

The Post Office, A Vital Part Of A Town

The first errand many people can recall being trusted with as a child was "going to the post office". The feeling of importance and responsibility, plus the anticipation of what might be in the mail made it a pleasurable errand to run.

And few people every completely outgrow the feeling of curiosity as they check the mail box, even knowing that there is likely to be more bills than anything else!

The local post office is as much a part of the community as the volunteer fire department or the schools. In many ways it is the communication hub of a small town, not just because of the mail, but because it provides a perfect center to exchange local news and happenings as people sift in and out, but because the postmaster is a well of vital information about nearly anything.

In Bogata, Blossom, Deport, Talco, Cunningham and Pattonville, the post office serves as a convenient meeting place for impromptu get-togethers, the place to go where sooner or later most of the citizenry will pass by. And all the postmasters agree that it should also be listed as a central directory for the town, because of the numerous requests for information concerning where people live, what time an event is scheduled, or who to consult about a problem.

Jack Crane has been the postmaster in Bogata for three years. Although not a Bogata native, he has been accepted into the community, and expresses gratitude towards the citizens for their graciousness.

He and his wife and two boys originally come from Newport News, Virginia.

Crane is excited about the new post office which is soon to be constructed in Bogata.

The new post office will be keyed, and eliminate the need for the old combination locks currently in service. Crane says his most often heard request is to get mail out of the box.

He also expresses satisfaction with the service the post office currently supplies, and the modern methods which will be upcoming within the next ten years.

A bar code which will read the letters will increase mail processing efficiency soon...and he tells of a copy system where a letter won't ever leave where it's sent from, but instead a machine copy will be hand delivered at the destination. All this is in the near future.

Crane also points out that there hasn't been a rate increase in three years due to the more efficient operation of mail service. He expresses pleasure at working in a small town post office and plans to be here for many years.

Crane points out that the post office handles billions of pieces of mail and there will, of course, be mistakes occasionally, but that it is still one of the best, fastest and most efficient international communication form in the world.

Local art is beginning to be displayed in the Bogata Post Office. Plants adorn the inside, which he cares for personally. At Christmas,

Crane sees to it that the post office is one of the best decorated places in town!

Grace Hearnon is the postmaster in Talco, and has been since August of 1982. She has been employed by the office since 1966 and loves her work.

She says that the post office is more convenient for customers than a rural route, and folks can run their errands in town and pick up their mail, too.

Her pet peeve is when the mail truck is late and the mail piles up.

She says her job is never dull, with people coming and going, each adding their little bit of information

about what is happening in the world as they are waited on.

The most unusual thing that ever happened to her was a man who walked in and said "This is a stick up". She froze, since he was a stranger and she thought he was serious. The man then informed her he was "only kidding" and left. She hasn't seen him again, and doesn't really care to!

Grace has a collection of mail boxes in the post office besides the regulation ones. People began to bring her the figurines, salt and pepper shakers, metal or wooden replicas from all over, and the collection continues to grow. They

are displayed on a shelf in the office. She has old fashioned boxes, rural boxes, new types and unusual ones. They are crocheted, carved, molded and painted and make a nice, personal touch to the post office.

At Cunningham there is no separate building, but rather postmaster Nelda Musgrove tends to the mail, which is put in boxes located within the Musgrove Store building. The operation is small, personal and very much an integral part of the Cunningham community.

Each post office in each community has its own personal touch, added by each postmaster.

It is one of the centers of small town life...the hub of society in many ways. The post office is the place where the elderly receive the precious letters that keep them informed about family, where teenagers receive the notice that they have been accepted into college, where Christmas presents to kids are picked up. It is a place special, and unique to the small town.

U.I.L. Requirements Changed This Year

The U.I.L. rules for athletic physicals have changed for the year 1984-85.

All junior high athletes will be required to have a physical before they may participate in any sport. All high school students who had a satisfactory physical last year need have only a medical appraisal form

filled out by their parents this year.

All ninth graders must have the regular physical this year as previously required. All students who plan to try out for any sport must get their physicals before they will be permitted to try out.

The physicals should be taken care

of by August 8 for football players. They should be taken care of by all other athletes before school starts.

