

# School Board Readjusts Personnel Positions

One of the major items of the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools was the resignation of Tillman Hale, Rivercrest principal for the past six years, to accept the superintendency of the Buffalo Schools. Mrs. Rosie Hale who has also taught in the district for the past six years submitted her resignation and has plans to teach in the Buffalo Schools.

In other personnel matters, Danny Buchanan was employed as girls basketball coach and teacher at Rivercrest. He is 37 years of age and is a 1965 graduate of Talco High School. He has 10 years of experience in coaching and teaching and has been head girls basketball coach in the Elkhart Schools for the past four years. He is a graduate of East Texas State University. Frank Stubblefield who has had a very successful coaching career at Rivercrest had requested to be relieved of his coaching duties but will remain as a Math teacher at Rivercrest.

Mack Humphrey was employed as Math teacher at Talco Junior High replacing Verda Duncan who retired at the end of the 1983-84 school year. He has teaching fields in Mathematics on both the Bachelors and Masters Degree. He has taught Mathematics in the Detroit and Clarksville Schools and has served as high school principal and assistant superintendent in Clarksville. He is a native of Clarksville and is a graduate of North Texas State University and East Texas State University.

Board approval was given to the firm of Oakerton & Arnold to serve as school auditors for the coming school year. McClanahan & Holmes of Paris has served as school auditors for the past years.

In other matters, principals made progress reports on various summer repairs either completed or in progress on the three campuses. Major work completed on the Bogata campus has been the repainting of the Junior High Building and the laying of some sidewalks. The old ag shop and bus barn at Talco has been painted along with other general maintenance and upkeep to the school facility. The major project under consideration for the Talco Campus is a heating system so that the old boiler system can be shut down because of cost and inefficiency of operation. Only general summer repair and maintenance work is being done at Rivercrest.

Sometime was spent by the Board and administration in reviewing the procedures and instrument being used in the evaluation of personnel in the school district. The purpose of the study and review was to make all Board members aware of procedures being used and for their suggestions on improving and upgrading the procedures for the coming school year so that a more thorough job of evaluation can be done; to pin-point areas in performance in need of improvement and methods to resolve these problems.

In final matters, the Rivercrest Student Handbook, with the exception of a couple of items concerning attendance and homework, was approved. Also, the results of the TABS tests were presented to the Board and the various financial reports were approved. The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, July 10 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the general public cordially invited to attend.

## Talco To Have Account At Blood Center

Talco will have a Community Account at the newly opened Stewart Blood Center Donation Site located in the Harris Building at Mt. Pleasant.

The account will be listed under the name of the Calvary Baptist Church, No. 6438, which will benefit all of the Talco community. Information may be obtained by calling Marion Coon at 379-3981.

The blood center is near the intersection of Alabama and Johnston streets, and the office number is 572-3620.

The center will cover hospitals in the Titus County and surrounding area, and will provide blood where needed.

Niece Jenkins, medical technician and LVN with the local center said that donating blood is a simple procedure. The average person has 10 to 12 pints in his or her body. A healthy donor can replace the fluid they have donated within 24 hours.

Anyone who is eligible to donate blood is also eligible to participate in the center's Life Share Group Plan.

This plan assures unlimited blood replacement for donors and their families when and if they need a blood transfusion. You simply have to pledge a pint of blood for a year.

Due to a recent scare concerning disease there have been a lowered number of blood donors. However, medical authorities say it is virtually impossible to contract a disease when donating blood, and also unlikely when receiving a transfusion.

Blood is carefully screened at the center, they test every donor, each pint of blood is tested.

People are urged to contact the above numbers for complete information.

To most producers, recent rains were very beneficial. However, some bad things often come with the good. The rainfall, plus high humidity and cloudy weather has created an environment conducive to the development of brown rot on peaches. This is

especially true for varieties nearing ripening.

Growers should keep a close watch on the peaches for any signs of brown rot or other diseases. Even those producers who have been following a strict spray schedule should be aware of the situation and follow through on spray applications, possibly at shorter intervals.

Philly says that preharvest sprays should begin two to three weeks before anticipated harvest. Some fungicides can be applied the day before harvest while others have a waiting period of several days. Check the labels to determine the proper application rates, procedure and waiting period.

Vegetable diseases will also be increasing on most crops that are susceptible to foliar diseases. Septoria leaf spot on tomatoes, alternaria on cantaloupe and numerous fruit rots may become

### Agricultural Briefs

The season is approaching for tick and flea infestations. Some reports have already been received of infestations in yards and on pets.

Since ticks are vectors of some important human diseases, persons would be wise to control any infestations. One of the most common tick borne diseases is Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Hikers, campers, etc. should protect themselves from tick bites by applying insect repellent to shoes and trouser legs. Layering clothing will also help. Robinson says to put pants legs inside boots and keep shirt tails tucked in.

