Agricultural Briefs

By Herb Brevard During spring and early cracks in the paint. summer is the time many people repaint their houses. The preparation of the wood and the selection of paint are critical to the success of the job, says Chuck Stayton.

If the present paint is not peeling, Stayton recommends using the same paint as before. However, if the paint is peeling or blistering, the loose paint should be removed down to the bare applied to the bare wood and so will the painter. allowed to dry for several

For rough textured surfaces, Stayton suggests using a stain. To show the grain, use a penetrating stain. If wood texture is not important, a water base stain may be used. Do not stain a surface which has previously been painted.