The physical forms are at Talco and Bogata Elementary Schools and at Dr. Miller's and Dr. Brooks' offices.

Football Physicals Due Soon

All boys in grades 9-12 who plan to play football at Rivercrest High School this fall should report to the field house Wednesday, August 8 at 4 p.m.

Shoes and shorts will be issued to players. Any student who has not filled out a medical appraisal form should do so immediately by meeting time on August 8.

Forms may be acquired at the doctor's offices or at any one of the Talco-Bogata School campus offices. All freshmen must have a physical examination on file before practicing for any sport.

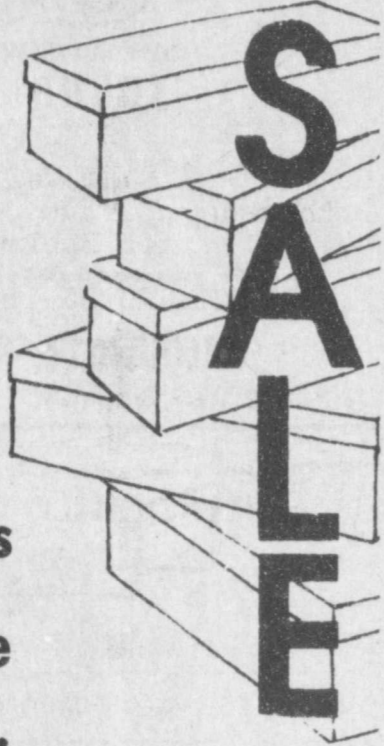

Footprints From The Past

This past Thursday the wife said that it was time to get some peaches to put up for winter when we would like some peach cobbler or some preserves or maybe some good fresh peaches. We set out to see what we could find.

I called my brother and he said he knew where we could find some good peaches, so we went by and picked up he and his wife and sure enough, we found some. After stopping and having a good meal of catfish, we came on home and proceeded to peel and put the peaches in plastic bags for the freezer that was not too much of a job for all we had to do was to peel them, cut them to the size we wanted them and put them in a plastic bag and seal them and put them in the freezer.

The jellies were a little more trouble as we had to cook them just right and put them in jars and seal them, but first the jars had to be washed and scalded and then when the jelly and preserves were cooked, we put them in the jars and sealed them and put them away for this winter. But in the days when I was growing up, it was a lot different as there were no freezers to put them in and all the peaches or whatever you were canning had to be cooked some as we had no gas stoves we had to build a fire in the wood cookstove, heat the water in the teakettle, put the jars in an old dish pan and wash them. Then we had to keep the fire

going so we could cook whatever we were canning, then we would seal the jars and let them set overnight. The next day we would check them to be sure that they were sealed good, for we didn't want all that canning to spoil and that is just what it would do if there was just a little leak.

I always hated canning day because, first there was the wood to cut and bring in for the stove, and then it had to be fed every so often to keep it going and all the time the kitchen just kept getting hotter and hotter and the flies would eat you up if you got outside where you could get a little breeze, and I never could decide which was worse, the flies or the heat, so I usually just stayed in the kitchen and fussed about having to help with women's work when I could have been playing ball or doing something. But that winter when we were eating some good homemade jelly or had a fresh peach cobbler I was mighty glad that Mom had made me stay in and help with the canning.

Back in those days you could not go to the store and pick up fresh vegetables like you can now, so we would can them and put them in the storm cellar for the winter.

I can still remember how hot it would get canning. I think two of the jobs I hated the worst was washing jars, peeling peaches and churning it was always hot and the flies were awful.

8. The Champion Pot of Stew will be judged on taste, appearance and quality by a competent judge selected by the Stew Cook-off committee.