Ticks can be controlled in yards by treating with dursban or diazinon. Pets should also be treated with a recommended pesticide which can be purchased from local outlets or veterinarians.

Fleas are a nuisance and can also spread diseases. Control measures used for ticks will also control flies. More than one application of some insecticides may be necessary.

Inside the home, it is essential to eliminate or treat areas where eggs are laid and fleas are found. Cracks and crevices should be thoroughly tested with an approved insecticide. Carpets should be vacuumed regularly and the dust bag disposed of properly and quickly.

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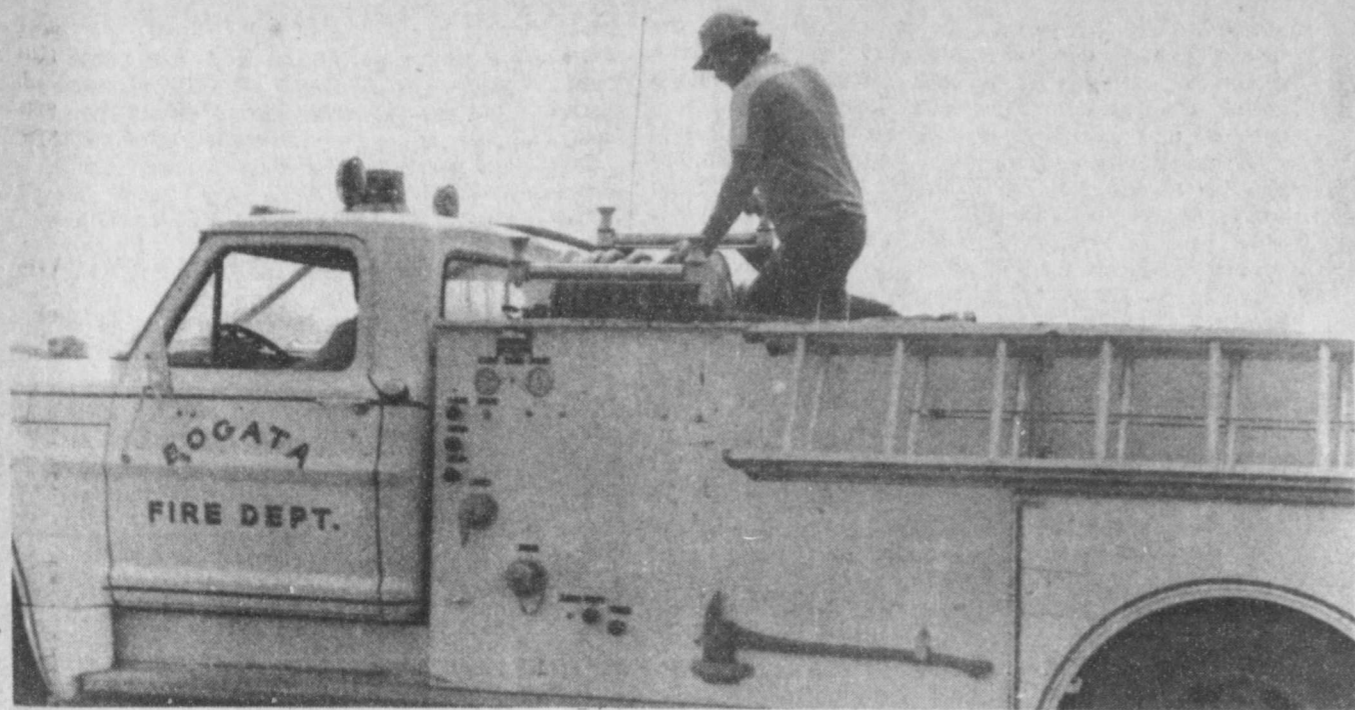

### Local Citizens Attend Democratic Party Convention

Going to a Texas political convention is a great experience in the American democratic process. Naomi and J.C. Watson, Vashti and Worth Hood and I had that experience June 15-16 as delegates and alternates at the Democratic Party Convention at Houston, along with 5500 others from all over Texas.

Getting to be a delegate isn't hard. In a rural county like Red River, it has sometimes been impossible to recruit enough participants. Delegates must take time off from their own work and must pay their own expenses to a Party Convention. Although hotels give special convention rates, expenses can add up. Even so, a convention is probably cheaper than a trip to Hot Springs or Branson, and certainly cheaper than the briefest shopping trip to Dallas!

I'm proud that Bogata citizens took such an active part this year. At the Precinct Convention in Bogata after the May 2 primary election, eleven delegates were named to attend the Red River County Convention on May 16. Nine of us actually attended, which means that Bogata's votes were a large percentage of the county total.

At Clarksville, four bogatans were among the ten elected to go to Houston, and one more was named as alternate; Ed Bryson of Bogata introduced a resolution calling for a direct primary vote on Presidential candidates in Texas, as is the practice in many other states. The resolution was adopted unanimously and sent to Democratic Party state headquarters.

