

E.P.A. Sewer Grant In Order For Bogata

The City Council of Bogata met in regular session on July 10 at 7:00 p.m. with Mayor Pro-Tem Morris Foster presiding. Councilmen present were Morris Foster, Travis Hale, Pat Cowan and Robert Bishop. Others present were Mildred Eudy, Ted Byndas, Barney Sawyer, Bill Hayter and Bill Stringfellow. Mayor Pro-Tem Foster called the meeting to order and asked Travis Hale to give the invocation. Consideration of hiring a Bond Consultant was tabled until the next regular meeting.


Foster reported on discussion with Texas New Mexico Power Company about additional street lights. J.N. Lee reported on street repairs. The Board moved to repair Alameda Drive and East Fifth to Highway 271, to patch streets on South Main, South Bryson, and Patterson and also to add culverts to the north end of the alley and the intersection of North Bryson and Third Street, and to buy one load of oil to mix with sand for the patch work.

The Board also moved to hire one or two part time employees, high school students, for summer work to help read the water meters and trash pickup. Barney Sawyer reported on Bobby Williams water bill and stated he would get back in touch with the City Council after contacting Lone Star Gas Company. Mildred Eudy, City Judge, reported on fines for the month and the revenue collected. Ted Byndas, City Marshall, reported on the activities in the city. He asked the Council if there was an

ordinance against stands that were set up during the rodeo. It was stated that it was necessary for them to obtain a permit from the City Secretary. There was a lengthy discussion on an Open Container Law Ordinance. Barney Sawyer reported on zoning ordinances. He is to furnish a copy of a zoning ordinance and also building permits at the next regular council meeting. Bill Hayter, Management Consultant, reported that the city was three months into the fiscal year. He

furnished the council with a print-out of expenses for these three months. The Council moved to pay off a note on a waterwell of \$6,110.00, to put \$10,000 in a 30-day C.D. out of the general fund, to put \$6,000 in a 30-day Pass Book Savings Account out of the Revenue Sharing and to pay the Appraisal Board. Hayter reported that the E.P.A. Sewer Grant was in order and at this point and they, funds are available. He also reported that Austin had received an application on a Street Grant and it looked in order.

J.N. Lee is to check on the cost of a pulling pump and report at the next Council meeting. The City Council moved to approve the Accounts Payable list. It was reported that the City is looking for a Housing Coordinator. The City Council tabled discussion on the purchase of a city flag. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

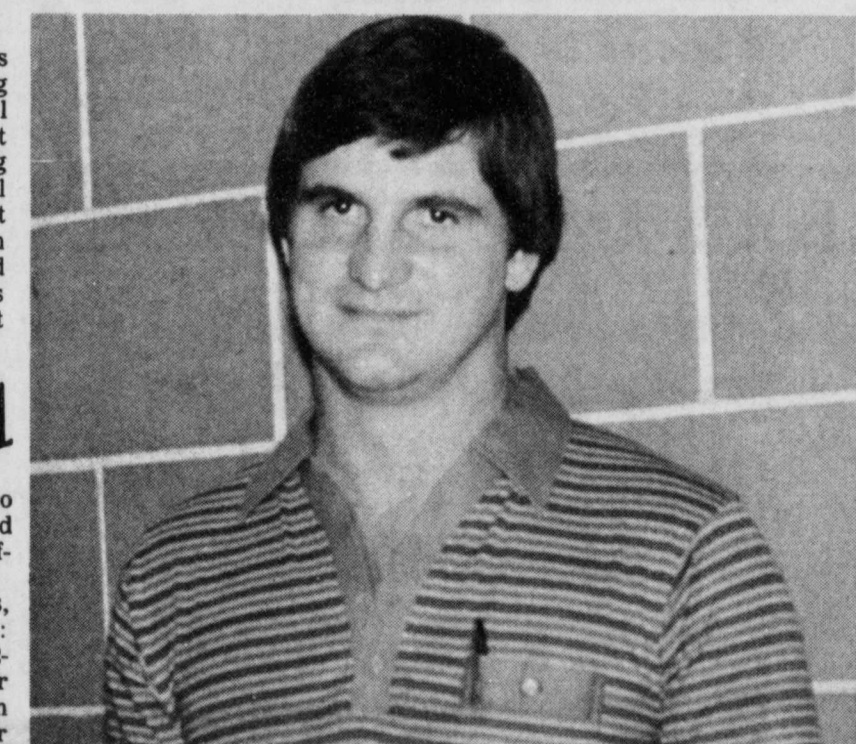

U.I.L. Requirements Changed

The U.I.L. rules for athletic physicals have changed for the year 1984-85. All junior high athletes will be required to have a physical before they may participate in any sport. All high school students who had a satisfactory physical last year need have only a medical appraisal form filled out by their parents this year.

All ninth graders must have the regular physical this year as previously required. All students who plan to try out for any sport must get their physicals before they will be permitted to try out. The physicals should be taken care of by August 8 for football players. They should be taken care of by all other athletes before school starts.

