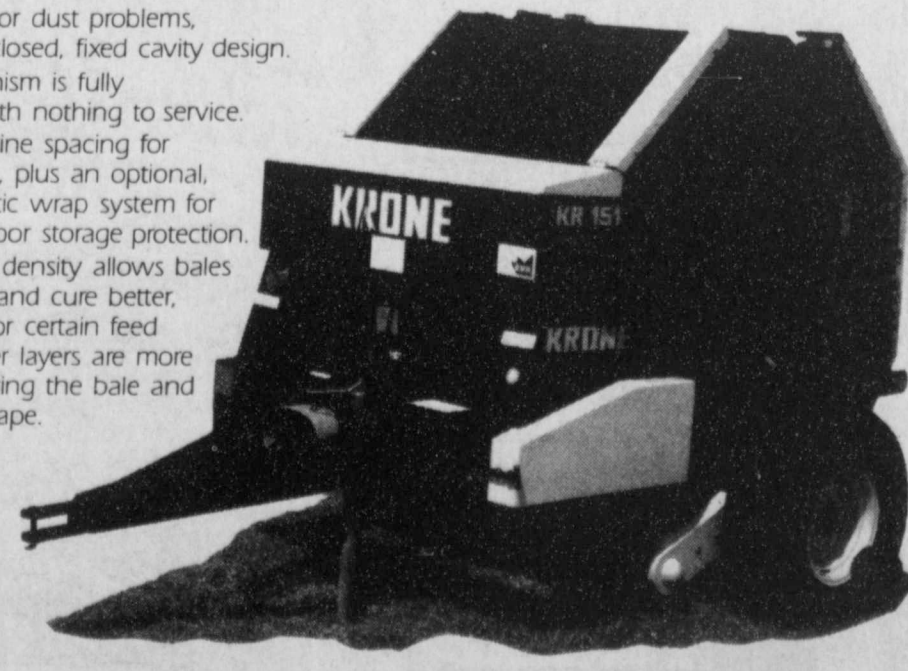

Using insecticide impregnated ear tags to repel hornflies, producers should use one tag in each ear if ear ticks have been a problem. The cow herd should be checked closely to make sure the bull is working. Close observation will indicate which cows are in heat. The cows should be checked 18 to 22 days later to be sure they do not return to heat. If a high percentage of the cows return to heat, this is an indication that the bull needs checked for fertility and possibly replaced. With lush spring forages, consumption of salt will increase. Producers should keep out an adequate supply of fresh trace mineralized salt and mineral supplement. For best results, keep the salt and mineral supplement separate.
