Accident Injures Seven

Bobbie Giddens of Talco was seriously injured in a two vehicle accident at the intersection of FM 71 and Hwy. 37, 10.3 miles north of Mount Vernon at 9:35 a.m. Saturday, June 9.

Mrs. Giddens was the passenger in a white 1978 Mercury Marquis, driven by her husband, Robert Wayne Giddens. Giddens, age 61, was west bound on FM 71, stopped at the intersection with Hwy. 37, then proceeded into the intersection.

Giddens auto pulled into the path of a yellow 1976 Mercury Marquis, driven by John Robert Pope of Clarksville, who was south bound on Hwy. 37.

Pope's auto struck the Giddens vehicle in the front passenger door, causing the car to skid west into the parking area at the Bussell Store. The Pope auto came to a halt partially blocking the southbound roadway behind the stop sign on the east side of the intersection.

Ambulances from Franklin and Titus counties and Talco responded to the accident, along with both the Talco and North Franklin Fire departments and Titus County Rescues Unit. Investigating Department of Public Safety Trooper, Steve Blake, commended all emergency personnel for their efforts.

Mrs. Giddens, who was trapped in the vehicle for approximately 30 minutes, received emergency treatment from both Franklin

and Titus County emergency medical teams. She was then taken to Titus County Memorial Hospital.

Following her admittance to the hospital, Mrs. Giddens reportedly underwent surgery late Saturday afternoon for a collapsed right lung. She was also reported to have suffered multiple broken ribs, a broken collar bone and severe cuts on the face.

At last report, Tuesday, June 12, Mrs. Giddens had been moved from the hospital's intensive care unit and was reported in stable and improving condition.

Giddens and all five occupants of the Pope auto were taken to Franklin County Hospital via ambulance. Giddens was treated and released for multiple scrapes.

Pope, age 37, was released following treatment for facial injury. His wife, Debra, age 32, was released after examination for shoulder and back injuries, not believed to be serious, and treatment for a laceration to her lower lip.

The Popes' daughter, Tonya Currin, age 9, received treatment for minor abrasions, and was released. Their son, Courtney Currin, age 6, was treated for a broken wrist, and released.

Mrs. Pope's mother, Caludia Whitney of Deport, was examined and transferred on request to McCuiston Regional Medical Center in Paris.

Openings For Girl Scouts At Camp Gambill

Camp Gambill Girl Scout camp opened its camping season on June 3 with approximately 60 girls attending the first one week and two week sessions. According to Linda Woolston, camp director, there are still some openings in the Brownie Friend Maker three day sessions, which will be held June 17-20 and June 20-23. These sessions are designed for younger, first time campers to offer a sampling of camp life. Openings also remain in the one week sessions of June 20-24 and July 1-7. For older girls and more experienced campers, the two week session to be held June 24-July 7 also has several openings. In this session, girls are given the choice of cabins or tents. Fees for the sessions are as follows: \$45 for three days; \$70 for one week; and \$115 for two weeks. Girls who are not scouts and scouts from outside the Red River Valley Girl Scout Council are charged an additional \$20. During the resident camp, girls are given the opportunity to participate in such activities as cooking out, nature crafts, hiking, backpacking, sleeping out and wildlife projects. Some of the waterfront activities include swimming, beach parties, and fishing. Older girls may go canoeing and sailing. Camp Gambill is five miles northwest of Paris and is owned and operated by the RRVGSC. The camping programs are open to all girls ages 7-17. GTE Has Slight Increase Approved

The Public Utility Commission of Texas has approved a slight increase in charges for intrastate long distance calls within the regional calling areas called local access and transports areas established by the federal judge overseeing the divestiture of AT&T and the Bell operating companies. The new charges, effective June 1, do not apply to intrastate calls made between the regional calling areas which are carried by the long distance carriers rather than the local telephone companies. The new rates apply to customers of all local telephone companies, including General Telephone, since the local companies are joint providers of long distance service within each of the regional calling areas.

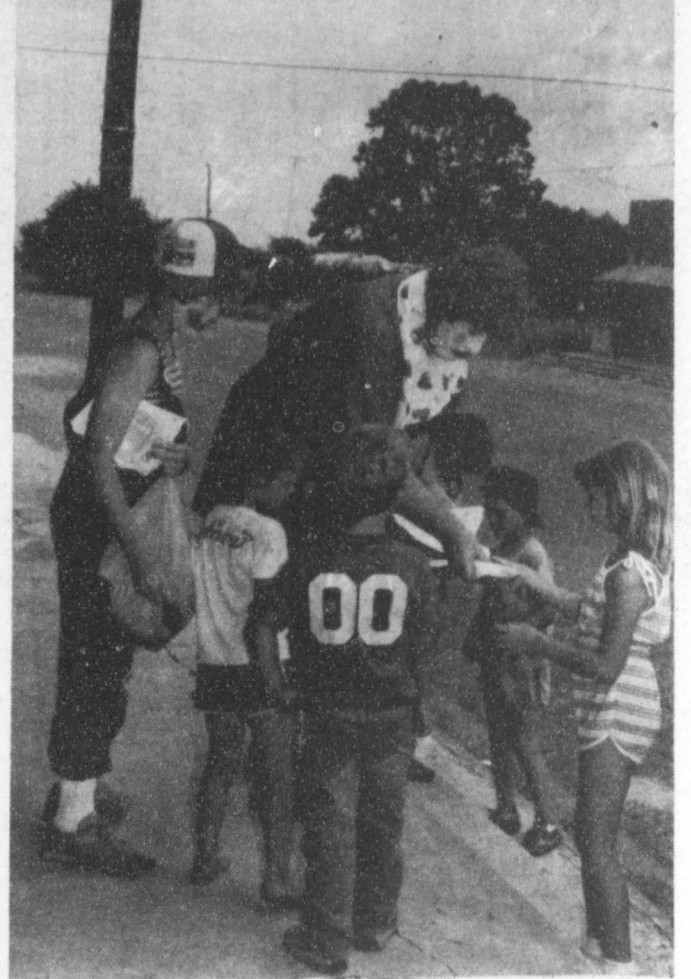

Agricultural Briefs

By Herb Brevard
 During spring and early summer is the time many people repaint their houses. The preparation of the wood and the selection of paint are critical to the success of the job, says Chuck Stayton. If the present paint is not peeling, Stayton recommends using the same paint as before. However, if the paint is peeling or blistering, the loose paint should be removed down to the bare wood. This is particularly true if the lumber is southern yellow pine. A water repellent should be applied to the bare wood and allowed to dry for several days. Follow with a primer and acrylic latex paint that has a 100 percent acrylic binder. Latex paints will stretch as the wood expands and shrinks, thus preventing cracks in the paint. For rough textured surfaces, Stayton suggests using a stain. To show the wood grain, use a penetrating stain. If wood texture is not important, a water base stain may be used. Do not stain a surface which has previously been painted. Temperature is critical when painting. Avoid painting on a hot surface. A good rule of thumb is to start in the shade and stay in the shade. The surfaces to be painted will be cooler and so will the painter. Properly applied paints or stains should have a life of approximately seven years. A little extra care in doing the job right pays dividends in money and labor saved.