The physical forms are at Talco and Bogata Elementary Schools and at Dr. Miller's and Dr. Brook's offices. Pine Branch Sports its Own Air Show

Through the centuries, man has envisioned himself being able to fly like a bird. Finally in the 1980's and in Bogata, this has become a reality. "The closest thing to really flying that there is!" is how Barney Gayler describes his new sport, flying his ultra-light plane. Gayler, vice-president of the First National Bank in Bogata and a resident of Pine Branch, has been piloting his new craft for the last two months. This type of flight gives one the sensation of soaring through space like a bird. Gayler has monitored the development of the "Weedhopper" closely since 1978. He first saw one of the crafts in a farm magazine and wanted one from then on. The sheer enthusiasm and enjoyment Gayler has displayed has drawn the interest of local residents. One of them has gone so far as to purchase one of the ultra-lights for himself. Merle Smith, a resident of Bogata for several years, has been flying his crimson and white Weedhopper for only a week. "I just

can't get enough of it," is how he describes his feelings on the sport. This sport should not be attempted without proper instruction. It is not really difficult to learn to fly the aircraft, but a qualified instructor's experience is invaluable. Safety and common sense are prime requirements for participation in this sport. The aircraft itself is simple in construction. The entire plane weighs less than 254 pounds. The struts (supports) are constructed of anodized aircraft aluminum. The wings are double surfaced rip-stock nylon and feature a wingspan of 28 feet and an overall wing surface of 168 square feet. The engines are 27 to 47 horsepower which will enable a person to climb 300 to 500 feet per minute. They carry less than five gallons of fuel and are available in any color scheme to suit the taste of the individual. It is recommended that these aircraft not be flown in winds over ten miles per hour. Although the craft is rated at 10,000 feet, it is recommended that one stay under

3,000 feet to avoid air traffic. The ultra-lights are not equipped with radios and because of this, cannot land at a controlled airport. On land we are restricted to beauty only this view can give. 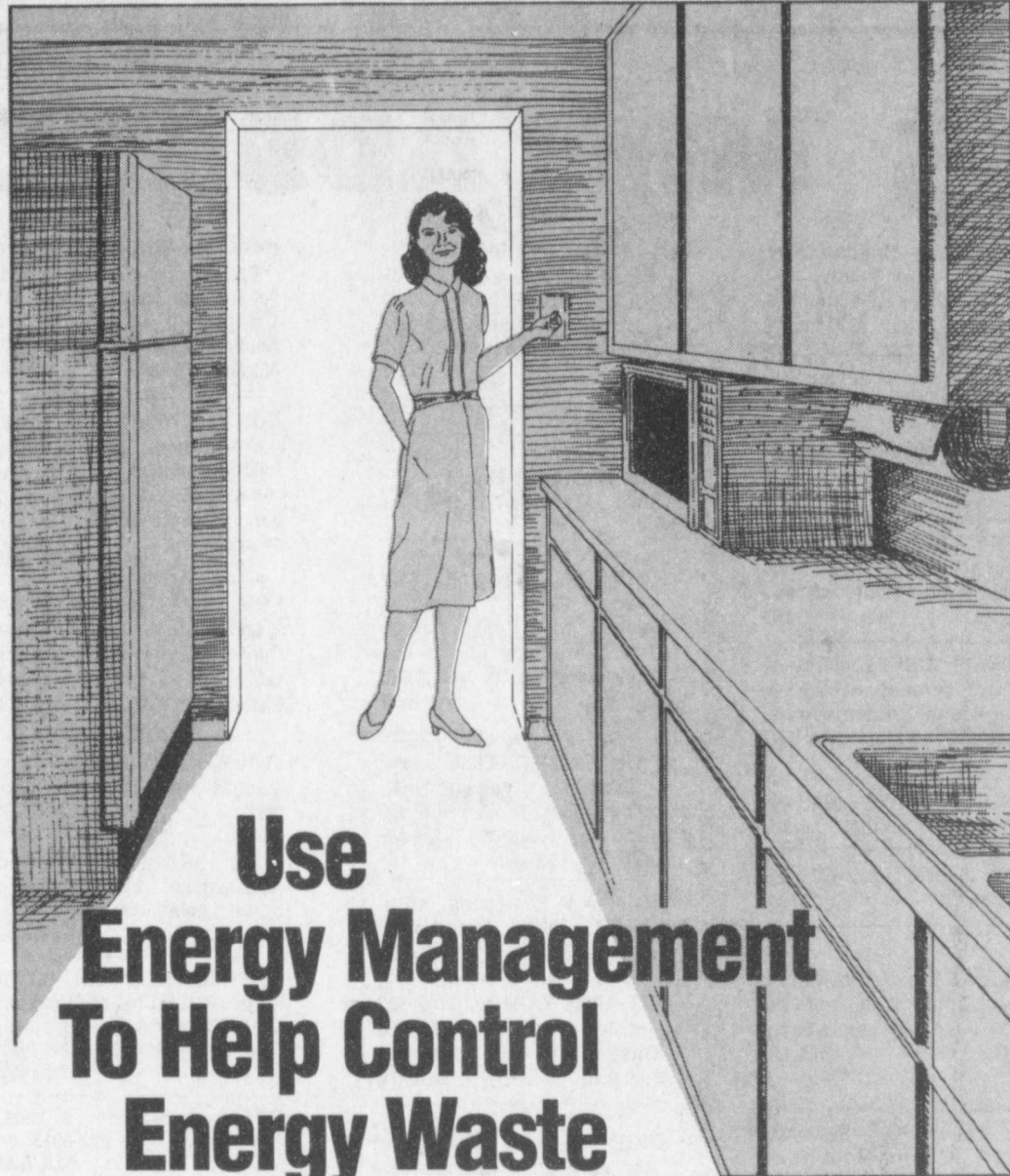
