Weekly Agricultural Update

By Herb Brevard Spring has arrived and a majority of the calf crop is on the ground. Now is an excellent time to take care of many of the cow herd

One of the first chores is to make arrangements to sell all cows that have not calved or that calve late. Calves need working as soon possible. management chores as castration of the bull calves and vaccination of all calves for the chlostridium

diseases including blackleg, malignent edemia and Black's disease are critical. All heifer calves should be vaccinated for brucellosis as they reach four months of

Additionally, all calves not to be used for breeding purposes should be implanted with growth im-plants. While the calves are young is an excellent time to dehorn. Fire branding calves is a sure method of herd identification.

Using insecticide impregnated ear tags to repel hornflies, producers should use one tag in each ear if ear ticks have been a problem.

The cow herd should be checked closely to make sure the bull is working. Close observation will indicate which cows are in heat. The cows should be checked 18 to 22 days later to be sure they do not return to heat. If a high percentage of the cows return to hear, this is an indication that the bull needs checked for fertility and possibly replaced.

With lush spring forages, consumption of salt will increase. Producers should keep out an adequate supply of fresh trace mineralized salt and mineral supplement. For best results. keep the salt and mineral supplement separate.