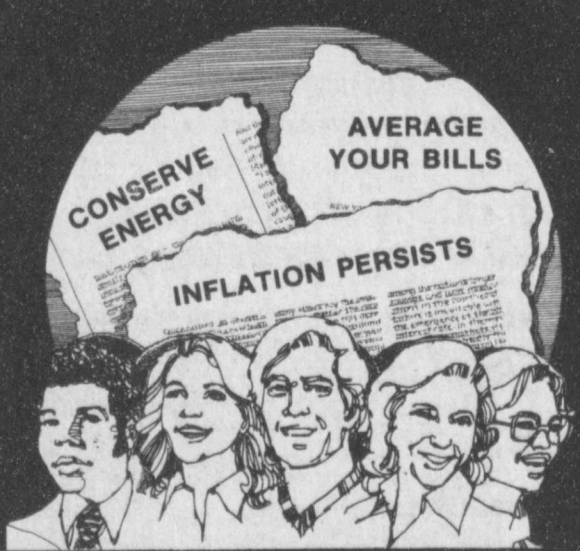
9. Cash prizes will be awarded to the champion, second and third place winners. A trophy will also be awarded to the winners.

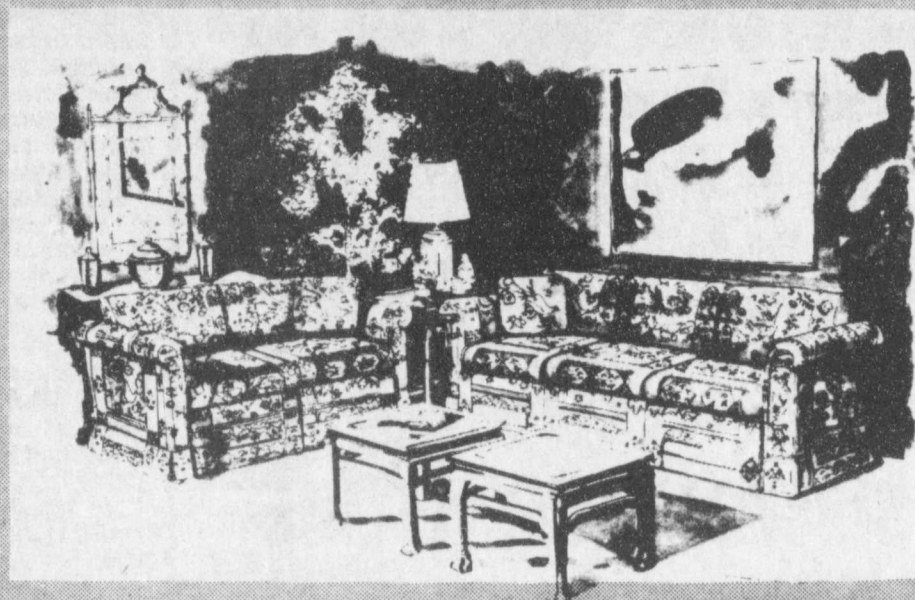

PJC Fall Registration Schedule

To better serve working persons in the Paris area, Paris Junior College has revised the registration schedule for the fall semester to include an expanded registration from August 22-25 with new evening and Saturday hours added for convenience.

The originally scheduled early registration period August 13-17 has been cancelled, and registration on the Paris campus will begin Wednesday, August 22 and continue until noon Saturday, August 25, explained Dr. Eric Priest, vice president for student services. Registration at the off campus centers in Greenville, Mt. Pleasant and Sulphur Springs will start on August 20.

Registration dates and times for the Paris campus follow: Wednesday, August 22, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Thursday, August 23, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Friday, August 24, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and Saturday, August 25, 8 a.m. to noon. Students will begin registration with advisors in the McLemore Student Center Ballroom that week. Classes will begin Monday, August 27.

Many courses have been scheduled on Fridays, Saturdays and evenings to meet community needs. New evening courses in elementary French and Italian are on the schedule for the first time this year. Complete schedules of daytime and evening courses in general academic and occupational areas may be obtained by writing, calling or going by the Admissions Counseling Office in the Rheudasil Learning Center.

Students planning to enroll for six or more hours are encouraged to apply for financial assistance by

calling, writing or going by the Financial Aid Office. Financial aid applications and course schedules also may be obtained at the three off campus centers.

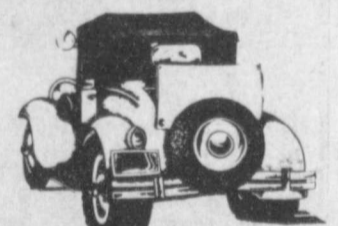