The convention process began before we left Bogata. As a guest, I attended a delegation caucus in Lamar County, where veterans of previous conventions told newcomers how it would be, and talked about issues and candidates. On June 13, Worth Hood and I had telephone calls from a Gary Hart staffer, urging us to attend a caucus of Hart Delegates Friday afternoon, before the Convention opened officially. Hart himself would be there to greet us.

From this and other news, it appeared that Hart was still very much "in the

game", though Mondale seemed to have the nomination for President sewed up. Many at Houston seemed to think it likely that Mondale would choose Hart as the Vice-Presidential nominee. Walter Mondale was in Houston for a "Salute to Bentsen" dinner Thursday night, but we did not see him.

Leaving Bogata before daylight Friday morning, I rode to Houston with Martha and Roy Castleberry of Deport, who were on the Lamar County delegation. Martha is a veteran of Democratic Party activity, so I learned a lot about what to expect in Houston.

Arriving at our hotel there, we found the Watsons and the Hoods, who had driven down together, already in line to register. I managed to find my daughter, Martha, who was a delegate from Irving.

The First Senatorial District delegation, of which Red River County is a part, proved to be a very congenial group. Sybil

Colson of Clarksville headed the Red River delegation. Judge Ed Miller from Texarkana and Jeanie Stanley of Kilgore were our district leaders. From Lamar, besides the Castleberry's, there were several old and new friends, including Ruth and Leighton Cornett, Rachel and Judge Braswell, Brady Fisher, Mary Leonard, John Washington and Dixie Rector's daughter-in-law, Ellen Stringfellow. From Mt. Vernon there were Truman Griggs, Sid Hicks and Lillie Bush, and from Mt. Pleasant Bill Russell.

Many delegates showed their local pride with badges, T-shirts, placards and banners. J.C. Watson wore his "Bank in Bogata" cap and was right in style.

The Convention schedule ran from six p.m. on Friday into the wee hours, and from Saturday morning until 9:30 that night. There were no recesses, so that even getting a bite to eat meant leaving your seat and risking missing an im-

portant vote. We adopted and rejected scores of policy resolutions, elected delegates to the San Francisco National Convention and other officials, and heard brief speeches by Governor Mark White, Senator Doggett and other prominent state officials and Democratic figures. We had hoped that Senator Ed Howard, Representatives Pete Patterson and Alex Short, and some of our elected officials from Red River County would appear, but they were not at the convention.

In the voting on resolutions and for Party offices and nominations, the delegates from Bogata won some and lost some, occasionally find each other on different sides. On the whole, we were very pleased. Perhaps our greatest disappointment was that support for a direct presidential primary, so strongly favored in this neck of the woods, is still not Party policy. Maybe next year....

## Drinking And Driving Serious Problem

Approximately 100 million adult Americans drink alcoholic beverages. Some drink and drive, in fact, all too many. At least 55 percent of all fatal accidents involve alcohol use. These accidents occur most often late in the evening and early morning hours. These accidents occur on weekends. Most involve a single vehicle.

The young men and women of our country are the group most affected by this social menace. The age group of 16-24 years accounts for about 34 percent of all alcohol related fatalities while representing less than 22 percent of all licensed drivers. On any given night, one out of every 50 drivers on the road are drunk. Alcohol is a depressant. It works on the central nervous system, slowing down brain and spinal cord activity.

Reaction time and coordination are considerably impaired with increasing intoxication, as is vision. Alcohol is rapidly absorbed into the blood stream. Some is instantly absorbed through oral tissues upon taking a sip. When it reaches the stomach, about 25 percent of the alcohol is immediately absorbed into the blood through the stomach wall.

Within 20 to 30 minutes, the remainder of the consumed beverage is processed through the intestinal tract into the blood stream. The blood carries it to all organs and tissues. The brain, rich in blood and having a high water content, is quickly affected. A full stomach can slow the ab-

sorption process, not stop it. A normal person, drinking two drinks or two beers in an hour, will have a blood alcohol content of about 0.04 percent. The legal intoxication point in Texas is 0.10 percent, or one drop of alcohol for one thousand drops of blood.

Society's total financial loss including wages, productivity and medical and legal cost exceeds \$10 billion annually as a result of alcohol related traffic accidents.

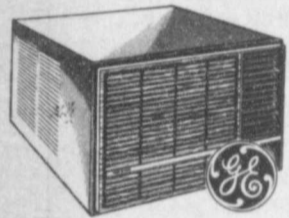

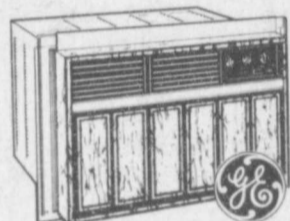
